

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Weare qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

First. To choose Selectmen and Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Second. To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.

Third. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Fourth. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to repair highways and bridges the ensuing year.

Fifth. To make provision for the collection of taxes.

Sixth. To see if the town will vote to buy four or more oxen to work on the road machines.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of fifty dollars to enable Stark Fellows Post, G. A. R., to decorate the graves of their fallen comrades.

Eighth. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for school purposes in addition to the amount required to be raised by law.

Ninth. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to repair the buildings on the town farm.

Tenth. To see if the town will vote to appropriate two hundred dollars to be expended for books to add to the town library.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to build ten or more horse sheds on the town house lot, and appropriate money for the building of the same.

Twelfth to see what action the town will take in relation to building a soldiers' and sailors' monument at Weare Centre.

Thirteenth. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to repair school houses.

Fourteenth. To see what action the town will take in relation to disposing of the town histories and pass any vote relating thereto.

THE LIBRARY.

TO THE CITIZENS OF WEARE:

Your library trustees have placed the books belonging to the library in the custody of Miss Eva Simons of Weare Centre, as librarian. We have received 100 volumes from the state. Four volumes from Rhoda Breed as a gift. We would suggest that others, who have books to spare should loose no time in presenting them to the town, for its benefit and for safe keeping. No books can be lost to the town, unless stolen, as a correct account is kept of every book taken, and it is hoped a general interest will be taken in this library. No doubt, if this is the case, it will be an important factor in the future intelligence and prosperity of the town. We should all remember the young people growing up around us, and that "just as the twig is bent the tree is inclined." In view of the fact that up to this time from Jan. 1st. to Feb. 25, 134 volume have been taken out of the library, and that a good town library gives character to the town, we recommend the raising of two hundred dollars (\$200) to be expended on books this year. The \$25 voted by the town a year ago, has not been expended from the fact of the resignation of one of the board some months ago. It is in our custody and will be used as soon as circumstances will permit. We append below a list of the books, including 18 volumes belonging to the town, prior to the establishment of the library.

SCHOOL REPORT.

The school board, in compliance with former usage, respectfully submit the following report of the several schools in town:

A new school house has been built on Barnard Hill during the past year, so that we have had fifteen schools, the same as were run under the old school system. It will be seen by this that the outlying divisions of the town are not to be deprived of their school privileges, as some of our people feared they might be when the new law came into operation, but on the other hand, they have more weeks of schooling and better school privileges than before. It appears that the better acquainted the people become with the present school system, the better they like it, and we think it would be difficult to get a vote of the district to return to the old system. We find, by looking over old reports, that some of our small schools had only ten weeks schooling during the year, and had to board the teachers among the families in order to get that amount. We would be pleased to give every scholar equal school privileges, which we think is almost an impossibility, but we have divided the schooling as we thought the circumstances demanded. Our schools the past year have been generally satisfactory. The teachers have discharged their duties in an acceptable manner, and there has been no serious difficulty in any of our schools. Yet there is room for improvement. It is surprising to see how rapidly scholars pass through our common schools; there are not more than thirty in our schools that were there seven years ago. According to statistics, the average time of our scholars in our common schools is from eight to nine years. Those scholars who do not intend to go to any other school could use a longer time to good advantage.

While visiting the schools, it is interesting to note the progress made from term to term, and from year to year, and our observation has taught us that there are four classes of scholars, one that learn easy and remember what they learn, and consequently make rapid progress; another that learn easy and forget easy, and therefore make fair progress; another that acquire knowledge with much difficulty, yet remember what

they learn, and they also make fair progress; and still another that acquire slowly and forget quickly; this class, therefore, make very slow progress, it matters not how hard the teacher may work. It is a good qualification with teachers to be able to understand the various peculiarities of their scholars, so that they can present their lessons to them in such a manner as to make an impression on their minds, and thereby keep them interested in their studies. We are pleased to say that we have some teachers of this kind.
