

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lancaster qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose one Selectman for three years, a Treasurer, a Prosecuting Agent, one Trustee of trust funds for three years, three members of the Col. Town Spending Committee for three years, and other necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the following purposes:
 - First: To meet current expenses of the Town and apply on the principal and interest of the Town debt.
 - Second: For Highways and Bridges, Town Maintenance, State Aid Maintenance and Permanent Roads.
 - Third: For building and repairing Sidewalks and Sewers.
- 4. To direct how money raised for any of the above purposes be expended.
- 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to an act for State Aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the permanent improvements of many highways throughout the State, passed Feb. 5, 1925, and amendments thereto, and raise money for the same.

- 6. To see what action the Town will take in regard to assuming the payment of the cement road from Hart Square to Burnside Street and raise money for the same.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the purpose of issuing and distributing circulars and other written or printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, and direct how the same should be expended.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to continue the granolithic sidewalk from its present ending on Prospect Street southerly to the road now leading from the State Road to the stone-crusher location, and appropriate money therefor.
- 9. To see what action the Town will take in regard to constructing a new sidewalk on the left hand side of Soldier's Park on Portland Street, and over Pleasant Street, and raise money for same.
- 10. To see what action the Town will take in regard to building a cement sidewalk on Stevens Terrace from Bunker Hill Street to High Street.
- 11. To receive the final report of the Zoning Commission appointed under and by virtue of the resolution adopted at the annual meeting of the Town for the year 1929, and to take such action thereon as may be deemed advisable; And further to take any and all action which may be necessary and proper relating to the establishment of zoning district; provide for the appointment of a Board of Adjustment, and adopt regulations and restrictions, as provided under Chapter 42 of the Public Laws.
- 12. To bring in your votes for two delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

13. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

Much credit is due Mrs. Hastings, the promoter of this innovation, and Miss Ellen Davis, the juvenile Librarian, who is well fitted for the work of a children's department.

Another great improvement was the redecoration of the interior of the Library Reading rooms, Stock room and Delivery room.

In September the Librarian was given the pleasure and benefit of attending the N. H. State Librarian's Association held three days in Concord.

During the past year the Library has loaned 18,905 books, an addition of 336 books over last year.

The Library is open from 1.30 to 4.30 every afternoon and from 7 to 9 in the evening, except Sundays and holidays.

COL. TOWN SPENDING COMMITTEE

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN

Following traditions established by previous committees it seems to be the duty of the Chairman of the Col. Town Spending Committee to make a report. The Spending Committee this year was faced with a rather serious problem, at the very outset, by the resignation of the carry-over members of the previous committee. These vacancies were filled only after the careful consideration of each member of the committee who remained. By a system of ballot, Mrs. Fannie Moses, Fred C. Congdon, and Dr. W. M. Bronson, were elected to fill the vacancies of the two-year members. Harold Alden and Carroll Stoughton were elected to complete the terms of the members with one more year to serve. The committee, although not elected by the people, happen to be a very cosmopolitan group, as far as vocations are concerned, which has made of special value their judgment on the variety of problems which the spending committee must consider in making appropriations. Mrs. Moses. Mrs. Lane, Harold Alden, Carroll Stoughton, and your Chairman had the privilege of being reared on farms. Dr. Bronson's experience as Health Officer. Carroll Stoughton's knowledge of the younger generation, and Fred Congdon's knowledge of property values, etc., Enos Fay's experience in finance. and Mrs. Magoon's knowledge of clerical work made a combination that has proved practical in meeting the duties confronting the Committee.

The wisdom of the citizens of the town in delegating the spending of this money to a Committee elected by the people is unquestioned. All requests for appropriations were very carefully considered from all angles, in order that the greatest good could be done, with the money, for the greatest number of people. In some instances the matter was left on the table for a month to study into the advisability of making the appropriations requested and in such cases the judgment of others was requested, and frankly. Each member of the Committee was provided with that section of the Will of Col. Town that concerned appropriations and each appropriation was considered with the spirit of the Will uppermost in the minds of the Committee. The experience of those having the responsibility of making appropriations augment their firm belief in the careful consideration of appropriations, by a committee chosen by the people.

There is little doubt but that the Committee for the past year have made many mistakes. They have tried to assume and exercise their responsibility as your agents to the very best of their ability and have taken this responsibility very seriously, attempting to carry out your wishes as the composite judgment of the group desired. They sincerely hope that the efforts which they have made have not been too far out of line with your desires and that, as a whole, their appropriations will meet with your approval.

The committee is very grateful to previous committees for the foundation that was made for the proper administration of the fund.

In conclusion, your committee would call special attention to the work that has been done on Ray Field. This is the initial step in the development of the property for an athletic field and play-

ground that will be a credit to the community and a real service to our boys and girls. We have had the field graded and a drainage system installed and the entire cost of nearly \$10,000 was met from the income of the fund. We were able to do this and meet, also, nearly every request made us for appropriations.

The Community House Managing Board included Dr. W. M. Bronson, Fred Congdon, Fannie Moses. The Playground Committee: D. A. O'Brien. Carroll Stoughton, Katherine Lane. Chairman of Community Camp: Harold Alden.

Two proposals of the preceding committee were adopted. First, a suitable sign was placed on the roof of Community House for aviation purposes. Second, the Committee made up a small deficit of the Academy Athletic Association.

The customary prizes were offered to the students of the Academy for excellence in public speaking and scholarship. Two scholarships were established to be loaned to needy students in institutions of higher learning. An appropriation was made for the establishment of a Juvenile Reading Room in the Library.

Another successful playground was maintained. Those in charge were Elizabeth Carpenter, Director In Charge of Kindergarten; Ruth McKinnon, Assistant Director and in charge of Handicraft; Roxanna O'Dowd in charge of Athletics; Laura Kynett in charge of Pageants. Great interest was shown by the children during the entire season. The average attendance was fifty. One parade and four pageants were given by the children. A definite program of work and play was followed each day and the whole undertaking seemed very much worth while.

Our share in the Community Camp consisted of making some necessary improvements, such building a fence around the property, establishing a telephone line, repairing car and roof, and cleaning the swimming pool. The camping period covered a period of four weeks. The boys were in camp the last two weeks in July and the girls the first two weeks in August. Mrs. Olive Stanard directed the Girls' Camp, assisted by Katherine Laughery, Lorraine Chandler, Camp Nurses; Mrs. Jennie Robinson, Cook: Dorothea Smith, Ruth Fitch, Beatrice Fuller, Betty Tufts, Councilors. A regular camp routine was followed augmented by Handicraft. Folk Dancing, and Hiking. The number of campers was twenty, four of these from out of town. Rev. Roger Dunlap supervised the Boys' Camp, assisted by Rev. Richard McClintock and Edwin Fuller as

Camp Secretary. The councillors were Maynard White, Charles Proulx, Reginald Donnelly, Roland White, John Tuttle. The attendance was eighteen, three from away.

In accordance with a vote taken at the Town Meeting the sum of \$800 was given to the band. Gardner Wentworth was granted a sum of money to be expended in buying musical instruments for children in lower grades. These become the property of the school and may be loaned for a period not longer than two years.

An opportunity presented itself whereby more shrubbery might be purchased for the grounds at a reasonable cost, so this was done.

Considerable headway was made in the way of draining and grading Ray Field and it is hoped that the work will be completed at an early date.

A committee composed of Carroll Stoughton, Harold Alden and Mrs. Fannie Moses was appointed with authority to purchase some equipment for the rural schools of the Town of Lancaster. After carefully considering the requirements seven schools were equipped with victrolas and the remaining two with oil stoves.

The usual amount of money was given to the Hospital Auxiliary.

The Committee appreciates the lighted sign on the front of the House and regrets that the name of donor is withheld by request.

Thoughtful consideration has been given to requests and the Committee has endeavored to distribute the money entrusted to its care in such a way that the largest number of people may receive a maximum amount of benefits.

About 400 visitors have been shown through the building during the year.

I would like to take this opportunity to express our appreciation to the citizens of the Town of Lancaster for the many courtesies shown both Mrs. Daley and myself and the willing manner in which you have co-operated with the rules of the house.

The manner in which the younger people, particularly school children, have conducted themselves while at the Community House, conforming to the rules and heeding suggestions of the Matron and Superintendent, reflects creditably on the parents and home training of these young people. At the last annual meeting Mr. Wm. Galbraith was elected as a member of the board, resuming his membership after an absence of two years. The school board believe that the town schools are functioning in a satisfactory manner. This coming year will see all of the schools fitted with modern furniture and conveniences. Major repairs are needed in only two of the schools, and it is planned to attend to this during the coming summer. It is a matter of gratification that the cost of the schools is diminishing while the standards are still being maintained.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the Honorable School Board and Citizens of Lancaster:

This is the eleventh in a series of school reports, and this past year saw the completion of ten years of school progress under the policy of state wide supervision.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

The work of the district schools has proceeded with practically no interruption. Because of the overcrowded conditions in the Academy, it was necessary to care for the eighth grade pupils in the town schools.

FINANCES

Because of several economies it has been possible to conduct the schools at a cost less than the proposed budget. The chief saving resulted from the closing of the Mt. Prospect school. The pupils from the Mt. Prospect district were transported to the Stebbins Hill school, and the combined attendance has been only fourteen, which shows the wisdom of this consolidation.

TEACHERS

But few changes occurred in the teaching staff. Miss Laura Smith took charge of the Martin Meadow school, and Miss Irene Dunham, who substituted at South Lancaster last spring, was given the permanent appointment there. Miss Annie McGinley transferred to the Riverton Road School, and Miss Alice Fellows, a Plymouth graduate, took the Great Rock school.

ATTENDANCE

A study of Table II will show that the school population is fairly distributed throughout the nine schools. Serious overcrowding threatened in the Grange school, and this was overcome by trans-

porting the older pupils to the two nearby schools, No. 6 and No. 15. By this arrangement it was possible to have the first five grades only in the Grange school, thus enabling the teacher to concentrate on primary work. This plan also enabled the seventh grade pupils to be concentrated in No. 6, and the eighth grade pupils in No. 15. The arrangement has proven a success.

REPAIRS

The policy of keeping schools in an up-to-date condition has been continued. Extensive repairs were made last summer at Stebbins Hill. The cellar wall was repaired, and a cement vault installed. The building was shingled, and other minor repairs made. The Grange School was also shingled. A notable improvement was made at the Great Rock School in connection with the new bridge contract. The brook was diverted to a new bridge and the space in back of the school filled and graded. The children now have an excellent playground which was entirely lacking heretofore. Adjustable desks were placed in schools No. 9 and No. 11.

SCHOOL PROGRESS

The schools have been furnished with a number of up-to-date text books. Two circulating libraries are in use, and the books are much appreciated by the children.

Much stress has been put on reading program this year with emphasis on oral and written expression. Self-help work books are being introduced, and these enable the teacher to keep all the various groups busy. Lessons in elementary agriculture are being taught in the 5th and 6th grades.

ACADEMY PUPILS

In addition to the 46 town district pupils registered in the Academy, there are 36 pupils from Dis-

trict 3 in the Lancaster Village schools. This makes the total school enrollment for the Lancaster Town District, 216.

APPRECIATION

The superintendent cannot properly close this report without some words of appreciation for the fine spirit of co-operation that has been shown by the school board, teachers, and parents.

The school board have at all times been willing to devote their time and energy for the benefit of the schools. The teachers by their unselfish devotion to duty, and fine spirit of co-operation, have proved themselves worthy members of the profession. The superintendent has found the parents at all times willing to cooperate for the best interests of the children.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That a definite program of salary increases for the teachers be adopted.
- 2. That new heating plants be placed in Districts No. 10, 11, 15.
- 3. That adjustable seats be installed in No. 6 and No. 11.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE'S REPORT To the School Board of Lancaster Town District:

The following report is respectfully submitted by me, as Public Health Nurse of Lancaster, having the Town Schools under my supervision.

The physical examination of all pupils was completed by Dr. William Bronson, with my assistance, during September. These examinations consist of weighing and measuring the children, teeth and tonsils inspected, heart examined, observed whether or not any skin condition exists, checked up on goitre and whether or not the child has been vaccinated. We have at present 100 per cent vaccination in our schools.

After completing the physical examinations, the defect cards are made out, signed by the school physician and mailed to the parent so they may be informed of any defect which may exist.

The vision and hearing test is given the pupils and cards are mailed to the parents of any child showing defective vision and hearing.

Health talks are given in the schools as often as time permits. Some of the subjects covered are: Fresh air both day and night, correct posture, proper amount of rest and sleep, food values emphasizing the effects of tea and coffee and the importance of milk, fruit, and vegetables, care of the body with special stress on the care of nails, hands, hair, teeth and skin.

Also to further interest the children in the care of health, Health Plays have been instituted which bring out more forcibly the principles which I have been endeavoring to impress upon them through these talks.

On my visits to the schools, any child presenting symptoms of the following contagious diseases such as measles, mumps, diphtheria, scarlet fever,

chicken pox, and whooping cough, are excluded from school. Any child presenting symptoms of scabies, ringworm, impetigo or acute eye infections is referred to his family physician for treatment.

At the close of this report will be found a table showing the kinds and number of defects and the physical standing of each school.

It is very pleasing to report that the number of defects has been reduced greatly, showing a great improvement in all the schools. It is my aim with the help of parents and teachers, who, in the past, have been untiring in their efforts to have 100 per cent records and and we are striving for this goal.
