

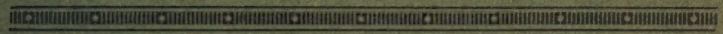

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Rumney town hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To choose Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.
4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways in addition to the amount required by law.
5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of library.
6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day and choose a committee to expend the same.
7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.
8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of cemeteries.
9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Common.
10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,063.50 to secure from the state \$1,063.00 for state aid construction.
11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$750.00 to secure from the state \$1,875.00 for state aid maintenance.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,380.00 to secure from the state \$5,520.00 for trunk line maintenance.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$200.00 to buy snow fence.

14. To see if the town will vote to allow a 2% discount on all taxes paid before July first.

15. To see if the town will vote to have the inventory blanks distributed at the time of taking appraisal of property.

16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of uncollected taxes.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to secure from the state \$2,000.00 for permanent road from Rumney Village to Stinson Lake.

18. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling the town roads.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be expended for control of the White Pine Blister Rust.

20. To see if the town will vote to change the conditions attached to the vote of last year to pay damages occasioned by discontinuing the Doetown Hill road so called or otherwise dispose of the appropriation.

21. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid on the Billings Bridge so called and raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 or sum sufficient to secure state aid for the same.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The figures in the tables above largely explain themselves. It is to be hoped that parents and pupils will make an earnest effort to reduce the number of tardy marks for this year. It is interesting to note that the cost per pupils in the Rumney elementary schools is less than that of half the other towns of the state.

For the most part the buildings are in good condition. There are however, a few things that might be

done to advantage. Improved toilets better protected from the weather at the Village and Depot, double roll shades in the Depot primary room, electric lights at Quincy and Mont View seem to be our most urgent needs.

Comfortable, well equipped, and attractive buildings are a great asset to any school system, but of far greater importance are the skills, habits, and ideals which the children receive from their schools. In this respect I feel that there is much good work being done. From personal observation and from reports it is evident that there is a growing interest in matters of hygiene. As children's progress in school rests so largely on their physical condition, parents are urged to cooperate in every possible way with the suggestions of the school nurse and teachers in all those things which pertain to health.

The two Parent Teacher Associations are continuing their activities as in the past. The slide given by the Village Association has been a great source of amusement to the pupils. The officers for this year are as follows:
