The 1992 Town Report is dedicated to A. Richard Price in appreciation of his 49 years of service to the Town of Gilmanton and the State of New Hampshire in his Role as Town Forest Fire Warden. In 1943 Richard Price was appointed by the State of New Hampshire to be Gilmanton's Forest Fire Warden, a position previously held by Arthur Durgin. During the course of his nearly half century of service Richard Price was responsible for the issuance of Fire Permits to residents of the community as well as the forest fire suppression effort. Many residents of Gilmanton have had the opportunity to serve under the leadership of Richard Price during this period. In addition to his Forest Fire Warden appointment, Richard Price also served the community as Fire Chief of the Gilmanton Hills Fire Department during the 1950's.

A. Richard Price is a true example of the volunteer spirit common to New Hampshire. His no nonsense approach to accomplishing the task at hand has proven over the years to be effective and respected by our community. We the citizens of the Town of Gilmanton, extend to you our appreciation and thanks for a job well done.

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Gilmanton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Gilmanton Academy in said Gilmanton on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Zoning Ordinance:

Purpose: To allow greater flexibility in determining the number of parking spaces for a specific use based on the actual need. Applicants can apply for a waiver of the standards along with their Site Plan Review and will not have to apply to the ZBA for a Variance.

Amendment: Amend Article III.G.2., Off Street Loading and Parking to: "All proposed new development shall provide for adequate off-street parking spaces in accordance with the Site Plan Review Regulations." Eliminate remainder of "Parking Standards".

Amendment: Amend Article XV. Definitions by adding: "Parking Space - An off-street space available for the parking of one motor vehicle as regulated by the Site Plan Review Regulations."

ARTICLE 3: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Zoning Ordinance:

Purpose: To allow the Town to regulate a hunting preserve by creating a new Use under Table 1 for someone wishing to dedicate land for use as a hunting preserve which would be stocked with wildlife for scheduled hunting.

Amendment: Amend Article IV. Table 1. Permitted Uses and Special Exceptions to add: "Hunting Preserve***"; allowed by "E" Special Exception in the Rural and Conservation Zones; "N" not allowed in the Village and Business Zones. ADD: Footnote "****As a minimum, Hunting Preserves must comply with the Regulations of the New Hampshire Department of Fish & Game."

Amendment: Amend Article XV. Definitions by adding: "Hunting Preserve — an operation on privately owned or leased property which provides an opportunity for taking wildlife that have been placed on the property for such purposes, whether operated commercially or non-profit."

ARTICLE 4: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Zoning Ordinance:

Purpose: To clarify that the intent of the existing Article is to allow building on lots that are smaller than that currently allowed by the Ordinances and Regula-

tions, as long as all other requirements are complied with and the conditions stated in the Article are met.

Amendment: Amend Article VII.C.2. Non-conforming Uses, Lots & Structures to: "A non-conforming lot which does not meet current zoning and subdivision requirements as to minimum required lot size, and which is not adjacent to other land in the same ownership may be used for building purposes only if a septic system design, approved by the State of New Hampshire is submitted; any encroachment waivers for septic system or well setbacks as required by the State of NH have been obtained; all applicable state regulations have been met and the existing lot and proposed use conform to all other requirements of this ordinance except minimum lot size."

ARTICLE 5: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Zoning Ordinance:

Purpose: To clarify that the intent of the existing Article is to exempt Artificial Ponds smaller than 10 acres from this definition.

Amendment: Amend Article XV. Definitions by adding: "Water Bodies — Including rivers, lakes, natural ponds, and artificial ponds larger than 10 acres."

ARTICLE 6: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Zoning Ordinance:

Purpose: Create a new Use under Table 1 which allows for more activity than a Home Occupation, but is still allowed in all Zones in the Town, although some zones would require a Special Exception.

Amendment: Amend Article IV. Table 1. Permitted Uses and Special Exceptions to add: "Cottage Industry"; "P" permitted in the Business Zone; allowed by "E" Special Exception in the Village, Rural and Conservation Zones.

Amendment: Amend Article IX.B.2. Board of Adjustment by adding: "f. Any additional requirements as found in Article X of this Ordinance shall be met."

Amendment: Add Article X. Additional Special Exception Criteria: "In addition to the Special Exception criteria outlined in Article IX of this Ordinance, the Board of Adjustment, in acting on an application for a Special Exception as noted below must find that the following conditions are also met.

A. COTTAGE INDUSTRY

1. The use must be conducted by an owner or residential tenant entirely within the owner's or residential tenant's existing dwelling or accessory building.
2. A maximum of six employees, including the owner or residential tenant is allowed.
3. Cottage Industries shall not include uses that generate noise, fumes, outside storage or other activities objectionable to neighboring properties.
4. Cottage Industries shall not include uses that require an unacceptable

frequency of major delivery traffic.

5. Cottage Industries shall not include uses that have an adverse impact on the character of the neighborhood.
6. Exterior lighting shall not adversely impact traffic or neighboring properties.
7. Cottage Industries shall also be regulated by the Site Plan Review Regulations.

Amendment: Existing Articles X. through XV. shall be sequentially renumbered upon adoption of new Article X.

Amendment: Amend Article XV. Definitions by adding: "Cottage Industry — The production, assembly, packaging and shipping of materials for sale off-site. Use does not include on-site retail or show room use. See Article X."

The following articles will be acted upon at the Gilmanton School on Saturday, March 13, 1993, at 10:00 a.m.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,359,043 which represents the operating Budget said sum is exclusive of all Warrant Articles addressed.

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars to purchase Office Equipment (Copier) for the Selectmen's Office. (\$6000.00)

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars to defray expenses of Insurance Services Office Study (ISO). (\$2500.00)

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-five for the purchase of a Town Clerk's Computer program and related hardware. (\$9325.00)

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars for Document Restoration. (\$1500.00)

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Eight Hundred dollars for the purchase of a Computer for the Planning Department. (\$1800.00)

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars for the purchase of a new 1993 Police Cruiser. (\$14700.00)

ARTICLE 14: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars for the purchase of replacement radio and handguns for the Police Department. (\$1700.00)

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ninety-five Thousand Four Hundred Eighteen Dollars, to purchase and equip a new Fire Truck to replace the 1959 Chevrolet Fire Truck. (\$195,418.00) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 16: If the foregoing Article 15 is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the sum of \$195,418.00 and to issue Bonds and Notes of the Town. (Ballot Vote)

ARTICLE 17: To see if the municipality will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a new Fire Truck and to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars to be placed in this fund. (\$25000.00)

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Two Thousand Dollars, for the purchase of one Loader for the use of the Highway Department. (\$72000.00) (Not recommended by Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars for Two Sanders for the use of the Highway Department. (\$13000.00) (\$3500 Not Recommended by Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 20: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-C to restrict the revenues from the Gilmanton Fire Department, Building Inspections Division, to expenditures for the purpose of purchasing and replacing the Fire Chief/Building Official's Vehicle? Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be known as the Fire Chief/Building Official's Vehicle Replacement Fund, separate from the general fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed part of the general fund accumulated surplus and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund or source of revenue.

ARTICLE 21: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-C to restrict the revenues from the Gilmanton Fire Department Ambulance Service, to expenditures for the purpose of Ambulance/Rescue Vehicle Replacement? Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be known as the Ambulance/Rescue Vehicle Replacement Fund, separate from the General Fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed part of the General Fund accumulated surplus and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund or source of revenue.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey the property located at Route 107, Gilmanton, New Hampshire, Tax Map 1 Lot 28/1/0600, conveyed to the Town of Gilmanton by a Tax Deed dated May 11, 1992 recorded in the Belknap County Registry of Deeds at Book 1209, Page 907, to New Dartmouth Bank upon receipt of outstanding delinquent real estate taxes, taxes and interest that would have been assessed if the property had not been deeded to the Town and other expenses incurred by the Town.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for Temporary Loans in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 24: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply

for, receive and expend Federal and State grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-e, and also to apply for, accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to authorize library trustees to apply for, accept and expend funds from federal, state or private sources gifts or grants in accordance with RSA 202-A:4-c.

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote to authorize Selectmen to accept donations of real property.

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept donations of personal property in accordance with RSA 31:95-c.

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept the dedication of any street shown on a subdivision plat approved by the Planning Board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agent.

ARTICLE 29: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the town gifts, legacies and devises made to the Town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

ARTICLE 30: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell by sealed bid or public auction and convey such vehicles and equipment as they deem surplus to the Town's needs.

ARTICLE 31: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:80.

ARTICLE 32: To hear the reports of any Committees chosen and pass any votes relative thereto.

**MINUTES OF THE TOWN MEETING
MARCH 10, 1992**

The meeting was called to order by the moderator at 10:00 A.M. and the warrant was read. It was voted to hold the adjourned meeting of Articles 10 through 43 of the warrant on March 14, 1992 at 10:00 A.M. at the Gilmanton Elementary School. Ballots were unsealed by the Clerk and given to the Ballot Inspectors for counting. The ballot box was shown to the voters present as being empty. It was voted to close the polls at 7:00 P.M. and to open the absentee ballots immediately thereafter.

ARTICLES 1 - 9: By Ballot. 703 ballots cast. (See Results of Balloting)

March 14, 1992

The recessed meeting, determined by vote of March 10, 1992, was called to order at 10:00 A.M. by the Moderator and the results of balloting of March 10, 1992 were read. Connie Widger led the body in the salute to the flag. All the elected officers were sworn in by the Town Clerk, Elizabeth Smithers.

The Town Report for 1991 was dedicated to Elizabeth R. Smithers in appreciation of her twenty five years of service as Town Clerk of the Town of Gilmanton. She was presented a plaque by the Board of Selectmen in recognition of her dedication. The Town Meeting Body gave her a standing ovation.

ARTICLE 10: A motion by David Russell with a second by Philip McIntyre to instruct the Board of Selectmen, The Road Agent and all Departments of the Town of Gilmanton, to make all purchases of goods and services over the amount of \$1,000 through a bidding or proposal process. This process will include the posting and advertising of the intent to purchase in the media that will come into view of vendors offering these products or services. Further the Moderator, shall appoint a committee of five voters to work with the Board of Selectmen to develop for adoption at a subsequent Town Meeting a Purchasing Procedure and Policy for the Town was lost by a voice vote in the negative. (BY PETITION)

ARTICLE 11: A motion by David Russell with a second by "Pete" Osler to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for Temporary Loans in anticipation of taxes was adopted by a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 12: A motion by David Russell with a second by Philip McIntyre to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Federal and State grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-e, and also to apply for, accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money was adopted by a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 13: A motion by David Russell with a second by Philip McIntyre to authorize library trustees to apply for, accept and expend funds from Federal,

State or private sources gifts or grants in accordance with RSA 202-A:4-c was adopted by a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 14: A motion by David Russell with a second by Philip McIntyre to authorize the Selectmen to accept a gift of the deed to the Gilmanton Friends Cemetery located on the southerly side of Route 140 approximately one-quarter of a mile east of its intersection with Route 107 from the Dover Monthly Meeting of Friends was adopted by a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 15: A motion by David Russell with a second by Philip McIntyre to authorize the Selectmen to accept donations of real property was adopted by a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 16: A motion by David Russell with a second by Philip McIntyre to authorize the Selectmen to accept donations of personal property in accordance with RSA 31:95-c. was adopted by a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 17: A motion by David Russell with a second by "Pete" Osler to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the town by tax collector's deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:80 was amended by a motion by George B. Roberts, Jr and second by Elizabeth R. Smithers to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey, by public auction, real estate or any interest therein, acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deeds, but not prior to a list of land being submitted to the voters for sale and the Town Conservation Commission and Planning Board have the opportunity to review the properties for their recommendation or any other Town owned property proposed to be sold by the Selectmen. Such sale by Selectmen shall be advertised by publication in two newspapers widely circulated in the Town and a written notice of the auction mailed with the semi-annual tax bills to all persons and corporations known or believed to own taxable property in the Town as of April 1 of the year of such proposed sale. Further that this article remain in effect until changed by a vote of the people at a future Town Meeting. This article is pursuant to RSA 80:80 III. This amendment was adopted by a voice vote in the affirmative. The original motion as amended was adopted by a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 18: A motion by David Russell with a second by Philip McIntyre to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept the dedication of any street shown on a subdivision plat approved by the Planning Board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agent was adopted by a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 19: A motion by David Russell with a second by "Pete" Osler to adopt a Cemetery & Burial Site Ordinance under the provisions of RSA 31:39 and in accordance with RSA 289 was adopted by a voice vote in the affirmative.

This motion as amended was adopted by a voice vote in the affirmative.

April 4, 1992

The recessed Annual Town Meeting was recalled by the Moderator at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, April 4, 1992.

The Moderator announced that as a vote to reconsider failed during the previous portion of the meeting, Article 26, could not be reconsidered on this day.

The Moderator announced that Mr. McIntyre, former selectman would be seated on the stage with the three current selectmen to answer questions directed to his work on developing the budget before the voters at this time. There were also two non-voters who would be seated on the floor of the body to assist in the presentation of the Fire Department budget.

ARTICLE 27: A motion was made by Walter Skantze with a second by Alan Perley to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Three Hundred Dollars to defray the cost of legal expenses.

TOWN REPORT FROM A STATE LEGISLATOR

Here and there we can see signs that indicate the recession is subsiding. More people are working and confidence in the economy is growing. This year has seen more awareness of the need to preserve our resources. We have passed legislation to protect shorelines. We are looking to improve our air with better emission standards.

Personally, I am proud that a committee of five Senators and five House members was able to create legislation to lengthen sentences for sex offenders, to register them when they return to their home town and to educate law enforcement personnel and lawyers about the crime of rape, the rapist and the victim. This should enhance the prosecution and sentencing as well as encourage victims that they will not be further victimized by coming forth.

This year in Concord, we'll be looking at new ideas for raising revenue. The New Hampshire voters have said "No" to broad base taxes. There are bills for casino gambling, tax on golfing (for education) and to retain present levels of some taxes. It is hoped there will be work on equity of taxes—namely the property tax and business profits tax.

Nearer, Gilmanton can be pleased that Gunstock needs less tax money this year because of reorganization and improving business. The International Speedway in Loudon will bring people to our area hotels, restaurants and shopping areas. This also increases state revenues. Good news is that the budget problem in Concord should not be as difficult. With real-estate slowly picking up, unemployment not growing, we should be thankful and hopeful.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Town of Gilmanton, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1992 we considered the Town's internal control structure to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

However, during our audit we became aware of several matters that are opportunities for strengthening internal controls and operating efficiency. The memorandum that accompanies this letter summarizes our comments and suggestions regarding those matters. This letter does not affect our report dated January 20, 1993 on the financial statements of the Town of Gilmanton, New Hampshire.

We will review the status of these comments during our next audit engagement. We have already discussed many of these comments and suggestions with various Town personnel and we will be pleased to discuss them in further detail at your convenience, to perform any additional study of these matters or to assist you in implementing the recommendations.

ACCOUNTS PAYABLE

Finding— We noted in our review of accounts payable at year end, that it was difficult to determine what comprised the accounts payable balance on the trial balance at year end. This was eventually done by copying all the invoices entered as 1992 payables and adding the amounts to reconcile to the trial balance.

Recommendation— Accounts payable at year end need to be substantiated by computer listing as the payables are entered. Also, during the year the accounts payable account needs to be balanced at the end of each month to the open invoice listing run at the same time as the final trial balance for the month.

Management's Comment — We agree with the recommendation and this will be implemented in 1993.

STANDARD MONTHLY JOURNAL ENTRIES

Finding — We noted that entries were made to expense workers' compensation premiums only in September and December. This results in a misleading monthly budget report for each department.

Recommendation — The town should do a standard monthly journal entry to each department for one twelfth of the workers' compensation insurance premium. The spreadsheet used to determine the fringe benefit budget for each department could be used to allocate the cost to each department. The Town should also consider adding two additional accounts under fringe benefits (Social Security/Medicare, and Health Insurance) to provide better detail and understanding of the actual fringe benefit costs of the Town. The current fringe benefit account could be used for workers' compensation and unemployment insurance fringes.

Management's Comment — This will be reviewed with the software company for standard reoccurring journal entries.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

While the year 1992 showed little improvement in the economy, the Board of Selectmen is proud of Gilmanton's employees and volunteers for holding the line on expenditures, and, in some cases, reducing them.

Through an extraordinary effort by the Tax Collector and our office personnel, and especially you, the taxpayers, we received our real estate tax income promptly. This resulted in a savings of \$10,000.00 that we didn't have to pay in interest on Tax Anticipation Notes. Congratulations!

Since her appointment as Director of Welfare, Judith H. Price has done an outstanding job of keeping expenses down. She has successfully instituted a Welfare/Workfare Program, as well as enlisting other public agencies to assist the needy in Gilmanton. Thanks also to the local clubs and organizations for their generous contributions.

Your efforts in recycling have resulted in yet another area of substantial savings. By separating bundled newsprint, corrugated cardboard, metal and plastic containers and waste oil, from the mainstream of our waste system, we have been able to reduce the cost of removal from \$65.00 per ton to about \$36.00. We are hopeful that more of you will make that extra effort in your home to separate your recyclables.

A study committee has been formed to research the Town's fire suppression rating by the Insurance Services Office. In 1981, Gilmanton was rated a "9" on a scale of "1 to 10". It is the goal of this committee to reduce this rating to a "6", thus allowing a savings on the average of \$75.00 annually on homeowners' fire insurance premium, based on a \$100,000.00 valuation. The committee is confident that this can be achieved, given the improved capabilities of our Fire Department.

Among others, a landmark accomplishment has been made in negotiations between Hidden Valley Scout Reservation and LCIP to put 2,500 acres of prime town land into a permanent conservation easement. This allows all of us free recreational access to this land for camping, hiking, hunting, fishing, etc.

Two of the most hazardous bridges in town have been totally replaced with new structures and improved roadways, those being South Road over Kimball Brook and Elm Street over the Suncook River. Phase one of the Hall's Hill Road project was completed in October, resulting in much improved safety, visibility and maintenance. The Highway Department has also begun the next scheduled project, that being the restoration of the first section of Sawyer Lake Road.

The Board is encouraged by the will and spirit of the townspeople, and the fact that so many are pulling together to help keep Gilmanton a GREAT place to live.

GILMANTON POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

This year proved to be the busiest year in the history of the police department. Criminal offenses have been increasing at a rate of about four percent per year, but this year realized a twenty-two percent increase over 1991. In 1992 we effected twenty-five individual arrests for burglaries. Interestingly, only two of those were residents of the town of Gilmanton. Our investigations have taken us throughout most of the New England states. Our success can be credited to a lot of hard work by our staff, whom I would like to publicly acknowledge for a "job well done." I would also like to thank the many outside agencies that have been instrumental in helping us solve crimes. If there is a bright side to the recession, it is that the turnover in the law enforcement field has slowed down which has resulted in a better flow of information between agencies.

The department investigated many law enforcement matters in 1992 including the following: 35 residential burglaries, 34 thefts, 3 car thefts, 7 assaults, 4 arsons, 8 frauds, 58 vandalisms, 3 sex offenses (two were alleged acquaintance rapes), 6 drug arrests, 11 DWI arrests, 13 domestics, 3 unattended deaths, and 98 other criminal offenses. In total, we investigated 275 criminal offenses and handled 1794 complaints from the community.

This recession has steadily increased our workload and I do not anticipate its leveling off until the economy is back on track, people are back to work and there is a general feeling of confidence. We are affected most when we are confronted with major cases which may take hundreds of hours to investigate and at the same time juggle the daily needs of the community.

Criminal complaints have always been a priority with this department and will continue to be. Unfortunately, as this area of our workload increases, something is going to suffer and generally that is our visibility. As previously stated, our criminal offenses went up twenty-two percent. Interestingly, our motor vehicle enforcement (which makes us visible) has gone down twenty-five percent.

The department has been working throughout the year with the membership of the Gilmanton Crime Watch. It has been my pleasure to work with these people, who are very serious about minimizing crime in Gilmanton. I would encourage everyone to find out about this group of concerned citizens because a more aware community makes for a safer place to live.

The department computerized this year and was selected by the Department of Safety as one of ten test sites for uniform crime reporting. Presently, not every community in the state of New Hampshire is reporting its crime statistics, so the state, as a whole, does not have an accurate picture of its crime problems. The Department of Safety has developed a software program for the reporting of crime which involves a comprehensive data

base. By becoming a test site, we were able to obtain this data base free of charge. The process will not increase our workload, but in fact will decrease a few steps in the administration of the office while at the same time giving us a comprehensive data base.

The DARE program is continuing to be taught to our fifth grade class at the Gilmanton Elementary School by Sgt. Baiocchetti. Last year we graduated two classes and as I write this, the instruction for the 1993 class is about to begin. This class is much more than an anti-drug program. It is a continuation of teaching our children to cope with their changing environment.

In closing, I would like to thank the community for its support during this past year. I'm sure there will be new challenges in 1993 and with community support we will be able to manage them.

GILMANTON FIRE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

The Gilmanton Fire Department is comprised of forty-three personnel, four engines, a ladder truck, two forestry trucks, and two rescue-ambulance vehicles. Personnel and apparatus are assigned to four Engine Companies and one Rescue Company that operate out of two fire stations located on Church Street in the Iron Works and Rte. 140 in Gilmanton Corner. Each of the four engine companies is supervised by a Captain and the Rescue Company is supervised by a Captain and Lieutenant. The companies are directed by a staff of Chief Officers which includes the Fire Chief and two Deputy Fire Chiefs. Other than the Fire Chief and one of the Deputy Fire Chiefs who are career officers with the Department, all other firefighters, Emergency Medical Technicians and officers work with the Department in either a volunteer or on-call capacity.

This past year has been extremely challenging for the Department in many respects. Although the actual volume of emergency calls has remained stable, the Department responded to an increased number of building fires and trauma related emergencies. It is our belief that the men and women that serve the department have met these challenges through their dedication to serve the community. Each of the members of the Gilmanton Fire Department have in addition to their emergency responsibilities expended many hours of personal time participating in the ongoing training programs offered by the Department. Each member of the Gilmanton Fire Department must successfully complete a 120 hour firefighter I course prior to being assigned to one of the Department's Engine Companies and a 130 hour Emergency Medical Technician Course prior to being assigned to the Rescue Company. Following the initial certification, personnel have the opportunity to continue to advance their certification in a wide range of Fire and EMS courses offered by the State of New Hampshire. In an effort to address the needs of the community, members of this Department have sought certification as Career Level Firefighters, Level II firefighters, and in the area of Emergency Medicine, seven members of the Rescue Company have achieved their certification as Intermediate level EMT's. The intermediate training allows members to provide an advanced level of care particularly to trauma patients. In addition to the 7 intermediates the Rescue Company has 16 emergency medical technicians and two paramedics, the combination of which allows our Department to provide the highest level of care possible to the community. Beyond certification the Department also provides regular in house fire and EMS training to its members on a monthly basis. The Department currently has 7 State Certified Fire Service Instructors and two State Emergency Medical Instructors on staff. The success of this type of training is a direct result of the support

the voters of the town of Gilmanton have given to the Fire Department over the past several years and it is the public that benefits directly from this success.

In addition to emergency services the Gilmanton Fire Department is charged with the responsibility of administering Building and Fire Inspections within the Town. The two full time employees and the Department's part time secretary provide building inspection services Monday through Friday. The responsibilities include the enforcement of the Town adopted building and fire codes. Last year the office issued 147 permits to property owners in town. Of the 147, 26 permits were for new single family dwellings. Over the past five years the office has issued a total of 192 permits for new single family dwellings. For each permit issued by this office there are no less than 5 required inspections and in many cases return visits are necessary. The permit and inspection program also includes fire service related inspections of oil burners, chimneys, group homes, private homes and businesses.

Although most residents and builders comply with the adopted codes, there have been disputes and violations that have required an enforcement effort by this department. Last year there were 25 formal complaints handled by our office. A percentage of these complaints required some form of enforcement action. The majority of complaints are handled administratively by our office however several cases have required either District Court or Superior Court action.

The Goals of the Gilmanton Fire Department for 1993 include the continuation of providing the community with the highest level of professional services in the areas of fire protection, life safety, emergency medical services, building code inspections and code enforcement; to provide these services in the most effective and efficient manner possible; to maintain the highest level of professionalism and quality control; to provide training and ensure safety of all personnel in the delivery of these services. More specifically the Department goals include the continuation of advanced certification of personnel, and in the area of Emergency Medical Services the department intends to increase the awareness of EMS providers in the area of pediatric trauma care. Our goals in the area of resources include a recommendation to the voters to support the purchase of a new Class A Engine to replace the existing 33 year old Engine 1. The replacement of this engine is paramount to the effectiveness of the fire suppression effort of the Department. In addition, the replacement of this engine will greatly improve the reliability of our apparatus during actual emergencies, and eliminate many safety concerns that currently exist with the Engine. The benefits of replacing this engine may include a more tangible return on your investment as we explore the reclassification of the town by the Insurance Service Organization this year. During the course of this year the ISO will evaluate

the fire suppression capability of the Gilmanton Fire Department. This evaluation will include personnel, training, record keeping, apparatus, and water supply capability. A committee formed at last year's town meeting has been working toward bringing the ISO evaluation to Gilmanton. The committee is confident that the rating of the Gilmanton Fire Department will yield a lower insurance rating that will result in the potential for lower insurance cost for homeowners.

The officers and members of the Gilmanton Fire Department stand ready to serve the community and we would like to thank residents for their continued support of our efforts to provide Gilmanton with top quality service. We invite the public to inspect our stations and apparatus at any time and to offer comments concerning this service. I would also like to thank the Firefighters and Emergency Medical Technicians for their outstanding performance and dedication this past year. We would like to remind residents that qualified individuals are invited to apply for membership on the Fire Department as a firefighter or EMT. Additional information regarding membership can be obtained by calling or meeting with the Chief or any other officer of the Department. Thank you again for allowing us to serve you.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

1992 was below average for wildfires reported in our state. Our largest fire was in May in Rumney where a suspicious origin fire burned approximately 150 acres with a total cost of approximately \$30,000. The N.H. Division of Forests and Lands assisted many other communities in wildland fire suppression as well.

Our fire lookout towers reported 289 fires, burning a total of 136 acres. Our major causes of fires were fires kindled without a permit, unknown causes and children.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, *without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.*" Violation of this statute is a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are liable for all fire suppression costs.

Local fire departments are responsible for suppressing fires. The small average fire size of .41 acre/fire is a tribute to early detection by the public or our fire tower system and the quick response of our trained local fire departments. Please help your warden and fire department by requesting and obtaining a fire permit *before* kindling an open fire.

The N.H. Division of Forests and Lands assisted 8 towns with a total of \$20,000 in 50/50 cost share grants for fire fighter safety items and wildland suppression equipment in 1992.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In 1992 the Gilmanton Conservation Commission started several new projects and continued some of the activities from previous years. This was our second year of water quality testing for Loon Pond, with financial assistance coming from the Gardiner's Cove and Loon Lake Beach Association. This year's report from the State Department of Limnology indicates no major concerns with the water quality of Loon Pond. We also continued with a number of dredge and fill applications to review.

This year the Commission helped the Town with applications for culvert maintenance permits. A change from previous practice came with our sponsorship for a Gilmanton Youth to Conservation Camp. This past summer a youngster was sponsored to go to the Audubon Conservation Camp in Concord, which proved very rewarding. We will be offering a similar sponsorship this year. Details will come from the Elementary School.

Four of the commission's members were trained this past Spring in the N.H. Method of Wetlands Evaluation, with training conducted by the N.H. Audubon Society and Belknap County Soil Conservation Service. Using this training, the Commission will be able to comparatively evaluate the major wetlands of the town for a large number of functions. We have already used this method with several wetlands in town and are doing related map and other paper work. This process will provide us with important information on the town's wetlands. As the Commission expands our evaluations, we will be asking for volunteer help from Gilmanton residents. This will be an opportunity for any interested townspeople to learn more about the ecology of our wetlands and also contribute to our knowledge of them. Details on how to volunteer will be published soon in the local papers.

REPORT OF THE CEMETERY TRUSTEES

The 1992 year was, again, one of progress for Gilmanton in regards to the reclamation and maintenance of our Town Cemeteries.

On June 20, 1992, many citizens joined together at the Copp Cemetery to celebrate the erection of 11 original Gilmanton gravestones that had been found and returned to Gilmanton by Old Sturbridge Village. A great deal of time and effort went into getting the stones back in their original resting places and the support of the Town in making this happen was tremendous.

Gilmanton voters also adopted a Cemetery and Burial Site Ordinance at the 1992 Town Meeting. Such an Ordinance will afford a greater level of protection to our cemeteries.

Thirty cemeteries and/or burial sites are under the care of the Cemetery Trustees. Four other Organizations, the Pine Grove, Beech Grove, Buzzell and Smith Meetinghouse Associations, undertake the care of the cemeteries at those locations. Efforts were made during the year to continue with the repair and upkeep of those cemeteries under our care.

Signs were erected at the Page, Friends, Plummer, Buzzell and Hillside Cemeteries.

Gates were repaired and or replaced at the Friends and Hillside Cemeteries.

Stone, marker and boundary repairs were undertaken in the Page, Friends, Buzzell, Parsons and Plummer Cemeteries as well as the Mary Butler Homesite.

We have begun the process to erect permanent markers at the Levi Hutchinson gravesite. This lone burial site of a Gilmanton civil war veteran was in danger of being lost over time due to its location. We hope that these permanent markers will preserve this important site for the future.

Work is still underway to complete the repairs at the Tibbetts/Alton Road Cemetery and to locate all known sites on the Town Maps.

Again we thank all those volunteers who work so diligently in reclaiming and maintaining our heritage as found in Gilmanton's cemeteries. Thank you.

GILMANTON PLANNING BOARD

In spite of a distressed economy in 1992, the number of applications to the Board showed a slight increase over last year. Six new residential subdivisions were approved with a total of 15 building lots. We received valuable assistance at no cost from the Belknap County Conservation Office in the review of one of the subdivision plans involving proper erosion control and road constructions issues.

Four Site Plan applications were approved involving local businesses. In two instances, where review by both the ZBA and Planning Board were required, joint hearings of the two Boards were held to streamline the process. In 1992, the Town meeting voted to expand the Business District on Rte. 106. Since that time we have had inquiries regarding commercial development in that area. For the 1993 Town Meeting, we have proposed amendments which we hope will result in a shorter approval process for commercial applications.

The Board is continuing their volunteer effort to update the 1982 Master Plan. Two chapters were completed in 1990. The remaining chapters are being readied for presentation at a public hearing during 1993. The Land Use chapter will probably be one of the most interesting in its ability to identify those changes occurring since 1982 and the direction in which we are currently headed. Lakes Region Planning Commission has been instrumental in providing us with the working maps to make these updates possible, as well as guiding us in the presentation of our information in the text of the Plan. Our work is also being assisted by the use of aerial photos that were received by the Town from the State Department of Transportation through the efforts of the Conservation Commission.

The board was very excited to learn of the continuing interest to preserve Gilmanton's active farms. We've offered our support to the Selectmen should they decide to appoint a study committee to see what Gilmanton can do to assure the preservation of both active farms and other significant open spaces. The Board is also currently reviewing the Cluster Ordinance which encourages clustering building sites in order to preserve significant areas of agricultural and open spaces.

We would be remiss if we failed to express our collective appreciation for the professional support we have received through the tireless efforts of our Planning Administrator, Candace Daigle, and Executive Assistant, Kam-mie Anderson-Ferré.

As we enter 1993, we pledge to continue to provide competent and responsible stewardship in planning what Gilmanton will look like in future years. We urge you to contact us at any time if we may provide particular assistance.

LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

The Lakes Region Planning Commission is a voluntary association of local communities designated by area towns as the organization that brings towns and cities within the Region together. By associating and pooling resources, local governments have a highly trained professional staff available to them for a wide variety of services. Areas of current expertise include land use planning, transportation planning, master planning, environmental planning, capital improvement programming, impact fee studies, economic and community development, housing, fiscal and environmental impact analysis, geographic information systems and computerized cartography, household hazardous waste collections and site plan review. Communities may also obtain the services of a professional planner on a regular basis through our circuit rider program. The Commission also serves as a collective voice in dealings with state and federal governments protecting and furthering the interests of our communities.

Your support enables the LRPC to undertake comprehensive regional planning and to carry out various projects and programs of regional benefit. Over the past year, the LRPC:

- Provided consultation and assistance to twenty-eight member communities.
- Met repeatedly with state officials and agency representatives to influence policy and help keep the Region an active participant in many ongoing State programs.
- Contracted and coordinated the 9th, and largest, regional household hazardous waste program in the Lakes Region serving over eighteen municipalities in a one day super collection.
- Participated on the Governor's Advisory Committee for the creation of the Governor's State Park along Lake Winnisquam in Laconia.
- Sponsored local sessions of the N.H. Law Lecture Series.
- Incorporated and participated on the Belknap County Economic Development Council, a regional consortium of area towns for economic betterment.
- Supported the capitalization of the long awaited U.S. Route 3 and N.H. Route 11 community oriented transportation study of the Route 3 & 11 transportation corridor from Franklin to Laconia.
- Appointed to the Route 3 & 11 Policy Advisory Committee and entered into an Agreement with the N.H. Department of Transportation to participate in the undertaking of this important corridor analysis.

- Completed a comprehensive environmental, transportation and land use analysis of important industrial lands bordering Gilford and Laconia for future economic development efforts on behalf of both municipalities.
- Prepared analysis of barriers to affordable housing that was used by the N.H. Office of State Planning and the N.H. Housing Finance Authority for developing strategies relative to affordable housing.
- Enhanced our geographic information systems capability. With two trained staff people, we provide advice regarding GIS to many member towns. We have completed GIS mapping for projects in Laconia, Franklin, Holderness and Moultonborough. We also are represented on the N.H. GIS Advisory Committee.
- Continued to participate on the State's Ad Hoc Route 16 Advisory Committee which is overseeing the Route 16 Feasibility Study designed to investigate steps to preserve the Route 16 transportation corridor to insure economic vitality and a high quality of life for the residents of communities and regions served by Route 16.
- Obtained approval from the N.H. Department of Environmental Services and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to develop and promote local water quality protection regulations among communities bordering Lake Winnepesaukee. The project is expected to be funded in 1993 and carried forward into 1994.
- Continued to participate on and support the N.H. Heritage Trails efforts. The N.H. Heritage Trail is a recreational trail generally following the Pemigewasset and Merrimack Rivers from the Canadian border to the Massachusetts border.
- Made available the services of a recycling coordinator to area towns.
- Worked closely with the Merrimack River Watershed Council, Pemigewasset River Watershed Council, and National Park Service, Society for the Protection of N.H. Forests and other to protect open space and conserve important parcels of land along the Pemigewasset and Merrimack Rivers as part of two federal Wild and Scenic Rivers studies.
- Initiated point and non-point source pollution mapping of towns in the Region and transferred this information into the LRPC's geographic information system.
- Continued to administer the Region II Transportation Advisory Committee in coordination with the N.H. Department of Transportation. This group meets throughout the year and has established regional transportation priorities which are annually

presented to the Governor's Highway Advisory Council and the State Department of Transportation for future transportation improvement projects.

- Continued to administer and participate in a number of master plan updates throughout the Region including, but not necessarily limited to, Belmont, Andover, Northfield, Holderness, Gilmanton and Sanbornton.
- Surveyed area towns to learn of the services that are of the greatest regional priority; e.g., education, data and information services and land use/water quality management.

SPECIAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING MINUTES
NOVEMBER 5, 1992 - 7:00 P.M.

7:00 P.M. Jean Cummings was asked to lead the meeting in the Pledge of Allegiance.

George Roberts then proceeded to read the Special School Warrant and to address the fact that this is the 4th time that people have come together to discuss the warrant and that the debate will be limited to one hour. He also informs people that the school board had requested a secret ballot and a reasonable time limit would be put on the voting.

7:07 P.M. A motion was made by Mr. Delcey that debate be limited to one hour; with fifteen minute presentations by both sides and one half hour for questions and answers. This motion was seconded by Mr. Osler and was passed by a majority voice vote.

A motion was made by Roger Burlingame to adopt Article I as presented. This motion was seconded by Steve Latic.

Roger Burlingame began his presentation with history of the past four years and the lack of a teacher contract since 89-90.

Roger Burlingame went on to highlight the information that everyone received in their packets regarding teacher salaries, step increases and the affect on your tax bill.

Roger Burlingame closed his presentation with the message that the town needs to keep quality teachers for our children and that quality teachers will follow the better pay scales.

7:23 P.M. A brief presentation was given from the opposing side regarding the percentages being asked for in the packet.

7:25 P.M. Question and Answer session ensued.

The following questions and answers were given during the debate.

-A question was raised regarding the cost of benefits in the teacher contract. It was estimated by one person, that the total benefit package alone could estimate \$13,600 per teacher.

Has the School Board considered the total cost of both the salaries and benefits? The answer to this question was YES given by Roger Burlingame.

He went on to say that there is \$221,000 being returned to the community from the school budget and that they are not trying to spend money loosely.

-Another person quoted Bill Clinton's campaign by saying "It's about the economy."

-Clarification was asked for as to whether or not teachers had actually been receiving a cost of living increase each year since the contract has not been settled.

Roger Burlingame responded by saying that there has been no cost of living increases for teachers. Some teachers have received step increases during the last 4 years but for some teachers at the top of their range they have received nothing.

-A question was raised as to the cost per student educated in Gilmanton as compared to the state average.

-Peter Osler wanted it to be known why the tax bill had been sent out prior to the school district meeting.

Roger Burlingame clarified this matter by stating that people have been paying their taxes quite rapidly since the tax bills came out and this enables the town to save money and not have to borrow. It was not done to sabotage the meeting.

8:20 P.M. Mr. Robertson announced that the vote will commence with a secret ballot. Do you wish to adopt Article 1 vote YES or NO.

9:42 P.M. Call for all registered voters in Gilmanton.

LETTER FROM THE SCHOOL BOARD

School year 1992-93 continues to be a year of transition, with equal parts hope and frustration thrown in for good measure. With the faculty, community volunteers and student body working together to get us through the opening days of the school year, we welcomed our new principal and set about the business of educating our children. The transition was not without its problems, resulting from limitations in our facilities and funding and not from our faculty or students, but the problems were all successfully managed.

Along with our new principal came new ideas, new programs and new opportunities. The recently announced first recipients of the Gilmanton School's Good Citizenship awards is just one example of the new programs being implemented. A short visit of four students and their teacher from Russia provided our children with contacts and insight into global changes that they have only read about in the past. A new sign, planned and funded by the PTA, graces the school's front lawn. These are just a few of what, if taken individually, are relatively insignificant happenings affecting our school and children but which, when taken together, are indicators of a living, growing school community.

As in the last few years, the energy of too many has been consumed by contract negotiations. The School Board and the faculty are all hopeful that the proposals to be voted on in March will get us past the deadlock we have faced with the voters during these years and we can refocus our energy to some of the other critical issues which must be addressed. These include the growing crisis we are facing with a lack of space and a continuing increase in the student population. Next year will see an additional modular in our parking lot and an additional bus on our bus routes. The increased student population and the necessity to house more and more of them in outside temporary units, along with our efforts to keep as many of our special needs students in our school while providing them with the specialized care and assistance they require, brings with it a need for additional administrative assistance. As always, we must balance the costs against the benefits. But as in years past, we continue to return to the general fund at year end, and all moneys we can retain during the year by cutting costs when the opportunity presents itself and by continuing to reevaluate budgeted expenses as the year progresses to see which, if any can be reduced or eliminated altogether.

In spite of these efforts, there are some costs over which we have little or no control. Tuition costs per pupil at Gilford continue to increase. With the new Americans With Disabilities Act comes the federally mandated requirement that our facility be brought into compliance with federal access standards. These

costs will be incurred next year and during the next 4 or 5 years and will continue to impact our school budget. But with your support, the School Board is confident it will be able to meet the challenge of meeting the needs of our school children while exercising fiscal responsibility.

We will also be asking for your support next year and in the years to follow as we attempt to develop programs to help deal with the impact on our school and our children of some of society's crisis such as the AIDS epidemic and the ever increasing presence of drugs in our State and our community. Although, at times, we would all like to believe that we are isolated and immune from the harsher realities of society in general, we aren't. To not plan to deal with these issues would be foolhardy and could find us in the position of trying too little too late. That is just one more reason why we need to move forward in our contract relationship with our teachers and focus on the future and not the past. Although there will always be room for disagreement in how we move forward, if we are all committed to the goal of moving forward, we will make our school a better school and provide our children with a better opportunity for their future. And after all, that what is all about!
