SCHOOL BOARD REPORT.

To the citizens of Salisbury:

The school year just ended has been one of activity and progression. Each school has had twenty-six weeks of instruction, except the Heights school, which was shortened two weeks on account of sickness.

The winter term at the North Road, now in session, did not open till January on account of important matters which we could not control. The pupils from the Greeley district attended school at Smith's Corner.

The Board has endeavored to procure efficient teachers, all of which have passed written examinations before receiving a certificate of qualification.

Taken as a whole the teachers have worked hard and faithfully, with satisfactory results. The closing terms showed marked advancement. To derive the most benefit from our schools the parents, pupils and teacher must be united in the work. Though a teacher may be patient as Job and wise as Solomon he cannot succeed without being supported by the parents. Without such support a school is of little or no benefit to the district. By listening to all complaints made by pupils and not personally investigating you are doing your children great injury. Do not blame the teachers too much if they do make some mistakes in governing your child. You have had all the child's life in which to study its character and disposition and all of you are ready to admit that you have made an occasional mistake; so be sure you know both sides of the story before you are too ready to believe the teacher wholly

to blame. Do not allow yourselves to think your neighbor's children are treated better in school than your own. There are enough already who are always jealous of their neighbors, and the children, if allowed to nourish these petty school jealousies, will surely grow up to be jealous of many things all their lives.

The Harper's series of geographies which were adopted nearly twenty years ago were so badly torn and worn out that we were obliged to buy new books. Butler's series have been introduced with satisfactory results. The readers also were not suitable and Cyr's series were adopted, much to the delight of teachers and pupils. Writing books, teaching the latest approved methods were also introduced.

Parents and taxpayers, the extra amount of supply money invested this year was not expended to gratify an extravagant idea or indulge in any luxuries, but to meet the actual needs of our schools. The repair money has been economically expended. The school houses were in a very bad condition and demanded extensive repairs. Four of the houses have received two coats of paint, new windows placed in the house at South Road, a new shed built at Smith's Corner, new blackboards added, and other necessary repairs made.

To the teachers and to those who are to become teachers we would say, remember this maxim, "Order is heaven's first law." The lack of discipline shipwrecks more teachers than all other causes combined. A good education is not the only requirement for a successful school teacher. Improve every opportunity to attend state and teachers' institutes. The law allows you this privilege with continuation of pay. Be careful in filling out your registers. A properly and neatly filled register is a rare sight.

We wish to thank the taxpayers for the liberal amount of school money voted for school purposes. We feel that every cent expended has been judiciously invested and the future will repay both interest and

principal by leading into a higher educational sphere
your noble boys and bright girls.
