## The State of New Hampshire

---

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday the 8th day of March next, at two of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to have the Railroad protect the crossings.
4. To see what the Town will do in regard to the Clark and Gilbert Bridges.
5. To see if the Town will raise Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) for a Sinking Fund to apply toward the payment of the Town Bonds due in 1920.
6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the street known as Maple Avenue, and have it laid out fifty (50) feet wide.
7. To see if the Town will vote to make a present to the Firemen of Haverhill, Mass. for services rendered at the last fire in Plaistow.
8. To choose one Trustee for the Public Library.
9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for



the Public Library.

10. To hear the reports of the various Town Officers and take action upon the same.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the public observance of Memorial Day and also to fix the soldiers graves in the Cemetery.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen wish to call the voters' attention to some of the articles in the Warrant.

Article 3. We have three dangerous crossings, which are not protected by gates or flagman, and during the past year, five persons have nearly lost their lives (all town people). Many times, the whistle is not sounded at these crossings and it is time some action was taken to guard these crossings.

Article 4. The town has 11 1-2 bridges to keep in repair—all wooden-top bridges, and as you all know, the cost of lumber is advancing every year and for some of the larger bridges it is hard to find suitable stringers. The life of a wooden bridge is only about six or seven years and many times it is unsafe for travel, and we believe that the town is at any time, liable for one accident that would cost them more than it would to rebuild every bridge in proper manner. The Clark's Bridge near Atkinson Depot is the most expensive bridge the town has and also the most

dangerous, for the bend of the road comes on the bridge. In the winter time and especially at night,—even with a good rail—a heavy team might slide into the water. The Gilbert Bridge has already given way on one corner, and it is only a question of time when one side will cave in. Most of the bridges come at the foot of a hill and after every rain the grade of the road stands on the bridges and soon rots them out. The stone abutments have to hold the hill and the frost is heaving more or less every year, and it is not a matter of economy to repair the bridges in the old way! While we do not suggest any particular way of fixing the bridges, no doubt it would be cheaper for the town—in the long run—to have every bridge arched, but we do suggest that the town take one or two bridges every year and have them cement-arched, or use steel girders with a cement top, and under this system, in a few years, the bridge question would be a thing of the past.

Article 5. In 1920, the town has a bond coming due and if they do not vote for a Sinking Fund, there will be no way except to issue a new bond.

Article 6. This article was inserted at the request of Mr. Frank Jenness, who lives on this street. He is thinking of building another house and is not willing to build on a private way. This street, for part of the way is only 38 feet wide, while the rest is fifty and to be accepted by the town, must be full fifty feet the whole way.

Article 11. Some of the soldiers of the town have asked to have this article inserted, as many of the graves are not marked and not cared for in any way. The cost of fixing up the graves would be about seventy-five cents each and the Government will furnish markers free.

### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

33 new cards have been given out in the last year; number of books loaned, 4022, classified as follows: Fine Arts, 3; Biography, 40; Poetry, 24; Description, 10; Fiction, 3775; History, 43; Literature, 31; Miscellaneous, 13; Natural Science 31; Religious, 5; Reference, 9; Sociology, 3; Travel, 33; Periodicals, 2; One hundred and eight new books have been added, making a total of 2446.

The library has received from Mr. and Mrs. Edward O. Eaton of Haverhill, Mass., a fine large picture of Abraham Lincoln, and from Mrs. Helen Bell Fowler and Mrs. M. P. Bailey, a copy each of Bench and Bar of New Hampshire and History of Exeter.

## Annual Report of Plaistow, N. H. Board of Education

---

In their annual report for the school year that closed Feb. 11, the Plaistow Board of Education would make note of the loss of two officials in the School District, during the year. Mr. John A. Tozier, resigned his position on the Board in December, owing to illness in his home which caused his temporary removal from town. Rev. A. DeF. Palmer, Treasurer, after an illness of four days died Jan. 27, after an honorable service as Treasurer and as an efficient member of the Board for years in the past. The vacancy in the Treasurer's office was filled by the appointment of Mr. Joseph S. Hills to fill out the unexpired term of Mr. Palmer. The vacancy on the School Board was not filled, as only about eight weeks of the school term remained when the vacancy occurred. With two exceptions the schools have been in session thirty-six weeks. The Clark and No. Main St. schools held sessions for thirty-five weeks only, owing to the illness of a week of each of the teachers. In the Pollard primary, the South and the Clark schools the teachers of the previous year were retained. Changes occurred in the No. Main St. Miss Merrick who gave up teaching, was succeeded by Miss Sibyl L. White, of Lynn, Mass., who has proved a valuable teacher. In the Westville school, Miss Bartlett, who decided to take a Normal

course, was succeeded by Miss Leola C. Noble, an efficient teacher. Miss Bassett of the Pollard grammar school, taking a position in a school in Haverhill, Mass., was succeeded by Miss Wilma Curtis, a very faithful and conscientious teacher. Having another position as teacher in view, Miss Curtis has resigned and Miss Leola C. Noble has been appointed in her place; a teacher with a fine record of teaching in our state for more than eight years, and will deserve the hearty support of the parents and of the district in her work. As to the school buildings, but few repairs have been needed which as far as possible have been promptly made. If the district continues to maintain the outside schools, many repairs will be necessary, calling for a special appropriation. It is a question worthy of consideration whether it is advisable to continue the Clark and the South schools with their 21 scholars combined, at an expense of nearly \$700.00, when by consolidation they could be maintained at much less expense and with greater efficiency. That a school building at the Center capable of accommodating all the scholars in the district is a feasible and practical thing was demonstrated a year ago in the report of a special committee to investigate the matter. The present board are more thoroughly confirmed than ever in the belief that consolidation would be the best arrangement for the best results in the education of the children of the entire district. The attention of the district is called once more to the article in the Warrant concerning the uniting with other towns in the employ of an efficient superintendent of schools. The real importance of this cannot be too strongly emphasized. The small expense incurred in having a superintendent would be offset in the special work that he would do involving a saving in other directions. It is a difficult matter to obtain a school board who can properly and efficiently supervise the schools without a superintendent. A thorough consideration of this matter is requested. During the year we have had four boys attending the

Haverhill high school: Wm. P. Freke, Stephen Terry, Harold Seaver, Allan Sawyer, and one girl, Helen Hoyt. Three boys have been attending Sanborn Seminary, Kingston: Howard P. Davis, Allan Tozier and Walter H. Mansell. Two girls at Exeter in Robinson Seminary, Donna Hills and Helen Towle. One girl in Atkinson Academy, Adie Sawyer. The tuition in Haverhill and Exeter is \$40.00 and in Kingston and Atkinson \$30.00 each, per year. For the current school year the amount of money as required by law will be for the payment of high school tuition, \$450.00; for supplies \$130.00; for flags \$15.00. The amount needed in addition to what is required by law and which the Board recommend to be appropriated, \$500.00. The reduction last year in the amount appropriated by the district, made it very doubtful if the schools could be maintained for thirty-six weeks. Right on top of this reduction, the Board were faced with unpaid bills of the previous year to the amount of nearly \$85.00 which was tided over only by a special assessment by the Selectmen. In view of the fact that we are at days when it is going to be very hard to retain teachers of efficiency at present salaries, it will be seen that the appropriation called for is by no means excessive, even if quite enough. The better qualified the teachers and the larger the average attendance of the scholars the more money will we get from the state; hence it behooves the district to obtain the best teachers possible and parents to see that their children are constant in attendance. The statistical report and financial statement of the Board are appended to which attention is called. It is to be noted that while the balance on hand is \$131.02 that only \$84.62 of this is available for school purposes. Money appropriated for supplies and for high school tuition cannot be used for school purposes, neither can the salaries of the board or of district officers.
