

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

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Dublin Qualified to Vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

First. To choose all necessary Town Officers, Agents, Auditors and Committees for the ensuing year.

Second. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Third. To see if the town will vote to elect its Tax Collector by ballot this year, fix his salary and allowance for his expenses, or pass any vote relating thereto.

Fourth. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and for any other purposes as mentioned in the budget.

Fifth. To see if the town will vote to apply for State Aid for highways for the ensuing year.

Sixth. To see if the town will vote to purchase a Sargent snowplow as recommended by the selectmen and road agent, raise and appropriate money for the same or pass any vote relating thereto.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and road agent to construct a bridle path along the highway at the South side of the lake in connection with the Permanent Improvement construction this year, same to be built in cooperation with the Dublin Riding and Walking Club.

Eighth. To see if the town will choose a Cemetery Committee to supervise the expenditure of cemetery appropriations or pass any vote relating thereto.

Ninth. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Health Officer to investigate and relieve the unsanitary conditions now existing on Mechanic Street, so called, the expense of such work to be met from any available funds in the treasury.

CEMETERY LOT TRUST FUNDS HELD IN TRUST BY TOWN OF DUBLIN Income to be Used in Care of Respective Lots Listed Below

REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

Scraped all the roads in town and dragged them, during the season. In the west part of the town on the Old Marlboro road, cut the brush and trees to widen road from Marlboro line to Mrs. Aldrich's residence. Put in two culverts opposite Miss Houghton's farmhouse, repaired the wash-outs, graveled along the road, cut water-ways, and cleaned the culverts on this road. On the old Troy road, cut the trees back, blasted out stones, filled in the washouts, and graveled in places. Cut all the alders along side of road beyond Mr. Pell's farmhouse and graveled road in places. Cut the brush and dangerous trees from side of road leading from Mrs. Aldrich's residence to the Waite Corner, and trucked brush away to burn. Cut all brush at west end of lake and patched the tar surfaced road twice during season. On the Upper Jaffrey road opposite Mr. Pellerin's house, widened the road, put in two culverts. blasted out wide water-ways, and graveled the road a length of about three hundred feet (300 ft.). Cut the brush and trees on the cross road from No. 4 school house to the Page place and trimmed the brush to Jaffrev line via Thorndike Pond. Graveled in places along school bus road to Mr. Korpi's corner. Repaired wash-out at foot of hill by Camp Iroquois, graveled the flat to the Jaffrey line, and cut brush along sides of road there. In the east part of the town all side roads were graveled in places and dangerous rocks blasted out. Put all new planks in bridge over river near Mr. Methley's, one culvert at Knight's mill, and repaired the wash-out. Repaired, also, wash-out next to Jaffrey line and put culverts in above Charles Pickford's house, graveling in places. From Bond's Corner toward Harrisville, took up old culverts and put them lower, graveled in places along the meadow, graveled toward Eastview line; graveled in places along road from Dublin Inn toward the Parsons' farm.

Used 1920 yards of gravel on town roads.

Built new chimney at tractor shed and painted the building with two coats of white paint.

Repaired the underpinning at the tool barn and painted it with two coats of paint on the front and west sides.

Painted tractors and snow-plows and repaired the woodwork on same. Put new clutch and springs in five-ton (5 T) Best tractor and new bolts in treads. Made two sixteen feet (16 ft.) leveling drags and repaired the smaller ones. Built some new board snow fence and put up all snow fencing about the town.

Special Appropriation on Chesham Road Leading from Charles MacVeagh's

Starting at spot where left off last year and continuing along the meadow road with 151 yards of gravel, 6 inches deep.

PERMANENT SOUTHSIDE LAKE ROAD

Starting at the cement of highway and working on toward Lake Club entrance, widened to twenty-one feet (21 ft.) a distance of 1150 feet, taking it to entrance of Currier's driveway. Cut the left-hand bank setting road over to avoid sharp curve, and blasted out ledge. Put a rock base just this side of where road was not drained, as water came under the roadbed. Used 72 feet 16-inch, 70 feet 12-inch, 72 feet 14-inch, and 28 feet 18-inch culverts which are all put in as far as the Dr. Russell cottage. Put 864 yards of gravel, and 2,453 gallons of oil on the road finished as far as Currier's driveway entrance, with two coats of oil.

PERMANENT IMPROVED UPPER JAFFREY ROAD

Dragged the road several times to shape same, graveled washouts, and put 7,437 gallons of oil on it; using 109 yards of gravel and two coats of oil. The road is finished to the bottom of hill just below Franklin MacVeagh's farmhouse entrance.

CATHOLIC CHURCH ROAD

Widened road from cement highway, down between the Gleason store and Town House to James L. Brockway's shop; a distance of 825 feet. Cut the bank back at top of steep pitch of hill by Millard Worcester's. Put 190 feet 15-inch culvert on both sides of road on hill, with large header opening into a brick man-hole at the lower end where pipes connect to cross the road, halfway down the hill. Put 170 feet tile drain from a pipe leading into the lawn at William Thompson's, connecting onto this pipe with a line directed toward the Library or some source of drain carrying same drain to entrance to newly installed culvert. Put stone base at lower part of hill, using 45 yards of stone and 142 yards of gravel on road. Put 1,670 gallons of oil on the road which finished same for above mentioned distance.

STATE AID CONSTRUCTION

1. From Bond's Corner on Hancock Road

Put in 4,000 feet, 21 feet wide, gravel and oiled road to a point 200 feet west of the bridge below Charles F. Appleton's farmhouse, leading past A. T. Appleton's. This was done under the supervision of A. E. White, Division Engineer, and the selectmen.

2. The U. R. C. Account

Continuing from the point in road left off as stated in previous paragraph, continued 3,500 feet and oiled same to the top of hill this side of Everett Hannaford's. The road is finished 200 feet from the junctions of roads leading to Hancock and Peterborough. Railings, culverts, and headers are put in; and railings are painted with two coats of paint. This also done under the supervision of Mr. White and the selectmen.

THE UNEMPLOYMENT FUND

1. The Old Harrisville Road

Started at the parting of the ways by the lake, cutting all the large dangerous trees, trimmed others, and cut the brush and burned same, to a distance this side of the Monroe Estate's house. Blasted out the stumps and several large boulders and ledges below Sterling's avenue, on the steep hill. Cut the alders and widened the road on all hills on this road, and blasted out ditches on the right, also blasted out waterways on all hills.

2. Monument Road

Cut the trees at the lower end of road, and cut the brush back to the walls, burning such brush as was cut.

3. From Bond's Corner to the Burr Corner

Cut the trees and brush, burned brush, and cleared all dangerous spots from dangerous trees and bushes.

4. From Charles Pickford's to Jaffrey Line

Cut trees and burned brush on this road, and cleared all dangerous and blind corners.

5. Road Leading from Knight's Mill Cut trees and brush, and burned wasted wood. Respectfully submitted.

SEXTON'S REPORT

On a May afternoon in 1840 a number of persons gathered at the town cemetery where they spent the entire afternoon in improving its appearance. This first endeavor on the part of our citizens to improve the appearance of their cemetery by making it a place of beauty rather than one of gloom was indeed a commendable one, worthy of emulation in the present year.

In 1932, after raking and cleaning up the enclosure, all lots were carefully gone over and approximately 1200 grave stones were straightened and righted. This operation meant the labor of days for a number of men and consumed the bulk of the \$500 appropriation. After this work had been done, a beginning was made toward grubbing out the rank ground blueberry growth in the east part of the cemetery.

The cemetery soil is, generally speaking, quite run out, and during the summer of 1932 the sexton sent a sample to the University of New Hampshire for analysis. The test showed the soil to be unusually sour, and a grass seed mixture was recommended for sowing. It is to be hoped that the east part of the cemetery can be re-seeded eventually as there is great need of stimulating a growth of grass there.

Under the sexton's direction all of the perpetual care lots were re-graded and put into condition in the fall of the year. Several other lots were also improved, and a considerable interest in bettering the appearance of family lots has been aroused, especially among persons having Dublin connections but now residing elsewhere.

Three new funds for the perpetual care of lots were given in trust to the town last year, and in all cases the reason for doing so can be directly attributed to interest in the present work of improving the cemetery's general appearance.

Only one copy of the chart made by Eben W. Jones of Peterborough has been located, and two copies were made of it this last year so that there are now three in the town's possession whereby graves can be located. As this chart was made in 1925 and as a number of new stones have been set in the cemetery since that time, it is the sexton's intention to bring it up to date and to keep it so in the future, making necessary additions to the chart as these become necessary.

One piece of work that especially needs to be done this year is the widening of the exit at the north end of the cemetery, removing a corner of the stone wall in order that modern motor hearses with their long wheel bases can drive out and make the turn more easily than is now possible. The trouble with which the operation is now affected has been the course of considerable dissatisfaction.

Much expert work must be given at once to repairing broken gravestones. A more substantial appropriation than last year's is therefore warranted as otherwise it will not be possible to employ as many men there in 1933 as a year ago. The acreage of the enclosure is extensive and nearly \$100 alone of the annual appropriation must be used merely for raking and cleaning up.

An erroneous impression that it is planned to transform the burying ground from a place of rustic simplicity into a "city cemetery" has unfortunately been created, but in reality nothing could be farther from the truth. There is no intention of doing so, but sunken lots should be filled in, and broken headstones repaired. A rustic appearance can be maintained without implying a semblance of neglect.

In this year of economic stress, the town's money should go largely into appropriations where it can be earned back again by the taxpayers. Only a certain number of men can be employed on the roads, and what could be more logical than an adequate cemetery appropriation which can be advantageously used to provide work for excess labor?

Let us, in conclusion, bear in mind the adage: "A well kept cemetery is an indication of a thrifty town."

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF

During the past year the Dublin Volunteer Fire Company answered fourteen alarms, of which nine were general and five still. The fire chief and wards issued 177 burning permits and owing to the dryness of the summer season these permit fires were carefully supervised.

Under the direction of Fire Ward Charles R. Thomas, several water holes were constructed about the town and a general survey and map made showing the location of these as well as the exact distances between them and dwellings in the area. It is now possible to give fire protection to nearly 85% of the buildings throughout the town when there is a normal flow of water in the various brooks. Plans have been made to increase the number of these water holes during the coming year.

The new Maxim 350-gallon pumper purchased by the town has proved to be a valuable addition to the department and with the present complete equipment is sufficient to cope with any fire that the town is likely to have.

Nearly all active members of the department have been instructed how to operate this piece efficiently, thus affording complete protection at all times.

All fire equipment has been completely checked and new parts and supplies added where necessary.

I take this opportunity to thank the telephone operators for the cooperation and efficient service given the department and also the members of the Volunteer Company for their prompt response to all alarms.

REPORT OF THE DUBLIN SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of the Dublin School District:

We herewith submit the one hundred and eleventh annual report of our schools.

The school year of 1931-32, being the first year of our consolidated school, finished with very satisfactory results.

As authorized at the last annual meeting the board sold at public auction schoolhouses nos. 2, 3, 4, and 5 realizing a sum of one thousand seven hundred five dollars.

The school year of 1932 and 33 commenced with quite a change from previous years, the school program being placed on the day school plan. This was the result of our Superintendent Mr. Chase having a survey made of our school by Columbia and Harvard Universities. This change necessarily called for different equipment and supplies and Mr. Chase has spent much time and trouble supervising the purchasing of these things.

Visual education has been introduced and the interest from the Appleton Fund has been used for this purpose.

We wish to thank our summer residents and others who contributed to the purchase of a radio.

Our teaching staff also changed in line with our new program. Mr. Jesse Miller, a graduate from the University of Michigan, became principal of the school, teaching grades 6, 7, and 8 as well as a nature course to the entire school. Miss Louise Hall, a Rollins College graduate, was engaged to teach art and grades 3, 4, and 5. Miss McLeod was re-elected to teach the primary room and music to the school.

Health work has been carried on as usual. The regular examination of the children was made by Dr. Clark with the assistance of Miss Harris.

Two clinics have been held, an underweight clinic by Dr. Kerr and a dental clinic by Dr. Bethel.

The following repairs and changes have been made in our plant during the year; both boys and girls basements painted, boiler and manual training rooms finished and plastered, all desks in the building sanded and varnished, opaque curtains installed in three classrooms and assembly hall, new grill work on windows in assembly hall, artesian well drilled and new pump and tank installed.

A great deal of interest has been shown in our school not only by parents and friends but by outsiders as well.

We wish to thank all parents and friends for the co-operation they have shown the board during the past year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Dublin School Board:

It is at once apparent that the new type of organization and the modern education which you are providing for the school children of Dublin, can be maintained at a sharp decrease from former costs, but your pleasure I am sure, lies more in the educational leadership which you are demonstrating because of the much greater value of the training which you are giving the children.

There is no substitute for the development of the ability to think, as a dominating value in civic life. The process of thinking is stimulated more by intelligent and interesting observation and discussion of objects of immediate relationship to personal environment, than by years of memorizing of facts dealing with the past.

There is no greater civic value than adequate organization of a school for its own control. Your centralized building now holds a little community, interestedly at serious work of a type which is correct, if the rounded development of the children is to be assured.

You have not been forced to rely upon local guidance for assistance in making your decisions as to what is best for children. The foremost authorities have been contacted for you. But it has been your own love for childhood and your own staunch insistance that nothing but the best is good enough for Dublin children, that have determined the policies which you are now carrying out.

There are many rough spots to be worked out. Much still remains that can be done. But I am extremely grateful that during my period of supervision you have seen fit to show to such communities as are interested in the lowering of the tax rate and the raising of the level of children care, how the results most efficiently can be brought about.

The interest and the cooperation of the parents have been greatly appreciated by you. And this support will be still more enthusiastic as the parents discover the real values which you are developing in the lives of their children.

The usual survey, statistical information, and financial summaries have been presented to you. This policy will continue for the remainder of the year as in previous years.

Your interest in the scholastic achievement, your desire for complete information, and your friendly support have meant much to me as to the remainder of the staff.

SPECIAL AUDIT OF TOWN ACCOUNTS

Made in October 1932 by Harold G. Fowler, Municipal Accountant for the New Hampshire State Tax Commission

Mr. Arthur T. Appleton, Chairman, Board of Selectmen, Dublin, New Hampshire Dear Sir:

I submit herewith a report of my audit of the accounts of the Town of Dublin which was made at the request of your board, this audit covering the fiscal year ended January 31, 1932, and the period from February 1, 1932 to October 27, 1932.

The Vouchers and Orders drawn by the Selectmen during these periods were examined, together with the accompanying invoices and payrolls. The Vouchers were checked with the corresponding entries in the Selectmen's Receipts and Payments Book to see if the correct amounts had been entered in each case and the proper classifications made. All of the Orders which were drawn contained the signatures of at least two members of the board of selectmen.

The payrolls for State Highway work were examined, orders for the total amount of each payroll having been drawn to the foreman in charge of this work. In some cases these payrolls were signed by the individual employees whose names appeared thereon. In cases where the payrolls were not signed the cancelled checks of the foreman to the employees were produced as evidence of payment.

The Treasurer's receipts were checked by the source of origin so far as it was possible to do this. The Treasurer's payments were checked and it was found that the total amount of the Treasurer's payments was in agreement with the total amount of the orders drawn by the Selectmen. The balance on hand October 27, 1932 as shown by the Treasurer's Cash Book was \$2,449.32. This balance reconciles with the bank balance of the same date as shown by the statement attached.

The accounts of the Tax Collector, including the tax levies of 1930, 1931 and 1932, were examined. The taxes of the 1930 levy were all collected and the account balanced. There appeared to be a very slight difference of \$1.06 in that year's account, in favor of the town.

In the levy of 1931, all taxes were collected with the exception of \$50.00, account of tax on a steam shovel, which tax is rendered uncollectable by a court decision. There appears to be a balance of \$22.06 due the town on that year's levy. This discrepancy was due to an error in the amount of the warrant as originally figured and charged to the Collector, as determined by our verification of the addition of the warrant.

In the levy of 1932, it was found that on the date of audit, collections of \$10,324.96 had been made. Of this amount \$9,500. had been paid over to the Treasurer, a balance of \$323.75 was in the Collector's account at the bank, and cash in the Collector's hands amounted to \$501.21, leaving a balance to collect on the 1932 list of \$33,532.65. There appeared to be a balance of \$7.20 in favor of the Collector, in this year's account. A summary statement of the Collector's accounts for the levies of 1930, 1931 and 1932 is attached herewith.

The securities and bank books representing the principal of Trust Funds held by the Trustees of Trust Funds were examined and the income and expenditures checked. Our recommendation that the standard form of Trust Fund book in which a record of all trust funds could be kept was adopted by the Trustees.

Generally speaking the accounts of the various officers were found to have been well kept and in accordance with the uniform system required by the State Tax Commission. No shortages were found to exist, and only slight discrepancies as heretofore mentioned.

The town of Dublin has no bonded indebtedness and the tax rate has for a number of years been well below the average rate for the State. The 1932 rate of \$2.15 per hundred is 62 cents per hundred lower than the average state rate of \$2.77.

I wish to acknowledge herewith the valuable assistance rendered during the time of the audit by the local auditors, Mrs. Ethel L. Adams and Mr. J. A. Grau.

STATE TAX COMMISSION

Gentlemen:

Herewith is a supplementary statement regarding certain tax bills on which it appeared that the amounts entered were incorrect. This is an entirely different matter from the Tax Collector's standing with the Town Treasurer and this separate letter is drawn in order to avoid confusing the two situations.

In the cases presented to us we found the greatest discrepancy in any one tax bill was two dollars. In some of these cases the total amount of the bill was not set down and no cancelled check accompanied the bill, thus it may be very difficult to determine whether or not an amount greater than the correct amount of the tax bill was actually collected.

In other cases the total amount of the bill was set down and the taxpayer's cancelled check for a like amount accompanied the bill. From an inspection it appears that in some of these cases two dollars more than the correct amount of the tax bill was collected. In every case where it can be proven that an overcharge was paid the Collector should be required to refund the amount paid which was over and above the amount assessed according to his warrant.
