TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the (L. S.) County of Cheshire in said State qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town hall in said town on Tuesday the 13th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect Clerk for the ensuing year.
2. To elect one Selectman for three years.
3. To elect all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairing of highways and bridges.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,750 for Trunk Line Maintenance.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175 for Suspension Bridge Traffic Plates, as their portion of same.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,842.84 for repairs on town highways. Amount being required by law in order to receive State Flood Aid.

9. To see if the town will vote for continued application for Trunk Line Construction for 1928, and authorize the Selectmen to borrow in 1928 on notes to pay for same, to complete, in 1928 the uncompleted sections of highway known as "Clay Hill Section" and "Suspension Hill Section," thereby completing the entire Chesterfield State Road between Brattleboro and Keene, in so far as it is incumbent upon the town of Chesterfield to so do.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient for the plowing out the Hinsdale—Chesterfield road by tractor, for vehicle traffic, enabling the doctors to reach town by the shortest route.

11. To see if the town will vote to purchase 2,000 ft., of snow fence to be used by the Road Agents on town roads in their districts and raise money for the same or act thereon.

12. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the abandoned section of the old State highway south and near the home of Henry Chickering in Chesterfield, and if this highway is found to be a county road, petition the superior court, or such other proper authority, to discontinue the road.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote for support of poor.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the town library in addition to what is required by law.

15. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400 to fight Pine Blister Rust.

17. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home day and raise and appropriate money for same.

18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lighting for the ensuing year.

19. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a police officer to patrol the Lake Spofford section from May 15th to Sept. 15th, and to vote \$400 any portion of which may be used for said officer's wage.

20. To see if the town will vote that the Selectmen sign only such orders for funds as are completely filled out in every detail.

21. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to in turn instruct the State Road Patrolmen to remove all signs advertising privately owned enterprises existing on that portion of road property engaged by the state for state road use, and to furnish said patrolman with the definite distance from the road center legally laid out for state purposes.

22. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hold their monthly meeting on a definite day of each month, this date to be selected by them at their first meeting after election day, and that, should any special meeting affecting town affairs be required, notice of such special meeting is to be posted at the town hall in Chesterfield three days before, and three Selectmen to be notified in writing.

23. To see if the town will vote to install a light near the residence of Frank Guyette, or act thereon.

24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to put in culverts and gravel a section of highway situated in the west part of Chesterfield, beginning at the four corners between the farm of Chester M. Burnham and the

residence of Thomas L. Chatfield and improve said road towards school house No. 1, as far as the money will permit.

25. To see if the town will vote to appoint an agent to sell a certain piece of real estate of the late Melvin Smith estate and the proceeds placed as per will.

26. To see if the town will accept in perpetual trust the sum of \$100, to be known as the Elizabeth D. Smith fund, and the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery association for the care and maintenance of the burial lot in said Association's cemetery in which the said Elizabeth D. Smith and her husband are buried, also Anson Hosley and wife.

27. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 in trust, to be known as the Helen Farr Burnham trust fund, said sum to be held in trust by said town forever and the income therefrom to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery association for the care and maintenance of the burial lot in said Association's cemetery in which the said Helen Farr Burnham and her husband are buried, also Worcester Farr and wife.

28. To see if the town will vote to accept in perpetual trust the sum of \$100 to be known as the Ransom C. Farr trust fund, the income therefrom to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery association for the care and maintenance of the burial lot in the said Association's cemetery in which the said Ransom C. Farr is buried. And it is hereby agreed by the parties in interest that the income from the principal sum shall be added to the same, and the whole remain in the care of the town till the same is properly authorized to use the money in the manner specified.

29. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 in trust to be known as the Arthur M. Davis trust fund the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Arthur M. Davis burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

30. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 in trust, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Martha L. and Bertra L. Davis lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

31. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 in trust to be known as the Fred C. Harris trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the John Harris burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

32. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 in trust to be known as the Mary Smith trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Mary Smith burial lot.

33. To see what disposition the town will make of the money already appropriated for physician or act thereon.

34. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 in trust, the income to be used for the care of the Emma V. Winn burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

35. To transact any other business that legally comes before said meeting.

TOWN MEETING, MARCH, 1927

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield called at the Town hall in said town on Tuesday, March 8, 1927.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Louis D. Herrick, at 9 a. m., and the warrant read by the Town Clerk. The report of the Auditors was read. Motion carried that the report be accepted.

The articles of the warrant were disposed of as follows:

Article 1. Election of Town Clerk. Whole number of votes cast 130, necessary for choice 66. Charles A. Post had 39, Imogene L. Chickering 91. Imogene L. Chickering having a majority of votes cast, was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 2. Election of Selectman for 3 years. Whole number of votes cast 131, necessary for choice 66. Fred E. Humphrey had 1, Warren B. Allen 2, Harold E. Randall 10, Chester M. Burnham 118, Chester M. Burnham having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 3. Election of other town officers.

Election of Road Agent at Spofford. Whole number of votes cast 128, necessary for choice 65. Fred Humphrey had 1, Clinton M. Joslyn 45, Walter J. Post 82. Walter J. Post having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Road Agent at West Village. Whole number of votes cast 117, necessary for choice 59. Curtis H. Chickering

ing had 1, Clifford E. Chickering 116. Clifford E. Chickering having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Road Agent at the Center. Whole number of votes cast 127, necessary for choice 64. Fred C. Humphrey had 8, Curtis H. Chickering 17, Emroy Carey 102. Emroy Carey having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Treasurer. Voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Harold E. Foster for Treasurer. Whole number of votes cast 1, necessary for choice 1. Harold E. Foster having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Trustee of Trust Funds. Clifford Tuttle was elected to serve as Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years by a voice vote and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Sextons. Nathan Puffer, Patrick Robbins, Charles Spaulding, George L. Brown, Fred E. Atherton and Charles J. Paro were elected sextons by a voice vote and took the oath of office.

Election of Town Auditors. Merle W. Cobleigh and Harry E. Winn were elected to serve as Town Auditors by a voice vote and both took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Constables. William D. Pierce, George W. Bevis and Charles H. Spaulding were elected constables by a voice vote and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Trustee of Town Library. Harry E. Winn was elected by a voice vote to serve as Trustee of Town Library for three years and took the oath of office.

Election of Fence Viewers. Fred O. C. Farr, Walter Dunbar and Olin Butler were elected by voice vote to serve as Fence

Viewers and Fred O. C. Farr and Walter Dunbar took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Surveyors of wood and lumber. Fred H. Stoddard, Floyd Fuller and Frank M. Holman were elected by voice vote to serve as surveyors of wood and lumber and Floyd Fuller took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 4. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 5. Voted to accept the provisions of Chapter 87, Section 1, of the revised statutes on a section of the Cheshire road so-called and the sum of \$475.00 was raised and appropriated for this purpose.

Article 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the repairing of highways and bridges, said sum to be equally divided into three equal parts for the use of the Road Agents in the East, Center and West parts of the town, and the sum of \$300.00 be reserved from each, of the divided amounts for the removal of snow in the various districts (exclusive of the Trunk line or State Road so-called).

Article 7. Voted to accept State Aid for highway construction and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for same.

Article 8. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,600.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance.

Article 9. This article for continued application for Trunk Line Construction for 1928 and 1929 was opened to discussion. Mr. Atherton estimated that it would take \$30,000.00. A motion made and seconded to pass over the article was not carried. Voted to ballot on article which resulted as follows: Whole number of votes cast 131, necessary for choice 66. "No" had 54, and "yes" 77. The Moderator declared the vote favorable

for continued application for Trunk Line Construction for 1928 and 1929 and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in 1927 on notes to pay for same to complete in 1927 the three unimproved sections at Chesterfield Middle Town, at Camp Marquette and at Spofford, so called.

Article 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for snow removal on the Trunk Line.

Article 11. The report of the Committee was read by Fred E. Atherton and enlarged upon by Cless G. Davis. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to repair and make improvements on the Town hall as outlined by the Committee, but on motion of Mr. Rice, it was voted that the water problem be excluded but to go ahead with necessary repairs first.

Article 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be used to repair the highway leading from the Hinsdale Town Line toward Chesterfield Center, known as the Bear hill road.

Article 13. Voted to pass over this article and that the Doctor Committee be discharged with a vote of thanks for their services.

Article 14. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 in addition to the \$500.00 already appropriated for construction of a town vault.

Article 15.—Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the poor.

Article 16. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for the support of the Town Library in addition to what is required by law.

Article 17. Voted to leave the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year to the Selectmen.

Article 18. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to fight the Blister Rust.

Article 19. Voted to observe Old Home day and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for same. A committee consisting of Charles H. Spaulding, Morris Friedsam, Fred E. Atherton, Mrs. Walter Dunbar, Mrs. Alice Spaulding, and Mrs. David Allen was elected to have charge of same.

Article 20. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.

Article 21. Voted to return the old parsonage to the donor, Morris Friedsam, with a vote of thanks for his generosity.

Article 22. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to add the names of Dennie W. Farr and Henry C. Streeter, Civil war veterans to the marker on the Common without expense to the town. Also that a round-up be made and to add all names necessary to complete records by Old Home day.

Article 23. Voted to pass over the article.

Article 24. Voted to accept in trust the sum two hundred dollars (\$200.00) from the estate of Ella C. Stearns, late of Seneca Falls, New York, the income therefrom to be paid to the Trustees of the Chesterfield West Cemetery association for the care and maintenance of the burial lot in which the said Ella C. Stearns and her husband, Gardis R. Stearns are buried, in the cemetery of the said association.

Article 25. Voted to accept from James C. Naylor the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) in trust to be known as the James C. Naylor trust fund. The income to be expended for the perpetual and improvement of the Naylor lot in Spofford cemetery.

Article 26. Voted to accept from Mary A. Howe the sum of one hundred fifty dollars (150) in trust to be known as the Henry H. Howe trust fund, the income to be expended for the perpetual care and improvement of the Henry H. Howe burial lot, which includes the terraces on the west to the drive in the Spofford cemetery.

Article 27. Voted that the Selectmen act as Assessors, and Fred E. Atherton, Albert L. Post, and Chester M. Burnham, Selectmen, took the oath of office before the Moderator.

No other business appearing, it was voted to adjourn.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I hereby submit my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

TEACHERS

Again we were fortunate in having only one change in our teaching force during the summer vacation. Miss Myra Blackington resigned her position in charge of the upper grades at Spofford and Miss Mildred Mitchell, a graduate of Keene Normal school with two years experience, took her place.

The following table gives the organization of the schools for the year 1927-1928.

WEST CHESTERFIELD

As the school year began there were 27 pupils in the school at West Chesterfield. In a few weeks this number had risen to 33 with the prospect of 2 more. This number seemed too many for one teacher to handle and the School Board with a nearly unanimous petition from the people of West Chesterfield in their hands hired a second teacher to handle the upper grades.

This arrangement has been very satisfactory from the educational standpoint.

Chesterfield is however facing a situation in which six teachers are hired to do the work which four could easily do if the children were in one locality.

If the enrollment at West Chesterfield should warrant this arrangement another year it would be highly desirable to alter the windows in the upper grade room to provide better lighting.

BUILDINGS

During the summer all three school houses were painted with two coats of white paint. The blinds which were in poor condition were removed.

An old chimney at Spofford which had been giving a great deal of trouble and was unsafe was torn down and a new chimney built. The wood shed roof was shingled.

New blackboards were installed at West Chesterfield.

The school buildings are in good condition. In spite of a large amount of window space the rooms are too dark for the children on winter afternoons. The installation of electric lights would be a great benefit.

UNION NURSE

Chesterfield has joined the other towns of the Union in employing Miss Frances Edgett R. N. as a Union School Nurse. Miss Edgett will spent four weeks in Chesterfield. She has already examined the children and will be available for short periods during the remainder of the year. I bespeak for her your cooperation.

HEALTH

Medical inspection in the schools was handled last year by Miss Edith Foss R. N. The results of her examinations are listed in the following table.

As dental care seemed to be the outstanding need of the children, dental clinics were held at or near the school houses—2 days at Spofford, one day at Chesterfield and one day at West Chesterfield. Dr. Irving Crandall and Miss Foss were in attendance.

The dental chair was loaned to the district by the state. The clinic rates were as follows: Teeth cleaned 50c, extractions 50c, fillings 50c-\$1.00. Novocain was used when occasion arose.

NOON LUNCH

The arrangement by which a hot dish is served at noon to those who carry lunch to school has been continued this year.

In this connection I wish to express the appreciation of the district to the Red Cross for its generous contribution of funds which has made this work possible at Chesterfield and West

Chesterfield. The \$50 appropriated by the town for this purpose is being appreciated by the children during the present winter.

CHARACTER EDUCATION

One of the most important duties of any teacher and one which should pervade all her work is the building of character.

This has in the past been handled rather informally and often neglected.

The State Board of Education has recently recommended for use in the schools an outline of work in character education and we have during the past year followed this outline in the Chesterfield schools.

As part of the work in character education there has been introduced in the schools a system of school banking giving the pupils a chance to deposit a small amount of money regularly and to receive interest on such accounts. Certainly thrift is an important phase of character development.

The health and the character of the growing child are very important. I hope there may be numerous conferences between parents and teachers on these two subjects.

I wish to express my appreciation of the efforts of the parents, School Board and the teaching force toward maintaining better schools in Chesterfield. It is this cooperation which makes the work effective.
