


THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways in addition to the amount required by law.

4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of library.

5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.

6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of cemeteries.

7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Common.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,065.00 to secure from the state \$2,130.00 for state aid construction.

9. To see of the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$950.00 to secure from the state \$3,800.00 for state aid maintenance.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,200.00 to secure from the state \$7,200.00 for trunk line maintenance.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$200.00 to buy snow fence.

12. To see if the town will vote to allow a 2% discount on all taxes paid before July first.

13. To see if the town will vote to have the inventory blanks distributed at the time of taking appraisal of property.

14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to secure from the state \$2,000.00 for permanent road from Rumney Village to Stinson Lake.

16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling the town roads.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be expended for control of the White Pine Blister Rust.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of the road on the south and east side of Stinson Lake.

19. To see if the town will vote to hire any of the money to be expended on the south and east side of Stinson Lake.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for improvement to the stage of the town hall and to appoint a committee to expend the same.

21. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of Stinson Lake road from George Phillips camp so-called towards Stinson Lake to its intersection with new road built in 1930.

22. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the municipal court.

23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the sale of the hearse and appoint a committee for the same.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Rumney:

I hereby present my first report as Superintendent of the public schools of Rumney. In as much the superintendent assumed supervision late in the spring, there was time only to familiarize himself with the problems of the district and finish up the year's work.

Instruction

All the teachers were reelected for the current year. Miss Tracy resigned during the summer and Helen Berry was elected to fill the position. Miss Berry is a Normal School graduate with 13 years experience and is doing successful work. Owing to the death, this winter, of Helen Merrill of the Quincy school, Doris Rowell was appointed teacher at that school. Miss Rowell is a Normal School graduate and experienced teacher. The work at Quincy is progressing well and suffered no interruption from the change.

The outstanding feature of the teaching staff of the district is the long tenure of position of its teachers. The Board is fortunate to attract and hold teachers over so many years. It gives the staff a stability and permanency seldom experienced in rural communities. In my judgment this has a bearing on the facts that Rumney children do so well in high school and that of the 17 graduates from the VIII grade last June 15 have entered high school—an unusually high per cent for a district where a high school is not maintained.

Survey

A survey of the accomplishment of the various grades is being made by means of the Stanford Achievement Test, a battery of 762 responses, covering a wide range of elementary subjects. In this way we

can check the progress of our grades against the standard for the same grades over the country. Such tests also show the accomplishments of pupils within the grades and give opportunity to prescribe remedial work. Again such tests show on what subjects emphasis should be directed. Although the survey is not completed it will be the policy of the present supervision to stress reading both oral and silent for some The intelligence of any community will vary time. directly with what its people are reading for instruction and pleasure. A few promotions have already been made as a result of these tests. While it is never wise to push children beyond their capabilities, neverthe-less, when children who are perfectly well are found to have accumulated knowledge a year ahead of the group they are in and the standard for the country at large they can usually be safely promoted to the next grade, where instead of forming habits of idleness, they meet a real challenge to their capabilities.

Marking

The marking system has been changed somewhat this year. No marking system is perfect nor entirely satisfactory to all. Children come to school to learn and to be stimulated to learn—not to receive marks. Public schools are operated to develop good citizenship. Scholarship is desirable for good citizenship, but does not of itself constitute good citizenship. Dependability, initiative, ability to work with group, attendance, etc., are considered in determining ranks. Outside this supervisory union, where this method has been used, the result has been to inspire good pupils to do real superior work, and to encourage slower pupils to do passing work, thereby decreasing non-promotion.

This year every parent is notified two weeks before report cards go out that the pupil is likely to fail unless he makes improvement at once. This gives an opportunity for the parent to come in and talk over the situation with the teacher. It is the opinion of the superintendent that many capable children are drifting or aimlessly wandering up through the grades simply because there is not a strong enough contact between school and parent. Parents should not be satisfied to have their children just "get by" when reports show that they are only making indifferent efforts. Every pupil should get out of school all that he is mentally and physically able to do regardless of the other members of his group.

Attendance

The percent of attendance last year was 94.29. This is below the state percent which has 95.50. It is to be regretted that only two schools of the district reached this average. An examination of the registers shows a great number of single and two-day absences. This may be due to sickness as considered later in this report under Health, but one cannot escape altogether the conviction that some parents are unmindful of the educational loss in even single session absences. Not only does the absentee lose, but the entire class is slowed down more or less the following day. New Hampshire school law requires that every child of compulsory school age, shall attend school every day the schools are in session. The practice of taking children on excursions, trips, etc., should be confined to weekends and holidays. Last year nearly 8 pupils were absent every day from school.

Health

The district is fortunate in having a nurse. Miss Underhill reports 187 instances of underweight, defective vision, hearing and teeth, diseased tonsils, defective breathing and enlarged glands. Apparently only 33 corrections have been made. This is a correction of less than twenty percent. Children cannot feel their best nor do their best when suffering physical discomfiture. I am convinced that the disappointing attendance of the district is due in no small measure to the fact that children with the above defects will have "poor days" now and again until they receive medical care and advice. It seems to me neither fair to pupil nor teacher to expect satisfactory results from children not up to par in health, and further neglect of these all important matters often brings on physical handicaps in adult life. I venture the prediction that if a large number of these physical defects were cleared up it would react favorably on the scholar-ship of the entire district.

Recommendations

After careful reflection I am of the opinion that the district should eventually wire and furnish electricity to all schools where current is available. For a good part of the school year there is need of light a great many days soon after 2:30 in the afternoon. As it is now children are required to strain their eves in regular session and for a long time there is but little opportunity after school for the teachers to work and have conferences with their pupils. The practice of outside organizations financing the wiring of schools in their vicinity while highly commendable should, in my judgment, in no way deter the district from furnishing electric current to other schools even if some schools have to forgo electricity from the fact that it is not available. It is my recommendation that during the coming summer the district wire the Mont View, Quincy and Rumney Village schools and budget enough money to supply them with current.

I repeat the recommendation of last year's report that the toilets at the Village and Depot schools be better protected from the weather.

Conclusion

In closing I wish to take this opportunity to express gratitude for my personal and professional reception in your town. I always enjoy coming to Rumney and sense a splendid feeling of cordiality. I deem it a pleasure and privilege to work with you and having a part in the education of your children.

The School Board is, in my opinion, well chosen for this important work. More responsibility rests on the school board than is generally known. The Board meets regularly and careful consideration is given to all matters both from the viewpoint of the taxpayer and welfare of the children. Thirty-seven school visits have been made showing an active interest in the school system. I believe that the finances are being handled carefully and efficiently. This report would not be complete without a record of the appreciation of Mrs. Jennie M. Stevens, who has served the district as treasurer faithfully and efficiently for many years.

Appreciation is also expressed to Mrs. Patterson for the splendid exhibition of graduation music presented by the children under her supervision.

Lake School

During the summer, Camp Eagle Point and Camp Stinson held an entertainment at the Lake for the benefit of the Lake School. Camp Waimea also held an entertainment at the Town Hall for the benefit of the school. A goodly sum from these entertainments was turned over to a committee, Mrs. Harold McDonald and Mrs. Wilbur Hall, who have had electric lights installed in the building, also an enamel sink and a cess pool has been made.

Mr. Leveigne very kindly gave a phonograph and records for the same. The school district bought paint for the inside room and Mrs. McDonald very generously offered to do the painting which was done before school opened in September. Seats have been taken from Quincy and the Depot Primary room so that now the Lake School has modern seats.

The fencing is nearly completed and Mr. Bryar will finish it in the spring.

The board appreciates the splendid cooperation that has been shown this last year at Stinson Lake.

At this time we wish to acknowledge cooperation of the Parent Teachers Association, both at Depot and Village, who have done a great deal to improve our schools and the playgrounds. The Village, P. T. A., are installing lights at the Village School this week.

The Grange at Quincy presented the school with a First Aid Kit and 15 white enamel mugs, a piano and paper napkins.

Mont View school held a Hallowe'en party, the proceeds which will be used for benefit of school.

During this coming year many repairs are needed. The Depot building needs painting badly. One side of the roof needs shingling at Quincy.

The playground at Stinson Lake must have some grading done as this was promised Mr. Leveigne when he so kindly gave the land on which the building is now located.

The board feels that some fencing should be done each year until the school yards are enclosed from the road. We feel that the Depot School needs a fence next to the road as this road is on a curve, by this expenditure, some child may be saved from running into the path of an automobile.
