TOWN WARRANT.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Childs' Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose three selectment, town treasurer, tax collector, highway agent, town clerk, chief of police and agent to enforce the liquor laws for the ensuing years, trustee of the Fuller public library for the two ensuing years, one trustee of Trust funds for the three ensuing years and two delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

ART. 2. To hear the reports of the selectmen, town clerk, tax collector, town treasurer and highway agent to the auditors, agents, committees, or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the town and apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 4. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and culverts.

ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, not to exceed seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for Senator Grimes Post, G. A. R., to be used Memorial Day.

ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to continue the present laws in force, prohibiting cattle and horses from running at large in the highways.

ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise any money for the support of the Fuller public library or pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

ART. 9. To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest of \$200.00 from the late Fanny E. Straw, the income to be used for the care of her burial lot in Deering, N. H.

ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to accept a bequest of \$100.00 from the estate of the late Mary E. Lovering, the income to be used for the care of her burial lot in Deering, N. H.

ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest of \$100.00 from the late Thomas H. Wilson, the income to be used for the care of his burial lot.

ART. 12. To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest of \$100.00 from the estate of Annie E. Gillis, the income to be used for the care of the Zachariah and Charles D. Robbins burial lot in Pine Grove cemetery.

ART. 13. To see if the town will vote to have liquor agents as provided in Chapter 147, Laws of 1917, or pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of preventing the spread of the disease known as White Pine Blister Rust.

ART. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed \$500.00 for the District Nurse association to be used for the payment of salary of the District nurse.

ART. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, not to exceed \$200.00, for the support of band concerts the coming season.

ART. 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SELECTMEN.

To the Citizens of Hillsborough:

The expenditures for the last year have been large. At the last town meeting it was voted to hire money for the construction of the Contoocook Valley trunk line highway. The scarcity of labor, the high price of grain and the severity of the winter have all contributed to large highway expenditures. The Robertson lawsuit, which was reported last year, was carried to the Supreme Court, and although the suit was won by the town, the appeal necessitated the expense of another trial. The attorney's fees in both courts have been settled this year.

On account of the death of William H. Dennison, a respected citizen who had been an officer of the town for eight years, it was necessary for the selectmen to appoint a treasurer, and Jesse C. Parker was selected for the position.

The copy for the town history has been reckoned as an asset to the extent of one thousand dollars, the same as last year.

PRECINCT WARRANT.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Hillsborough Bridge Village Fire Precinct in the Town of Hillsborough qualified to Vote in Precinct Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Precinct Hall in said Precinct on Monday, the eighteenth day of March, 1918, at seven of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose one or more water commissioners to serve five years.
3. To choose one fire commissioner to serve three years.
4. To choose treasurer, clerk, auditors, and other necessary precinct officers for the ensuing year.
5. To hear the reports of the fire commissioners, water commissioners, treasurer, clerk, auditors, and other officers and committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To see if the Precinct will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) necessary to run the sprinkling cart for a period of twenty weeks or more.
7. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for paying the current expenses of the Precinct, the debt of the Precinct, and any other charges arising within said Precinct.
8. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

In conformity to a law passed at the last session of the legislature the fiscal year of all school districts now shall end in August, hence no financial report of the Board of Education can be made at this time. The object of this is to make the school and fiscal year end at the same time.

The financial condition and the needs of the district for the coming year and a half will be outlined at the annual meeting in March.

The amount required for text books and supplies for the coming year will be \$500.

The program of work in the seventh and eighth grades has been radically revised this year so that now the boys in those grades have two double periods a week in the manual training room, and the girls the same amount of time in the domestic science department. In addition to this, the pupils of these grades have instruction in elementary science about one hour a week and in concrete geometry an hour and a half a week. The eighth grade began the study of French during the fall term and have made progress in becoming acquainted with that language.

The newness of these subjects and their better adaptability to the grades in which they are offered appeals to the interests of the pupils and thus makes their school life more agreeable and profitable. The boys have made numerous articles in the manual training room, and the girls have taken hold of the work in domestic science with commendable zeal and with good success. In many respects they do as well as do those who are farther along in their school course.

The boys of the manual training class in the high school have constructed a series of closets in the boys' basement which are being used for storing the school supplies. An inspection of the work would cause one to think that we have in the class some promising candidates for the carpenters' trade. In addition to this comparatively good sized project, the boys have made many other things among which may be mentioned a step ladder, bird houses, towel racks, coat hangers, etc. To provide for the larger number of pupils using this room, the equipment has been increased by the addition of two manual training benches with the necessary tools.

The four boys of the agricultural class who had summer projects raised vegetables to the approximate value of one hundred fifty dollars—a valuable addition to the nation's food supply in these strenuous times. The work for this coming season calls for field crops and larger plots of ground as well as for more capital to finance the projects. These two items have been causing some anxiety, but we are hoping

that a way out may come to light before the season is far enough advanced to begin work on the land.

The headmaster reports that fifty-six persons have registered in the high school this year, and that the present enrollment is forty-seven, an unusual number having left on account of illness or because of real need at home. "The reduced attendance is due to fewer families in town, the recent additions to population being foreign peoples without children of high school age; to ease of employment today; and to a smaller number of pupils from surrounding school districts."

The graduates of last June are employed as follows: One is preparing to become a nurse, two are engaged in office work, one is teaching, and two are at home. Although this was not a large class, the present prospects are that the next two will be of about the same size.

That the school is not lacking in patriotism is evidenced by the fact that there is in the high school room a "service flag with eleven stars representing recent graduates and other pupils who attended at least one year."

The headmaster also offers this suggestion: "The main-spring of incentive is lacking when no plan for future work fills the pupils mind. There should be more talk at home about ideals of student life, and the aspiration for college, normal school, or other study after high school days should be aroused."

The supervisor of music reports in part as follows: "Last May we had an exhibition of music on a parent's day, and each grade and the high school prepared a short program. Many people were pleased with the three and four part singing of the fifth and sixth grades, especially, and with the good tone and work in all classes.

In December of this school year, the fifth, sixth, seventh, and eighth grades united in giving a concert of patriotic songs which was very successful musically, and which netted ninety dollars for the local Red Cross work.

We expect to celebrate the National Week of Song, February 17-23, by special study of our standard patriotic and folk songs with the idea of encouraging the young people to take part in the Community Sing on Washington's birthday.

The question of giving credit for music in high school is gaining greater consideration everywhere. When we give music a place in the program on an equal with other subjects, and give credit for a pupil's work in that subject in school and outside, then we will appreciate the value of music as a vocational and as a cultural subject. The state superintendent of New Hampshire has announced that the department of public instruction is in favor of the plan of accrediting competent private instruction in music as a regular part of high school work and of counting such toward graduation."

I might add that what seems like a feasible plan for giving credit in music studied outside of school has been adopted by the high school in Concord.

The following quotation is taken from the report of the supervisor of manual arts. "The aim of the work is to enable the child to appreciate artistic work so he can select good pictures, help in selecting good wall paper and furniture and in planning for beautiful home surroundings, to make artistic and effective posters to advertise what he has to sell, to understand and to make drawings, to choose good clothes, and to aid him in many ways to live a more complete life.

The course of study is very similar to that of last year, except that we are giving more attention to design and hand work. The pupils have done excellent work in dress design, house decoration, and in poster work. The little people are working up to poster making very well. This is now considered both important and practical."

To use a military term, I would recommend that we "consolidate the ground already taken," and thus prepare for a further advance.
