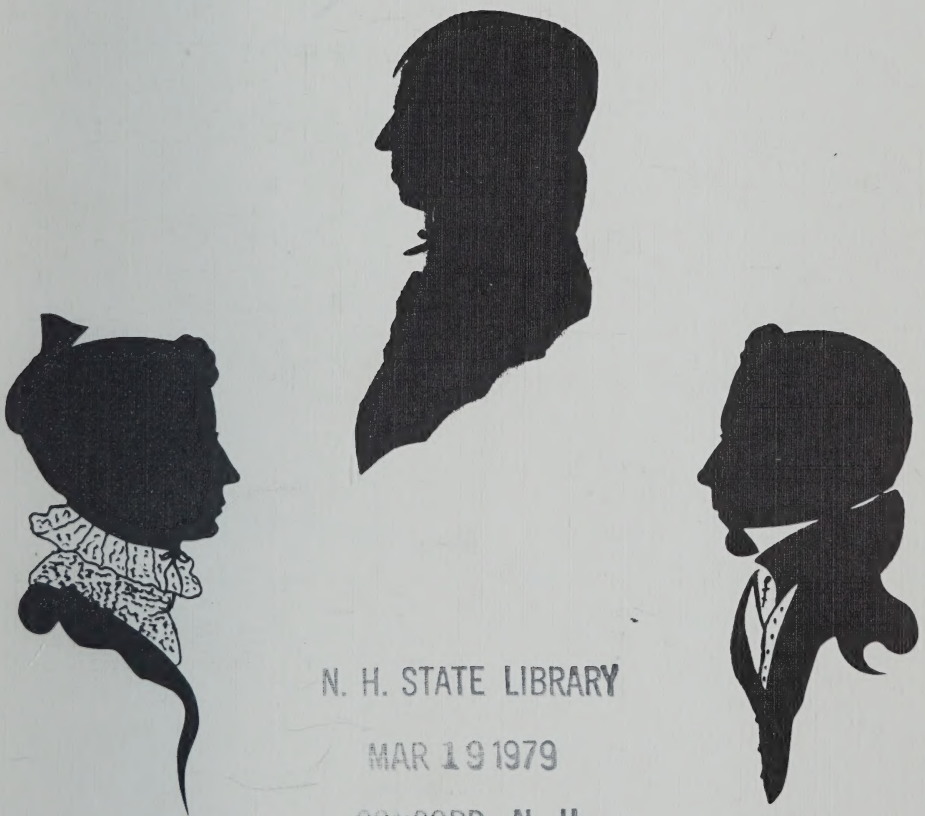

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

During 1978 the Board has dealt with regular duties and, in addition, many special problems. The Board issued 15 permits for new housing, 86 permits for building alterations, and 12 advertising sign permits. The Board accepted one new road, opening up another area for new housing construction. This addition, of course, adds to the responsibilities of the Road Agent and Town Highway Crew.

Current Use applications continue to increase. In 1975 there were 46 parcels of land in Current Use. In 1978 there were 102 parcels approved under the guidelines established by the Current Use Advisory Board. A total of 3466.77 acres are now under Current Use, representing an original assessed valuation of \$3,031,770. Through change to Current Use, the assessed valuation drops to \$202,160. This means a loss in revenue to the town of \$48,607.83.

Requests for abatement of property taxes continue to increase as both property values and town costs continue to increase. The Board continues the policy of denying these requests unless the Department of Revenue Administration, upon review, proposes changes in the assessment. Applicants for abatement, of course, have the opportunity to appeal to the State board of Taxation or Superior Court.

The Board has been involved with the Sewer Commissioners in seeking to clear the way for construction of the interceptor line to Sunapee. Hopefully, the agreed settlement of a court suit among the various parties will clear the way for construction to begin in the late spring.

Increasingly, town government becomes involved in the complexities of its relationships with federal, state, and county

government. Federal regulations for revenue sharing now require an independent audit of all our financial statements instead of audit by the traditional town elected auditor. Again, beginning with 1978 the Board must impose a penalty for failure to file timely the Property Inventory forms. This is a requirement each year, and the Board wishes to encourage property owners to file their inventory form prior to April 15, 1979.

More important for the town financing is that as the financial pressures increase on the State, the tendency in Concord is to reduce the flow of money to towns and, thereby, increase the local tax burden. The 1978 interest and dividends tax return to the town was reduced to \$137,550.45 from \$162,138.14 received in 1977 because of a state action changing the formula for distribution. The difference of \$24,587.69 had to be made up by local taxation.

The Board wishes to express its thanks to the members of the Town Hall Refurbishers Committee for their efforts in making our fine town hall more attractive in time for New London's Bicentennial. Through various money-raising activities, the Committee garnered funds for the purchase of 201 new chairs, a new stage curtain, movie screen, pull-up shades, new lighting arrangements.

Finally, New London mourned the passing of an excellent town officer, Wilfred "Slim" Davis, Tree Warden of the Town. The Board remembers him with appreciation for his work.

TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

Tracy Memorial Library's circulation reached an all time high in 1978. The total of adult and juvenile books circulated was 26,623, and the total of periodicals and non-book items was 1897, giving a total of 28,520.

The library purchased 528 new books and was given 30 books by friends and patrons of the library, bringing the total of new acquisitions to 898. Many of the new books were purchased from monetary donations, including \$1000.00 from the Friends of Tracy Memorial Library. There were four funds established in memory of Ruth A. Dickerson, Susan Fletcher Paige, Cecil Webster Boody, and Lee Wyndham. The librarians are in the process of purchasing books which they feel will make a valuable permanent addition to the library.

Not only have the people in New London been generous with their monetary and book donations, but there are volunteers who have contributed many hours of work to the library. They have assisted with preparations of books for circulation, with the children's story time, and with the cleaning and mending of books.

The library is fortunate to have a loyal staff -- Mrs. Stevenson, Mrs. Filkins, Mrs. Woodward, and Mrs. Kimball. Their efforts continue to make our library one of the best small town libraries in the state.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT — 1978

This year we have updated and improved some of our equipment and facilities. We have purchased a new two meter radio to replace the antiquated six meter. All Civil Defense agencies are now on the two meter radio enabling us to communicate with other towns and State in time of emergency.

Civil Defense also has had the gasoline pumps at the Town Shed wired so that a small generator can run them in case of power failure. This would enable the town trucks to get gas for plowing at anytime and the town police and ambulance when the power is off.

This coming year if the budget is approved by the Budget Committee and the Town we will purchase an emergency generator system for the Town Dispatch. The Dispatch has communication with the town highway, fire department, ambulance, police, other towns, and State Police. with an emergency system if the power did go off the town would still have all the vital communications necessary.

We would also like to purchase some mobil radios to replace the CB radios which we now have. With the popularity of the CB it has become impossible to use them for town activities.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FOREST FIRE CHIEF AND YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

For more than 80 years, a cooperative effort between the State of New Hampshire and local forest fire authorities has created a forest fire prevention and suppression program that is recognized as superior throughout the United States.

Since the first forest fire laws were written in 1895, the state and local community governments have worked together to prevent and combat forest fires.

Today, 249 forest fire wardens and more than 1,800 deputy wardens are appointed every three years by the State Forester to work with the members of the State Forest Fire staff in this effort. State funds are used to pay one-half the cost of forest fire suppression costs incurred by local forest fire organizations, within pay rates established by the Governor and Council. State funds matched by local funds are used to purchase hand tools to suppress forest fires, to train local forest fire crews and in forest fire prevention work.

All outside burning, when the ground is not covered with snow, is permitted only after obtaining a written fire permit from your local Forest Fire Warden. Penalty for burning without a permit when one is required is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$1,000 or a jail term of up to one year or both.

REMEMBER, ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT FOREST FIRES.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

1978 was a busy year for the Planning Board. Town Meeting authorized a first in ten years overall review which is just being completed as this report goes to press.

In the conduct of its regular business, the Planning Board held 13 meetings which involved different matters subject to Public Hearing. These included 9 subdivisions, comprising 20 new lots, as well as 9 site plans and 6 annexations. In order to improve knowledgeable handling of these matters, an effort was made to assign responsibility for each application to one board member. It's hoped that this plan will continue to improve Planning Board service to applicants and to the Town.

The ten-year overall Town Plan Review was managed by a subcommittee of the Planning Board, which held 9 meetings for that purpose. Competent professional leadership was supplied by Hans Klunder of the firm of that name, who did the major town plan study 10 years ago. Five other professional

firms were interviewed by the subcommittee in the course of making the final selection of the Klunder firm.

The membership of the sub-committee included William F. Kidder, Jr., Howard Moody, Mrs. John H. Ohler, and Lewis Vincent in addition to the regular Planning Board membership. Mr. Vincent was secretary of the subcommittee and of the Town Plan Review Committee which included 28 other New London residents.

The large Town Plan Review Committee members were carefully selected in order to make it the broadest cross section representation of the town. The Planning Board is deeply grateful to the tireless efforts of the subcommittee and the large Town Plan Review Committee to assist in executing a comprehensive review of the Town Plan. By the time this is published, printed copies of the proposals and results will have been given wide distribution through the town.

Wesley G. Nichols was appointed to the Board, replacing Mrs. Sydney R. Badmington whose term expired. Harry B. Harris, Jr. attended 1978 Planning Board meetings as Selectmen representative. The Conservation Commission was represented first by Mrs. Esther Currier and then by Marilyn Andrews. Mrs. Andrews was also appointed an alternate Planning Board member by the Board of Selectmen.

The Planning Board wishes to thank every one of the unusually large number of people who assisted the Board this year. The spirit of cooperation by the applicants who presented Zoning matters to the Board for consideration was excellent and most helpful to the Board.

We hope, too, that the attendance and effort in 1978 of the Town Plan Review Committee is widely known throughout the Town. Certainly better communication of the nature and detail of our Town Plan will make it more workable, practical, tangible and useful to our residents.

SEWER COMMISSION REPORT

Preparation of plans and specifications for proposed sewers was completed in March 1978 and forwarded to State and Federal Agencies for approval.

At the 1978 Town Meeting the Town voted to raise and appropriate funds for the construction of the first phases of the project. Completion of the construction will enable the Town to comply with State and Federal Directives regarding the elimination of the discharge to Lyon Brook and permit removal of the moratorium on connections to the sewer system.

In April an application for a Federal Grant for construction was submitted. Unfortunately approval of the Grant was delayed by a suit against the Environmental Protection Agency by a small group called Friends of our Rural Environment (FORE). However, in December a compromise was reached and it now appears that the grant request will be approved and we will be able to proceed with the project. It is difficult to predict a completion date at this time but we hope there will be no more delays.

The Warrant for the 1979 Meeting will contain an Article to raise and appropriate funds for a further study to determine the feasibility of eliminating the infiltration of storm water into the existing sewers. We have been assured of both State and Federal Grants for this study.

The routine operation and maintenance of our present plant have gone smoothly during the year under the able management of our superintendent, John Bickford.

ANNUAL REPORT NEW LONDON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The major effort of the Conservation Commission in 1978 was to develop a nature trail system in the Chandler Brook Wetland and to raise the money to complete the purchase of the land surrounding the duck breeding area. A fund drive, which was started in July, has brought in contributions of \$2500 which will be applied to the \$7500 purchase price. The balance of the money to complete the acquisition will come from accumulated funds and the anticipated appropriation of the Town Meeting.

Unlike most town agencies, the Conservation Commission is allowed by statute to accumulate any unexpended funds from the annual appropriation. As land grows more expensive and the pressure for development increases, the need to have a ready reserve will no doubt require a larger appropriation request in the future. Town and private contributions may be used not only to purchase land and easements but to obtain matching federal grants.

To acquaint townspeople and visitors with the wetland, four guided tours of the area were conducted last summer. With the help of Luther Child, Harold Hopkins, Anna and Walter Gallazzi, Bruce MacFarlane, Anne Johnson, Bob Teach, Blanche Emory, Eleanor Gillespie, and Carol Graham and two daughters, a bridge was built over the outlet stream, trails were cut and a beaver proof pipe was installed to control the water level.

The Philbrick-Cricenti Bog continues to attract a steady stream of visitors with more than 1500 signing the guest book in the past year. The other trails were well, if not heavily, used, and we are happy to report that there has been no major vandalism.

Under the direction of Esther Currier, the commission will again conduct snowshoe walks during Feb. and March and bird walks in the spring.

Commission members have been active on the Town Plan Review Committee and hope that the enthusiasm for preserving New London's "rural charm" can be translated into an even more active conservation program.

We were all saddened this past fall by the loss of our good friend and enthusiastic supporter "Slim" Davis. The entire town will miss his expertise and unflinching interest in protecting our natural beauty.

REPORT OF THE TOWN HEALTH OFFICER

The review of some fifty septic system plans and subdivision proposals has constituted a major portion of my activity this past year.

Additional work has involved diversified situations such as bat removal, requesting people to remove trash or unpleasant material, and routine water testing.

Bucklin and Elkins beaches were monitored three times during the season in May, July and August. The State Water Testing Laboratory does this work free of charge. Seasonal fluctuations in the water quality were observed but the results are well within acceptable levels for swimming.

Pleasant Lake shore properties were reviewed during the month of August and with few exceptions the residents around the lake have been alert and have promptly corrected septic system problems.

I wish to thank the Selectmen, Planning and Zoning Boards and all others who have expressed cooperative interest in health related matters.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH CONSULTANT TO THE TOWN HEALTH OFFICER — 1978

Since this is our Bicentennial year, I thought a little perspective might be in order. At the time of incorporation of the Town in 1779, there were perhaps 50 inhabitants with a dozen log cabins in the township. By 1800 there were 617 inhabitants. Dr. John Cushing was the first resident physician. He was described as a gallant knight who rode about the town with his saddlebags filled with pills, powders and potions. He failed to show up on his wedding day, fell out of favor, became intemperate and left the area in 1811. One hundred years ago, Dr. William P. Clough, Sr. was born. He began his practice in 1911. There had been a town Board of Health about 1900, but no hospital facilities until 1918. The now Tracy Memorial Library was the hospital at one point as was the New London Manor prior to the opening of the current New London Hospital in 1958, largely due to the vision of Dr. William P. Clough, Jr.. Fifty years ago, the New London Hospital and Nursing Association reported serving 163 patients with 15 births, 5 deaths, 25 major operations. Patients paid \$5,000, the Town of New London \$2,000 and \$3,000 was raised from Tag Day. There were 120 students in the school system with a significant amount of dental and lesser amount of medical care delivered at the schools.

In this Bicentennial year, the hospital comprises about 40 beds for acute medical care and 50 for extended care with an annual revenue of about three million dollars and average admissions of about 1500 patients with 120 births, 560 operations, 100,000 laboratory tests and 10,000 x-ray pictures, now termed radiology exams. The Visiting Nurse Service which was quite active 50 years ago has become again an active part of health care delivery. There are now over fifty physicians and dentists associated with New London Hospital either in a primary or a consultative role. The Town health department is no longer actively involved in the delivery of health care, and reporting of contagious diseases is primarily at the state level so that at this time, it serves chiefly as a resource in case of threatened pollution from sewage, water supplies etc. Nonetheless, the town is involved in health care by its generous support of Hospital Day and helps make up for the hospital financial deficit. There has been an enormous increase in the costs of health care delivery but this coincides with an enormous improvement in the health care being provided. Hospital stays are

shorter, diagnosis more accurate, treatment more specific and restoration of function vastly improved especially in the last 25 years.

The medical community is continuing to expand its expertise and services and is demonstrating the viability and necessity for small hospitals in rural areas. Because of the increased involvement of government in health care planning, we urge support of this venture in contrast to a resigned attitude that health care as well as other social functions is best delivered at a few huge megacenters. We continue to plea for your support, money and time because without it we cannot deliver the standard of care for which we strive.

NEW LONDON HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION, INC.
ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY
For 1978

The year 1978 was marked by the decision of the Board, in January, to adhere to the principles of the Voluntary Effort Program, to achieve a significant reduction in the rate of increase in health care costs, while maintaining high quality health care. This has required close cooperation among, and the mutual efforts of, the Trustees, Medical Staff and hospital management.

During the year, much time and effort has been put into dealing with the Health Systems Agency and the State Health Planning and Development Board in an attempt to attain approval for the renovations planned for in 1977, with the year 1978 ending in the same frustration as did the year 1977. In the spring, the Board voted to use \$200,000.00 from the Jardine estate and \$80,000.00 from the Capital Fund Account to finance the building program. This money is to be considered as a loan at a rate of interest not less than the current commercial rate.

In March, bids went out for a new food service, and subsequently the arrangement with Custom Food Management Systems was terminated. It was the decision of the Board to handle the food service internally, with a chef and dietician who would be members of the hospital staff.

In the spring, the Board received the report of the Ad Hoc ECU Study Committee, chaired by Bishop Charles Gilson, which first met in November 1977. This committee considered every phase of the Extended Care Center, as it is currently used, as well as making a determination concerning the needs of the future, and the role of this center in relation to the town. A special meeting of the Board was held to discuss this subject, as well as a meeting with the Medical Staff. As a result, it was voted to retain eight beds for skilled nursing care and to reclassify the remaining beds as intermediate care. This change became effective on October 1, 1978.

Committee activity has been a key factor in the Board activities during the year. The Investment Committee, aside from its regular meetings, has met quarterly with the New

England Investment Corporation, of Boston, for the purpose of reviewing the portfolio. The Public Relations Committee has been active in dealing with those towns served by the hospital, disseminating hospital information to the media, and in November the committee distributed a hospital Newsletter. The Joint Conference Committee has met monthly with the Medical Staff for the purpose of reviewing audits prepared by the Medical Staff, and dealing with mutual problems and concerns.

The Bylaws Committee reviewed the bylaws and made recommendations to the Board, which were adopted at the December meeting. An Ad Hoc Budget Committee of the Board was established to review and oversee the preparation of the 1978-79 budget, which was passed by the Board. The committee continues to function by reviewing the budget quarterly and reporting to the Board.

In October, the Board expressed in writing to all hospital employees, its appreciation of their holding of expenses, in all departments, below the 1977-78 budget.

During the course of the year, new room rates were adopted for both the Extended Care Center and the acute hospital.

Following considerable study and discussion, the Board voted, in November, to lease an IBM computer system 34, with an additional printer and CRT.

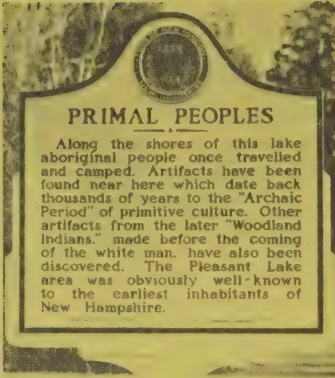
New London celebrates 200 years in 1979 and this marks the third time the town has noted with appropriate ceremonies its beginnings in 1779. The foregoing figures reflect the transformation that has taken place. New London is a big town now. Still, New London's beauty and its people are what is important as New London moves forward into its third century.

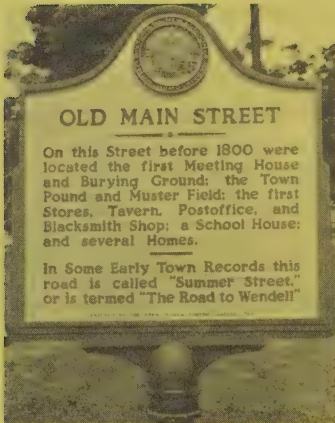

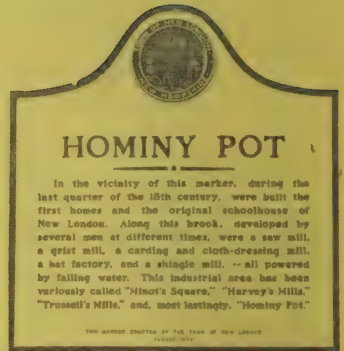
Location: West side of Pleasant Lake

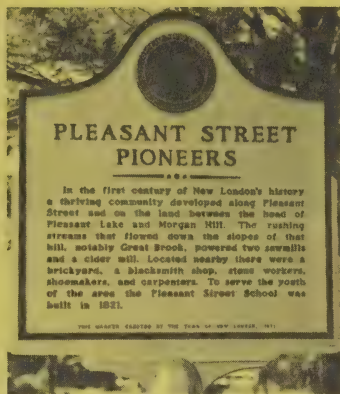

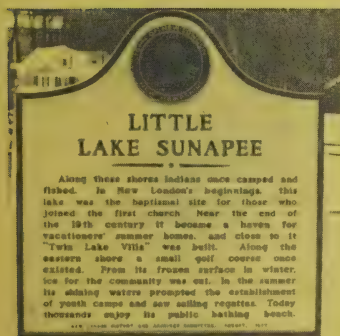

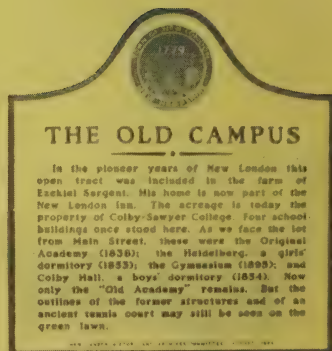

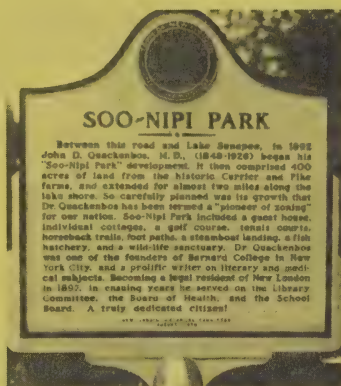

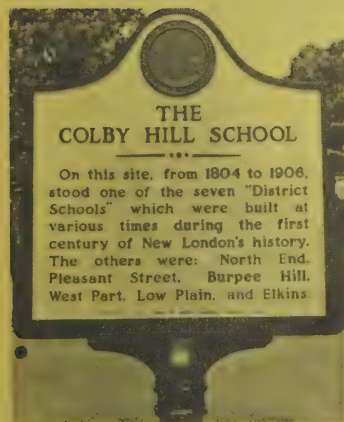

COMMUNITY ACTION ANNUAL REPORT

The Kearsarge Valley Community Action Program is the focal point of social service delivery in this area. Community Action is part of the Community Services Administration of the federal government. The program is designed to help the low-income and the elderly in your town. The programs are run out of the Community Action office in the Community Building (Old Graded School) in Warner. The Community Services Administration pays for 61% of the cost of running the center and the remaining 39% (\$9,733.50) is divided up among the eight towns based upon the percentage of local residents participation in the programs.

This money brings a variety of programs and services into the area at an estimated cash value of over \$150,000, though it is impossible to put a price tag on many of the services we provide.

One of our most successful programs is that of service to senior citizens in the area. Twenty-eight senior citizens receive meals-on-wheels (in addition to those who get them from New London Hospital). a congregate meal for seniors is served very Tuesday and Friday at noon at the Community Building in Warner and in Henniker there is a congregate meal the second Monday of every month. Community Action Program provides free bus service into Concord every Tuesday and Thursday for seniors who need to get to the doctor or do shopping.

Among the other programs are the Weatherization program to help low-income people insulate their homes and an Emergency Energy Assistance Program to help with the expense of home heating.

NEW LONDON CEMETERY COMMISSION

The development of the new area adjacent to the Old Main Street Cemetery in the vicinity of the Town Pound was completed, except for the final surveying necessary for the layout of new burial plots. It is anticipated that similar work will be done in 1979 in the area deeded to the Town adjacent to the West Part Cemetery on County Road.

Negotiations were conducted with our maintenance contractor, Superior Lawn Maintenance, Inc., in order to greatly improve and maintain the physical conditions in our three cemeteries. This was accomplished by the employment of two very capable and experienced men, namely, former Road Agent Willis Prescott and former Cemetery Commissioner William Taylor. It is felt that the obvious improvements this past summer have clearly justified the increased expenditure.

There were 22 interments, (including 2 cremations), during the year 1978 at the following locations:- 6 at Old Main St.; 11 at Elkins; 4 at West Part, and 1 at the Catholic Cemetery in Elkins.

REPORT OF THE TOWN ROAD AGENT

The winter of 1978 was an average winter with the usual snow and ice storms. We had several breakdowns in our sanders, but managed to get by without too many problems. One of our drivers had a serious operation and was out for several weeks but we were fortunate to be able to hire an experienced replacement.

Most of the summer and money was spent on County Road, which developed into a major project. Trees had to be cut, drainage had to be put in, and much of the old road was replaced with sand and gravel. Finally it was surfaced and sealed. We feel that it was well worth the money and effort.

Some of the other projects undertaken throughout the year were the resurfacing of Prescott Lane, part of Pressy Court, part of the Old Stagecoach Road, Currier's Corner, and the end of Job Seamans Acres. Another drain was installed on Burpee Lane in hopes that it will improve the very muddy situation in the spring. Much cutting of trees was done on Lakeshore Road and culverts were replaced or extended. Stumps were removed and some widening was done as part of the plans for shimming this road in 1979.

REPORT OF THE TOWN HISTORY AND ARCHIVES COMMITTEE

“Looking Ahead to New London’s 200th Birthday in 1979”

As New London reaches the 200th Anniversary Year of its incorporation as a Town by our State Legislature on June 25, 1779, we continue our practice of putting in the Town Report (1) a statement of events which concerned our community two centuries ago in 1779, and (2) a summary of what our committee has done in the past year.

Events of 1779

The chief activity in the War during 1779 which affected the people of New London was General John Sullivan’s campaign against the Iroquois Indians of New York State. General Sullivan took with him on this drive all three of New Hampshire’s Continental regiments. In one of these marched James Lamb, the first permanent settler in New London, and the father of the first child born within our community. While his fellow town-folk watched war news with concern, they also continued the effort to win a Charter from the New Hampshire State Legislature at Exeter.

During 1978 our Committee dedicated the 16th and last historical marker in its program to prepare for the 200th Birthday in 1979. This marker commemorates the old Colby Academy and was unveiled in August on the historic campus adjacent to the New London Town Hall.

In 1978, also, efforts to organize the Town Archives continued. The importance of having these in good order was illustrated during the year by the visit of an historical scholar from Georgia who is doing extensive research into New England town records prior to 1800. As time goes by, more and more students will come to examine these materials, either for genealogical or general purposes, and our Town may be proud of the condition in which these valuable records are organized and preserved.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,200 for the purchase of an emergency generator.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to spend Highway Subsidy Funds in the amount of \$17,265.54 for the improvement of Class IV and V highways (RSA 241:14).

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to spend Highway Subsidy Funds in the amount of \$11,194.23 for the construction or reconstruction of Class IV and V highways (RSA 241:15).

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000 for professional services to make a traffic and parking study. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Catholic Cemetery located in Elkins to be part of the public cemetery in Elkins.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will allow the Road Agent to use salt on town roads (intersections) at his discretion.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Town Hall Committee.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$50,000, for the purpose of constructing sewerage and

sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. §1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds and Notes not to exceed \$12,500 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH R.S.A. 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of New London, and to allow the Sewer Commission to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Finance Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. §1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to provide workers' compensation coverage for eligible employees by participating in the New Hampshire Municipal Association Self-Funded Workers' compensation Program commencing April 1, 1979, and to authorize the Selectmen to take such action in furtherance of this vote as may be necessary.

Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to have the minutes of this regular Town Meeting published in the 1979 Town Report.
(By Petition)

Art. 36. To see if the voters of the Town of New London will agree to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with the Kearsarge Regional School District for a parcel of land immediately adjacent to and behind the New London Fire House. Such parcel is approximately 175 feet wide, the width of the existing lot, and 100 feet deep. Such land would be held by the town for future development.
(By Petition)

Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Highway Department to wing back snow on the road and parking lot at the New London Outing Club from time to time. (By Petition)

Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to establish an Historic District Commission consisting of five (5) members in accordance with the provisions of New Hampshire RSA 31:89-C.

The Commission shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen as provided in New Hampshire RSA 31:89-d. (By Petition)

Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Town Manager Plan as provided in Chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes Annotated. (By Petition)

Art. 40. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following town ordinance:

“Compact Part of Town

For the purposes of New Hampshire RSA 644:13 the compact part of the Town of New London shall be that part of the Town zoned other than Conservation District (CON.) or Agricultural and Rural Residential (ARR.)” (By Petition)

Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act for use as a setoff against the following debt service:

Art. 42. To see if the Town will vote to have the nine (9) members-at-large of the Budget Committee appointed as provided in RSA 32:2.

Whenever the Town shall require an amended building permit, the charge for such a permit shall be \$25.00.

Art. 44. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with the State Highway Department for the installation of traffic light controls at the corner of Main and Pleasant Street should traffic conditions so warrant.

Art. 45. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes if deemed necessary by the Selectmen.

New London Centennial

A Gala Day on the Hill.

The morning of the 25th gave an early promise of a warm and pleasant day, and right well did it fulfill its promise.

From every point of the compass teams came pouring in upon the hill, single teams bearing little families, old couples and young couples, double teams with all the relatives and friends on board, huge wains loaded with a whole school district. The surrounding towns seemed to show as much interest as though it was their own celebration and certainly New London has reason to be justly proud of the estimation and respect of her neighbors.

Very close upon the hour appointed the line of march was formed resting its right near the "four corners."

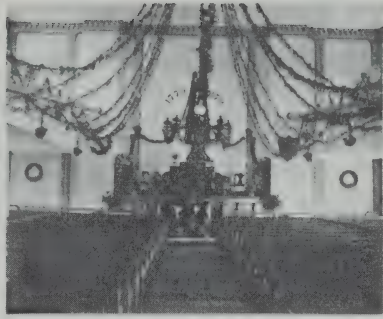
Gen. Joseph N. Clough was Chief Marshal, and a better one could hardly be found. Used to martial life, he seems in his very element when mounted on a fiery steed and leading off a martial column. Maj. A. C. Burpee was his leading aid. Following Gen. Clough came the Franklin Cornet Band, then the Messer Rifles, and Sabbath Schools.

The next division was led by J. H. Burpee accompanied by aids A. J. Cheney, Bram Buckford and J. F. Tilton.

In this division was the G. A. R. followed by citizens and invited guests. The procession countermarched the streets and then repaired to the church where the following exercises were held.

The Franklin Cornet Band opened with a fine and well rendered selection, not trying, as is too often the case with village bands, to give quantity instead of quality.

Gen. McCutchins then called the large audience to order by a few well chosen remarks and then announced an anthem by the choir, entitled "Praise the Mighty God." Mrs. R. O. Messer's clear voice, which is always a part of New London music, gave the leading part. Mrs. An-



gie G. Everett, for years the music teacher at the Institution, made the organ a thing of life. Few players are capable of making an instrument breathe such harmony and sentiment at the same time. Next followed

PRAYER

by Dura Morgan, son of Deacon Morgan, and one of New London's graduates; now a settled pastor at Beverly, Mass.

Mr. Morgan then read the following hymn, composed for the occasion by Mrs. Colgate of New York, daughter of the late ex-Gov. Colby. This was sung by the choir to music composed by Mrs. Nahum T. Greenwood of New London:

Gen. McCutchins now gave an address of welcome. He said that the past century had seen the change of all things but the mountains and hills, the streams and lakes of the town. The sturdy forests had fallen beneath the Woodman's axe. Agriculture, the source of all wealth began the work upon these hills and wrought the changes which the day celebrates. He rejoiced to see so many of the present citizens and so many of the former citizens. He feelingly referred to the church-yard containing the dust of the fathers and in well chosen language welcomed them to the beautiful view, to the hospitable homes, to the church where a living gospel had ever been preached, and to the warm hearts of the people. He closed by introducing the speaker of the day, Hon. Judge Sargent of Concord, a member of one of the largest of New London's old families and a native of the town. Judge Sargent's address was an exhaustive, historical essay and took nearly two hours for its delivery.

HALFWAY THROUGH

Judge Sargent took a rest and Mrs. Rogers of Boston, daughter of the late Jos. Phillips of the firm of Phillips, Messer & Colby, the famous scythe manufacturers, sung a very sweet selection. She was warmly applauded and presented with a beautiful bouquet.

The address was listened to attentively throughout its delivery and at its close after a selection by the band the poem which we gave on the last page was

read by the composer, Mrs. L. A. Blood daughter of Gen. McCutchins. She was very tastefully dressed and read in a clear, sweet voice. The effect was heightened by the attention of her father who was Master of Ceremonies. The two so like and yet so unlike made a picture of youthful womanhood and venerable manhood the audience will not soon forget.

The exercises at the church were closed by the choir's singing "Strike the Cymbals." The procession then re-formed and marched to the great tent where from fifteen hundred to two thousand people were generously fed. A fine collation was served at the town hall for the soldiers, band and others.

At four P. M. the people gathered at the church and listened to extemporaneous speeches by townsmen and old residents. We should not forget to mention the decoration of the church which reflected great credit on the ones in charge. About two thousand five hundred people were present and all seemed to enjoy the hospitality of the town and the fine exercises which were given. May another century witness still greater enterprise and advancement in Christian morals is the wish of

At the close of another year, I have the honor to submit a report of the way in which the school fund has been expended, together with a statement of the condition of the schools.

The amount of money appropriated at the last town meeting was \$1288.00; added to this was about \$150.00, board and wood given in several districts—amounting to \$1438.00.

Very much to the surprise of your committee, the practice continued for so many years, of appropriating a portion of the school fund equally among the several districts—the rest *pro rata*—was abandoned, and the whole sum was distributed *pro rata*. The result was that the smaller districts had less money this year than last, while the larger had very much more. Thus those that needed the increase were injured by the change, and those who did not need it were not helped, although a much larger sum was placed at their disposal. My conviction is, that greater good is accomplished by the former amount distributed as in years past, than the larger amount as distributed now. My recommendation is that the present amount be appropriated, and that three-hundred and fifty dollars, at least, be equally distributed, the rest *pro rata*.

All the teachers employed have labored faithfully, honestly, and diligently for the advancement of the schools, and the work done has been of a higher order than the average of past years. Too many of them, however, have no special love for their work, only as a means of gaining money or simply as a stepping-stone to something better. Hence they do not study, do not read educational works, are not growing themselves, and cannot lead and inspire as those who can bring things new as well as old, into their every day teaching. It is a reproachful fact to the teachers and the town that none have attended the Normal School, and few, even Teacher's Institutes. Prudential committees do not fully realize that the success or failure of the school depends largely on their wisdom in selecting teachers; first-class teachers cannot be obtained for third-rate pay.

Some other circumstances have prevented the greatest usefulness of our schools. There has been a lack of harmony in some districts. Unfortunately, personal or sectional variances influence our schools more than it ought, and it is only by the utmost harmony that the greatest good is accomplished. Also, a lack of perfect understanding between parents and teachers. It

is not right, or well, for parents to circulate reports to a teacher's injury, unless they first let the teacher know, by personal information, or through prudential or supervising committee, the faults charged. Again, with very rare exceptions, it is unwise to employ teachers who have recently been pupils in the district where they teach. It is harder for the teacher, and if there be any jealous, evil disposed person in the district, trouble will surely be made, much mischief done, and the usefulness of the school greatly injured.

During the year we have completed the introduction of Harper's geographies, and for three years, at least, it is hoped the same will prove satisfactory to teachers, parents, and pupils. A change in readers is very much to be desired, and Franklin's readers are recommended, both on account of intrinsic merit, and the fact that several of the adjoining towns have already adopted this series.

There is great need of maps, dictionaries, and illustrative apparatus. At the last session of the Legislature, an act was passed authorizing the school officers to purchase a map of New Hampshire. We have been urged by the publishers to do so, but have not deemed it best to purchase, as there are other things much more imperatively demanded. The excellent maps in the special geographies of New England, obviate largely this need. A petition will be circulated asking the next Legislature to authorize the expenditure of the literary fund for the purchase of maps, books and apparatus. If this is granted and wisely expended, it will be of very great advantage to the schools.

DISTRICT No. 1.

Summer term was taught by Miss Cora Manahan. It was the teacher's first term, and although the school was very small was excellent. One class of small scholars made the greatest advancement I have ever seen made by any class in so short a time.

Winter term taught by E. F. Hastings. He did as good work as could be expected with such a variety of pupils. Six or seven different districts and towns came together to form this school.

DISTRICT No. 2.

Miss Knowlton taught the summer and fall terms, and proved an exception to the general rule, that a teacher is not successful at home, and in this school fully maintained her excellent reputation as a teacher.

Winter term, H. Alonzo Baker taught. The examination of this teacher, his success in teaching in other towns, and the appearance of the school when visited at the commencement, promised very great usefulness. The teacher's understanding was perfect, his manner of imparting good. At the end of eight weeks, a division arose about a vacation and the length of the term, and Mr. Baker finding that some were dissatisfied with his management of the school, chose to leave rather than remain to the close of the term. After a vacation of two weeks, Mr. S. W. Ferguson took the school, but as it is still in session no report can at this time be made.

DISTRICT No. 3.

Miss Bickford taught the summer and fall terms, and, though laboring against some unfavorable circumstances, had a good school and her final examinations were the most satisfactory I have ever witnessed in the district.

Winter term. Parker Smith is teaching at the time of submitting my report, with his usual diligence and success.

DISTRICT No. 4.

Mr. Smith taught both the summer and fall terms, to the great advancement of the pupils and satisfaction of the parents, and proved that man can succeed in doing woman's work.

Winter term, Miss Abby Todd, teacher. With larger scholars and a larger school, Miss Todd showed as conclusively that in the school room a woman can do a man's work and deserves equal pay. It has been a profitable year for Low Plain.

DISTRICT No. 5.

Both terms were taught by Mrs. Sarah J. Baker. Her long experience in teaching, her patience and perseverance fit her admirably for this school. It is a hard school on which to make a distinctive mark. It is saying all that need be said, she did the best she could, and no one could do better.

DISTRICT No. 6.

Summer term taught by Miss Alma Paine, a graduate of the Boston High School. This was her first term's work as teacher, and it was very successful. Her methods of teaching are excellent, and with this class of pupils she did all that could be done.

Fall term, Miss Augusta Colby, teacher. She has great excellencies, in devotion to the work, in system, in vivacity, keeping the scholars wide awake, doing a great deal and doing it well, and but for her lack of health, would be as nearly a perfect teacher as can be found for this grade of schools.

DISTRICT No. 7.

Miss Josie Baker taught the summer term and fully maintained the rank of the school and her reputation as a teacher, and the pupils of this district have been greatly favored by receiving for so many terms the instruction of so excellent a teacher.

Winter term, taught by Miss Addie F. Robbins. The school did not suffer by the change of teachers, Miss Robbins being an equally diligent and faithful teacher. Her system was different, and by attention to the teaching of facts and imparting general information, added greatly to the usefulness and success of the school.

Bespeaking for my successor the same patience, courtesy, and helpfulness which you have shown me, with the hope that the schools are none the worse for my supervision, and that the coming year's work may be progressive, I leave in your hands the important work of this office.

SCHOOL REPORT.

The Superintendent of Schools respectfully submits the following report:

DISTRICT No. 1.

Belden Morgan, prudential committee. The summer term was taught by Miss Lurette S. Knowlton, of New London. Length of school ten weeks.

Winter term was commenced by Mr. C. S. Averill, of Massachusetts. His health failed after three weeks of labor, so he was compelled to leave the school. Mr. Anthony Jewett, of Springfield, finished the school, (whole length of school eleven and one half weeks.) Mr. Jewett gave general satisfaction. Although the school was interrupted, the scholars made a commendable degree of progress.

DISTRICT No. 2.

Nathaniel Messer, committee. Teacher summer term, Miss Carrie H. Cooper, of Sutton. Length of school six weeks. Although the school was short, (too short for the teacher or scholars to do themselves justice.) Miss Cooper did good and efficient work in a quiet manner.

Both fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Lurette S. Knowlton. Length of terms—fall nine weeks, winter fifteen weeks. Miss Knowlton, has taught eleven terms of school, ten of them in the town, four in her own district, which speaks well for her. She teaches well.

DISTRICT No. 3.

Prudential committee, Edwin Burpee. The school year was divided into three terms, as follows: summer term, eight

weeks; fall, ten weeks; winter, ten weeks; taught by Miss Augusta M. Fellows, of Boscawen. It is Miss Fellow's first school. She entered into her work with enthusiasm, and maintained it to the close. She did the best she could. Her discipline was excellent. At the examination, some of the scholars showed excellent progress in their studies; others not as good as they might, or *ought*, with the labor that was done for them. No other school in town shows so large an absent and tardy record as this, which is one reason of no better success. A neglected school cannot be successful, any more than neglected business.

DISTRICT No. 4.

Nelson A. Todd, committee. Summer term of ten weeks, was very successfully taught by Miss Sarah Nelson, of Sutton, who is a wide-awake teacher, and imparts enthusiasm to her scholars. It was a good school.

Mr. Parker T. Smith, of Springfield, had charge of the winter term, (twelve weeks.) Mr. Smith is an old teacher, loves his work, is clear in his explanations, has the faculty of teaching. With two such successful teachers, this school is second to none in town, and has but one equal, that is District No. 7.

DISTRICT No. 5.

Charles Whitney, prudential committee. Miss Emma Wheeler, teacher, summer term; length of school, eight weeks. At my first visit, this school was very restless. Miss Wheeler, by her perseverance and patience, managed so that at the examination the school appeared *well*, and showed a commendable degree of improvement.

Miss Sarah Nelson, who taught the summer term in Dist. No. 4, had charge of the fall and winter terms. Length twenty weeks. At the examination, the school appeared well, and showed good progress, considering the ages of scholars. There is no other school in town that has so large per cent. of young children as this, and none that requires better teachers.

DISTRICT No. 6.

Prudential committee, Edwin F. Messer. Teacher, Miss Augusta A. Colby, both summer and winter terms. Length of summer term, nine weeks. Winter term, eight weeks. Miss Colby is an experienced teacher, has taught this school several terms before, which speaks better for her than praise from me. The school appeared well and showed that both teacher and scholars did their work well.

DISTRICT No. 7.

Summer term was taught by Miss Emma J. Davis. This was her first experience in teaching. She was thoroughly acquainted with the branches taught; was not confined to text books; had the faculty of imparting her ideas to others in a remarkable degree, which is necessary to succeed in teaching. Length of school ten weeks.

Winter term, Miss Addie F. Robbins, teacher. Miss Robbins has taught this school before. She had the confidence of parents and scholars, and deserved it. The school is second to none in town. Joseph C. Adams, prudential committee. Length of school eleven weeks.

 GENERAL REMARKS.

There has been in the aggregate, one hundred and sixty-seven and one-half weeks of school the past year, at an expense in teachers' wages of \$879. There have been employed nine different teachers who have given general satisfaction. There is one fault common to most of the teachers, which, if corrected, would aid materially in their usefulness. They are confined too closely to the text books. Instead of considering them the foundation on which to build, they treat them as the structure, or in other words, they teach just what is taught in the books, and no more. Most children can learn how to analyze a hard sentence or solve a difficult problem, or pronounce hard and long words, but if they do not know why a

sentence is thus analyzed or a problem thus solved, or the meaning of what they read, it does them but little good and is soon forgotten ; but give them the reason of a thing and see they understand it, they acquire knowledge that is practical and will be retained. Then, instead of spending a portion of their time each term in learning what they have forgotten during the vacation, they might commence the term at least where they left off the preceding term, and thus make constant improvement.

In accordance with the recommendation of the former superintendent, after making an examination, I made a change in reading books, substituting the Franklin series for the old, which I trust will be an improvement.
