#### TOWN WARRANT

#### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookline, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Building in said Brookline on Tuesday, the eleventh (11th) day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and all other Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.

4. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for High-ways and Bridges.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Public Library.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purchase of basic books by the Public Library or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 to help defray the cost of swimming instruction for Town children or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

8. To see if the Town will elect a Bicentennial Committee consisting of seven (7) members or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of funds from the "Captial Reserve Fund for the Bicentennial Celebration" to be used By the Bicentennial Committee, or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to defray the cost of Town decorations for the Bicentennial Celebration or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

11. To see if the Tom will vote to authorize the "War Memorial Committee" to purchase a monument for the Veterans of World War II for the sum of \$866.71, and to further authorize said committee to erect the monument on the grounds of Daniels Academy Building. (By Petition)

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$866.71 from the "Capital Reserve Fund for War Memorial", said sum to be used to purchase the "World War II" Monument by the "War Memorial Committee" to have said foundation constructed, and the monument thereon. (By Petition)

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the purpose of excavating, and constructing a masonry foundation for the War Memorial Monument, and to authorize the "War Memorial Committee" to have said foundation constructed, and the monument placed thereon. (By Petition)

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for Memorial Dav.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the cutting and care of trees or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Fire Engineers and the Board of Selectmen to dispose of the said "Old Fire Station on Main Street", or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

17.. To see if the Town will vote to dispose of the "Old Town Ambulance" or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Radio Equipment Fund. (By Petition)

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for Water Holes. (By Petition)

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the Firemen's pay from \$1.50 to \$1.70 per hour at all fires or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for new Fire Equipment. (By Petition)

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$821.80 to defray the annual cost of the "Group Alerting and Dispatch System" or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition) 23.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be placed in the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund or take any action relative thereto. (Be Petition)

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$530.00 to secure State Aid for permanant improvements of highways.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropirate the sum of \$500.00 for cutting of brush along Town Roads.

26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

27. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on property taxes.

28 To see if the Town will vote to charge a penalty of twenty cents on each poll tax unpaid after September first.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Civil Defense.

30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a three year contract for janitor at Daniels Academy Building.

31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a three year contract for the purchase of fuel oil for the Town Hall and Fire Station.

32. To see if the Town will vote to require that three bids of equal specifications are submitted for all labor and/or materials of \$100.00 or more before a contract is awarded or authorized by anyone for indebtedness to which the Town may be liable. (By Petition)

33. To see if the Town will vote to require the Selectmen to include the cost of each subject on the warrant. Furthermore, each subject should be listed in order of cost beginning with the subject of the highest cost first consecutively reducing down to the lowest cost subject last. (By Petition)

34. To see if the Town will vote to limit the salary of the Tax Collector to \$750.00 annually. (By Petition)

35. To see if the Town will vote to have all properties re-assessed by the State Tax Commission at the earlist possible date. (By Petition)

36. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the re-appraisal of the Town of Brookline as directed by the State Tax Commission; said re-appraisal to be decided by the voters, or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

37. To see if the Town will vote to require the Moderator to call for a paper ballot at Town Meetings if requested by any voter. (By Petition)

38. To see if the Town will vote to require all Fireman to be paid by individual checks. (By Petition)

39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the care of cemeteries or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

40. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to start work on a Town Map or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

41. To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to Chapter 31, New Hampshire Revised Statues Annotated, and all other legal power, to establish or continue to body to be known as Melendy Pond Authority, said Authority to be compsed of six members to be chosen from time to time in accordance with the provisions hereinafter set forth. Said Authority shall serve without pay and shall have as its purpose the ownership, administration, maintenance and control, all in the best interests of the Town, of the property known as the Melendy Pond tract, and said Authority shall receive forthwith from the Town title by deed to said property. Five members of the Authority shall be elected at this Town Meeting, one to serve for a term of one year, one to serve for a term of two years, one to serve for a term of three years, one to serve for a term of four years, and one to serve for a term of five years. At each successive Town Meeting hereafter, a member shall be elected to serve for a term of five years to replace the member whose term expires at such Town Meeting. Each of foregoing members shall be a resident of the Town when elected and and throughout his period of membership. In the event of the death, incapacity, or termination of Town residence by an elected member, his successor shall be elected at the next Town Meeting to serve the unexpired portion of the term of such member. This sixth member of the Authority shall be any person duly elected from time to time by a majority of lesses of the lots in the Melendy Pond tract, and in the event that no such person shall be so elected, the other five members of the Authority shall elect a a sixth member to serve until such a person shall be so elected. The deed of

conveyance to the Authority shall restrict the Authority from conveying legal title to any portion of the Melendy Pond tract to any person, firm or corporation. The Authority shall submit at each Town Meeting an annual report of its administration of the property including an accounting of all receipts and expenditures and a statement of any balance then held by the Authority. The Town may dissolve the Authority by two-thirds vote at any Town meeting, and the deed of the property to the Authority shall contain the provision that title to the property shall revert to the Town subject to then existing leases and encumbrances immediately on such dissolution of the Authority. (By Petition)

42. To see if the Town will officially adopt the Mill Seal in current use as the Town Seal.

43. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Charlotte Wright Memorial Fund for the Brookline Public Library. (By Petition)

44. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following legacies:

- 1. The sum of \$200.00, the income of same to used for the perpetual care of the Grover C. Farwell lot.
- 2. The sum of \$200.00, the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Geroge F. Farwell lot.
- 3. The sum fo \$100.00, the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Wesley Jillson lot.
- 4. The sum of \$200.00, the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Oscar and Eva Elliott lot.
- 5. The sum of \$200.00, the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Carl E. and Blanche Clifford lot.
- 6. The sum of \$200.00, the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Dunphee lot.
- 7. The sum of \$200.00, the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Edward Lancey lot.

45. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of Forest Fire Warden & District Chief

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted matches is an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older we like to have woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result - escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3 To safely dispose of rubbish preferable at the town dump. If you

- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn
  - a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for all debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on notification of the warden.
  - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on grass by householders between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

#### REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The Brookline Public Library had a very successful year. The total circulation of books was 8,642. Of these, 2,949 were adult and 5,963 were juvenile, making an increase of almost 2,500 books over last year.

In February, people interested in the library started an organization called THE FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY. The main purpose of this organization is to help our library in any way it can.

Mrs. Geraldine Phillips was appointed the new Librarian following the death of Mrs. Charlotte Wright on April 20. 1968. Mrs. Wright had been our Librarian for more than twenty years. Friends of Mrs. Wright have started a memorial fund.

During April, the library moved to its new rooms. We wish to thank everyone who participated in painting and helped in moving.

Story hours were held during the summer months by the FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY. With the FRIENDS help, the library is now open on Monday nights from 7 until 9 p.m. In September, THE FRIENDS group started showing films once a month. These films included something of interest for all ages.

Open house was held on November 19, 1968, in order that the townspeople could see the new rooms. The total number of books acquired during the year was 501. Almost 300 of these were donated. Fifty record albums, new drapee, two file cabinets, with films and books were also donated to the library.

#### Annual Report of the Fire Department 1968

#### **Building Report**

During the past year the Fire Department has moved into the new fire House. <sup>TTL</sup> e members of the Department have brought materials and furnished the labor to put in a Meeting Room and shelves for the Radio Room. The firemen worked many hours installing the fire alarm system. Most of the wire for the alarm system was donated. The landscaping was accomplished with the help of the following townspeople: Edward Veno donated the loam, Clarence Farwell the loading, Arthur Bent Jr. and Ralph Bent the hauling, Eddy Whitcomb donated his tractor for the leveling, Arvo Bedders the Hot Top which Clarence Farwell laid. The firemen seeded the lawn and planted the shrubs.

## Equipment

During the past year the pump on the 1929 truck has been rebuilt, the only cost to the town being the bearings. Extensive repairs have been completed on the 1939 truck. All the fire engines are in good condition now.

The town has bought two Scott Air Paks. The firemen donated an Emerson Resuscitator. Three protective coats were bought with town funds. The chief and assistant chief purchased their own coats, boots, and helments. Two firemen purchased boots of their own.

This year we are asking for new coats and boots. After twenty years use, the old ones are worn out. 500 feet of 1-1/8" hose is also needed.

#### Training

The firemen completed a course of "Ventilation" offered by the New Hampshire Fire Training Service.

### **REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD 1968**

Since this group comprised a large cross section of our community we felt an amendment to our zoning code might be what the Town desired at this time, hence, we have offered the recently advertised amendment for the Town's consideration.

#### Conservation Commission Report

The Conservation Commission was not as active in 1968 as in the first year of operation. The principal area of interest has been in the preservation of the Nissitissit River. Members of the Commission have been active participants in the discussions and plans which have led to the formation of the Nissitissit River Land Trust, Inc.

The Trust was incorporated in December, 1968 and has as its object: "to engage in and otherwise promote for the benefit of the people of the surrounding area, the preservation of the Nissitissit River and its surrounding lands as a natural area or type of "wild river", to preserve the quality of the environment and the natural resources of the land, marshland, woodland and open spaces, and the plant and animal life therein, and the unique scenic and historic sites, and the maintenance of the waters of the Nissitissit River unpolluted and clear-running".

To concept of the trust was developed to overcome some of the difficulties of working with the conservation groups of three different towns and two different states through which the Nissitissit flows.

Land acquisition for the Trust has been given a good start with the donation of a 10 acre tract in Brookline by Jeff Smith of Hollis.

Membership in the organization is being actively sought, with details still to be worked out during the winter months.

Hopefully, with the work of organizing the Nissitissit River Land Trust now out of the way, other worthwhile conservation projects will be studied in the coming months.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY LIBRARY

## USE OF THE OLD FIRE STATION

At the 1968 annual Town Meeting Mr. C. Thistleton moved, Mr. R. Kecy seconded, and the town approved a motion that the "Moderator appoint a committee to study the cost of using the fire station on Main Street as a library and report back to the next Town Meeting". The committee appointed consisted of the selectmen, library trustees, and Geraldine Phillips.

The committee met during November to analyze the proposal that the library use the old fire station and determined that building maintenance, heat installation, fuel, electricity, etc. would use a large amount of funds which could be better utilized on books and other directly beneficial items.

The committee recommends that the library not occupy or otherwise utilize the old fire station, however, as the Committee did not go into extensive investigation of the Fire Station, it is felt that the Town may wish to conduct further investigation.

Article 6. We voted to authorize the use of the two vacant rooms in Daniels Academy for the Brookline Public Library, until the study Committee reports on the cost of using the Main Street Fire Station as a Library.

Articles 9 & 10. We voted that payment on principal of Serial Notes and interest in the Fire Department Budget.

Article 29. We adopted a 9 PM curfew for all minors under the age of 16.

When all ballots were counted and results announced the meeting was adjourned at 4:35 AM.

# ADMINISTRATIVE SCHOOL REPORT

To the Citizens of Brookline:

The responsibility of the school, in our democratic society, is to provide an educational program within which framework all students may become all they are capable of becoming. We are continually driving towards fulfilling this goal, as we move forward, only to pause a mement to review the past.

Our year began under the fine leadership of John A. Murphy, Jr., Superintendent of Schools. Mr. Murphy resigned from this position during the summer of 1968 when he accepted a position for advancement. The impact of Mr. Murphy and his untiring efforts will long be felt in Supervisory Union #40. Great strides in education were made during his reign as superintendent here.

After Mr. Murphy's resignation, Mr. Donald Desmarais, Hollis High School Principal, was appointed to fulfill the role of Superintendent until an interim superintendent could be located. Mr. Desmarais is to be congratulated for his outstanding efforts as acting superintendent for Supervisory Union #40.

In August, we were indeed fortunate to locate Mr. Lewis F. Foote, Retired Superintendent, to guide and direct us as Acting Superintendent for the period of August 1 to December 20. An Admirable job was done by Mr. Foote. In December, Supervisory Union #40 found their new Superintendent to again lead the districts toward fulfilling its educational philosophy.

Another of our fine leaders found his opportunity to further his education. Mr. Edward J. Lawton, Teacher Consultant for the past two years, resigned in August to pursue a Doctoral Program at the University of Virginia. Mr. Lawton worked closely with the elementary staff and should be congratulated for the improvements that he has made in the elementary program of our Union. In August, A Teacher Consultant was appointed replacing Mr. Lawton to contine his role.

The addition of Mrs. Mary Dulac, school secretary, to our staff has been greatly appreciated by both myself and the term. Mrs. Dulac has done much to ease the burden to non-teaching paperwork which, previously, the teachers had to carry. Thus, she has been able to free them to devote more time to their primary responsibility - maching children.

Withethe resignation in Jure, 1968 of Mrs. Lillian Barton, Mrs. Betty Hall has been odded as Reading Consultant for the Schools of Supervisory Union #40. Mr. Harry Tong, cur Music teacher, continues to instruct the school childrer in Music one half day per week, and Mrs. Charlotte Saxe, Speech Specialist, works with those students who exhibit certain difficulties in speaking. Mark Lard Gardner continues as Guidance Counselor for Supervisory Unio. #40 Elementary students, while Mrs. Margaret McInnis remains our School Nurse.

No report on our staff would be complete without mentioning the continued concern and deducation of Mrs. Eliza Wright, school custodian.

The enrollment figure of 214 students represents an increase of eleven pupils from January of 1968.

Our sprots program continues this year, and the hope is that it can be extended to include more children than were able to take part last year.

The release of the principal this year from teaching for part of the school day has enabled him to be of more in the service to his staff. This makes for happic, relations among star members which, in turn, has its effect on classroom performance.

The motion was made by Beatrice Hall that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$222,711 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of the school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. It was seconded by Alan Fessenden.

An ammendment  $\rightarrow$  the motion was made by Rudolf Peterson to change the figure to read \$414.711. It was seconded by Philip Chandler. A discussion followed. The ammendment as put to a vote by show of hands. and the vote was as follows:

The ammendment was defeated. The motion was put to a voice vote and the Ayes carried without dissent. Closed under Article 5 and opened under Article 6.

# AREA SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

At the 1968 Brookline School meeting formation of an AREA School Study Committee was authorized to consider AREA School possibilities for Jr. and Sr. High students. The committee has asked a number of surrounding towns if they would consider an AREA school arrangement with Brookline. Of the region's town and cities, Hollis was the only one in a position to develop an AREA agreement for submission to the voters at the 1969 meeting. Since Hollis is also a good geographical choice and the Nashua School Board indicated to Brookline that the future of students in Nashua was uncertain, your AREA Committee decided to form a joint Hollis-Brookline Committee to prepare an AREA School agreement for the voters' considerations.

An AREA School plan is a tuition contract between participating school districts. The essential elements are:

- 1. The sending district (Brookline) pays the receiving district (Hollis) tuition calculated on actual operating costs plus a facilities (rengal) charge.
- 2. The receiving district agrees to provide facilities.
- 3. A contract is signed for a term of 20 years.
- 4. The State provides increased financial aid to the receiving district-10% more building aid and variable payments per student crossing town boundaries (\$50 to \$60).

The agreement submitted for your approval has been printed in its entirety and distributed to al voters. The following summary points out the important features of the proposed contract.

Summary of Authorized Regional Enrollment and (AREA) School Contract

- A The Hollis AREA School is the name.
- B. Tuition is calculated from actual operating expenses plus rental charge. Transportation is not included in determining tuition rate. All State and Federal aid reduce operating costs except Foundation aid and sweepstakes. Cost per pupil is determined from average daily attendance. Rental per student is calculated from the formula;

2% of the paid-up value of the building plus principal and interest payments less State aid, divided by the building capacity.

- C. All State AREA incentive aid reduces operating cost for tuition computation.
- D. The first year, Brookline grades 7, 8 and 9 would attend, the high school students continuing to go to Nashua, Each year the incoming 7th grade would be added until all six grades are attending. Total enrollment of the AREA school would be about 550.
- E. The AREA plan would begin July 1, 1969 and operate for a minimum of 20 years (required by State).
- F. All Brookline students must attend Hollis unless the parents pay the tuition elsewhere or special schooling, not available at Hollis, is required.
- G. Hollis agrees to provide facilities.
- H. There are two billing dates per year, January 1 and June 1.
- I. Two joint school board meetings per year are provided ro the purpose of information, advice and consulting.
- J. Hollis agrees to provide progress and attendance reports and that the same school regulations apply to both Hollis and Brookline students.
- K. The written agreement may be amended by vote of both school districts at an annual or special meeting by ballot if requested. In deciding how to vote on this plan you should be aware of all considerations both pro and con. We have, therefore, included in our report those factors which we have uncovered in our development of the proposed plan.

# ADVANTAGES OF PROPOSED PLAN

- 1. 20 year guarantee replaces year-to year uncertainity.
- 2. Reduced transportation costs.
- 3. Less time lost to the student in transportation.
- 4. Greater participation in extracurricular activities possible.
- 5. Small school atomosphere.
- 6. Small (20 students average) classes.
- 7. Recognized high quality school.
- 8. More involvement by Brookline School Board than straight tuition plan. 102

# DISADVANTAGES OF PLAN

- 1. 20 year contract does not permit a change to another school system if conditions were to warrant such a move.
- 2. Relatively high costs in Hollis School system.
- 3. No control over costs.
- 4. Smaller school may not have the curriculum possible in larger school (at present Hollis is certified as a comprehensive high school and a prime reason why this plan appeals to Hollis that the larger student body makes it easier to provide the desired courses)

In conclusion, your AREA Committee believes that this is a fair plan which considers the interests of both towns. Adoption of this plan will guarantee a high quality education for our children for the next 20 years. However, it will probably cost about 15% more to send our children to Hollis than to Milford or Nashua (if either of those districts would agree to operate with us under a similar plan).

# School Board Report

The Brookline Elementary School has completed a year in the addition. It has been a successful year with all of our school operation together under one roof. The building has proved to be all that was expected.

The teachers approached the School Beard in December to discuss salary proposals for the coming year. The majority of the School Board did not accept the proposal and made a counter proposal. A minority report is appended. The School Board amjoritites proposal has been used in the budget submitted in this report. The two proposals are as follows:

The School Board was notified in January by the Superintendent of Schools of Nashua that the Nashua School District, due to overcrowding problems, was asking Brookline to phase out the 10 - 12 Sr. High School students a grade per year, and look elsewhere immediately for a place to send 7 - 9. If no place can be found, our 7 - 9 students could attend one more year.

An "Area" planning committee was set up by the School District at the School District Meeting last March to study the possibility of setting up an Area School with Hollis or any other solution. This committee, consisting of a School Board member and two members appointed by the Moderator met with a similar committee from Hollis. The report of this committee is included separately in this report.

The School Board is still at this writing searching for alternate solutions for the problem of finding a place for the Jr. High students to go next year and to solve the problem for subsequent years. An alternative to the Area plan might be to send students to Hollis or another town on a straight tuition basis on a year or three year contract. An article to authorize this appears in the Warrant.

Much of the increase in the proposed budget is due to the increase in tuition cost. This has been experienced all over the state. The state averages has increased from \$549 to \$562 at the Jr. High level and from \$637 to \$695 per pupil for Sr. High. As a result our tuition to Nashua would have been \$98,938 had we continued to send all our high school pupils to Nashua.

This compares to a figure of \$117,092 included in this budget to send 7 - 9 to Hollis and 10 - 12 to Nashua. This is a difference of \$18,154 next year. We expect we can save between 5 and 7 thousand dollars on transportation to Hollis next year, with larger savings in future years.

The budget figures represent the maximum amounts we can estimate for our various alternatives. When we pick a plan it will be possible to reduce line items in the budget e.g. transportation if we go to Hollis, tuition if we go to Nashua, as estimated earlier in this paragraph. This is a crucial year, when important decisions must be made which will affect our town for many years to come.

I feel strongly that we must be competitive with the other towns in our Supervisory Union and in the Nashua area, if we do not want to take a chance on slipping backward in the quality of our teaching staff. We know we are losing two teachers, who will have to be replaced. We will be competing with salary schedules from \$6000 to \$6500 base, in our immediate area. The compromise proposal would cost the town \$2031 more than the majority Board Proposal. The teacher's proposal would cost the town \$3,729 more than the Majority Board Proposal. I strongly endorse the Finance Committee recommendation.
