TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Town, on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect a Clerk for the ensuing year.
2. To elect one Selectman for three years.
3. To elect a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
4. To elect three Assessors for the ensuing year.
5. To elect all other Town Officers.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 which sum combined with \$100.00 granted and paid by the Highway Department, also \$200.00 already contracted for and paid, to make complete contract for the purchase price of \$600.00, thereby giving to the town a legal title to the snow plow.

8. To see whether the Town will vote to appropriate \$1,173.41 to pay the remainder of the cost of extending the State Aid road at West Chesterfield.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,625 to pay for repairing the Catsbane bridge.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,575.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550.00 for State Aid Maintenance.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,062.50 for State Aid Construction.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not less than \$4,000.00 for the purchase of two pieces of Fire Apparatus with complete equipment to combat Forest Fires in the Town of Chesterfield, N. H., said equipment to be kept in the village of Chesterfield and West Chesterfield, N. H., and a committee of three practical citizens be appointed by the Moderator to purchase same.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$4,000.00 for the purchase of two pieces of Road Equipment (the same as is now owned by the town) for the use of the Road Agents in their respective districts, to enable them to perform their work in a more satisfactory manner, also to be used in breaking out the back roads so-called in winter, the said Road Agents to be held strictly accountable to the Selectmen for the care and operation of the same. A committee of three practical men to negotiate for the purchase of the above equipment be appointed by the Moderator.

15. To see what action the voters of the Town will take to remove piles of snow in front of entrances to residences, mail boxes, cross roads, etc., where paths are refilled by passage of the snow plow.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$7,000.00 and apply to the State on continued application for State Aid, the total sum to be expended for new construction on the so-called Hinsdale Road beginning where the new work ended near the so-called Harvey Corner and continuing to the Chesterfield Hinsdale line, thereby coordinating with the State Department in a through highway leading from Walpole to Hinsdale through the Town of Chesterfield.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,200.00 to be expended in improving the so-called West Swanzey and Spofford highway beginning at the property of Mr. J. T. B. Fisher and continuing to the Swanzey line thereby opening an important artery to Lake Spofford.

18. To see if the Town will vote an amendment to Articles 13 and 14 and authorize the Moderator to appoint five commissioners with authority to make these expenditures (if voted) **provided in their judgment** after investigation the appropriation (if voted) is found to be legal, practical and moderate in cost to taxpayers.

19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repairing of highways and bridges.

20. To see if the Town will vote to **discontinue or petition** the court for the discontinuance of the road leading from the so-called Hoyt Stearns' place past the Lincoln pasture so-called to the Westmoreland town line.

21. To see if the Town will vote to take over the fire apparatus and buildings at Spofford with no expense to the Town, providing the precinct is agreeable and will turn over the same.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money sufficient to pay off the outstanding short term notes.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for Trunk Line Snow Removal.

24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the poor.

25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the Town Library in addition to what is required by law.

26. To see what action the Town will take in regard to purchasing new road and snow equipment and appropriate a sum of money for the same.

27. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

28. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate money for the same.

29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for street lighting.

30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the improvement of town cemeteries.

31. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to be expended on the curve near the residence of Fred Gibson.

32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 to be held in trust and known as the Elizabeth Bonney Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for the care and improvement of the Abel and Joseph Holt burial lots in Spofford cemetery.

33. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 to be held forever in trust, the income thereof to be used toward the expenses of evangelical preaching in Spofford.

34. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the John Stanford Cemetery Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for the care and improvement of the John Stanford burial lot in the Chesterfield Center cemetery.

35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Louise E. Davis Cemetery Trust Fund, the income thereof to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the care and improvement of the Louise E. Davis burial lot in Chesterfield West cemetery.

36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the George Wheeler Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the Foster Wheeler burial lot in Spofford cemetery.

37. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust, to be known as the George W. Webb Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the George W. Webb burial lot in Chesterfield West cemetery.

38. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

TOWN MEETING, MARCH, 1930

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, called at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, March 11, 1930.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Louis D. Herrick, at 9 A. M., and the warrant read by the Clerk.

Voted to stand for one minute in silent tribute to the late Ex-President and Chief-Justice William Howard Taft, which was done.

The Articles of the warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Article 1. Election of Town Clerk. Voted that the moderator be instructed to cast one ballot for Imogene L. Chickering for Clerk for the ensuing year and Imogene L. Chickering having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 2. Election of one Selectman for three years. Whole number of votes cast 116, necessary for choice 59. Chester L. Burnham had 1, Chester Burnham had 2, and Chester M. Burnham 113, and Chester M. Burnham having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 3. Election of Town Treasurer. Voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one vote for Harold E. Foster for Treasurer for the ensuing year and Harold E. Foster having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the moderator.

Article 4. Election of Delegate. Floyd M. Fuller, Sherman L. Rice, Walter J. Post and John R. Ryans, appointed Ballot Clerks, took the oath of office before the Moderator. Moses H. Chickering was nominated as delegate to the Constitutional Convention. The polls were opened and the article continued for action upon during the day.

Article 5. Election of Road Agents by the Selectmen. Voted to pass over the article and to elect Road Agents in the usual way.

Article 6. Election of all other necessary Town Officers. Voted to start election of Road Agents at the East part of town.

Election of Road Agent at Spofford. Whole number of votes cast 124, necessary for choice 63. Nelson H. Ball had 1, George A. Tuttle 27, Donald A. Wellington 37, Walter J. Post 59. No choice.

A second ballot resulted as follows: Whole number of votes cast 126, necessary for choice 64. George Tuttle had 1, George A. Tuttle had 26, Donald A. Wellington 35, Walter J. Post 64, and Walter J. Post having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Election of Road Agent at Center. Whole number of votes cast 88, necessary for choice 45. Mr. Harlan Streeter had 1, Roger Spaulding 1, Roger C. Spaulding 86 and Roger C. Spaulding having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Election of Road Agent at West Chesterfield. Whole number of votes cast 102, necessary for choice 52, Clifton J. Stoddard had 1, Harry Winn 1, Harold Foster 1, Mr. Harlan Streeter 23, Clifford E. Chickering 76, and Clifford E. Chickering having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Then Walter J. Post, Roger C. Spaulding, and Clifford E. Chickering took the oath of office before the moderator.

Election of Auditor. Voted that Merle W. Cobleigh serve as Auditor for the ensuing year.

Election of Constables. William D. Pierce, Charles H. Spaulding and Harlan Streeter were elected by voice vote to serve as constables for the ensuing year and William D. Pierce and Charles H. Spaulding took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Trustee of Town Library for 3 years. Harry E. Winn was elected by voice vote to serve as Library Trustee for three years.

Election of Fence Viewers. Morris Friedsam, Walter Dunbar and Roger C. Spaulding were elected by voice vote to serve as fence viewers for the ensuing year and all took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Surveyors of Wood and Lumber. Moses H. Chickering, Fred W. Holman and Earl Walston were elected by voice vote to serve as Surveyors of Wood and Lumber for the ensuing year and all took the oath of office before the moderator.

Election of Trustee of Trust Funds for three years. Arthur H. Post was elected by voice vote to serve as Trustee of Trust Funds for three years and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Sextons. Byron A. Davis, Fred W. Holman, Harlan Streeter, Fred E. Atherton, Charles A. Tuttle, and Charles J. Paro were elected to serve as Sextons for the ensuing year and Fred W. Holman and Fred E. Atherton took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Assessors. Voted that the Selectmen shall act as Assessors for the ensuing year, and Fred E. Atherton, Henry C. Chickering, and Chester M. Burnham, Selectmen, took the oath of office as Assessors before the Moderator.

Article 7. Election of one Library Trustee for one year. Morris Friedsam was elected by voice vote to serve as Library Trustee for one year to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of F. O. C. Farr and Harry E. Winn and Morris Friedsam took the oath of office as Library Trustees before the Moderator.

Article 8. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,750.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,083.50 for State Aid Construction.

Article 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,250.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance.

Article 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for State Aid Maintenance.

Article 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the repairing of highways and bridges.

Article 13. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 including the unexpended balance of 1929 for the continuance of the plowing out of the Hinsdale road so-called by tractor for vehicle traffic enabling the doctors to reach town by the shortest route from Hinsdale, N. H.

Article 14. Voted to amend the article and to raise the sum of \$500.00 to repair the road from Ware's Grove to the corner of the road leading to Camp Chesterfield said sum to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen.

Article 15. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the repair and improvement of the road leading past the Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 16. Voted to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for the repair of the Hinsdale Road beginning at the intersection of the State Road at Harvey's corner so-called, south to the Hinsdale line past the Fisk Homestead farm, but to hold said sum in abeyance for a decision from the State Committee as to what they will do on improving it for us. If in the judgment of the Selectmen the State will act, said sum shall revert to Town Treasury. If there is no prospect of action by State for a year or a year and a half said sum shall be spent this year on said road. An amendment to the motion to lay the article on the table until hearing definitely from the State did not pass.

Article 17. Voted to appoint a committee of three, said committee to be the three Selectmen, to investigate the need of new road equipment and report in time to insert a proper article in the warrant for March, 1931.

Article 18. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Phineas Gline trust fund the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Phineas Gline burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 19. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Moses Puffer Trust Fund the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Moses Puffer burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 20. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Jennie M. Phillips trust fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Phillips lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 21. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Louise Davis trust fund, the income from same to be used for the care and improvement of the Charles Darling burial lot in the Chesterfield Cemetery.

Article 22. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the Gertrude B. Cook Trust Fund, the income to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the Rollin J. and Gertrude B. Cook burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 23. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 in trust to be known as the George W. Sargent trust fund the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Edwin Sargent burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 24. Voted to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the support of the poor.

Article 25. Voted to move the Library in Chesterfield from the residence in which it now is to the General Store on the main highway, at which place it is to remain until at a vote of the Trustees it will be moved to a permanent home.

Article 26. Voted to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the Town Library.

Article 27. Voted to elect Harry E. Winn to collect the taxes in the usual manner and Harry E. Winn took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 28. Voted to raise the sum of \$400.00 to fight Pine Blister Rust.

Article 29. Voted to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be added to fund left over from 1929 for the observance of same. The same committee to serve in 1930.

Article 30. Voted to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.

Article 31. Voted to extend the street lighting system from West Chesterfield to the Suspension Bridge, to raise the sum of \$550.00 for installing 26 lights and to leave to the discretion of the Selectmen to arrange if possible the distribution of said lights along main highway in needed places.

Article 32. Voted to instruct the Selectmen to properly designate the public entrances to Spofford Lake.

Article 33. Voted to raise the sum of \$600.00 for Trunk Line Snow Removal.

Article 34. Voted to instruct the Selectmen to move the Hearse House so-called and to join it to the addition of the Town Hall for the storage of wood thereby giving the room in said addition for use of the various public uses to which it might be put, and to raise the sum of \$200.00 for same.

Article 35. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 in trust to be known as the Butler-Marsh Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Butler-Marsh Burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Voted that the Selectmen be instructed to sell the hearse and harness if possible.

A count of the ballots cast for a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention under Article 4, resulted as follows: Whole number of ballots cast 38. Morris Friedsam had 1, Maurice Friedsam 1, Alba Farr 1, M. H. Chickering 1, Moses Chickering 6, Moses H. Chickering 28 and Moses H. Chickering, having a plurality of votes given in, was declared by the moderator to be elected Delegate to the Constitutional Convention to be holden at Concord on the first Wednesday of June, 1930.

No other business appearing it was voted to adjourn at 3:40 P. M.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I submit herewith my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

ORGANIZATION

The beginning of the present school year found but one change in the teaching force. Miss Stanton, at West Chesterfield, is succeeded by Miss Muriel H. Fissette of Nashua, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School in the class of 1930. In December, 1930, Miss Dorothy Barrett, teacher in the Spofford Primary room, resigned, after more than seven years of successful service in the Chesterfield schools. The vacancy caused by her resignation has been filled by Miss Doris Foxlow, of Salmon Falls, N. H., a graduate of Plymouth Normal School in the class of 1929.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

In general the buildings are in good condition and well equipped. A new teacher's desk has been purchased for the Spofford Primary room. Twelve visitors' chairs have been furnished in each of the three buildings. An additional unit of three swings and one see-saw have been installed on the grounds of each building, thus doubling the play ground equipment of the schools. The Spofford Primary room has been equipped with desks.

During the past two years the toilet conditions at the three schools have been very unsanitary and otherwise unsatisfactory. Conditions were worst at the Spofford school, and during the fall the toilets there were replaced by Kaustine system, a type approved by the State Department. I would recommend replacing those in the other two buildings as soon as practicable.

New desks are needed in the Chesterfield Village school, and I believe the district might well consider thus equipping one of the rooms there this year.

The changes already accomplished have greatly improved the conditions under which our children work, and I feel that credit should be given to the spirit of progressive cooperation, shown by the citizens toward the schools, which has made these improvements possible.

ATTENDANCE

Again I feel obliged to call attention to the irregular attendance of some of the children at the schools, particularly at the Chesterfield Village school, where the general attendance is very unsatisfactory.

The New Hampshire school law states that: "Every child between eight and sixteen years of age shall attend the public school to which he is assigned....., unless he is more than fourteen years old and has completed the studies prescribed for the elementary schools, or has been excused from attending

on the ground that his physical or mental condition is such as to prevent his attendance or to make it undesirable.

“Every person having the custody of a child shall cause the child to attend such a school during all the time the public schools are in session.”

The condition mentioned above has existed to a greater or less degree for some time. I feel that the School Board and the Superintendent will be at fault if it is permitted to continue. I earnestly solicit the cooperation of the parents in raising the percent of attendance of our schools to that on a par with other schools.

As in the previous years prizes of books were awarded at graduation by the Community Needlecraft Club to the pupil of each room who attained the highest scholarship, and to the pupil who showed the greatest effort in his work. A book was also presented to each member of the graduating class. This organization and the Ladies Aid Societies of both churches cooperated with the schools in the annual Christmas tree for the children.

At the graduation exercises in June Mr. Charles A. Post awarded pliers to each of the boys who were members of his course in Auto Mechanics.

I wish to gratefully acknowledge the generous and loyal support of the citizens, the members of the School Board, and the teachers.

109 visits were made in homes.

84 visits were made in the schools.

A dental clinic was held at Dr. Estler's office, Chesterfield Village in October, 1930, at which 18 pupils had their teeth treated.

Nine pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

A tonsil clinic was held at the Mousley Hospital, Walpole, N. H., three pupils were treated.

An underweight clinic was held at the Chesterfield school, Sept. 30th, 1930, at which twenty-one pupils were examined by Dr. Robert Kerr of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

One pupil had special eye examination and defect corrected.

I wish to express the appreciation of the district to Mrs. Ada Allen, Mr. Arthur Post, the local chapter of the Red Cross for assistance.

I wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation of the parents in the work accomplished in the past year.
