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## Town Warrant

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Charlestown, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges, and for necessary charges arising within the town.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote the use of the Town Hall to the different societies in said town for expenses.

Art. 4. To see what discount, if any, the town will vote to make on all taxes paid in, on or before July 15, 1912.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to deliver the inventory blanks at the time of taking the inventory.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways under the law passed at the January session 1905.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to license a junk dealer.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to accept \$50 in trust, the interest to be expended annually for the care of the Mary Chubb lot in Forest Hill cemetery.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair the highway between Daniel Whitmore's and the Claremont line, known as the "Junction Road."

Art. 10. To see what action the town will take in regard to reimbursing the treasury of the Village Water System for money expended in the construction of the North Charlestown Water System.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the preservation and renewing of the shade trees of the village streets.

Art. 12. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing five hundred feet of hose for the use of the fire department at North Charlestown village, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to cut the trees on the Soldiers' Monument site.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to sell or move the cannon house in Forest Hill cemetery.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for building and maintaining the village sidewalks.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to require the Boston & Maine Railroad to station a flagman at Bidwell's Crossing, so called, for the protection of the public.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to purchase bonds for its bonded officers.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to transfer to the Board of Water Commissioners the care and rental of the springs owned by the town.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to sell the gravel pit located near the residence of Benjamin L. Eaton.

Art. 20. To see if the town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to purchase or take by right of eminent domain any gravel pits deemed advisable by said Board for use by the town, and authorize said Board of Selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town to pay for the same.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to purchase the interest of the Lambs' Club, so called, or other parties in interest, in the Charles H. Hoyt homestead, situated on the corner of Main and School streets, in the village of Charlestown, or make any other trade in regard to said property with the above named parties, and borrow money on the notes of the town to pay for the same.

Art. 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### Report of Trustees

The library has been run throughout the year on the broader system inaugurated last year. The library is open for exchange of books three days each week and the reading room is open at the same time and every week day evening. A record was kept of the reading room attendance during part of the year, and it was such as to assure the trustees that the present system is a step in the right direction. The daily newspapers, with the weekly and monthly magazines, make it very attractive to all who possess a love for reading, and tend to create a liking for it in others.

While the number of books actually circulated has decreased somewhat this year, the number of new patrons is normal, and the increased use of the reading room, in our opinion, goes far to counterbalance this falling off.

The increased expense of keeping the library and reading room open more days in the week has prevented the purchase of as many books as usual. Possibly this ac-

counts somewhat for the falling off above noted. As soon as the income from the Marks legacy becomes available, which will be this year, it will be possible to make the usual purchases.

The trustees intend soon to follow the modern custom of giving patrons the freedom of the stack room — a custom that invariably promotes the usefulness of a library in a town. Work is now under way looking to this end. It will be necessary to re-arrange the books, and to issue a corresponding catalogue. The expense of this we believe will be justified by the increased satisfaction people will take in the library. It is to partly cover this expense that the trustees this year ask an increased appropriation.

We recommend that the town raise and appropriate \$600.00 for the use of the library during the coming year.

So far as contagious or infectious diseases in this locality are concerned, there have been but a very few instances where such have been a menace during the past year.

One case of diphtheria and one of infantile paralysis are the only instances of such diseases in our town during the year just ended.

So far as illness due to locality is concerned, ours is the equal if not the superior of any section in this part of the state.

We occasionally hear some one remark upon the unfavorable condition of the air, or the underfoot conditions of our highways, but for a country town we believe that we are well started on the road of progress, and that those who find fault with our beautiful town will doubtless be more or less dissatisfied when they arrive in Paradise.

It may be that our village commissioners will be able to negotiate with the electric light company and save something by cutting out the use of so much needless street-lighting on moonlight nights and during the last half of every night, and appropriate such money to the building of sidewalks in the most travelled parts of the village.

Again referring to the much-dreaded infantile paralysis, recent research indicates that it occurs more frequently along much-travelled automobile thoroughfares. If this is so, it is doubtless conveyed by the dust that adheres to the machine and that is blown off as chance may take it.

Also it is said that flies are carriers of this as well as many other diseases. Consequently, keep out the fly, and when he gets in "swat him."

And don't forget that fresh air is an absolute essential to good health. Therefore, in cold weather, living and sleeping rooms can have good air only by keeping open windows or doors, or by frequently opening them.

### Report of School Board

The year has been marked by quiet, steady work, and in all the schools of the district satisfactory progress has been made. A highly efficient corps of teachers has been employed, and the expert supervision of the Superintendent is most valuable.

There has been a marked increase in school visiting by parents and others interested. In the village schools this has been due, in part, doubtless, to the entirely new teaching board. It is pleasant to record that the comments of visitors have in the main been commendatory, in some cases highly so. Disaffected criticism, as usual, has been most rampant among those who do not visit schools and therefore have no direct knowledge of the matter. Frequent visits and honest criticism will always do the schools good, and these the School Board earnestly invites.

On account of the decreased number of pupils in the Trapshire district, it was deemed best to discontinue the transportation of these pupils to the village schools, and require attendance instead at South Charlestown, without transportation. A high grade school has been maintained there to general satisfaction, and the attendance has been better than this district usually shows. The saving through discontinuing the transportation has been considerable.

During the year some sixteen of our advanced pupils

have attended high schools and academies in other towns, the district being at the expense of their tuition and two-thirds of their transportation. Of the tuition charge, one-half is refunded to the district by the state. This has brought the cost of school privileges for these advanced pupils to a very low figure for the district to pay, much lower than would have been possible if an advanced school of any sort had been maintained here; while the advantage to the pupils of the superior equipment and the thoroughly organized teaching forces that have been brought within their reach, is evident. This is a question that the school board has carefully studied, and the board remains a unit in the opinion that the present method of educating these pupils is far preferable to any attempt at local schooling of an advanced nature.

A school year of 36 weeks has been maintained in all schools of the district.

### Report of the Superintendent of Schools.

The School Board of the District of the Town of Charlestown,

Madam and Gentlemen:—According to your rules and regulations the Superintendent of Schools herewith presents his seventh annual report, the eighth under expert supervision.

I am pleased to announce that good work has been done throughout the District during the year. Of course we could have wished fewer changes in the personnel of the teaching force, a better attendance and interest on the part of pupils and in some cases a more cordial sympathy on the part of parents with the teacher of their children; but there are always some setbacks in any good cause, even when there is real progress, when everything has been taken into account. Honest effort, faithfulness, hard work and a self-sacrificing spirit have characterized the labors of every teacher. In some cases the attendance has been better than usual and we wish to commend both teachers and pupils for their efforts for this improvement. In some schools the parents visit and take an intelligent interest in the work, ALL parents should do so and all taxpayers whether they are parents of school children or not. Then they will know how their money is being spent and when they hear criticisms they will know whether they are well founded or not.

#### THE TEACHER

I shall not here fully discuss the merits or the status of the teacher but desire to call attention to a few points in regard to her relation to the community.

I say "her" because the woman is so greatly in the

majority in the work of teaching that the comparatively few men may be ignored.

While the teacher, like the Superintendent of Schools, is the servant of the community as a whole and an employe of the School Board, she is NOT a servant of the individual citizen or subject to his orders or direction even in the case of his own child. She should take orders from no one but the School Board or their agent, the Superintendent. It is easy to see what confusion and discord would arise if it were otherwise. Much less is she subject to the dictation and criticism by a citizen in her school room, perhaps in the presence of her pupils. The law provides a heavy penalty for the interruption of her work in this way.

The people of Charlestown, as a whole, hold their teachers in high esteem and give them the respect and consideration that are due to a class of toilers than whom none are more important, useful and honorable and who are so closely identified with the important interest of a community, and the misunderstandings that are sure to rise in school work are generally adjusted intelligently and amicably.

But there are exceptions to the rule and in some instances parents have been known, either by letter or in person, to heap insult and abuse on the teacher of his child. Such parents should know that they have no legal or moral right for such action, even when the teacher has made a mistake. But more often the teacher has done no more than her duty and the action of the parent is based on the imperfect judgment of a child who, when he reports the matter truthfully as he understands it, which is not always the case, still he understands as a child, seeing

only one side of a matter or a part of one side. Thus an injustice has been done the teacher, usually a sensitive young woman, who feels it so deeply that she is more or less unfitted for her work and the whole school suffers loss. No one who has not visited a school and endeavored in the spirit of fairness to examine the work of the teacher has any right to utter criticisms.

Again, the superintendent's office should be the clearing house for all school difficulties and the teacher should not be troubled by the complaints of individuals. Complaints can be adjusted most easily and with the least friction by one experienced in school affairs.

Parents should understand that teachers will be able to render the most effective service if they take a friendly rather than a hostile attitude toward them. If a community combine to support a teacher even of inexperience it is most likely that they will make her school a success while a hostile attitude will materially impair the school's work.

The success or failure of a school depends much on the attitude of the community toward it.

Parents will get the most for their children by loyally supporting the teacher as long as she is in office.

Drinking water in the Farwell school is a very great improvement and well worth all it cost. It is fully appreciated by teachers and scholars.

The physical welfare of the children in the Hemlock school demands a new stove, their moral welfare demands a water closet for each sex.

The reports of the Supervisors of music and drawing follow. Some tables also of the Superintendent which give information in small space. The harmonious cooper-

ation and faithful work of teachers have made the past year successful and it is with pleasure also that I make a record of my appreciation of the cordial support of the School Board and people.

### Report of the Supervisor of Music

To the Superintendent of Schools:

This year has been the natural development in the upper grades of the training in the lower grades.

In order to get full results in any school system from a new subject or a subject handled in a new way we must wait for the lower grades to arrive at their graduation from the grammar or high school.

Every year has brought increased interest in music but this year with the establishing of the glee club we believe the highest standard has been reached.

The general work of our subject has been carried on along the same lines as in former years.

We wish to say a word in regard to our glee club alluded to above:—All who enter must have kept a standard of eighty per cent in all written work, in music must be interested to sing and pay strict attention in all musical classes of his grade or room. Such pupils are allowed to stop after school and enjoy from ten to twenty minutes by singing in the glee club.

We introduce piano, violins, etc. but probably the element which has helped most is the unselfish support of all the teachers who have entered into the singing, making us all feel it is worth while.

Over forty pupils have entered and from questions asked about time of rehearsals and conditions of entrance we feel sure the movement is quite popular.

### Report of the Supervisor of Drawing.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It gives me great pleasure to submit my first report of the work of North and South Charlestown and Charlestown.

Number of schools visited, 8. Number of class rooms 8, for the inspection of work already done and giving of model lessons.

It has been the aim to develop the children along intellectual, industrial and aesthetic lines, to present a practical and comprehensive course of study in art education. Lessons are planned for the teacher on a basis of two half-hour periods in the first three grades and two three-quarter hour periods a week in the fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades.

The plan of work begins with exercises that are at once observational and expressional in their character. Through observation the child is brought into acquaintance with his surroundings in the world about him; sometimes this leads him into the great out-of-door world and sometimes to the observation of his home, the workshop, the great industries of life, giving him acquaintance with objects, and with what may be called man's world. All of this is done in order that he may be equipped with a great store of material, that will enable him to express not only what he knows but what he thinks and imagines. Thus, there becomes necessary to his development, training along creative lines as well. In this threefold development, his technical ability increases as his mind expands, and his power of appreciation grows, giving ability to draw, ability to make things, and ability to discriminate between the good and the bad, in the world of manufacture and of art.
