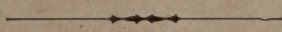

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

It seems only fair to Mr. Davis and the other members of the School Board that the town should understand the item entered on page 10 of last year's report. The \$79.50 paid to Mr. Davis is the total amount incurred by the School Board in drawing up the check-list of school voters in accordance with the petition of ten or more voters of the town. The whole was reviewed in the supplementary report of 1893.

At the regular meeting of the School Board held on the last Saturday in May, R. H. Davis resigned, his resignation to take effect at once. The school work was carried on by the two remaining members of the Board until Sept. 1st., when they appointed Rev. W. B. Allis to fill out Mr. Davis unexpired term.

Through what the Board considers to be a false economy of previous years, the amount expended in repairs has necessarily been somewhat large. The school-house in the No. 8 district has needed shingling for two years. This has now been done. The plastering was badly damaged, and the Board recommends that the ceiling of the lower room be sheathed to prevent constant damage by jarring from the room above.

The out-buildings have also received very much needed repairs. The sanitary arrangements at Kearsarge school have made imperative a change which has necessitated the building of a new wood-room and a thorough reconstruction of the out-buildings.

At the completion of the McMillan School-house, the building committee notified the board that their contract did not include the heating apparatus. It was decided that the proper way to heat the building, economy and other things considered, was with a hot-air furnace. And that the building might be dedicated free from debt we drew from our School fund sufficient to pay for the same.

The only repairs that the Board anticipates for another year will be of black boards in several of the rooms. A much needed addition, however, is of book-closets, in which the property of the town in books and supplies can be secured. We think a better care of books will be taken by the scholars when they see that the town cares for its property.

We would also call attention to a law passed by the Board in 1893, forbidding the loaning of school books during the vacations. The Board are always ready to sell books to meet this demand, and will sell them at cost price, which is low.

The Board calls attention to the State-law forbidding any new scholars to attend school until they have been vaccinated. Their understanding of the law is that parents are expected to attend to having their children vaccinated, rather than to expect that it is to be done by the town. The Board are required simply to require certificates not to vaccinate.

The Summer term of the East Conway school was taught by Miss Edna Eastman of Conway, She is conscientious in her work, and her method are good; but in this School she failed in discipline.

The second term was taught by Mrs. Marion Shirley Irish of Conway, Mrs Irish has had this term several times before and always with a good degree of success. The teacher for the Winter term was Miss Virgie M. Chadbourn of Mattawankeog, Maine. This term was very successful. The teacher was wide-awake, enlisting the interest of her pupils from the beginning, and wonderful to relate, she pleased everybody in the district.

No school was held in the Thomes district this year. The scholars were sent to the Center school and to Fryeburg Me.

The Summer term of the Potter school was taught by Miss Blanche McLay of Conway, who tried hard to give satisfaction, but by reason of lack of experience she did not succeed very well in discipline. The second term was taught by Miss Isabel Hale of Conway, and was a successful school.

The Primary school at Conway Center was taught by Mrs. Mattie Stark Smith, who has taught the school several terms.

The teaching for the year has been fairly good. The Board with the consent of the Selectmen have used the Town House as a school room, fitting it up with seats suitable for the purpose. But after Winter set in, the school was discontinued on account of the cold.

The Center Grammar school was taught by Mr. John Tracy of Bridgton, Me. Mr. Tracy is a teacher of long experience and had success. The Fall and Winter terms were in charge of Mr. H. A. Greenwood of Wales, Maine, who is a graduate of Farmington Normal School, his past experience, together with his knowledge of newer methods of teaching have combined to awaken in his scholars a keen interest in their work. We hope Mr. Greenwood can return.

At the Stark school Miss Grace Paige of Conway has had three successful terms. Miss Paige is not a new teacher but has surpassed her previous record. We wish to mention the fact that two of her scholars with rather poor past attendance have had perfect records for the year.

From the report of last year it almost seemed that the West school was verging upon barbarism. We were fortunate in our choice of teachers for the year, and the school has taken its own place again in the front rank. The Spring term was taught by Miss Marion Shirley of Conway, who did excellent work

The Board regretted her resignation. The other two terms were taught by Miss Mamie S. Chase of Madison, a graduate of Gorham Normal School in June, and who brought with her modern methods of teaching. In this school we found for the Winter term a good number of young men; we hope more of our young men will take advantage of at least this term of the year.

Echo Lake has had as good a year as previously under the teaching of Miss Jessie Kimbal of East Hiram, Maine.

The enrollment the three terms has been 10, 9 and 7 scholars respectively. The decrease is not the fault of the teacher. If North Conway schools were graded we should recommend transportation of these scholars. It is hard to do the best work with so small an enrollment.

In the North Conway Grammar schools the first terms were taught by Mr. H. Dunham of North Attleboro, Mass, and Miss Mary Gryer of Cambridge, Mass. The choice of the former was unfortunate, and the school was closed four weeks earlier than the others. although that time has been made up by Mr. Chester Chapman, who has had charge of the second and third terms. The change has been most beneficial, as Mr. Chapman is a stern disciplinarian and his teaching has given most excellent results; we hope his services will be retained for another year.

Miss Gryer's term was successfully carried through and Miss Mary Meserve of Bates College has finished out the year, with a good school, and in some particulars, a considerable improvement over the first term: placing both schools and building in charge of Mr. Chapman has been a gratifying success.

The Ridge school was taught by Miss Edith Bickford of Conway, who did good work. Neither teacher nor pupil can be enthusiastic with an attendance of four. This school should be consolidated with Conway village.

Miss Flora M. Hill of Chatham, taught the fall term of the Green Hill School: she has taught this school several terms before and has been uniformly successful. The Board excused her in the fall to allow her to enter the Normal School at Farmington, Me. and substituted Miss Ora C. Wakefield of Conway.

It was her first attempt at teaching and the school was not as profitable as was hoped for. Miss Hill returned for the Winter term and succeeded as she always has heretofore.

The first term of the Conway Grammar school was taught by Mr. F. H. Sanborn, of Denmark, Me. This term was not as successful as the Board had hoped for. The fall and winter terms were taught by Mr. Edgar A. Kaharl of Exeter, a Sophomore student at Havard. He was interested in his work and kept up an interest with the pupils under his care.

The Primary school was taught for the year by Miss Mattie Lewis of North Conway, a graduate of Gorham Normal School. Miss Lewis is an excellent teacher, and did commendable work

with the little folks under her charge.

The Intermediate grade was begun with the fall term in the annex which had been completed in accordance with the vote of the town. At that time it seemed that we ought to take the first step in grading the schools of this part of the town. We received valuable aid from State Superintendent Gowing, and Supt. Luce of Maine, together with the School Board of Plymouth, who sent us their printed graded course of study for ungraded schools. This new Intermediate grade was placed under the care of Miss Addie L. Allard of Brownfield Me., a first-class teacher of large experience. We feel that the pupils in Conway village schools have taken a step upward.

McMillan school survived two terms spent in the old building. Miss Paige is one of our most successful teachers, and the year's work has been of thorough value. The winter school in the new building was considerably larger in numbers, and was as successful as in previous terms.

Kearsarge school was taught its first term in a very satisfactory manner by Miss Minnie L. Warren of Windham, but personal reasons prevented her return. Mr. Philip Perry of Portland, a graduate of the Boston School of Technology, taught the second and third terms. This was his first work as a teacher. The Board think his work was conscientious, and his attempt to win the confidence of his scholars was sincere. We are especially in sympathy with his attempt to govern the school by a sense of honor, rather than by corporal punishment. Possibly if some of the parents and scholars had more fully understood this there would have been a more positive success. As it is, we think the school has not fallen behind.

The summer term of the South school was taught by Miss Emma A. Heath. At each of our visits this school appeared well and the pupils had made fair progress. After the term closed the Board were greatly surprised to learn that neither pupils nor parents were fully satisfied. Miss Heath declined to continue her connection with the school. The fall term was taught by Miss Mary E. Dale of Danvers Mass. Miss Dale

taught a very successful term, but by reason of poor health was unable to return. Miss Ava H. Chadbourn of Mattawamkeog, Me., taught the winter term. We can most freely say of this term and this teacher all that we have said about the winter term and teacher in the East school. These teachers are sisters.

Redstone school under the charge of Miss Katherine Osgood for the year has done good work and the new building has aided greatly in the fine educational work which Miss Osgood has performed in this, as in previous years.

We would say in closing that whatever restlessness or actual trouble there has been in any of the schools has in large measure been due to the lack of a graded system of study. Scholars who are forever reviewing cannot keep their interest in their work. We think the imperative need is a course of study arranged on an ascending scale, leading from the primary schools up to a high school. If such a gradation with yearly courses of study can be adopted the coming year, we can see no reason why the following year cannot see the town supporting, and economically, a high school. The need is not an elaborate building, but a teacher and scholars. The scholars are in sufficient numbers to demand a higher course of study. This gradation would relieve some of our schools which are over crowded, whose teachers because of the large number of classes cannot do justice to their work. It would give an opportunity to abolish some of the smaller schools, and to substitute a system of conveying scholars to the central graded schools. It might not require a building at present, if, as in Maine, the high school held one term in each village during the vacation of the grammar schools. The first need is to get a teacher and grade out scholars for such a higher course of study. The fuller equipment will come when it is necessary.

We have estimated that the cost of the schools in town including fuel has been an average of \$150.00 a week. The schools have with a few exceptions kept 29 weeks. We think a fair estimate for the ensuing year would be for 30 weeks at

the same rate per week.

In submitting our report we desire to call the attention of the town to articles 15 and 16 of the Warrant.

ART. 15. It has been thought advisable by many of our citizens to raise a sum of money each year to be invested for the purpose of paying the bonded liability at its maturity, and we

have been requested to put an article in the warrant for that purpose.

We recommend that a reasonable sum be raised annually for that purpose.

ART. 16. Heretofore the Savings Bank Tax and Railroad Tax have been used by the Selectmen for usual expenses without direct authority from the town to do so. Your Selectmen are of the opinion that the town should direct the disposition of this annual income, for that reason we have put an article in the Warrant for that purpose.

The amount of funds in the Treasury, \$3816 04, will be needed to pay the demand liability and to provide the necessary funds for the summer schools, hence it is apparent that no part of this amount can be appropriated for town expenses. We therefore recommend that the sum of \$2000.00 be raised to defray town expenses in addition to the recommendation of the Road agents.

ROAD AGENTS REPORT.

In submitting the Second Annual Report we realize that it will not be as complete as contemplated by the law establishing a single highway district in towns, and abolishing all former sub-divisions of highways. At the time of entering upon our duties as Agents we had not made ourselves familiar with that part of the statutes, requiring the keeping of a record of accounts in detail and reporting in the same manner.

The board at the time of its organization for its own convenience and for an immediate examination of all of the highways in town, made three divisions of roads and assigned to each Agent a division.

Division ONE consisting of the roads in Dists. 7 8 14 and 15, assigned to Agent Davis.

Division Two the roads in Districts 5, 6, 10, 13, 19, to Agent Heath.

Division THREE the roads in Districts 1, 2, 3, 4, 9, 12, 16, to agent Hatch.

Our report taken from bills filed with the Selectmen and presented to the Auditors will show all of the money expended by your agents, and approximately what has been expended in improving the roads and bridges and in constructing needed drainage in each of these several divisions.

For a better understanding of the Appropriation made by the town at its last Annual meeting we revise the last report of the road agents by a brief re-statement of the account.
