

### Town Warrant of March 14, 1916

- ARTICLE I. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year. (See list of officers.)
- ART. II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same. Voted to raise three thousand dollars. Adopted.
- ART. III. To see if the town will vote to rebuild the bridge across Boat Meadow Brook and raise and appropriate money for the same. Voted to raise five hundred dollars. Adopted.
- ART. IV. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate two hundred dollars to be paid to the District Nurse Association for the support of a nurse in town. The money to be used at the discretion of the association, under the advice of the physicians. Adopted.
- ART. V. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars for the purpose of securing the services of the Suncook Cornet Band for a series of free band concerts. Adopted.
- ART. VI. To see if the town will raise and appropriate twenty-five dollars for the observance of Memorial Day. Adopted.
- ART. VII. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of nineteen hundred dollars for maintenance of state highway within the town. Dismissed.
- ART. VIII. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers, heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- ART. IX. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
- ART. X. To see if the town will vote to have installed three hydrants in the vicinity of Allenstown depot and maintain the same; one near the store of Pennell Bros. one on the main road near the residence of Charles Fisher; and one on the river road near the residence of John M. Howe. Adopted.
- ART. XI. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary amount of money to secure State aid for the permanent improvement of its main highways. Adopted.

### School Report

To the School Board of the School District of Allenstown:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report of the schools of Allenstown.

#### WORK ACCOMPLISHED.

Better results have been accomplished in our schools during the year last past than during any year since the schools have been under my supervision. The work in folk dancing and domestic arts has been carried on progressively. In the manual training department large projects are being worked out by the pupils which is most desirable.

Music and drawing have been taught by the same teachers as last year and with excellent results.

The number of pupils at the Rural School was reduced to three and these are conveyed to the Buck Street School.

#### MEDICAL INSPECTION.

The beneficial results of medical inspection under the direction of Drs. Butterfield and Lavallee have fully justified its introduction into our schools by the voters of the district.

The work of the district nurse in following up the urgent cases, as directed by the medical inspectors has been made most helpful. She has visited the home, explained the nature of the child's physical defects, the remedy and treatment. I would suggest some means be placed at the disposal of the medical inspector for remedying defects, especially in the teeth and eyes.

The health of the pupils, their freedom from colds and epidemics, their mental strength to do hard work, prove the wisdom of medical inspection.

#### REPAIRS.

The rooms in the Village School were thoroughly cleaned and attractively painted during the summer vacation. The toilets were painted with enamel white paint, rendering it easy to detect any markings and giving it a sanitary finish.

Single, pedestal, adjustable seats and desks were put in the grammar room. Each seat was properly adjusted to its occupant at the beginning of the fall term. The seats and desks in the other rooms were rubbed down with sand paper and varnished with three coats.

The worn out wooden steps to the building were replaced by steps of concrete.

In making repairs the school board has endeavored to meet the requirements of the law.

The public——laws of the State compel every child of normal mind and health to attend school all the time school is in session until he has completed the eight grades of the elementary schools or has arrived at the age of sixteen. Hence, the parents can reasonably and expectantly ask that the school house be made as sanitary and comfortable as the home from which the child comes.

There yet remains the halls on the first and second floors, the stairs leading to the second floor, the front doors and the two small rooms on the second floor to be put in proper condition.

#### REPORT CARDS.

Report cards are sent to the parents or guardians of all pupils five times each year. These report cards give the pupil's rank in his studies, conduct, effort, instances of tardiness and half-day's absences.

The rank marks are as follows:

1 excellent, 2 good, 3 fair or passable 4 unsatisfactory, 5 very poor.

A careful examination of the pupil's report card will tell the parent just what the pupil is doing and how he is behaving.

I urge parents to investigate immediately any unsatisfactory mark (4) by conferring with the teacher. I also call to the attention of the parents the importance of the regular and punctual attendance for the ethical and moral effects upon the child. A day out of school is a day lost. It cannot be made up. The habit formed of being tardy and absent is disastrous to school work and pernicious in all after school life.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

I would recommend that music and drawing be taught by the same instructors.

That medical inspection be conducted as in the year last past.

That a sufficient sum of money be raised to complete the needful repairs on the school building.

That a sufficient sum of money be raised to employ competent and well qualified teachers.

That the sum of twenty-five dollars be raised for optical and dental relief, to be used at the discretion of the medical inspectors.

That the school board report three hundred and fifty dollars for books and supplies.

That the school board report six hundred and sixty dollars for High school tuitions.

For more detailed information I refer you to the appended reports.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation to the citizens, school boars, teachers and pupils for their cordial support.

#### DOMESTIC SCIENCE DEPARTMENT.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit my report of the work of the domestic science department.

In the sewing classes, there are forty-one enrolled, and twenty-eight in the cooking. Each child begins with sewing, in the fourth grade, and with cooking in the fifth grade. Last fall, it was deemed advisable to discontinue the work of the boys in this department above the sixth grade.

It has been my aim to interest the children along practical, rather than scientific lines. Each lesson has been so planned, that it may be repeated in the home. Many of the children take their recipes home, so that they may make them, and, oftentimes, say that their mothers want them to make the same again. This, not only shows interest from the child's standpoint but cooperation on the part of the home.

During the fall term, a lunch was prepared and served for two parties, given in the grammar room. Each time the children gladly brought all of the ingredients used, and cooked everything themselves.

At Christmas time, the children were very much interested in making five hundred of the bags for the community tree. At present, the classes are working on the costumes for the operetta, which will be given sometime in April. Many of the mothers are helping us in this work to such an extent that we wish to take this opportunity to express our appreciation to them.

For regular work, the fourth grade begins with simple stitches, making their cooking aprons and caps. To complete the course in sewing, manual training, underclothing, laundry bags, and dresses are planned. In the lower grades, I try to encourage the girls in making dolls' dresses and furniture. Any article which the child cares to make, may be brought to class as work, provided it is not too difficult.

We would be glad to welcome any of the parents or friends at any time we are at work.

#### MANUAL TRAINING DEPARTMENT.

Mr. Henry S. Roberts, Superintendent of Schools:

I submit my report of the work done in our manual training department.

All of the boys in the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades are enrolled in this department, each grade working an hour and a quarter a week.

In our beginners' class we teach the use of the common tools by following a course of models, such as a pencil sharpener, bench hook, slat foot rest, and pencil holder. It is our aim, however, as soon as each boy has gained proper muscular control of the tools to allow him to choose his own model, provided it is not too difficult for him. In this way he is making an article of vital use and importance for himself and therefore it has special value.

Besides our regular bench work we do some work about the school and I find that these boys who help in this way have a greater pride in the appearance of their building.

By the end of the eighth grade the boys will have completed a large furniture problem, (the boys are now at work on tables, a hall rack, medicine cabinet and book case) and will also have a knowledge of tools, their care, and use; the common kinds of wood, and wood finishing,

Other studies are correlated with manual training, making those subjects much more interesting and real to the student. For example, in geography we study the lumber industry and the kinds of woods; for arith-

metic, we calculate the amount of lumber required and the cost of each model; and in drawing we make our working drawings.

It is not our aim to make experienced carpenters or cabinet makers of these boys but I hope by introducing these industrial departments we are making better citizens and that is, of course, the aim of our public schools to-day.

I shall be very glad at any time to have the townspeople visit our classes which meet Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons.

MUSIC.

### To the Superintendents of Schools:

Before presenting my report, let me first of all express to you and to the members of the school board my own thanks for the good piano which was purchased during the past year, and which has given the pupils in the grammar department, a better support, in singing, and surely an impetus to greater effort. I am so gratified with the work of the boys in these grades, for at this period in their lives, boys are very often apt to drop singing, because their voices are changing and they find it hard to adapt themselves to new conditions.

We are now working on an operetta "Over the Rainbow" which we hope to present at the Opera house in the near future, the proceeds of which, we hope will be large enough to warrant the purchase of a good phonograph and records. A phonograph is almost a necessity, to set before the students high ideals in music and can be made to serve a number of purposes by correlating music with bird study, geography, reading, history, literature, penmanship and gymnastics.

It is especially essential that the pupils in the higher grades have high ideals in music set before them during their most receptive years, for with many, their musical education ends with their school life, which is too often terminated before high school is reached.

I would like to see the boys especially, studying orchestral instruments, and I am confident that there are quite a number of children who could become skilfull performers. This providing, not only innocent amusement for them now, and later in life, for their leisure hours, but also a means of the highest culture and of acquiring a working knowledge of the greatest of the arts, making the player a positive asset to the home, to the school and to the community.

In many towns and cities of the land, a fund is established, whereby instruments are purchased and loaned to pupils, just as books and other school articles are, and whereby free tuition is given in classes. In one of my schools, I have a class of seventeen beginners on the violin, the only cost to the pupils being the music books, as lessons are paid for by a friend of the school.

The new books introduced a year ago, "The Progressive Series" are more educational, since they are based on psychological principles and especially in the three lowest grades, they are more interesting to the children.

The work in ear training, in writing music, in reading music, goes hand in hand with the voice training. Occasionally, to encourage the latent gift of composing, the pupils are asked to write a musical phrase to a line or two of poetry. The decorations of the original settings to Christmas sentiments testify to the splendid work of the supervisor of drawing.

The production of the operatta "Over the Rainbow" is enlisting the co-operation of the departments of sewing and manual training and so we are all working together for the welfare of the community,

Whatever has been accomplished in my department is due to the faithful and efficient work of the teachers, to whom I, at this time express my hearty appreciation. I also take this opportunity to thank the superintendent of schools for his encouragement at all times, and the members of the school board for their hearty support.

DRAWING.

To the Superintenkent of Schools:

I submit the following report of drawing in the Allenstown schools.

The pupils are divided into four classes. One lesson a week is given to each. The length of the lesson is from forty-five minutes to an hour.

We try to have drawing correlate with the other studies to a great extent; with language in the study and writing stories of artist and their pictures; with geography in map drawing; with history in the making of booklets and illustrating stories of Washington, Lincoln, the Indians and other historical characters; with manual training in the construction of boxes, baskets, toy furniture, and calendars, in working drawings, drawing to scale, geometric problems, and different styles of lettering; with nature study in plant, flower, fruit and land-scape reproductions.

Several lessons are given to each grade in the study of color. The lower grades are taught to know and use the spectrum colors, their tints and shades, and their arrangements in groups. The higher grades learn how to mix and match colors, color harmonies and complimentaries, and apply the knowledge gained to their designs, constructions and other school work, also to their dress and home furnishings.

Design is studied from the use of geometric figures, flowers and fruit, and applied to book covers, calendars and all objects made in class. The first five grades have designed rooms, making the wallpaper, floor covering, furniture, draperies and pictures, using good designs and harmonious colors.

Lessons are given to all the grades in drawing from objects. In the upper grades the objects are drawn in different positions for the purpose of learning the principles of foreshortening and convergents.

Drawing, like other studies, advances step by step from one grade to another. The pupils having now had several years' instruction are able to take up more advanced work. This year the work has been especially satisfactory owing to the four divisions of pupils instead of three as in previous years.
