TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Lancaster qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose one Selectman for three years, a Treasurer, a Prosecuting Agent, one Trustee of trust funds for three years, three members of the Col. Town Spending Committee for three years, two members of the Col. Town Control and Investment Committee and other necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the following purposes:
 - First: To meet current expenses of the Town and apply on the principal and interest of the town debt.
 - Second: For Highways and Bridges, Town Maintenance, State Aid Maintenance and Permanent Roads.
 - Third: For building and repairing Sidewalks and Sewers.
- 4. To direct how money raised for any of the above purposes be expended.

- 5. To see what action the town will take in regard to an act for State Aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the permanent improvements of main highways throughout the State, passed Feb. 5, 1925, and amendments thereto, and raise money for the same.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the purpose of issuing and distributing circulars and other written or printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, and direct how the same should be expended.
- 7. To see what action the town will take in regard to building a cement sidewalk on Stevens Terrace from Bunker Hill Street to High Street.
- 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for White Pine Blister Rust Control, to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry Department.
- 9. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising money for the maintenance of the Town Building.
- 10. To see if the town of Lancaster voters wish to instruct the Selectmen to take steps to improve our Main Street lights and discard the obsolete arclights and to see if the town will vote a certain sum or sums to be used for the above mentioned improvement or improvements and if so how much.
- 11. To see if the voters of Lancaster wish to instruct the Selectmen to install stop signs at the intersections of streets running into or across Main and Summer Streets and to appropriate money for the same and if so how much.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money on temporary notes in anticipation of taxes.

13. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

Lancaster Public Library

The Library year beginning February 1, 1930, and closing January 31, 1931, was one of progress, inasmuch as the new department, the Juvenile Library, which was fairly installed April 1, 1930, has become a beneficial factor. After the resignation of Miss Ellen Davis in August, her place was filled by the appointment of Miss Elaine Fuller, who has carried on the work with great efficiency. Another benefit was the appointment of Mrs. Theodore R. Lund as Assistant Librarian. Mrs. Lund has had experience in library work in Boston.

In October, two of the Library Trustees, Mrs. Annie Hastings and Mrs. Emilie Shurtleff, together with Miss Brackett, the Librarian, attended the Neighborhood Meeting of nearby towns held in Lisbon, where a discussion of books, ways and means, was led by Miss Dorothy Annable of the Library Commission of Concord.

During the year, the Adult Department has loaned 16,277 books, which only includes two months of Juvenile books issued before the latter department was completed. Money turned over to the Treasurer for cards and fines amounted to \$100. As usual, the Library is open for the public from 1.30 to 4.30 p. m. and from 7 to 9 in the evening.

COL. TOWN SPENDING COMMITTEE

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

With the reports of the Secretary of the Committee, who aims to explain more or less the motive back of each appropriation, and the report of the Treasurer who gives in detail the amount which the Committee deemed wised to appropriate, it seems to the Chairman that there is very little of interest which could be added in behalf of the Spending Committee. Inasmuch, however, as the various members of the Committee do not have an opportunity to explain their action as a committee, possibly a word from the Chairman in behalf of the whole committee might be worthwhile.

Your present Committee has aimed to guide their actions on two fundamental policies: (1) They have attempted to carry out the spirit of the Will which Col. Town made, a copy of which was provided for each member. Deliberations on various appropriations very decidedly shows that the members have studied the Will thoroughly and were try to carry out its recommendations. (2) All appropriations have been made on the basis of using the money which the Colonel made available to the town where the greatest good would result to the greatest number of people.

The Committee senses keenly the fact that Col. Town left his estate to the town of Lancaster; that the money is the property of the town of Lancaster

and not the individual property of the Committee; and further appreciates that the people of the Town of Lancaster should have their wishes gratified with this money insofar as the wishes are along the general line of the spirit of the Will. In making the appropriations during the past year these policies have been followed. The Committee senses their duty as agents of the Town of Lancaster in the administration of this money, and appropriations have been made on application of citizens backed by the positive evidence that a large group was to be benefited from this appropriation. In some instances this fact was presented in the form of petitions and in other instances by large delegations coming before the Committee. All appropriations that have merit and conform to the general policies of the Will have been granted, either in part or in whole.

Without doubt your Committee has made some appropriations which some citizens may feel have been unwise. They have used their best judgment as your agents to act as Col. Town would have acted had he been alive and approached on the matter. They are a group of human beings, possessed with the normal amount of human frailties and if they have erred in judgment we trust you will understand they have tried to do their best and will therefore be charitable with them.

Many of our appropriations have become almost an annual affair, such as prizes offered to Academy students for excellence in scholarship and public speaking, assistance given to the Hospital Auxiliary, Town Band and School Orchestra.

The amount of money available for scholarship loans has been doubled. The numerous requests for the use of this money have proved its worth.

Two small deficits were covered by the committee, first, for the Lancaster Academy Athletic Association; second, for the Board of Trade, in the maintenance of the Information Booth.

Under the leadership of Mr. Carl W. Miller, assisted by Miss Ruth McKinnon, another playground was maintained from June 30 to August 23. The attendance was between 80 and 100 during the best part of the day. Special events were arranged

twice a week, such as Doll Shows, Pet Shows, Treasure Hunts, Swimming and Hiking Outings. Various games for children were also featured, as well as handicraft work, sewing and fancy work.

Permanent improvements were made at Camp Daniel Webster. A fence was built across the back of the property, the swimming hole enlarged, the car repaired, also some of the cots. A basketball court was built and signs posted along the route to the camp. The boys were in camp for two weeks under the leadership of Rev. Roger A. Dunlap and Rev. Richard McClintock. Camp Councillors were Edwin Fuller and Lawrence Willson. The attendance was eight. Mrs. Olive Stanard and Mrs. Hazel Eastwood supervised the twenty-seven girls during the first two weeks in August. Five of these girls were non-residents. The councillors were Helen Donnelly, Dorothea Smith, Beatrice Fuller, Ruth Fitch and Helen Smith. Elizabeth Carpenter was cook. Regular camp routine was followed, varied by Handicraft, Hiking and other innovations.

Arrangements were made whereby those Academy students living beyond the two mile radius might have suitable transportation. This venture has proved eminently satisfactory.

Work was continued on Ray Field up to the point where it was deemed unwise to spend more money at the time. Half of the field has been seeded and plans are under way for a baseball diamond there in the spring.

A sum of money was voted for the proper care of the skating rink during the rest of the season. A request from the Golf Club for aid in reducing their debt was also granted.

During the past year it has been necessary to pairt the Col. Town House. It is almost needless to say that it requires a large sum of money for the upkeep of this piece of property. The debt is being systematically reduced each year. Your committee has endeavored to meet all requests with an open mind and with the utmost justice. We trust that our work will be regarded in the same light.

Unity Club twice a month with the exception of June, July, August and September.

4-H Club, twice a month.

W. C. T. U. meeting once a month.

Prize Speaking contest, Graduation exercises and Reception, New Hampshire State Exhibit, Flower Show and Odd Fellows annual meeting were held in the Auditorium.

Five hundred visitors have been shown through the building the past year.

The completion of another year of service as Matron and Superintendent more forcefully convinces us that our effectiveness in these positions is directly influenced by the citizens of the town. Each year shows a marked improvement in the willingness of the people to comply with the rules as laid down by the House Committee.

The younger generation who use the building so much in school activities and at dances have shown a conspicuous tendency to respect the property. These two factors, combined with the gentlemanly conduct of our young men, have made our duties a pleasure rather than a job.

We wish at this time to extend to the citizens of Lancaster our appreciation for the many kindnesses shown us during the past year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the Honorable School Board and Citizens of

Lancaster:

This is the twelfth school report since 1919, the year that state-wide supervision went into effect.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

The present year has been marked by a high average of school attendance due largely to the mild weather in the early part of the season. Excellent progress has been made in all of the schools.

TEACHERS

Two changes in the teaching staff took place this year. At Elm Ridge, Miss Helen Shattuck resigned to accept a position in Arlington, Mass. and Miss Grace E. McKee was appointed in her place. Miss McKee is a graduate of the University of Vermont Training School, and has had two years of teaching experience in southern Vermont. At the Grange school, Miss Shirley Chamberlin was elected in place of Miss Dorothy Hillier. Miss Chamberlin is a graduate of Plymouth Normal and had taught at Jefferson Meadows for two years.

REPAIRS

The buildings at South Lancaster and Elm Ridge were shingled, and the Mt. Cabot and Stebbins Hill schools were repaired. Other minor repairs were made, and all of our school buildings are now in an excellent state of repair.

NEW EQUIPMENT

Adjustable desks were placed in Schools No. 6 and 11, thus providing all of our schools with this valuable feature. Atlantic circulators, a type of heating plant that has proved to be most satisfactory, were installed in schools No. 10, 11 and 15. At Stebbins Hill, new slate blackboards were introduced and the building was also equipped with electric lights.

SCHOOL PROGRESS

The policy of providing the district schools with up-to-date text books has been continued. Standardized tests have been given in all the schools, and the general average has been above that of the schools throughout the country.

HEALTH

All of the children were given a thorough physical examination early in the year, by the school physician. Regular inspection for physical defects has been taken care of by the nurse. In most of the schools, hot lunches have been served throughout the winter season. Outdoor sports have been encouraged by the purchase of basketballs and other apparatus.

FINANCES

The Lancaster Town schools are conducted under many financial handicaps. Our school district is the outer shell surrounding the village district, and distances that the children must be carried are excessive, since six transportation routes must be maintained. Our district schools average less than sixteen pupils in their enrollment, whereas in a graded system as many as thirty-five pupils can be taught successfully by one teacher. In spite of these handicaps, the cost of our schools is but slightly above the state average.

IN CONCLUSION

The Superintendent wishes to express his appreciation of the fine spirit of cooperation that all have shown this year, and to thank the teachers for their splendid efforts in the cause of education.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE'S REPORT

To the School Board of Lancaster Town District:

The following report is respectfully submitted by me, as Public Health Nurse of Lancaster, having the Town Schools under my supervision:

The physical examination of all pupils was completed by Dr. William Bronson, with my assistance, during September and October. These examinations consist of weighing and measuring the children, teeth and tonsils inspected, heart examined, observed whether or not any skin condition exists, checked up on goitre and whether or not the child has been vaccinated.

After completing the physical examinations, the defect cards are made out, signed by the school physician, and mailed to the parent so they may be informed of any defect which may exist

The vision and hearing test is given the pupils and cards are mailed to the parents of any child showing defective vision and hearing.

Health talks are given in the schools as often as time permits. Some of the subjects covered are: Fresh air both day and night, correct posture, proper amount of rest and sleep, food values emphasizing the effects of tea and coffee and the importance of milk, fruit, and vegetables, care of the body with special stress on the care of the nails, hands, hair, teeth and skin.

Also to further interest the children in the care of health, Health Plays have been instituted which bring out more forcibly the principles which I have been endeavoring to impress upon them through these talks.

On my visits to the schools, any child presenting symptoms of the following contagious diseases such as measles, mumps, diphtheria, scarlet fever.

chicken pox, and whooping cough, are excluded from school. Any child presenting symptoms of scabies, ringworm, impetigo or acute eye infections is referred to his family physician for treatment.

At the close of this report will be found a table showing the kinds and number of defects and the physical standing of each school.

It is very pleasing to report that the number of defects has been greatly reduced, showing a great improvement in all the schools.

The teachers in these schools are much interested in this part of their curriculum and have been of much assistance in instilling in the children the importance of health and with their co-operation, together with the parents, we will strive for even better results and it would seem not impossible to achieve them.

——The Juvenile Department of the Public Library, sponsored by the Library Trustees, and financed by the Col. Town Fund, was opened on April 10, 1930, with Miss Ellen Davis as Librarian. 'Under her capable leadership, the room ran at full speed until early in September, when she resigned to be married, leaving her mother, Mrs. Nettie Davis, in charge.

The children from the ages of 6 to 12, enjoy their room, surrounded by their own books. They never had opportunities for browsing, as their elders have had for years. The increase in the circulation of books, alone, shows the popularity of this separate room. The total circulation for the ten months that the Juvenile room has been in existance, is 4,414.

During the summer months, book clubs, story hours, and plays were held, with a large attendance. The room was kept bright with flowers, thoughtfully donated by various townspeople.

The Pilgrim village, made by the Junior High School pupils, and the ship model, add to the attractiveness of the place, and are never ending centers of interest to the patrons.

Miss Elaine Fuller was appointed in Miss Davis' place and took charge in the middle of November.
