The contract for the state highway was let by the Governor and Council to Fred W. Stowers of Methuen, Mass. The town appropriation accounted for above was composed of \$81.79, balance from last year's funds, and this year's appropriation of \$1,495.50. In addition the state appropriated \$2,000, and \$1,999.88 of the same was expended, making the total expenditure \$3,577.17, and leaving a balance of 12c in the hands of the state treasurer. Five thousand and twenty-five feet of gravel road was constructed, at a fraction over 71c per running foot.

REPORT OF THE Superintendent of Schools

Hill, N. H., Jan. 1, 1908.

To the School Board of the Town School District of Tilton:

I hereby submit my first annual report to you, and through you to the citizens of the district.

The supervisory district comprising the school districts of Danbury and Hill and the town school district of Tilton was organized August 17, 1906. I was at that time elected superintendent of schools. One year ago your schools had been under my charge only one term. Feeling that I had not yet formed opinions concerning them which were worthy of the serious consideration of your citizens, I did not at that time submit a report for publication.

Under the terms of organization each of the three districts was to receive one third of the superintendent's time. A brief statement of how his time has been spent seems fitting. I have recorded up to date 111 visits in the schools of Danbury, 118 in Hill, and 109 in Tilton. This means that on an average each school has been visited a little oftener than once in two weeks. These visits have constantly presented problems of administration and management not susceptible of immediate easy solution. Much work in the study, much time spent in learning methods employed in other school systems, has been required to make them result in real benefit to the schools. As the time spent by the superintendent in observation and professional study cannot but result in benefit to the schools under his charge. I mention attendance at the Summer Institute at Plymouth both years, visits to the New Hampshire Normal School, the Concord Training School, and Grammar Schools in Con-

cord, Franklin, and Tilton Union District. I have also visited Tilton Seminary, Proctor Academy and Franklin High School; and have attended four Teachers' Institutes, three School Board conferences, three Superintendents' conferences, a conference of Academy Teachers, and a meeting of the State Teachers' Association. I have delivered one public address.

During the time covered by this report no attempt has been made to effect sweeping changes in the schools. It has rather been the superintendent's policy to find out just what amount of progress is possible under conditions as they are, before recommending changes of consequence. A growing efficiency along certain lines has been aimed at. The attempt has been made to make the work of the four schools more uniform and closer related to that of other schools in the state, by introducing the state program of studies. The school authorities, in harmony with the vote passed at the last district meeting, have endeavored to secure more regular attendance. A more careful system of handling text-books has been tried, provision being made for their freer circulation among the schools.

Progress along all these lines has been hindered, sometimes stopped, by various unfortunate circumstances. Too frequent changes in the personnel of the school board or the teaching force make the formulation of a strong, wise policy difficult and its execution unsteady or uncertain. During the sixteen months of my service Mrs. Gile, Mr. Locke and Mr. Gray have been lost from the school board, and Miss Bennett, Miss Foss and Miss Belcher as teachers. Miss Belcher's successor, Miss Perkins, will probably remain but a few weeks. The prevalence of sickness has made improvement in attendance in the district as a whole, impossible.

The attendance at No. 4 school, except when chicken pox was raging, has improved materially. The per cent of attendance there last term (96.1) compares very favorably

with the average for the district in the last four years (86.8). The grading system found in operation has not been materially changed. The school now contains five distinct classes pursuing the work outlined in the state program of studies for grades 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, as well as can be done considering the short time the teacher has for each class.

At Sanborn road the classes are not as at No. 4, kept distinct. A "grouping system" of classification is used. The school contains pupils doing the work of grades 1, 2, 4, 5, 6 and possibly 7. Poor attendance during the winter causes more or less confusion in classification during the rest of the year. The per cent of attendance attained last spring (95) is commendable. The fall term was much broken in to by the sickness of the teacher; and the winter term has opened with a very small attendance, caused in part by sickness among the children.

At East Tilton the school's efficiency has constantly been seriously impaired by irregular attendance, some of which must have been due to carelessness on the part of parents. During the last few months diphtheria has reduced the school to a small number, and finally compelled its closing. With an attendance ranging between 35 and 10, systematic work has been an impossibility. Some time will be required to put the school on a good working basis. Children cannot be classified properly as they return one by one. I would urge upon every parent the especial importance of every child presenting himself on the first day of the spring term and attending regularly throughout its course. Parents and pupils should help the teacher in the difficult work of beginning over again by the exercise of due patience. In September, the last month when there was a full attendance, the classes (more or less mixed) were doing the work of grades 1, 4, 5, 6, 7. There are several classes in the first grade, as little ones have been allowed to enter at all times of the year and have attended irregularly.

At the Highlands the attendance has been good since moving to the new building, sometimes coming close to perfection. The eleven pupils there are divided into six classes pursuing the work of grades 1, 2, 5, 6 and 8. One class has four pupils, two classes have two pupils each and three classes have only one pupil each.

In commenting on the schools and in making recommendations I shall take it for granted that you and the citizens of the district want my honest opinions, whatever they may be worth.

In all probability the school at the Highlands is the one where least can be accomplished. The task of making a good school with so few pupils who must be classed by one's and two's, is almost a hopeless one. Classes of this size are uninteresting to pupils and to teacher. No teacher can afford to stagnate in such a school, nor ought a bright child to be allowed to acquire there habits of laziness which lack of enthusiasm breeds. Although this time, when a new building has just been erected, seems an inopportune one for suggestions of change, I do believe that, considering only the good of the children in this school, it would be better for them to attend No. 4 school than to remain in a separate one. I do not anticipate that the parents will agree with me, and I would not recommend the adoption of such a plan until a large majority of thoughtful parents are willing to try it. I do wish, however, that the parents would visit their school, when at its regular work, frequently; and also visit the larger school at No. 4, note the differences, and draw their own conclusions.

Such a consolidation would not bring a like benefit to the pupils now at No. 4. The school there is already large enough, and the classes are large enough (except the highest class,) to secure the stimulus which comes from numbers. A course is open, however, which if agreed upon would result in decided benefit to both schools. The pupils at the Highlands could be conveyed to No. 4, in a vehicle

providing ample protection from storms or cold, at a cost considerably smaller than that of maintaining the Highlands school. The money thus saved would help toward paying the tuition of a few of the older pupils at the Union Graded School. At the present time if only four pupils in grades 6 and 8, were sent to the Graded School, the school formed from the consolidation of No. 4 and Highlands would contain but four grades, 1, 2, 4 and 5, and could accomplish some worthy results.

At East Tilton and Sanborn Road there is no necessary reason why good schools cannot be maintained. If the School Board's recommendation that "beginners should present themselves at the commencement of the FALL TERM" should be made a definite regulation, and if parents, teachers and school authorities would do their utmost to secure regular attendance, a fairly good system of classification could be maintained and systematic, thorough work would be possible. There are nevertheless, certain features of the situation which are worthy of attention. The East Tilton school has a registration of 36. This is too large a number for the accomplishment of the best results unless other conditions approached the ideal. The classes in the upper grades of each of the schools are too small to allow the spirit of emulation to assist in arousing interest.

It is a fact worth noting that throughout the district, with a registration of over one hundred, only thirteen pupils are above the fifth grade and only one is in the eighth grade. While much dropping out is to be expected when the legal school age is past, so large a shrinkage cannot but suggest the possibility of fault in the schools. Do the schools fail, through some fault in their organization, to compel the interest of pupils in the upper grades? Do some drop out to attend other schools because the work of our schools is not entirely satisfactory to parents?

I will not attempt to answer these questions here, but I have come to believe that some of our citizens are desirous

of better schools, that a few at least desire the best schools that the district can afford. To successfully meet this demand some plan must be devised which will reduce the number of grades, but not the number of children, under each teacher. As any change along these lines would be considered by the voters an experiment only, the plan must have in view only such school-rooms as we already have.

I would suggest a plan for consolidating the Sanborn Road and the East Tilton schools. One of these schools might take all the pupils in the upper grades and the other the lower grades. A barge collecting the older children in the vicinity of East Tilton would reach the Sanborn Road school just before nine o'clock. It would then return to East Tilton, with the younger children from Sanborn Road aboard, arriving there in time to commence the primary school at about half past nine. This school would close at about half past three, when the barge would carry the Sanborn Road children back home and return with the East Tilton children. The barge could, if it was thought feasible, take the longer route over "The Plains" accommodating children who now have a pretty long walk to school.

By this plan the barge would cover the distance between the two schools four times a day loaded, on each of the four trips, with about fifteen children. The cost of transportation would be an added expense to the district, as the number of teachers would remain the same.

In the interests of greater efficiency, can the district afford this additional expense? This question must be answered by the citizens. I present for your consideration a list giving the average school assessment on \$1000 of valuation in the neighboring towns for the years 1903-6:

Lack of space forbids adequate discussion of consolidation here. The physical and moral welfare of the children must be carefully provided for. Before adopting any such plan it should be fully discussed with and by the parents. Men of experience could be engaged to address the people on this subject. The state department of public instruction issues a valuable pamphlet on consolidation and transportation which I would be glad to furnish to anyone desiring it.

At all the schools small repairs are needed. The draft of the East Tilton chimney has been improved and the stove no longer smokes. The walls and ceiling should now be whitened or tinted. The room could be made lighter by cutting a few of the pine trees at the back of the building.

If the No. 4 schoolhouse is to be occupied for a number of years, extensive changes should be made there. The building should be turned around to face the street, and raised above the street level. Dirt can be had near at hand to grade the front of the lot. A good lawn can be made with no unreasonable outlay. The water should be carried across the lot in sewer pipe, or at least, the ditch should be bridged for the whole distance. The play ground needs a strong, neat fence. With the schoolhouse facing the street it would be possible to place the outbuilding where it would be less obtrusive. More desirable still would be an addition to the back of the schoolhouse containing some form of heating apparatus and flush closets.

In certain of its phases the work of the superintendent of schools touches closely that of the board of health, the overseer of the poor and the selectmen, and of physicians and clergymen as well. Easy access to the town's officers and citizens would increase, somewhat, his efficiency. The parents should have easy access to him. A superintendent residing in your community, with an office at some center like the town hall building, would doubtless render more pro-

ductive service. I trust you will seize the first opportunity to form a district with the towns in your immediate vicinity.
