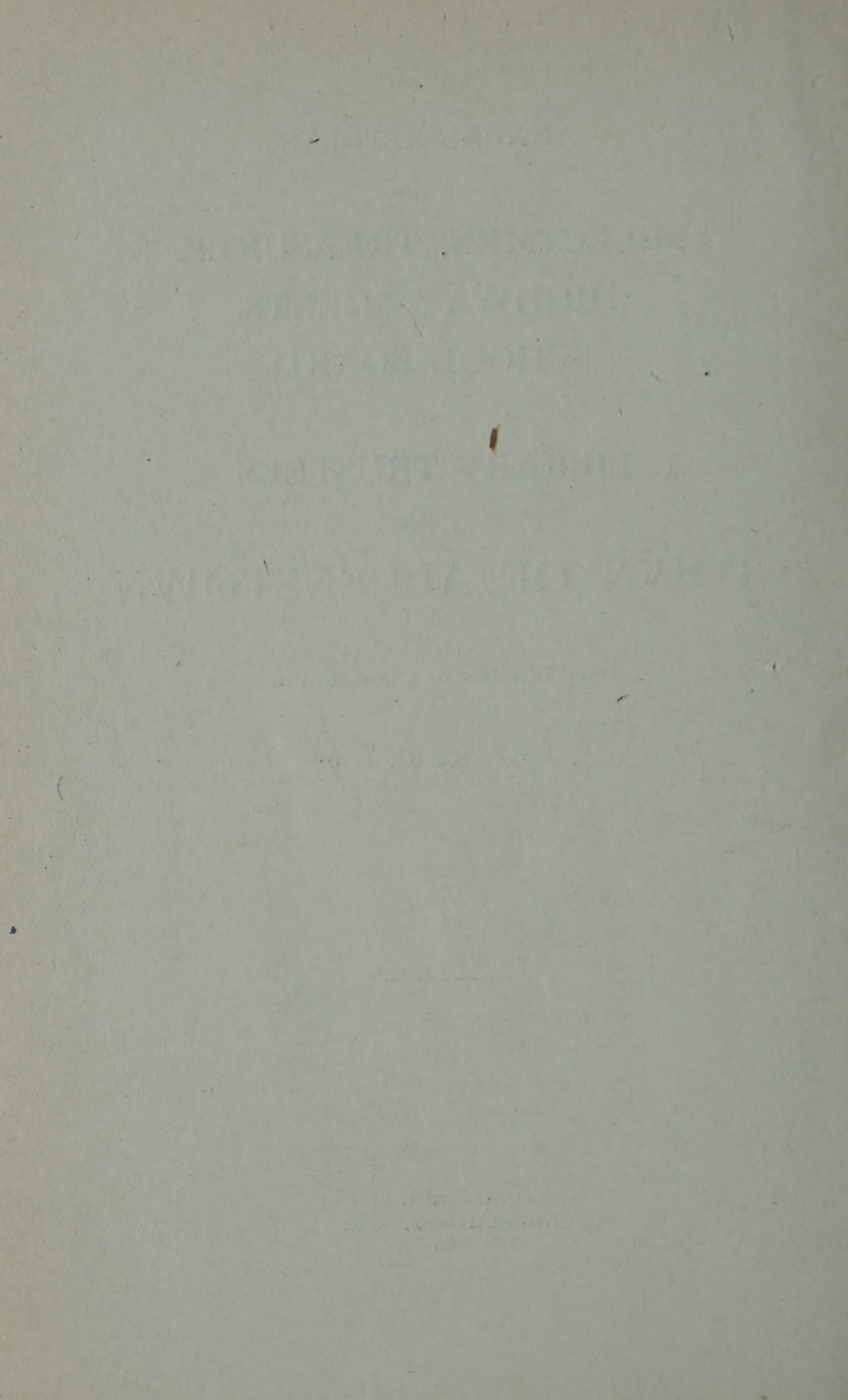

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Allenstown in the (L. S.)
County of Merrimack in said state, qualified to vote in
Town Affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the New Opera House in said Town, on Tuesday the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing. (See list of officers.)
- ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same. Voted to raise \$3,500.00.
- ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate two hundred dollars to be paid the District Nurse Association for the support of a nurse in town. The money to be used at the discretion of the Association, under the advice of the physicians. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars for the purpose of securing the services of the Suncook Cornet Band for a series of free concerts. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars for the observance of Memorial Day. Adopted.

- ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary amount of money to secure state aid for the permanent improvements of its main highways. Dismissed.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for the maintenance of state highways within the town. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of ten hundred and thirteen dollars (\$1,013.25) for maintenance of state highways, to be applied to trunk line maintenance. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to build a new road on Turnpike Street from the residence of Fred St. John leading to the St. John Baptist cemetery, and raise and appropriate money therefor. Voted to raise six hundred dollars.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the salary of the night officer to three dollars per night. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to install one or two lights on Granite Street in the vicinity of the residence of Henry Denencour. Voted to install two lights.
- ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to purchase a fire truck and raise and appropriate money for the same. Voted to raise \$2,500.
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will vote to lay a sewer pipe from some point in front of the land owned by Moses Dickey on Cross Street to connect with the sewer on Granite Street and also to see what sum the town will raise and appropriate to pay for same. Dismissed

ARTICLE 14. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees of officers, heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. Voted to accept all reports as printed.

ARTICLE 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SCHOOL REPORT.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens:

I call your attention to certain provisions of the new school law which it is your privilege and duty to perform.

REGULATIONS FOR TEMPORARY APPROVAL OF SCHOOL- HOUSES.

For School Year 1919-20 Only.

1. Lighting shall be principally from the pupils' left and rear and no windows shall be permitted in the front of any schoolroom. The ratio of window area to floor area shall be not less than one to five. Ceilings shall be white or light cream color, and curtains of a light tint shall be provided wherever needed.

2. Equipment for heating must be adequate to furnish a minimum temperature of 68 degrees, and some provision must be made for ventilation without direct draft on the pupils.

3. Floors must be in good condition and oiled or swept with some dust-laying compound. Walls must be in good repair and painted some light color. Papered walls have only temporary approval.

4. Toilets must be decent and in sanitary condition. They must be located in buildings free from obscene markings and furnishing proper privacy. The vaults must be fly-proof and properly ventilated. The seats should be provided with covers and in the boys' toilets a double seat or urinal should be provided. Single toilets for both sexes will not be approved except for small schools and then only if the entrance is from the schoolroom only.

5. Water for drinking must be provided in properly covered receptacle with faucet or bubbler. Facilities for

washing the hands must also be provided. Common towels or drinking cups are prohibited by regulations of the State Board of Health.

6. Every schoolhouse must be provided, as required by law, with a flag and the proper means for displaying it.

7. This list of minimum requirements for temporary approval is intended to cover only such changes as are required to make schoolhouses decent and safe for children and in many cases will be less than has been already done. Full regulations for the permanent approval of schoolhouses will be prepared and placed in the hands of school boards before the budgets for the next school year are made up. These regulations will require the adoption of a progressive plan of schoolhouse betterment.

8. It is the duty of all school boards to see that schoolhouses are properly cleaned and that they are kept in clean and sanitary condition by suitable janitor service. Vaults should be cleaned at least twice each year and some effective deodorant provided for constant use. Proper care of school buildings is as essential to their approval as their construction.

REGULATIONS ON HEALTH AND PHYSICAL WELFARE.

For the Year 1919-20 Only.

All districts which have adopted medical inspection in accordance with the Laws of 1913, chapter 83, shall comply with the provisions of the law.

In all other districts there shall be employed, as the school board may direct, a school physician, or a school nurse or school nurses, who shall make not less than one annual examination of pupils, note and record their physical condition, together with diseases and defects, including dental defects, notify teachers and parents and with the aid of teachers and superintendents labor to secure remedial treatment when necessary, provided, however, in districts where the school physician and nurses are under the control of the local board of health, such control shall be exercised by

said board. All tests shall be made as the law provides and all reports made upon prescribed forms.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE.

Unless excused for physical or mental reasons, any child of school age must attend a public or an approved private school all the time such school is in session. ●

It is the particular duty of the truant officer to see that this law is enforced.

I know of no other civil law so frequently violated by otherwise law abiding citizens as is the School Attendance Law.

Detaining pupils at home for the purpose of purchasing clothing for them or allowing them to attend moving pictures shows in the afternoon or visiting friends, are the excuses usually received by the teachers for absences.

It is quite evident that the parent or custodian does not realize that he is not only breaking a useful law but is making a truant of the pupil.

The effect of non-attendance at school is most pernicious both to pupil and school. A day out of school is a day lost in the pupil's school life. A large per cent of retardation or lack of promotion is caused by irregular attendance.

A child of normal bodily and mental health should have completed the eight grades of school at the age of fourteen or earlier.

If for no higher reason than a financial one a parent should cause his child to attend school regularly as the Attendance and Child Labor Laws prohibit the employment of children under fourteen years of age.

AMERICANIZATION.

A number of factors growing out of the World War forcibly aroused a nation wide interest in Americanization. The Surgeon General of the Army submitted a report showing the illiteracy in the draft camps.

Tests made in the 28 camps showed an average of illit-

eracy of 24.9 per cent. This represents a per cent of the illiterates between the ages of twenty-one and thirty-one.

These men are presumably recently out of school and illiteracy is less between these ages than between any other adult years.

If this percentage is one to four in our best class (not able to read a newspaper or write a letter home) what would be the number of all our people unable to read and write?

These facts and similar awakened in our people the need of education, of the foreign born, in the English language and American ideals.

THE TEACHER-SHORTAGE AND SALARY.

General Frank S. Streeter, chairman of the New Hampshire State Board of Education at a conference at Durham, December 31, 1919, said:

“There are now 50 of our schools closed because of lack of teachers, and probably 80 or more will be closed within a few weeks. From statistical experience we may expect there will be withdrawals of between 400 and 450 teachers at the end of the present year. Our two normal schools will graduate less than 100, which is about the usual number.

“There is no certainty of filling the vacant places with a sufficient number of competent teachers.

“The State Board frankly admits that the situation is serious and is a cause for anxiety, but it is not ready to admit that New Hampshire cannot protect itself and its schools against the threatening danger.”

It is an acknowledged fact that the shortage has been caused by the low salaries paid teachers as compared with wages paid stenographers, clerical positions, and women laborers in other industries.

The remedy is this—increase in salary.

In making a salary schedule, I quote from the report of the United States Commissioner of Education.

1. “The salary of a teacher at the very least should be a living wage, large enough that a teacher may live in com-

fort, purchase necessary books for professional reading and culture and to take part in the social life of the community. The salary should be sufficient not only for these present needs but large enough for a saving account."

2. "The maximum salary should be large enough to retain the service of the most efficient teachers and to induce others to enter the service."

THE WORK ACCOMPLISHED IN THE SCHOOLS.

Although the school attendance was greatly hindered by the prevailing epidemic of influenza, nevertheless the work accomplished in the schools has been up to standard and in many cases the classes have done more than the minimum requirements as established by the State Board of Education.

The continued service of the teachers has clearly proved the value of retaining efficient teachers in schools.

The work of the teachers in their special lines, music, drawing, domestic arts and manual training, has been progressive and successful and has proved the value of these branches as educational factors.

I ask of the citizens their hearty co-operation, as in former years, for the carrying into effect completely the new requirements of the School Regulations and Laws.

In order that this may be accomplished a sufficiently large appropriation must be made at the Annual School District Meeting. Otherwise it will devolve upon the State Authorities and the expense charged to the district.

I wish to express my appreciation for the hearty assistance and sympathetic co-operation of school officers, citizens and teachers.

We hope to be able to give a public entertainment this year, aside from the graduation, if it can be accomplished without too much extra work on the part of teachers and pupils.

It is a matter of regret that we have no school orchestra and that there is apparently no interest among the pupils in studying some instrument.

Class instruction on piano, violin, cornet and other instruments is being given in many places and a plan could be worked out in Allenstown, where the classes are small, whereby every child could learn the rudiments of playing one or more of these instruments.

At the exhibition of this work last June each girl had a table showing the work she had accomplished during the year. Articles of clothing such as dresses, underwear, sweaters, crocheting and knitting were displayed.

In conclusion, I wish to thank you, the school board and townspeople for their hearty co-operation which has tended to add to the success of the work.
