STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in (L. S.) County of Cheshire in said State qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect a clerk for the ensuing year.
2. To elect one Selectman for three years.
3. To elect a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
4. To elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
5. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint one or more Road Agents, who under the direction of the Selectmen, shall have the same power and perform the same duties as the Road Agents elected by the town.
6. To elect all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
7. To elect one Library Trustee for one year to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of F. O. C. Farr.
8. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,083.50 for State Aid Construction.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,250.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for State Aid Maintenance.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairing of highways and bridges.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150.00 including the unexpended balance of 1929 for the continuance of the plowing out of Hinsdale road so-called by tractor for vehicle traffic, enabling the doctors to reach town by the shortest route from Hinsdale, N. H.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise \$500.00 to repair the road from Wares Grove to the corner of road near the Hampshire House, to be expended under the direction of Selectmen.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$300.00 for the repair and improvement of the road leading past the Chesterfield West cemetery.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the repair of the Hinsdale road beginning at the intersection of the State road at Harveys Corner so-called, south to the Hinsdale line past the Fisk Homestead farm, and if so, authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract for the performance of said repairs.

17. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing new road equipment and raise and appropriate a sum of money for same.

18. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Phineas Gline trust fund the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Phineas Gline burial lot in Spofford cemetery.

19. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Moses Puffer trust fund the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Moses Puffer burial lot in Spofford cemetery.

20. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Jennie M. Phillips trust fund the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Phillips lot in Spofford cemetery.

21. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Louise Davis trust fund the income from same to be used for the care and improvement of the Charles Darling burial lot in the Chesterfield cemetery.

22. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Gertrude B. Cook trust fund, the income to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the Rollin J. and Gertrude B. Cook burial lot in the Chesterfield West cemetery.

23. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 in trust to be known as the George W. Sargent trust fund the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Edwin Sargent burial lot in Chesterfield West cemetery.

24. To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of the poor.

25. To see if the town will vote to move the Library in Chesterfield from the residence in which it now is to the General Store on the main highway.

26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the town library in addition to what is required by law.

27. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

28. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 to fight Pine Blister Rust.

29. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate money for same.

30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lighting for the ensuing year.

31. To see what action the town will take in regard to extending the street lighting system from West Chesterfield to the suspension bridge and raise money for same or act there on.

32. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to properly designate the public entrances to Spofford Lake.

33. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$600.00 for Trunk line snow removal.

34. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to move the Hearse House so-called and join it to the addition of the town hall, for the storage of wood, thereby giving the room in said addition for use of the various public uses to which it might be put, and raise money for same.

35. To transact any other business that legally comes before said meeting.

TOWN MEETING, MARCH, 1929

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, called at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, March 12, 1929.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Louis D. Herrick at 9 a. m. and the warrant read by the Clerk.

The articles of the warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Article 1. Election of all necessary Town Officers.

Motion carried to proceed to election of Town Clerk.

Voted to ballot for all Town Officers.

Election of Town Clerk. Whole number of votes cast 109, necessary for choice 55. C. A. Post had 1, Harold E. Foster had 1, Imogene Chickering 9, Imogene L. Chickering 98. Imogene L. Chickering having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the moderator.

Election of Town Treasurer. Whole number of votes cast 96, necessary for choice 49. Charley D. York had 1, Harry Winn 1, Charles Post 2, Harold E. Foster 9, Harold Foster 83.

Harold Foster having a majority of votes cast and there being no Harold Foster registered on the Check List, the Moderator called for another vote which resulted as follows:

Whole number of votes cast 91, necessary for choice 46. Donald A. Wellington had 1, Fred W. Holman had 1, Harold E. Foster had 89. Harold E. Foster having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Selectman for 3 years. Whole number of votes cast 123, necessary for choice 62. Clarence E. Savage had 1, Donald A. Wellington 1, Paul M. Penning 42, Henry C. Chickering 79. Henry C. Chickering having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

A motion made that Article No. 1 be laid on the table while Article No. 3 was being considered did not pass. Voted to proceed with Article No. 1 and to begin at the Center of the Town for election of Road Agents.

Election of Road Agent at Center. Whole number of votes cast 113, necessary for choice 57. Imogene L. Chickering had 1, Alonzo Rhinesmith 5, Mat Collins 4, Frank M. Holman 7, Roger C. Spaulding 96. Roger C. Spaulding having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Election of Road Agent at Spofford. Whole number of votes cast 118, necessary for choice 60. Clifford E. Chickering had 1, George F. Amidon 1, Donald A. Wellington 58, Walter J. Post 58. No choice. A second vote resulted as follows: Whole number of votes cast 117, necessary for choice 59. Walter J. Post 47, Donald A. Wellington 70. Donald A. Wellington having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Election of Road Agent at West Chesterfield. Whole number of votes cast 103, necessary for choice 52. George F. Amidon had 36, Clifford E. Chickering 67. Clifford E. Chickering having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Then Roger C. Spaulding and Clifford E. Chickering took the oath of office before the Moderator and later Donald A. Wellington took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Auditor. Voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Merle W. Cobleigh to serve as Town Auditor for the ensuing year and Merle W. Cobleigh having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Election of Constables. Voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for William D. Pierce to serve as Constable for the ensuing year and William D. Pierce having a majority of votes cast was declared elected. Voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Charles H. Spaulding to serve as Constable for the ensuing year and Charles H. Spaulding having a majority of votes cast was declared elected. Voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Harlan Streeter to serve as Constable for the ensuing year and Harlan Streeter having a majority of votes cast was declared elected. Then William D. Pierce, Charles H. Spaulding, and Harlan Streeter took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Trustee of Town Library. Voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one vote for Charley D. York to serve as Trustee of Town Library for three years and Charley D. York having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Fence Viewers. Voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Fred O. C. Farr to serve as Fence Viewer for the ensuing year and Fred O. C. Farr having a majority of votes cast was declared elected. Voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Walter Dunbar to serve as Fence Viewer for the ensuing year and Walter Dunbar having a majority of votes cast was declared elected. Voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Olin E. Butler to serve as Fence Viewer for the ensuing year and Olin E. Butler having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Then Fred O. C. Farr and Walter Dunbar took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Surveyors of Wood and Lumber. Moses H. Chickering, Frank M. Holman and Earl Walston were elected to serve as surveyors of wood and lumber for the ensuing year and all took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Trustee of Trust Funds. Voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for James A. Wilson to serve as Trustee of Trust Funds and James A. Wilson having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Sextons. Byron A. Davis, Fred W. Holman, Harlan Streeter, Fred E. Atherton, Charles A. Tuttle, and Charles J. Paro were elected to serve as sextons for the ensuing year, and Byron A. Davis, Fred W. Holman, Harlan Streeter, Fred E. Atherton and Charles A. Tuttle took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 2. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 3. Voted to pass over the article concerning the appointment of Road Agents by the Selectmen.

Article 4. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the repairing of highways and bridges.

Article 5. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,106.00 for State Aid Construction.

Article 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,075.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance.

Article 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the continuance of the plowing out of the Hinsdale road so-called, by tractor, for vehicle traffic, enabling the doctors to reach town by the shortest route from Hinsdale.

Article 8. Voted to raise the sum of \$300.00 to purchase additional snow fence needed by the various districts of the Town.

Article 9. Voted to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the poor.

Article 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the repair of the Gulf road, so-called, and to authorize and instruct the Selectmen to enter into a contract for the performance of the same.

Article 11. Voted to instruct the Selectmen to buy or lease one or more parcels of land to be used for public dumps, and to raise money for same.

Article 12. Voted to raise the sum of \$175.00 for the support of the Town Library.

Article 13. Voted to elect Harry E. Winn to serve as Tax Collector and to use the same method and receive the same salary as in the past year.

Article 14. Voted to raise the sum of \$400.00 to fight Pine Blister Rust.

Article 15. Voted to observe Old Home Day and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for same. A committee was appointed consisting of Rupert B. Telfer, Paul M. Penning, and Harold E. Foster to have charge of same.

Article 16. Voted to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.

Article 17. Voted to raise the sum of \$600.00 for Trunk Line snow removal.

Article 18. Voted to appoint the Old Home Day Committee to investigate the merits of a Town Forest. The three members refused to serve in a body, whereupon it was voted that the Town should not accept their resignation, that they not be excused.

Article 19. Voted to accept in perpetual trust the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Walden L. Laskey trust fund, the income therefrom to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the care and maintenance of the burial lot in the said Association's cemetery in which the said Walden L. Laskey is buried. And it is hereby agreed by the parties in interest that the income from the principal sum shall be added to the same and the whole remain in the care of the Town till the same is properly authorized to use the money in the manner specified.

Article 20. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as the John W. Davis trust fund, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the care and improvement of the Davis-Hutchins burial lot.

Article 21. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 as given and bequeathed to the Town of Chesterfield in the will of Herschel J. Fowler, said sum to be held in trust as a permanent fund and the income only used for the care and maintenance of the Carpenter and Fowler burial lot at Spofford.

Article 22. The subject of traffic plates for the Suspension Bridge was brought up, a sum of money for which having been raised at the Annual March Meeting, 1928 and the plates not yet having appeared. It was explained that this delay was the fault of the State Bridge Department at Concord. It was voted to have the Selectmen try again to get these plates.

Voted that the sum of \$600.00 be set aside from the amount raised for highways and bridges, said sum to be used for Snow Removal on Town roads.

Voted that the Selectmen try to dispose of the old snow rollers.

No other business appearing it was voted to adjourn at 3:45 p. m.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

ORGANIZATION OF SCHOOLS

The addition of an extra school at West Chesterfield increases the number of teachers to six. We are fortunate in having Miss Barrett, Miss Marshall, and Miss Stanton, teachers of several years experience in the Chesterfield schools, again in the system this year. Miss Laura Greene, Keene Normal school, 1929, Miss Virginia Flather, Plymouth Normal school, 1929, both teaching at the Chesterfield Village school, and Miss Ruth Lord, Plymouth, 1928, at the Spofford Advanced school, are newcomers to the system. I feel that the pupils of all the schools are making good progress.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

During the summer of 1929, the extra room at the West Chesterfield school was thoroughly reconditioned. Extra win-

dows were added, thus improving lighting conditions. A new blackboard was installed in this room.

The badly worn blackboards in the two schools at Spofford have been replaced by new ones.

The advanced room at Spofford has been furnished with new desks, of the single-unit chair type. New shades have been installed in all the schools. These are of the double roller type, the rollers attached at the middle of the window, allowing the upper, or lower, or both sashes to be covered, thus providing any desired degree of lighting.

Swings and see-saws were erected on the grounds of all three buildings. These are very substantially made and should last for a long time.

I would suggest the following improvements for next year: A new teacher's desk and new desks for the pupils at the Spofford primary room. The appearance of the interior of both rooms of the Chesterfield Village school would be much improved if the walls and ceilings were painted a light color.

HEALTH

With good cooperation from the parents, the work of the school nurse has shown gratifying results. Her detailed report appears in another part of this report.

As in previous years it has been possible to continue this year the serving of a hot dish at noon during the winter months.

Through the generosity of the Community Needlecraft Club of Spofford, prizes of books were awarded to the pupil of each room, in all six schools, whose work showed the highest scholarship, and to the pupil who made the greatest effort in his school work.

I hereby express my appreciation of the helpful co-operation of the parents, the members of the School Board, and to the teachers.

I herewith submit my second annual report as school nurse:

88 pupils were examined.

5 pupils were underweight.

62 pupils were in need of dental care.

12 pupils were unvaccinated.

4 pupils showed defective vision uncorrected.

1 pupil showed defective hearing.

3 pupils showed some orthopedic defect.

18 pupils had enlarged or diseased tonsils.

4 pupils had enlarged glands.

84 visits were made and health conditions talked over with parents.

Tonsil clinics were held at the Keene Community Hospital, Keene, N. H., four children were treated.

Two tonsil cases were treated privately.

An underweight clinic was held at the office of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association, Keene, N. H., Sept. 27, 1929, at which nine pupils were examined by Dr. Robert Kerr.

A dental clinic was held October 2nd, and 3rd, 1929, with work done as follows:

The clinic rates were as follows: Cleaning, 75c; extraction, 50c; silver fillings, \$1.00; porcelain fillings, \$1.25.

The total bill for this work was eighty dollars and fifty cents (\$80.50) paid for by the parents of the children having work done.

5 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

4 pupils had special eye examinations and defects corrected.

12 pupils have been vaccinated.

In the past year the number of underweight children in our schools have been greatly decreased. While the number of children has not been decreased, the amount of dental work needed by the children attending the clinics had been greatly reduced.

I wish to express the appreciation of the district to the local Red Cross Chapter, Mrs. Allen, and Mrs. Henry Chickering, for assistance.

I wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation of the parents in the work accomplished in the last year.

To the Citizens of the School District and Town of Chesterfield. As a member of the School Board for the past five and one half years, three of which I have been Chairman, I wish to give you a summary of what has been accomplished in that time. First it was voted by the entire board that there should be held on the first Wednesday in each month a full school board meeting with the superintendent in attendance. second, to pay the teachers their salary on the first Friday of each month, and all other bills contracted, third, that all matters pertaining to the schools, complaints, and other district matters to be discussed by the entire board and a decision rendered, and no one member of the school board to act without the consent of the board. This has worked out most satisfactory to all concerned. Fourth, that the board annually advertise for bids for the conveyance of scholars and the awards given to the bidder who in their estimation was best qualified to perform that duty.

All the school houses have been painted in a most satisfactory manner. The Spofford school has had a new shingle roof, new desks and new teacher's desk in the advanced grade. new shades of the most approved type have been installed in all three schools, electric lights the best in the entire Union and complimented upon by the deputy commissioner of education, Mr. Pringle. The advanced grade room in West Chesterfield school has been re-modeled to meet with the requirements of the state board, playground equipment of the most sturdy construction has been installed in each school ground, and grounds have been kept in first class condition. The boys of the eighth grade have taken up as their manual training at the Square Deal Garage in Chesterfield an automotive course where they are at work re-manufacturing a Ford car which had been wrecked, and will do all the work from the front to the rear and including the wood work, and when completed will drive it to Somerville, Mass., to the Ford factory for inspection. We have been very fortunaté in retaining some of the older teach-

ers, and in securing three new ones and our schools at the present time rank A 1 in the Union. Our school nurse Miss Francis Edgette ranks as one of the best in the state and we **can consider her work among our pupils and citizens** one of our greatest assets.

Mr. Thompson our school superintendent for the past two years has worked in perfect accord with the school board, and by his shrewd foresight has saved the town in the purchase of supplies for the schools quite a bit of money, and has attended all of the meetings of the board, and has been willing at all times to assist them at any time when called upon. All of the interior and exterior of all the schools except the school in Chesterfield Center have been painted in the past two years. The school in Chesterfield Center needs painting inside which will complete the job, in West Chesterfield two new stoves are needed, and as we have embarked on the playground equipment to meet the trend of the times, three more swings should be added as nothing ever done for the enjoyment of the pupils in the three schools has met with such favor, and I earnestly hope that the voters of this district will at this meeting and at other meetings keep up the good work as a busy and contented child makes the better scholar. I here wish to thank the parents, teachers, school board members, superintendent, school nurse and the pupils for their co-operation during my term of office, I am
