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

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the school board and citizens of Alstead:

I am pleased to submit herewith my fourth annual report on your schools.

The whole number of children registered in the several schools last year was 141. Of this number 15 had been previously registered in some other district in the state. There were 66 boys and 60 girls of these registered in Alstead alone. Five children were registered in elementary schools in neighboring districts. To offset this we had two elementary children registered in our schools and three in the first year of high; two from Langdon and one from Acworth. There were seven trachers in the district with no changes during the year. The average salary paid was \$820.28. The average for the state for the same period was \$916.42. The percent of attendance for the year was 88.7. The percent for the state was 93.46 for the same time. One teacher held a state certificate; five licenses and one a permit.

REPAIRS

The desire of the people to have the school buildings as near right as possible and that as soon as possible was very much in evidence last year at the annual meeting. This is a very encouraging sign. On motion from the floor \$200 more than the amount asked for by the board was raised for repairs. This is all the more creditable since the district faced the necessity of building a new building in the Mine region. Immediately after the meeting a public spirited gentleman came to me and

offered \$50 to put the toilets at the village school in decent shape. This has been done. While chemical toilets in the main building would be more desirable, the ones now in use are clean, sanitary and free from markings.

The primary room of the village building has been thoroughly renovated, the walls tinted as well as the ceiling and new blackboards have been installed. The old ones were simply plaster, painted over. These crumbled and cracked, causing an ugly appearance and a very uneven surface to use.

The plan for the Forristall school was to get more light into the room. On examination it was found that the sills of the building were considerably decayed. Since these needed to be replaced soon it was thought best to spend what little money was available on windows, leaving the desks as they were, and figure on moving the building down its own length or more at the same time turning the window side toward the south. There have been 10 pupils registered in this school this year but not more than 7 or 8 in attendance at one time. The toilets here are now in good shape. Since the number of pupils in this school is small and since this is so they can be placed in the best lighted parts of the room, I would recommend that this building be left as it is until the East school can be put in good shape. Here we have nearly 25 pupils and here repairs of a very permanent nature ought to be made.

MINE BUILDING

The total cost of this building ready for occupancy with desks and blackboard installed was \$1,052. That all may know what this means I set forth the following: The building is 24×28 feet with a 9 foot post. The studding, 2×4 , are set 2 feet on centers. The sills are 6×6 inches with a 6 inch center beam. The sleepers are 8×2 inches, set on top of sills 2 feet on centers. The outside is boarded with novelty boarding over heavy building paper. The roof is covered with three-ply roofing laid

on closely fitted boards on rafters, 2x6 inches, laid 2 feet on centers.

There are 4 windows on the south side and 3 on the east. This brings the light in on the pupils' left and over the left shoulder. The main room is 24x24 feet, finished with beaver toard, paneled at the joints. The floor is double laid with building paper between the rough boards and the fir finish surface. There is a good coat room 4x24 feet, out of which two doors open into the room proper. The woodshed and toilets are attached. All in all, this is a rather creditable piece of work from the view point of convenience and comfort. The land, the site of the old Newman place, was given by John Sarvinasky to be used as long as a school is maintained.

SCHOOL WORK

I am pleased to report a very creditable showing in the several schools in the main branches. Of this I am certain for standard tests have been given, and results compared with other districts.

In special tests in arithmetic and spelling for the eighth grade Alstead made a score of 87 per cent. My next closest score from another district was 71.1 percent. This was for spelling. The arithmetic score was 81.2. This test in arithmetic was given to the children of the ninth grade in Springfield. Mass., in 1916. The average percent there attained was 29.46.

THE FIRST YEAR HIGH

The purpose of this year of work is to accommodate those children who are anxious for more education but who are not able to get away or whose parents are unwilling to send them away at such an early age. If a child wants a general high school course or start on a commercial course he can do the work in Alstead as well as elsewhere. We cannot teach Latin or much other foreign language or domestic science to any

extent. These could be done with considerable outlay. The additional cost is now about \$150 per year. The tuition from neighbors covered this last year. The work now with the three other classes makes a very heavy schedule for the teacher. The two girls who finished there last year and who are now in Walpole are doing about the same grade of work as at Alstead. This shows that the thoroughness of the work is about the same. The boy who transferred to Bellows Falls high school is doing his work well there.

VACCINATION

I learn from the state board that there are 12 percent of the children in school illegally due to not having been vaccinated. We have a little over 20 per cent on this same basis. I urge all to see to it that their children are vaccinated, or have a proper excuse from a physician stating that the child is not physically fit to be vaccinated.

In conclusion allow me to thank the school board for its support and advice; the parents, teachers and children for kind co-operation in the many problems that have confronted us all.
