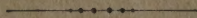

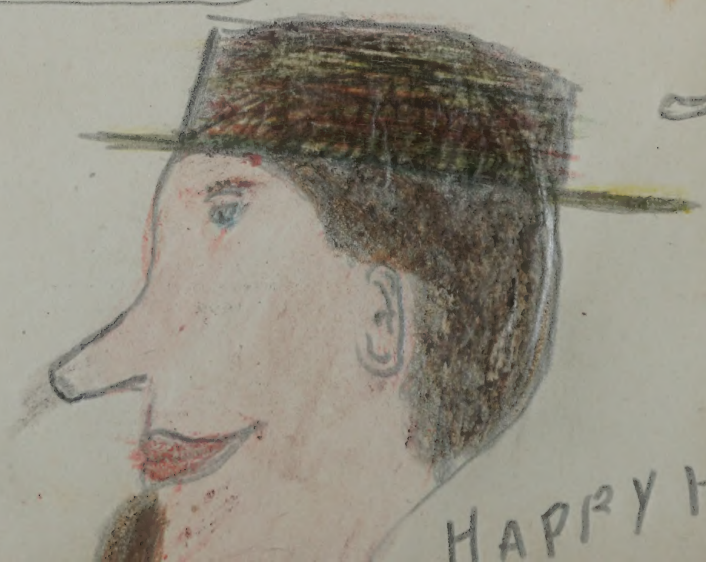
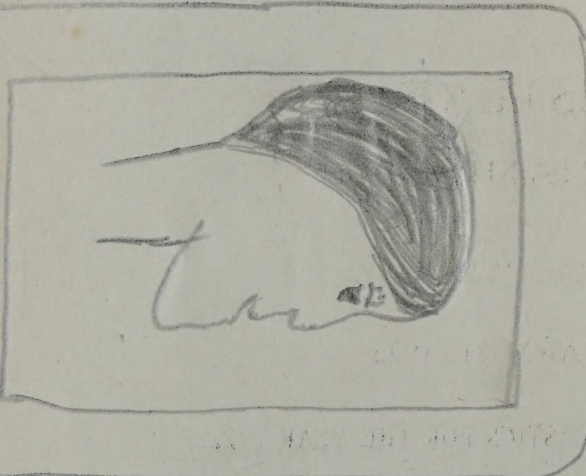

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I have the privilege of submitting to the School Board and Citizens this my third annual report.

There are in Alstead this year seven teachers. Of this number, four are new. The average salary is \$810.28 per year or \$15.06 per week for the number of weeks in the calendar year. The additional teacher this year is due to there being a school in the Mica Mine District.

This school has had an enrollment of 20 pupils with an average enrollment of 18 or thereabout. The school is housed in a room in the home of Charles Blaisdell. The accommodations are very unsatisfactory for good school development although the best that could be found this year. I hope that the district can see fit to build something to take care of this situation. In looking over the register one can see that most of the children were born in Alstead. This would tend to show that the population was permanent. The cost of a school there is more than that for transportation last year but more children are accommodated.

Out of the move for a school in the Mine district came the difficulty in a matter of transportation of one child in the Blake district. The School Board made all possible and reasonable efforts to meet the parent of this child half and more than half way in the way of getting the child to school. The parent interprets the law to hold that the district is obligated to take care of the education of the child. Such is the case with limitations. Children may be asked to walk a mile to meet teams that transport. Children are never or

never have been asked to do this in Alstead. The Board has been as liberal with parents in matters of transportation as the financial situation of the district would allow. Some are not thus inclined to believe. But let them consider that since the memory of civilized man, parents have had to bear some, at least, part of the responsibility of rearing their own young. This responsibility still prevails.

In the village school the work in the first year high has been added. There seemed to be quite a demand for this among parents and children. On its realization, however, many who were loudest for its creation have been slowest in attendance. Some to be sure moved away but it would seem that more ought to take advantage of this opportunity to get an added year of schooling with home residence. The work is good enough to admit a child to the second year of neighboring high schools. Five are taking advantage of this. Three of these are from other towns with enough tuition receipts to pay the additional cost.

Reading, writing, arithmetic, geography and language are getting the main division of time in all schools. It is, however, compatible with the spirit of the times that additional work be done in hygiene, drawing, civics. It might seem like a crowded program to say that all these studies had a place but which one will we strike out? Much emphasis is being put on spelling. I believe the fair minded will find the schools in a progressive state. The fanatic can find children who do not read well, children who seem to chew up the whole sentences into unitelligible jargon. It is manifestly unjust to charge all with the shortcomings of the few.

Your teachers are doing thorough and painstaking work with the children. They seem interested in them and in their future welfare. Might not more parents visit school for the regular work rather than at specific times of entertainment! The teachers and I wish that this might happen.

We have noon supervision in all schools. This is being

done by the teachers as an extra piece of labor for the welfare of the child's morale as also for the preservation of and to gain respect for public property.

Much has been done to improve the conditions of the buildings in Alstead. The conditions improved, however, have been for the maintenance of the structure itself. Nothing, or little, has been done for the betterment of the buildings as pertains to the children's health in general or eyesight in particular. That things have been as they are for fifteen years without change is not an argument for continuance but rather a grievance.

I wish to express appreciation of all that the people have done for the work of the schools and desire not to bring offense by rather frank statement of actual conditions.
