THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Mason in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To choose one trustee of the Boynton Common School fund for five years.
- 4. To choose one trustee of the Stearns Common School Bequest for three years.
 - 5. To choose one trustee of the cemeteries for three years.
- 6. To choose one trustee of the Mason Public Library for three years.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for repairs of highways and bridges.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for library purposes.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for care of cemeteries.
- 10. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Memorial purposes.
- 11. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.

- 13. To see if the town will accept the state aid for construction of the Class II road known as Greenville road, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$421.50 or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$421.50.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to accept from the Adams heirs the sum of \$100.00 for the perpetual care of the Luke Adams Cemetery lot and \$100.00 for the perpetual care of the Henry P. Adams cemetery lot or take any action thereon.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Cemetery Trustees and Selectmen to accept perpetual funds care from those wishing to establish such funds.
- 16. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for state road construction, to be used provided the State Legislature appropriates the balance necessary to complete the two pieces of road on the Greenville road. If said \$600.00 is not used for said purpose during the ensuing year the appropriation will revert to the general funds of the town.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to make any discount on taxes, and authorize the Selectmen to fix the date said taxes must be paid on or before to receive such discount, or take any action thereon.
- 18. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
 - 19. To wit: Is it expedient to revise the Constitution?

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Mason:

I respectfully submit my fourteenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Supervision

There has been no major change in the general plan of supervision from that of previous years. The results of the standardized tests are used with more effectiveness as we gain in the understanding of the meaning of test results and methods of utilizing them to improve instruction. The outstanding illustration of this gain the past year is in the fields of Reading and Spelling. When tests showed weakness in the reading skills, and particularly in the knowledge of exact meaning of words, we shifted the emphasis in methods of teaching reading to meet the situation. This weakness carried over also into spelling abilities, and we have made a change in the spelling system, introducing a new type of textbook which is a combination of spelling and word study. These have been in use approximately two months, and the improvement in spelling is noticeable already by comparison with work of the preceding months. Standardized tests in the spring and next fall will indicate the extent to which we have overcome the weaknesses, and will point the way to future procedure.

TEACHERS AND SALARIES

The surplus of qualified teachers which existed during the years of the depression has very largely disappeared. There is almost a scarcity of good primary teachers and no more than the normal surplus of upper grade teachers. This situation has accelerated the rate at which teachers' salaries are being restored to their former levels, from the reduced salaries that prevailed in the past five years.

HEALTH

The annual medical inspection was made in November by Doctor McLean assisted by Mrs. Gilbert. The following defects were found:

BUDGET FOR 1937-1938

The budget for the coming year has been prepared on the basis of the organization and costs for the current year. The only important change from last year's estimates are those for transportation and high school tuition. Cost of transportation is estimated on the basis of actual cost this year. High School tuition cost will decrease because of the expected graduation of three pupils now attending Townsend High School and one at Appleton Academy. The total reduction from last year's figure is more than \$500. State Aid has not yet been definitely announced but should be approximately the same as last year, \$1800. We should have a balance of approximately \$500 at the close of this year. Trust Fund income will probably be less than it has been, and we have estimated \$900 for this item. An appropriation of \$2,100 should be sufficient with the balance carried over and other income to meet all necessary expenses next year.
