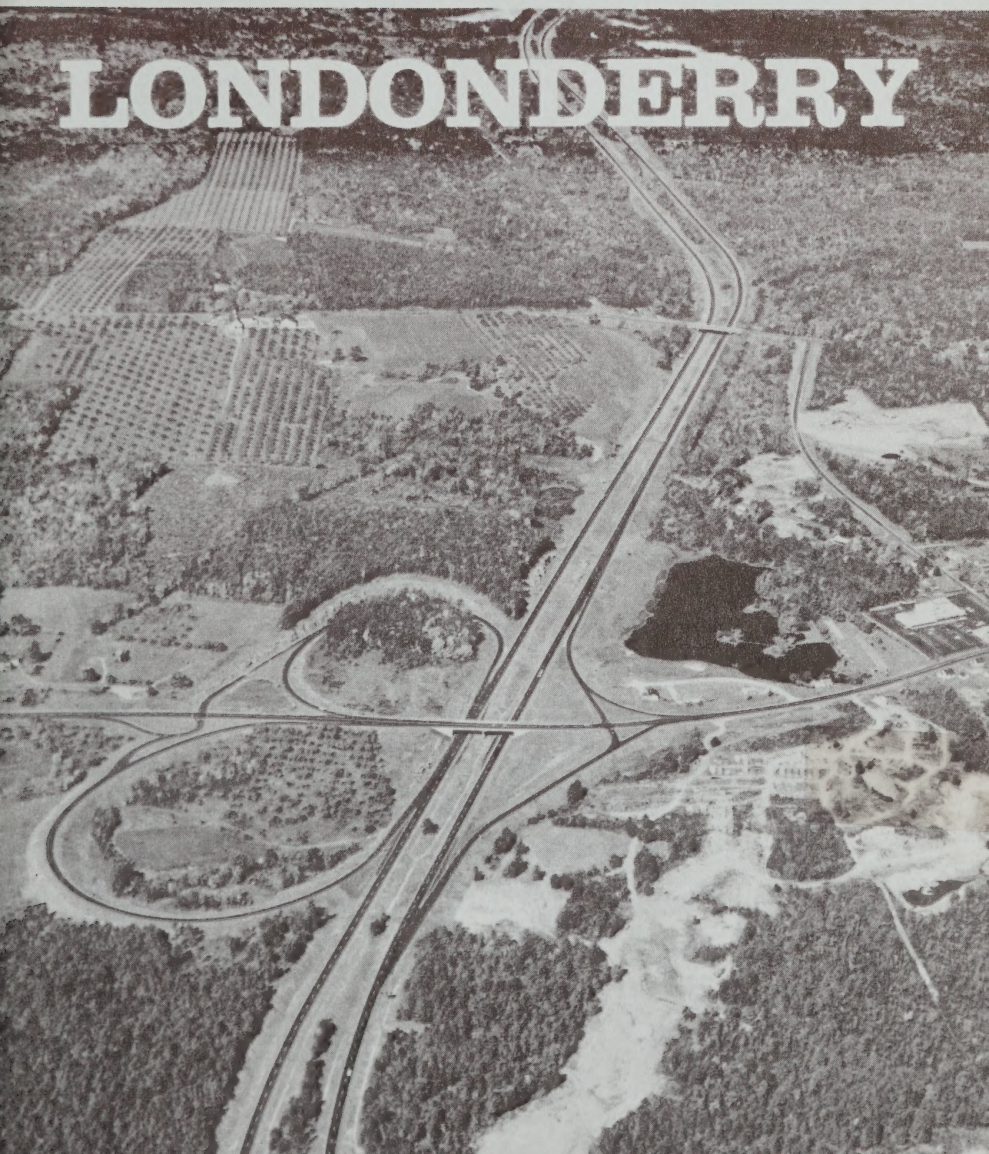




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TOWN MEETING - MARCH 12, 1963

Annual Town Meeting, Town of Londonderry, County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire, Tuesday, March 12, 1963, at the Londonderry Town Hall.

The School Meeting was called to order at 10 A.M and their business transacted.

The Town Moderator, Mr. Rene Paquette, the called the Town Meeting to order and read the Warrant up to Article #1.

A. Cote was recognized. "Mr. Moderator, I move that the polls now be open and that they remain open until 7 this evening and that we now proceed to act upon Article #1 as stated in the Warrant and Article #22 as stated in the Warrant by ballot." Seconded by C. McInnes. Voted in the affirmative.

Polls were closed at 7 P. M. The School closed their Meeting and Rev. West opened the Town Meeting by leading in Prayer.

Article #1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Acted upon by ballot: 825 votes cast.

Article #2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. W. Lievens made a motion in that the Budget is printed on Pages 48 and 49 and that there had been a public budget hearing, the budget be accepted as in book. Seconded by R. Dutton. Affirmative vote.

Article #3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Mr. Shepard made a motion to accept Article #3 as read. Seconded by A. Strino. Affirmative vote.

Article #4. To see what rate of discount the Town will allow on taxes for the ensuing year. A. Strino made a motion to accept the same rate of discount (1%) as the previous year. Seconded by G. Thibeault. Affirmative vote.

Article #5. To see if the Town will accept State aid for the construction of Class V Roads, and raise and set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1,221.37, and the State to contribute the sum of \$8,142.48. Taken care of in the budget.

Article #6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell a 10 acre lot, more or less, on west side of Hardy Road known as Gage Land. W. Lievens made a motion that the Selectmen be empowered to sell this property at public auction, with due notification, and give quit claim deed. Seconded by A. Strino. Affirmative vote.

Article #7. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$125.00 to take care of the overdraft to pay Librarian's 1962 salary. A. Strino made a motion to pay the Librarian's 1962 salary. Seconded by A. Conner. Affirmative vote.

Article #8. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the purchase of equipment and development of area for storing bulk salt. A. Whitney made a motion to accept Article as stated. Seconded by W. Rowan. Affirmative vote.

Article #9. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to be used for the installation of approximately 550 feet of 12 or 14 inch drainage tile plus 4 catch basins to run from the west side of Coin Street on north side of Foxglove Street to corner of Loan Street thence south on Loan Street to present drainage area. By petition of Chester E. Eaton, et al. G. Thibeault made a motion to table Article #9. Seconded by J. McCarty. Affirmative vote.

Article #10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Street known as Pine Street extending from Mammoth Road to South Road. By petition of Bushrod Z. Smith, et al. A. Carter made a motion to accept Article #10 as read. Seconded by F. Greenwood. J. McCarty amended Article #10 by stating that upon the road meeting the requirements of Article #11 of Town Warrant of 1961, it be accepted as stated in Article #10, Warrant of 1962. Amendment seconded by W. Boucher. Negative vote for the amendment. Negative vote for the Article.

Article #11. To see if the Town will approve changing the Town Clerk's hours to the following: 9 A.M. to 5 P.M. - Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays plus 7 P.M. to 9 P.M. - Tuesdays. L. McKinney made a motion to accept Article #11 if the hours were included in the Budget. Seconded by H. Zannoni. Affirmative vote.

Article #12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the purpose of installing a front end pump and 600 gallon tank and alterations on Ford Fire Truck. By petition of Harold J. Main, et al. Seconded by A. Conner. Affirmative vote.

Article #13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following trust fund to be used for perpetual care of lot #57 in Pleasant View Cemetery - Mrs. Joseph Currier (\$100.00). A. Conner made a motion to accept the trust fund. Seconded by K. McCann. Affirmative vote.

Article #14. C. Hall offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

“RESOLVED That pursuant to the provisions of RSA Chapter 38, entitled “Municipal Lighting and Water Systems”, and amendments thereto, a water works system to be acquired, constructed and established to distribute water for municipal use and for the use of inhabitants and others, including any and all things necessary or incidental thereto.”

Mr. Hall read to the meeting the provisions of RSA 38:5. The motion was seconded by G. Thibeault, and the resolution was acted upon by ballot with the use of the checklist. After tally of the ballots the Moderator announced the results of balloting as follows:

Total number of ballots cast	321
In favor of the resolution	280
Against the resolution	41

More than two-thirds of all the voters present and voting having voted in favor of the resolution, the Moderator declared that the resolution had been adopted.

A. Conner suggested that the meeting pass over Articles Nos. 15 and 16 and act upon Article 17 at this time, and that thereafter Articles Nos. 15, 18 and 20 dealing with appropriations at Grenier Field Industrial Park be grouped for action, and that Articles Nos. 16, 19 and 21 relating to the borrowing of Money in connection with Grenier Field Industrial Park be similarly considered together. There was no objection to this procedure.

Article #17. A. Conner offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

“RESOLVED that the provisions of RSA Chapter 252, entitled “Sidewalks and Sewers”, and any amendments thereto, be and are hereby adopted, so that the provisions of said chapter, and amendments thereto, may be inforce in the Town of Londonderry.”

Mr. Conner read to the meeting the provisions of RSA 252:25. The motion was seconded by W. Lievens, and the resolution was adopted.

Articles Nos. 15, 18 and 20. A. Conner offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

“RESOLVED that the sum of thirty five thousand dollars (\$35,000.00) be and hereby is appropriated to acquire, construct and establish a water works system to supply water for municipal use and the use of inhabitants and others at the Grenier Field Industrial Park in the Town of Londonderry, and

“That the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) be and is hereby appropriated to construct common sewers and such appurtenant structures as the Selectmen may deem necessary for public convenience and health at the Grenier Field Industrial Park in the Town of Londonderry, and

“That the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) be and is hereby appropriated for the construction of public highways at the Grenier Field Industrial Park in the Town of Londonderry.”

The motion was seconded by W. Lievens and the resolution was adopted.

Articles Nos. 16, 19 and 21. A. Conner offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

“RESOLVED that the Selectmen be and hereby are authorized and empowered to issue serial notes or bonds of the Town in the amount of thirty five thousand dollars (\$35,000.00) to acquire, construct and establish a water works system to supply water for municipal use and the use of inhabitants and others at the Grenier Field Industrial Park in the Town of Londonderry and further

“RESOLVED that the Selectmen be and hereby are authorized and empowered to issue serial notes or bonds of the Town in the amount of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) to acquire and construct common sewers and such appurtenant structures as may be necessary for public convenience and health at the Grenier Field Industrial Park in the Town of Londonderry, and further

“RESOLVED that the Selectmen be and hereby are authorized and empowered to issue serial notes or bonds of the Town in the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for the construction of public highways at the Grenier Field Industrial Park in the Town of Londonderry; and be it further

“RESOLVED that the Selectmen be and hereby are authorized and empowered to determine the time and place of payment and the rate of interest on said notes or bonds, to provide for the sale thereof, and to do any and all such acts and things as they may deem necessary to the issuance thereof, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and any amendments thereto.”

The motion was seconded by W. Lievens. The vote was taken by a division. The Moderator announced the results of the voting as follows:

Against the resolution	3

More than two-thirds of those present and voting having voted in the affirmative, the Moderator declared that the resolution had been adopted.

Article #22. Voted upon by question placed on the official ballot for the election of Town officers. Results of vote:

Total number of ballots cast	727
In favor of adopting Zoning Ordinance as set forth in Article No. 22	374
Against	353

A majority having voted in favor of the question appearing upon the ballot, the Zoning Ordinance recommended by the Planning Board was adopted.

Article #23. R. Landry moved that, subject to the adoption of the Zoning Ordinance under Article No. 22, that the Selectmen be and they are hereby authorized to appoint the Board of Adjustment contemplated by such Zoning Ordinance, such Board to conform in membership and duties to the provisions of RSA 31. The motion was seconded by W. Lievens and the vote was taken by a count vote on a show of hands with the following results:

In favor of the motion	122
Against	72

The Moderator announced that the motion had been adopted.

K. McCann suggested a rising vote of thanks to our Selectmen and Planning Board.

J. Sives made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Seconded by P. Weymouth. Affirmative vote.

Rev. Joyal closed the meeting with a few words and a prayer.

The 1963 Annual Town Meeting ended at 10:25 P. M.

GRENIER ACCOUNT

Pursuant to Articles 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20 and 21 of the 1963 Annual Town Meeting, Town of Londonderry, New Hampshire, which authorized and empowered the Selectmen to issue serial notes.

At a Meeting of the Londonderry Board of Selectmen held May 21, 1963, it was voted unanimously to issue serial notes payable over a period of fifteen years carrying an interest rate of three per cent (3%). First payment due May 27, 1965.

It was voted unanimously that the serial note applying to Article #15 in the sum of \$35,000.00, payment against principal - \$3,000.00 each year for five years and \$2,000.00 each year for the next ten years.

It was voted unanimously that the serial note applying to Article #18 in the sum of \$15,000.00, payment against principal - \$1,000.00 each year for fifteen years.

It was voted unanimously that the serial note applying to Article #20 in the sum of \$10,000.00, payment against principal - \$700.00 each year for ten years and \$600.00 each year for the next five years.

It was voted unanimously to award the three serial note issues to the Merchants National Bank of Manchester, Manchester, New Hampshire.

LONDONDERRY POLICE DEPARTMENT

In the past year, the department has answered nearly seven hundred requests for services and assistance from townspeople and other departments. Phone calls to the department in connection with police matters have reached close to three thousand a year, and with the current situation, the amount is skyrocketing.

Listed below is a rather detailed account of our activities during the past year. It is listed primarily to acquaint the people of Londonderry with the work load that we have had, a work load that has been increasing steadily throughout the year.

Londonderry has an area of over 40 square miles and has nearly 100 miles of roads. We have nearly 3000 people and are growing at a rate of nearly 10% a year. The town is dissected by four heavily traveled highways that permit easy entrance and exit by those who are criminally inclined. We are nearly surrounded by several heavily populated areas and as the police vigilance in those areas increases, Londonderry becomes a vacuum that attracts those who believe it is unprotected. We have been attempting to protect it on a part time basis, but we are finding that a more adequate means of protection is sorely needed.

Twice in the past year we have proven that when provided with adequate funds and with the cooperation of alert residents, we can provide a definite deterrent to crime. We sincerely believe that with an alert patrol of our roads and thorough investigations of any troubles that may arise, we can reduce substantially, the number of people cruising around the town looking for trouble and as a result, alleviate much of the fear that prevails at this time.

We sincerely appreciate the cooperation we have had from the people. Your alertness to potential trouble has aided greatly in our work. We hope that you will continue to report any suspicious actions or cars that you may observe. Working together, we can keep Londonderry as a better place to live.

REPORT OF THE
LONDONDERRY VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Fire Department has operated during the year 1963 under a very small budget. We have 25 firemen who work without any compensation, and are doing a fine job. During 1963 we answered 43 fire calls, a few of these were woods or grass fires, without any valuable loss of property. This cannot be done without the help of all Citizens of the Town. We are very much in need of a tank truck at the North End Station, to replace the old Diamond T which is about ready for the junk yard.

Whenever there is a fire in your home or neighborhood, you call upon the Londonderry Volunteer Fire Department to come to your assistance. In the past, the services of the Department have been highly praised by most citizens who have had to call for help. This fire protection is possible because of the cooperation that most of you have given to the men of the fire department in the various fund-raising projects they have had in the past.

Through these efforts we now have two completed fire stations and four fire trucks. This year we again had to replace our tank truck at the South end and this has drained our treasury.

We are in great need of a new tank truck at the North end station as the present one is worn out and is very old. This would be too expensive to repair to give good service. We estimate that to get a new truck would cost approximately \$3,000.00.

For a number of years during the summer months, the firemen and their auxiliaries have held carnivals to earn money to improve the fire-fighting equipment. Due to the ever-increasing number of carnivals in surrounding towns and also the fact that the success of a carnival depends upon the weather, the firemen are not going to have a carnival but are going to put their labor into the work of the tank truck. Naturally, the need for funds will continue as they do this work and every effort will continually be made to give you good fire protection.

At Station No. 2 the boys have painted the exterior of the building with more work to be done as soon as weather permits. The inside of the Station is being readied for painting at this time, a new Tanker truck has been made up which carries about 800 Gal. of water, equipped with a new 4 cycle Wisconsin Engine to pump water from the tank, and deliver to the Ford Pumping Engine. This addition of water increases the amount of water to 1300 Gal. which is a great asset on the type of firefighting in the absence of fire hydrants.

This tanker truck is in a ready condition to assist in fighting house fires and woods fires. We have a number of back pack Pumps installed on it.

All the men of the south end station are to be congratulated for a job well done in helping to build this tanker.

Work by them will be on a continuing basis to give the townspeople a more workable and efficient Fire Department for their protection and safety.

During the year 1963 we answered 43 fire calls about half of these were woods or grass fires.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Londonderry in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Londonderry on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what rate of discount the Town will allow on taxes for the ensuing year.

4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will accept State aid for the construction of Class V Roads, and raise and set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1,215.33, and the State to contribute the sum of \$8,102.17.

6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum of money not to exceed \$4,000 to provide for surveying, purchasing and developing a new dump site.

7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the street known as Pine Street, extending from Mammoth Road to South Road. By petition of Bushrod Smith, et al.

8. Article relative to acceptance of roads in the Town of Londonderry:

Said road shall consist of a 50' right of way with a 24' tar surface. The shoulders shall be no less than 3'. The slope from the shoulder shall be no more than 4 to 1 grade. No road shall have more

than a 6% nor less than 1% grade.

The entire area of each right of way shall be cleared of all stumps, roots, brush, boulders and like material and of all trees not intended for preservation. All loam and other yielding material shall be removed from the roadway and replaced by a suitable material. All boulders shall be broken off to a depth of not less than 12 inches below the sub surface. All streets shall be subgraded with at least 12 inches of binding gravel or crushed stone to a width of not less than 30' and shall not contain stone over 9" in diameter. The upper 12" of gravel shall contain no stone over 2" in diameter.

The subbase and surface of the road shall have a 3" crown.

No less than 12" - 15" pipes underlaid on native material no less than 2' below the surface of the road and constructed of reinforced concrete or corrugated steel standard gauge with paved invert shall be used.

A concrete header of approved construction shall be provided at both ends of the culvert.

The asphalt surface of the road shall consist of 1-1/4 gallon MC3 asphalt per square yard; to be surfaced between July 1st and October 1st. 1/4 gallon of sealer shall be applied before the 15th of October after construction.

Adequate wide sloping ditches shall be provided and facilities for proper drainage of water at the entrance to each house.

Upon passage of this Article acceptance will be the responsibility of the Road Agent and Selectmen.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Roads, section by section as completed and developed with new homes by Fred S. Tinkham, builder of Tinkham Homes. Agent and Town Selectmen, providing they meet the standards of the Town. Total of Thirty-nine homes to be built ranging in price from \$17,500.00 to \$22,000.00. By petition of Fred S. Tinkham, et al.

10. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 for new hardwood book cases, locally made, for the new library.

11. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for a new Librarian's desk, chair, and check-out counter.

12. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$1,200.00 for the Librarian's salary to extend the services of the Librarian from one afternoon and evening per week to five mornings and two evenings per week.

13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow the sum of \$2,600 for the purchase of a 6 yard sander.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,000.00 to erect a monument for the men of World War II and Korean Conflict. This is to be located near the present monument across from the Town Hall. By petition of John A. McCarty, et al.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT MARCH 1964

In our report this year we would like to emphasize the importance of planning the future of education in Londonderry.

Education in our town is now a large institution with an enrollment next fall of nearly eight hundred students, including those in high school.

The present building including the new addition has twenty-two rooms and a very large hall. This hall will serve as a school gymnasium, cafeteria, and auditorium. It can also be used for the annual school and town meetings. It will need some additional equipment including new facilities for the kitchen, a curtain for the stage, and a public address system. The townspeople should start now to plan ways to utilize this hall for meetings, plays, etc.

We think that the next school building program should be planned now. If it is the desire of the people to build in a new location the next time, we feel that the land should be acquired now and we have talked to the town planning board in this respect.

The money spent on education in Londonderry exceeds a quarter million dollars. This reflects a desire of the people for good educational opportunities in our town. We know that the school board plays an important role in the management of this ever-growing institution and its members are sincere in trying to fulfill this responsibility.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Londonderry, I herewith submit my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

PERSONNEL

This has been a year of expansion as you well realize with the new families and children who have taken up residence in town. Our school, which has been added to several times, will once again have a new addition. This of course requires a greater number of teachers. Those new to us this September were:

Grade 1 - Miss Joanne Baker of Nashua, N. H., a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, with teaching experience in Chester, N. H.

Grade 2 - Mrs. Frances Accardy of Londonderry, N. H., a graduate of Gordon College, with teaching experience in Norfolk, Va. and Gordon College.

Grade 5 - Miss Joan Lester of Reeds Ferry, N. H., a graduate of Keene State College, with teaching experience in Newton, N. H.

The system is indeed fortunate to have Mr. John Bone as Principal. His capable leadership and effective organization is needed and will be even more noticeable with the impact of the completion of the new addition which will bring the school plant to 22 classrooms, 1 library and the big multi-purpose room and kitchen.

HOUSING

The completion of the new addition will bring many advantages to the school children and the community. The new library space will afford expansion of area available for display of books, reading or study tables and a greater number of adult selections.

The multi-purpose room will afford a large area for school assemblies, physical education, lunch program and a facility that the public may use for town meetings and other occasions.

The new classrooms should be sufficient for a few years but if the rapid growth continues it will cause a need for more classroom space, possibly in another area of town.

CURRICULUM

We have made progress in the selection and purchase of up-to-date textbooks in Science, English, Arithmetic, Social Studies and Reading. We hope to continue this program while carrying on a constant evaluation of new materials and while we utilize existing materials to the fullest.

APPRECIATIONS

The cooperation and friendly advice received from the School Board was and is of great value to me. Your School Board, the Selectmen and the Building Committee united to give the community the best plan for the needed school expansion.

Our school system will be as good as we want it to be or as poor as we will allow it to become, and only with continued strong support will it be a good system.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

It is my pleasure to present this report to the citizens of Londonderry for the year ending June 30, 1963.

It certainly is commonly accepted that Londonderry is experiencing and will continue to experience a very appreciable growth in population. This problem is being faced by your citizens and starting in September 1964 your school plant should be adequate for a period of time. This period of time, of course, is dependent upon the rate of growth. Your building survey committee has thus far kept the town in a fine position to continue, without serious interruption, your educational program.

As will be indicated much more extensively in other reports in this publication, our curriculum is being updated at the best rate possible.

The world of competition in education is changing and intensifying so rapidly that it is almost impossible for our generation to realize the pressures on our young people. In terms of easing these pressures we must, considering all things, and to the best of our ability, try to improve their chances of success in competition for education, jobs and even survival.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the people of Londonderry, the School Board, Mr. Dolph and members of the faculty and staff for making this a very pleasant year.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

This year has been one of transition - new administrative leadership in the new superintendent and assistant superintendent and the addition to our present school. We have had to abide many temporary arrangements but the enriched school program that the new auditorium, library, classrooms and kitchen facilities will provide will have made it all worth while.

In the few years that I have been in Londonderry the number of teachers and students has increased approximately 75%. Along with this increase have come more duties and responsibilities. In order to relieve the principal of the many clerical tasks necessary in a large school, Mrs. Betty Smith was hired to work in the school office. With her able assistance I have found more time to supervise classrooms and work on curriculum improvement which I feel are my most important duties.

We have been able to introduce several new textbooks into the school system. Certainly the most revolutionary is the Modern Math curriculum. This was started in the first two grades and then in certain groups in the third, fifth and seventh grades. Next year it will be necessary to implement this program by expanding it into the other grades. This new method is the greatest departure from the old way that has come into the school in a long time. However, it is often more difficult for parents to understand than for the children. The aim of modern math is to make arithmetic more easily understood - to know not only how but also why something works. This basically is the aim of all modern curriculum - to encourage thinking and discovery, rather than merely telling.

I would like to acknowledge the receipt of several gifts to the school and to express our appreciation to the following town organizations: the Girl Scouts, the American Legion Post, the P. T. A., and the Men's Bowling League. With this money audio-visual equipment and basketball uniforms were purchased.

We have made much progress toward giving the children of Londonderry a richer and more adequate elementary school experience. As the town grows, greater

and more complex needs will have to be met. Our society is rapidly changing. More and better education is being demanded. What better investment can we make than in the education of our youth?

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

A good school health program is the result of the combined efforts of the entire staff and community. The teacher continues to be the key person in the establishment of a healthy classroom environment. Good health habits are gained by constant usage and imitable patterns. Cooperation between home and school is the greatest asset in maintaining a good health program.

Vision and hearing tests were done on all children during the year. Of the 465 visual tests done, 17 children were referred for eye examinations by their own doctor. Of the 453 hearing tests 15 were referred for further examination.

The dental clinic, sponsored by the P. T. A., was held the week of Dec. 3rd with Dr. Robert Madden of Concord as the participating dentist. 83 children had the following work done: 123 permanent teeth filled, 4 deciduous teeth filled and 3 deciduous teeth extracted.

Mrs. Marjorie Plaisted, state dental hygienist, visits the classrooms twice during the year. She orients the teachers in planning and securing materials in conjunction with the dental health program.

The tuberculin patch testing program was conducted during the month of May. 222 children in grades 1, 3, 5 and 8, whose parents so desired, received the patch test. The portable X-ray unit was set up at Grinnell school, where 12 children who had positive reactions received chest X-rays.

The pre-school registration clinic was held in May for all children entering school in September. At this time each child receives a vision, hearing and motor coordination test. The dental hygienist is present to conduct dental examinations and make necessary recommendations. The nurse also gets a complete medical history on each child. 70 children were registered at the clinic.

A speech clinic was held in Derry with the purpose of determining the need of a speech therapist in

this area. 8 children from Londonderry were evaluated at this clinic. The number of children referred for therapy certainly indicated that such a need exists.

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Londonderry School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1962 and June 30, 1963, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt increased by \$266,552.60 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$7,778.34, less a revenue surplus of \$292.18, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$7,486.16.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1963, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit H)

A statement of outstanding bonded indebtedness as of June 30, 1963, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the School Tax Account with the Town of Londonderry is presented in Exhibit I. As indi-

cated therein, as of June 30, 1963, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1962-63 School Tax plus \$10,780.00 of the 1963-64 School Tax. This represented a deficiency appropriation of \$5,550.00 which was made at the annual district meeting in March, 1963, plus an advance of \$5,230.00 on the 1963-64 School Tax. The amount of the advance is shown as a liability account in the Balance Sheet (Exhibit A).

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus - (Deficit):

It is noted that the current financial condition of the School District changed from a current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) of \$116.44, to a current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) of \$3,436.16, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, as shown herewith:
