# Report of the Municipal Court

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MARCH 1, 1896, TO MARCH 1, 1897

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The record of this court for the past year is characterized by a marked decrease in the number of criminal prosecutions brought before it. Only one case for the illegal sale of liquor in this town was prosecuted, and the court found no evidence to substantiate the complaint. The account of complaints presented for drunkenness continues to exhibit a very small number, only eleven in a population given for the town by the last census as 3363. It will be noted that the percentage, based on these statistics, is very near the vanishing point. It is only a small fraction more than one case of drunkenness for each 300 of the population.

The vacancy in the office of Special Justice of the court was filled by the Governor and Council, February 11, instant, by the appointment of Lewis B. Heald, Esq., to that office. He was born March 5, 1839, and his term of office would accordingly expire, by constitutional limitation, on his completion of the limit of age in March, 1909.

The statistical report this year follows the form adopted last year, and is designed to exhibit in the fullest practicable detail the transactions in this department of town affairs.

## Report of the Trustees

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During the past year the Library has continued on the methods of administration already well understood and approved, and has accomplished important results as a prominent feature of our educational system. It has provided the means to the people for investigation and study of general and special topics in all the departments of literature to which taste, inclination or educational advice has directed them, to the utmost of the facilities of the collection thus far made. The extent of this patronage is exhibited in detail in the report of the librarian. It is necessary, however, to call particular attention to one condition that requires improvement. With the occupation of spacious and convenient quarters set apart by the town for the Library in the new town building, and by the extension of the duties of the librarian in order to maintain a reading room and have it open for the public each evening, the resources available for the purchase of new books for the Library proper have been considerably curtailed. In the old building the Library was open but two days in the week, and the running expenses on account of salaries and various incidentals, were much less than at present. The provision of periodicals for a reading room, which is now a department of the Library, is another considerable expense. These are all reasonable and necessary outlays, but they constitute a primary charge on the annual appropriation. With items of insurance and other unavoidable current expenses, the amount now remaining of an annual appropriation of five hundred dollars for the purchase of new books is almost trifling when compared with what was available out of the same appropriation under former conditions.

It may be said that one hundred dollars represents 100 books at current prices. We have a population which may be 3500 or 4000. In order to keep the "blood circulating," so to speak, in this Library, and a reasonable number of new books in movement among the people, fresh literature—literature which is the product of modern thought and progress—must be obtained. Without this stimulus the interest of the people in the Library slackens, and the tendency is towards a comatose state. An addition of 250 new books in any year means very much to the patrons of the Library. Allowing a week's use for each book, and assuming that all of the 250 are in circulation, that number of books would yield 12,500 readings. It would be three new books for each man, woman and child in town. But the actual patrons of the Library are necessarily much less in number than the entire population, and this consideration doubles the number of new books that would be available to each of the registered takers. In taxation, all this represents a rate of only two cents on each one hundred dollars of valuation. To a person who is only taxed on a poll, the price of the free use of two hundred and fifty new books, as they are available in this Library, is less than two cents. If these books are wisely selected, and are of a character which gives them permanent value, their usefulness is only just commenced at the end of one year of their library life.

In view of these considerations it is recommended that the standing appropriation for the Library be increased by the sum of two hundred dollars, so that hereafter it shall be seven hundred dollars instead of five hundred dollars.

The Trustees invite special attention to the reports of the Treasurer, the Librarian, and of the standing committees.

Their recommendations have our endorsement, and we trust that they will receive the approval of the town.

A display case for the reception and exhibition of gifts of relics, articles of historic interest, and rare curiosities,



which are coming to the custody of the town and which would be largely increased by the assurance of a safe and suitable place of receptacle, is very much needed, and, if its procurement is authorized, will be placed in the reading room.

Within the last year, a portrait of Hon. Harry Bingham, of nearly life-size, has been painted for the Public Library, by Daniel J. Strain, a son of Littleton whose attainments in the profession of art have reflected honor upon his native town. This will be one of the most valued and appropriate benefactions hitherto made by one of her sons. It is expected that an opportunity, in the near future, will be given for a more formal and public expression of the sentiment of the public towards the generous act of Mr. Strain.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BOOKS

Our Library has become one of the most important institutions of the town. The growing interest taken in it by all the people, irrespective of age, demonstrates the wisdom of its foundation and the yearly appropriation.

There has been from the first a most healthy increase of patronage, and best of all a reaching forth for the higher classes of reading.

Of course the works of fiction have been in the largest demand, 80 per cent of all the books taken having been of this kind, but this is not peculiar to our people. It is an almost universal experience and is in itself a most healthy condition when we see the type of fiction in demand, which with almost no exception is of the highest character. Books of this kind are read largely by the families who are seeking rest and at the same time intellectual pleasure, by the young who are charmed by the realism or the exaggeration of life, by the little folk who are entertained and held at the hearthstone by the accounts of other child life.

The modern novel must have a distinctive moral tone and real literary merit to find its place upon the shelves of our Library. Every book of this sort enlarges the ideas, inspires the life, quickens the intellect, and lifts one for a time out of oneself.

The "survival of the fittest" is the law of our selection. We wait until the storm is over before we decide as to the merits of a book. While we welcome most gladly the products of the latest literary genius, we urge upon the people not to forget the great monumental writers of the early part of the century who have never been surpassed.

We must express our regret that only three per cent of the books read have been biographical and only six per cent of history and travel. We would suggest to those who have the guidance of the young in their reading (and no one should read without a guide) that they impress upon them

the inspirational influence of studying the great characters of history, and show them the broadening influence which comes in the reading of books of travel, it is the very next thing to visiting the far away lands.

In our selections we have studied the needs of all the people. The Friday Club, the Colonial Club, the Musical Club, the young people in the schools, and above all the juvenile element in our midst, for it is here the intellectual life is determined.

The committee wish to express their gratitude for the several gifts of books and magazines which have been presented this year. Special mention should be made of the memorial volume of Ancient Redding presented by Edwin Child Miller and Ida Farr Miller, also the history of the Wentworth family, presented by the Hon. Samuel Wentworth of Boston.

The committee would be glad to receive from time to time lists of books for their consideration in which the people might be interested.

It is gratifying to note the increase of applicants for cards. We wish to see a still larger increase. Every citizen of our town should be a patron of the Library.

This year we have added 237 new books and it was with great difficulty we made the selections from the host which we feel should be on our shelves. The appropriation does not permit us to keep pace with the choice new publications and the people's needs. We can afford to economize on every other line better than on those which tone our moral and intellectual life. The true wealth of the people is the intellectual, so we make bold to ask a more generous appropriation; we hope it will not be less than \$200.

Our reading room is becoming more and more popular; the interest taken in it by the young is gratifying.

The Committee on Finance beg leave to report as follows:

The past year the expenditure for Librarian's salary has been \$325; the insurance has cost \$78.75; the aggregate for binding and repairs of books has been (estimated) \$50; for new books, \$86.95; periodicals for reading room, \$42.67; furniture and fixtures and repairs on same, \$17.78; Library material, \$3.25; miscellaneous items not classified above, \$4.25.

We have conferred with the Committee on Books and Rooms, and after considering their recommendations, and in accordance with our own views as to the needs of the Library for the coming year, we think that provision should be made for the following expenses:

The Committee on Rooms submit the following report :

The expenditures for furniture and repairs of same have not been considerable the past year. We are of the opinion that in the next year the ordinary expenses to be expected for furniture and repairs will be \$35.00. It has been suggested that an exhibition case should be provided and placed in the reading room or reception room for the reception, preservation and exhibition of curios, relics and such articles of a similar character as might be found of interest. A number of persons are only awaiting suitable provision by the town in this way that they may make valuable donations to such a collection. We recommend that a suitable case be provided for this purpose.

A suitable pedestal should be provided for the beautiful vase donated by Maurice Cochrane.

The arduous task of replacing the books on the shelves would be acceptably lightened by a library truck.

The grateful acknowledgments of the town are due for a handsome stand for the Century Dictionary, given by Miss Stella B. Farr and Rev. F. G. Chutter ; for a valuable relic in form of a business paper by G. C. Furber ; for a framed picture of the Saranac Band of 1894 by M. D. Cobleigh ; and for a very ancient and interesting document bearing the name of Capt. Caswell, the first settler of the town, by Hon. Chester B. Jordan.

## REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE LITTLETON PUBLIC LIBRARY :

During the past year 14,721 books have been loaned, an average of 283 a week. Of these 80 per cent have been fiction, three per cent biography, and six per cent history and travels. Two hundred and seven cards have been issued, bringing the number up to 2,176. Four hundred and sixty-three volumes have been added. Of these 237 have been by purchase, 14 donated by individuals, 62 bound volumes and 150 pamphlets from State and Government, making a total of about 6,000 books in the library.

The Atlantic Monthly and Public Opinion have been added to the periodicals in the reading room.

## REPORT OF THE

# Committee on Town History

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The town at the annual meeting, March 14, 1893, adopted the following :

“Voted that the Committee on Town History be directed to procure the writing and publication of the town history, the same to be completed within two years, in two parts, one devoted to the general history of the town and the other to histories of families, all similar in general style, size and form to the history of Sanbornton ; that 1000 copies of the work be printed ; that when completed it be the property of the town ; that the price at which it shall be sold be not less than the cost of publication, to be determined by the committee, with reference to the best advantage of the town in disposing of the volumes ; that no copies shall be disposed of to any person, whether connected with the publication or not, without full payment therefor to the town at the price fixed ; and that the printing, illustrations and binding be awarded to the party that will offer the most advantageous terms to the town, reference being had to the quality of the work and the responsibility of the contractors.”

“Voted that the committee may recognize and accept for the time being, with the same rights and powers as a member, any person designated in writing as a proxy for any member of the committee who may not attend upon the duties of his office, at meetings or for a stated period.”

At the annual meeting March, 1895, the following vote was adopted :

“Voted that the Committee on Town History be directed to procure the compilation of the material for the genealogy and statistics and the composition of the narrative forthwith and that so much of the vote of 1893 as is inconsistent with this vote be and hereby is rescinded ; \* \* \* \* and that it is the opinion of the town that the matter to be included in the Town History, should be in the hands of the printer, and the work pushed without any further delay to an immediate completion, so that the public may have the use of it, and the town may be receiving back its outlay by disposition of the volumes.”

Under the authority of this action the committee has proceeded with all diligence consistent with accurate and permanent results in such an undertaking, to bring the work to a completion. Where assistance has been found necessary in collecting and arranging important material, it has been procured at the least possible expense, and all indispensable facts thus obtained have been incorporated into the work. The compilation of the volume of genealogy is completed and the narrative so well advanced that its conclusion is a question of but a few weeks. Those who have gone out from Littleton families, and have achieved prosperous conditions abroad, have demonstrated a marked interest in the undertaking and have rendered such generous and effectual assistance that the family records will surpass, in completeness, nearly all of those of a like character hitherto published by New England towns. A great many of these sons and daughters of Littleton have also given orders for the books. Special care has been taken with the military records, official successions, ecclesiastical affairs, the history and development of our various industries, political events and the relation of the town and its people to them, educational development and progress, the professions and princi-

pal business callings, the native ministry and native physicians, distinguished sons and daughters of the town who have accomplished worthy careers, women's work in social and public affairs, changes in the industrial, social, moral and financial condition of the people, the growth of the ideas of religious toleration, anti-slavery, temperance, libraries, newspapers, local organizations, and innumerable other subjects related to the history of the town, and all these topics have been thoroughly treated. No effort has been spared to accomplish an accurate, systematic and comprehensive history.

The methods of procedure adopted and pursued by the committee have tolerated no mere haphazard accumulation of vague traditions and unverified statements of supposititious facts. A system has been adopted by which the facts on every line of investigation have been methodically ascertained and carefully verified by records, whenever practicable, and by other tests when record evidence has failed.

One illustration out of many that might be cited is taken to indicate the system. The following circular was sent to all veterans of the civil war known to be living, and to representatives of those deceased. It embodies a statement of the scope of our efforts as to soldiers' records:

"It is indispensable to a complete town history that its part in the wars of the country should be fully and correctly recorded. To this end this committee urge upon you personally the necessity of contributing what information you have which will go to make up the history of Littleton in the civil war of 1861-5.

We have prepared blanks indicating some of the facts relating to the personal history of each soldier, which we hope to obtain. If every individual who can give assistance in this direction will attend to it promptly and carefully we may expect to present results that will be of great and permanent value.

Our plan for the military history of the town includes biographical sketches of :

1. All natives of Littleton, whether accredited to the quotas of this or other towns, who served in any branch of the military or naval service.

2. All who were credited to Littleton, whether residents of this town or of neighboring towns.

3. All who have since become permanent residents of the town and who served in the army and navy, whether for this town or other towns, whether from this state or other states.

In addition to the facts indicated in the blanks as desirable, we should be pleased to have you furnish any anecdotes and incidents relative to your own army experience or that of others which may have come to your knowledge."

This was followed or accompanied by a blank requesting a statement by individuals of all material facts of a personal military record.

These have been so carefully and industriously looked after and the execution of them so completely effected, that there is reason for the assurance that this branch of our undertaking is as perfect as faithful labor can make it.

In other directions the investigation and results are practically the same.

In justice to the committee it should be stated that the most difficult part of the duty which was incumbent upon them in this behalf has been the bringing up of the records and facts within the possession and knowledge of individuals who, not indifferent to the success of the work, have nevertheless greatly delayed in making out their own records and putting them in possession of the committee. This has necessitated, especially in the last two years, a vast amount of effort to spur up those parties and secure the information which if lacking would leave irreparable defects in the published work.

One volume is now ready for the printer; the other is in such an advanced stage of preparation that it will be ready to put in type as soon as the other is out of the way.

The period of collection and compilation of facts, documents and material for the narrative, the statistical tables, and the genealogy, has been terminated.

It is with much gratification that we find and can report the point reached where the remaining questions are those which relate to a publication of the work.

Estimates of the expense have been obtained from responsible parties. The plan of the work already adopted by the town contemplates two volumes—one for the narrative part, and one for the genealogy. It is probable that each volume should contain about 700 pages. The cost of printing and binding the two volumes, with one thousand copies in the edition—that is, two thousand volumes in all—will be \$3500. There are bills for service and expenses already incurred but not cancelled, which, with the expenses of making and inserting suitable maps and other illustrations, indexing and proof-reading, as estimated, will make the total cost of bringing out the work and having it ready for distribution, about \$5000.

It is now especially desirable that the public should have the benefit of the outlay that has been made, and that the publication should be accomplished by the most advantageous methods, having reference both to a reimbursement of the town for its investment in the work, and, a price that shall

bring it within reach of all who may desire to procure it. With these considerations in view, the committee recommend the following plan :

Let the edition consist of one thousand copies of each volume.

This will be two thousand volumes in all.

Place the price per volume at \$2.50.

This will yield \$5000.

It will also bring the books within the means of every person who would be presumed to care for them.

The volumes would undoubtedly all be sold at that price within two years.

That sum would pay for the cost of printing, binding, illustrating, proof-reading, and the bills for services and expenses of town in the undertaking, now remaining unliquidated.

It would be advisable to allow for a reasonable time in which to place the books on the market, advertise them, and complete the disposition of the whole edition by sales for cash to reimburse the town.

This may be accomplished without resort to an assessment of a tax, or direct appropriation of the money by taxation out of the treasury.

It could just as well be effected by a short loan on two notes, one due in one year and one in two years.

The proceeds of the sale of the town history being set apart as a special fund to meet these notes as they become due, and every citizen being directly interested to have the whole edition disposed of within the time limited, there need be no solicitude as to a favorable result from this plan.

At the end of one year of sales at the rate of \$5.00 for the set, in which time our people could avail themselves of the lowest figure at which the books could be sold by the town, the price might be advantageously raised.

The very complete lists and records of soldiers of Littleton in all the wars of the Republic, the tables of town officers, and of all the other organizations, ecclesiastical, military, business, social, reformatory, or relating to any of our local affairs, and the general statistics, have been prepared by Mr. C. H. Greene with accuracy, completeness, fidelity, and to the approval of all who have examined the result of his labor.

Of the part performed by the several members of the committee, they can only say that they await the verdict of the people who have sustained their efforts and in whose interest they have faithfully labored in this cause with the assurance that the finished volumes will prove to be of such a character as to justify the support and patronage which the town has accorded to the enterprise.

# Fire Alarm System

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## LOCATION OF FIRE ALARM BOXES

- No. 42, corner Cottage and Mt. Eustis streets.
- No. 43, corner Cottage and South streets.
- No. 44, near West end of Union block.
- No. 45, corner High and School streets.
- No. 46, corner Main and Saranac streets.
- No. 47, corner Main and Meadow streets.
- No. 48, front of Saranac Glove shop.
- No. 49, South St., near J. R. Jackson's residence.
- No. 52, corner Union St. and Lafayette Ave.
- No. 53, corner Pleasant St. and Chiswick Ave.
- No. 54, Union St., near G. A. Edson's residence.
- No. 55, front of E. H. Wells' store, Apthorp.

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## DIRECTIONS

The glass covered box on side of alarm boxes contains the key ; get the key by breaking glass, and open alarm box ; pull down the hook, letting go at once. For second alarm pull down the hook after first alarm has rung.

The alarm will indicate the station from which the signal was given. Thus, a signal at Station No. 42 will be sounded by four strokes of the bell, followed by two strokes. This will be repeated, so that notice will be clearly given that a fire has broken out in the vicinity of Station 42, if that be the case, because the alarm sounds a four, by four strokes of the bell, and a two, by two strokes of the bell. In this way Station 42 is indicated. The other stations will be indicated in a similar manner, the second number struck by the alarm bell corresponding to the number in unit's place, either 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 or 7, as the case may be.
