

TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Orford, on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensing year. Also to choose one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, and one Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.
- 2. To hear the Budget of the Town and to raise and appropriate any money recommended therein, or to pass any vote relative thereto.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensing year, and make appropriations for the same.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town buildings.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Social Library and Orford Free Library.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote for the removal of snow from the Town roads, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 10. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for construction of the Class II. road known as Dame Hill Road, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1,138.50; or will accept State Aid for construction of Class V. roads, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$466.39
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to turn any unexpended balances of special appropriations into the general funds of the Town.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell any real estate acquired by Tax Deed.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.
- 14. To hear reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the Orford School Board and Citizens of the Orford School District:

I hereby submit my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Since my last report Louis Ramsay of the high school staff resigned to accept a headmastership, and Stanley Adamandares appointed to his position. Clarence P. Amadon is teacher at the Grammar School, and Alice B. Bewley at the Primary School. Dorothy Wallace is at the East Orford School, and Rosina Cummings at Mt. Cube. There are more changes than usual this year, but the work is motivating exceptionally we'll throughout the elementary schools. The report of the headmaster appears after this report. The enrollment is the highest in the history of the school and has reached the maximum for efficient work. A reorganization as offered in my last report or a similar one will have to be made if the enrollment increases another year.

The district closed the year with good assets of approximately \$500.00, and no liabilities. The average cost of elementary pupils is \$58.07, while that of the State is \$72.465. The buildings in general are in good repair except that the Orfordville school will need shingling another year, and the heating plant at the Orford Street building must be enlarged or an entirely new system installed. The present equipment is inadequate.

It is my opinion that the East Orford and Mt. Cube schools should be consolidated with Orfordville in September. In June, 1929, there were reported 603 one-room schools, and last year 476 in the State. The number was reduced 20 last year. The trend throughout the country is toward consolidation where larger classes and real competition can be effected. A man teacher can very well take the upper grades, and a woman teacher the lower grades, thus bringing more specialized instruction to the children of all three schools. Good roads and transportation are available. The Orfordville school is amply equipped with heat and water. Very little new equipment is needed. The situation seems ideal for consolidation. This would perhaps work some inconveni-

ence to a very few, but the good of the larger number must always be considered. The Board plans to put a fence across the front of the building.

To Allan M. McCurdy, Superintendent of Schools:

I am herewith submitting my ninth annual report

of the Orford High School.

Orford High School opened on September 4th with an enrollment of 76, divided by classes as follows: 20 seniors, 14 juniors, 15 sophomores, and 27 freshmen. Since then three pupils have left school.

Of the 73 pupils that we now have seven are taking the college preparatory course, 24 the commercial, and

42 the English course.

Of the number now enrolled 20 are from Fairlee, 13 from Lyme, 33 from Orford, 5 from Piermont, one from Vershire, and one from Wentworth.

Last fall a course of biology was introduced into the curriculum for juniors. Some seniors have been allowed to take it since it was not offered last year.

More books have been added to the reference library. The pupils have access to the following magazines: Review of Reviews, Literary Digest, Readers' Digest, National Geographic Magazine, Popular Science, Ladies' Home Journal, Woman's Home Companion, and the Saturday Evening Post. The Boston Herald is brought to the building daily. Some of the pupils subscribe, either individually or in groups, for The American Observer. These magazines are used for class-room work in current events, in English work, and for reading for enjoyment. As wide a reading as possible is encouraged.

Louis Ramsay, our efficient submaster for the past two years, resigned last June to accept a position as headmaster of Errol High School. His place has been taken by Stanley Adamandares, a graduate of Keene Norman School. Mr. Adamandares is well fitted for the position in character, scholarship, and athletic ability.

Both boys' and girls' basket ball teams began to practice in the fall in Davison's barn. It was felt by

both the pupils and their parents that it was not a suitable place for winter practice because it could not be heated.

In December it was voted by the Masons to tear out the stage in Masonic Hall, cover the windows, and change the lights so it could be used for basket ball both by the town and high school teams. The work was quickly done so that at the opening of school in January the teams had a good hall in which to practice and hold their games. The Masons have made the expense as small as possible so it is hoped that the gate receipts from games may cover the running expenses.

The seniors gave their annual play in Fairlee Town Hall on November 28. They cleared about \$60, which will be used for graduation expenses and for a class out-

ing.

In the latter part of December committees were chosen to prepare for the Winter Carnival which was held on January 25. There were a number of contestants in the winter sports events from Bradford and Orford, but not as many as there would have been if there had not been so much sickness and such intense cold.

The Carnival Ball was held in the evening at which Nellie Drew was crowned as Queen. There was a large attendance, but because of the expenses necessary for an affair of that kind, only about \$17 were cleared. This

has been used for basket ball expenses.

The members of the high school appreciate the support given to the carnival by the people of Orford and Fairlee. The business men of both towns contributed

generously.

What is most needed in the high school now are courses in domestic arts for girls and in mechanic arts for boys. These courses would be better adapted and more useful for many of our boys and girls than the courses we now have. Teachers and equipment would be furnished by the State if room could be provided for the class work.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the people of both Orford and Fairlee for the splendid cooperation which they give to the high school in all its undertakings.
