TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect a Clerk for the ensuing year.
2. To elect one Selectman for three years.
3. To elect a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
4. To elect a Library Trustee for three years.
5. To elect all other Town Officers.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,160.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,091.00 for State Aid Construction.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for State Aid Maintenance.
10. To see if the Town will vote to hire a Clerk other than the elected Town Clerk who shall attend all meetings of the Selectmen and keep a record thereof, copies of which shall be filed every three months in the office of the Town Clerk. The Town to select such Clerk at it's present Town Meeting and to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150 to be used in defraying the salary and expense of such Clerk, who is also to furnish the

Selectmen a copy of such reports yearly and at such time as to insure it's appearance in the yearly Town Report.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to raise by taxation a sum of money sufficient to pay all or a part of our short term notes amounting to \$6,000.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the poor.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairing Highways and Bridges.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to be divided equally between the town fire engines, for the purpose of equipping said engines; the same to be spent under the authorization of the Selectmen.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the use of the two Forest Fire Engines for fighting any, and all kinds of fires in the Town of Chesterfield; also to authorize the Selectmen the privilege of renting the apparatus to neighboring towns on call from said towns, at a rate to be determined by the Selectmen.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise in addition to what is required by law for support of the Town library.

17. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

18. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate money for same.

19. To see what action the Town will take in regard to unexpended appropriations of 1931.

20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lighting.

21. I, Hazel Guyette, petition for a street light to be placed on the last electric pole on the hill near my house in Spofford Village, on the land owned by C. A. Beal.

22. To see if the Town will accept the sum of \$150 to be known as the Ida A. Hosford Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the Nahum Darling burial lot in the Village of Chesterfield.

23. To see if the Town will vote and accept the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Clara J. Puffer Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the Warren C. Puffer burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

24. To see if the Town will vote and accept the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Anna P. Chamberlain Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the Joshua W. Chamberlain, Jr., burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

25. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 to be known as the Leroy N. Colburn Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the Leroy N. Colburn burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

26. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

TOWN MEETING, MARCH, 1931

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, called at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, March 10, 1931.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, James A. Wilson, at 9.30 a. m. and the warrant read by the clerk.

The Articles of the warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Article 1. Election of Town Clerk. Voted that the Moderator be instructed to cast one ballot for Imogene L. Chickering for Clerk for the ensuing year and Imogene L. Chickering having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 2. Election of one Selectman for three years. Whole number of votes cast 157, necessary for choice 79. John Mansley had 9, Fred E. Atherton 148, and Fred E. Atherton having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 3. Election of Treasurer. Voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Harold E. Foster to serve as Treasurer for the ensuing year and Harold E. Foster having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 4. Election of Assessors. Voted by voice vote that the Selectmen act as Assessors for the ensuing year.

Article 5. Election of other Town Officers. Voted to start election of Road Agents at the Center Village.

Election of Road Agent at Center. Whole number of votes cast 150, necessary for choice 76, Fred E. Atherton had 1, Charles H. Anderson had 39, Roger C. Spaulding 110, and Roger C. Spaulding having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Election of Road Agent at Spofford. Whole number of votes cast 157, necessary for choice 79. Clifford E. Chickering had 1, Lionel Cashmore 22, Donald A. Wellington 58, Walter J. Post 76. No choice.

A second ballot resulted as follows: Whole number of votes cast 163, necessary for choice 82. Lionel A. Cashmore had 7, Donald A. Wellington 73, Walter J. Post 83, and Walter J. Post having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Election of Road Agent at West Chesterfield. Whole number of votes cast 156, necessary for choice 79. Roger C. Spaulding had 1, Ada Allen 1, Donald Wellington 1, George E. Caruth 43, Clifford E. Chickering 110, and Clifford E. Chickering having a majority of votes cast was declared elected.

Then Roger C. Spaulding, Walter J. Post, and Clifford E. Chickering, Road Agents, took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Auditors. Merle W. Cobleigh, and John Mansley were elected by voice vote to serve as Auditors for the ensuing year and John Mansley took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Constables. Harold E. Randall, Charles H. Spaulding, and William D. Pierce were elected by voice vote to serve as Constables for the ensuing year and all took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Trustees of Town Library for three years. Morris Friedsam was elected by voice vote to serve as Trustee of Town Library for three years and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Fence Viewers. Morris Friedsam, Walter Dunbar and Roger C. Spaulding were elected by voice vote to serve as Fence Viewers for the ensuing year and all took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Surveyors of Wood and Lumber. Chester M. Burnham, Fred W. Holman and Earl Walston were elected by voice vote to serve as Surveyors of Wood and Lumber for the ensuing year and all took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Election of Trustee of Trust Funds for three years. Merle W. Cobleigh was elected to serve as Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

Election of Sextons. Byron A. Davis, Fred E. Atherton, Charles A. Tuttle, Fred W. Holman, Harlan Streeter and Charles J. Paro were elected by voice vote to serve as Sextons for the ensuing year and Byron A. Davis, Fred E. Atherton, Fred W. Holman and Charles J. Paro took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 6. Voted to raise the sum of \$3,500.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 7. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to complete payment for the snow plow.

Article 8. Voted to appropriate the sum of \$1,173.41 to pay the remainder of the cost of extending the State Aid Road at West Chesterfield, said sum to be deducted from the balance of unexpended road money, a balance of \$1,431.34, and that the disposal of the remaining \$258.93 be deferred until action on the first road appropriation.

Article 9. Voted to raise the sum of \$2,625.00 to pay for repairing the Catsbane Bridge.

Article 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,575.00 for Trunk Line Maintenance.

Article 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550.00 for State Aid Maintenance.

Article 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,062.50, less the sum of \$258.93 mentioned, for State Aid Construction.

Article 18. Voted an amendment to the amendment to Articles 13 and 14 and to appoint from the floor five commissioners with authority to make these expenditures (if voted) provided in their judgment after investigation the appropriation (if voted) is found to be legal, practical, and moderate in cost to the taxpayers. This committee later elected from the floor by voice vote consists of Morris Friedsam, Fred Gibson, Arthur H. Post, Fred E. Atherton, and Moses H. Chickering, all of whom took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 13. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,100.00 for the purchase of two pieces of Fire Apparatus with complete equipment to combat forest fires in the Town of Chesterfield, N. H., said equipment to be kept in the village of Chesterfield and West Chesterfield, N. H.

Article 14. Voted to pass over the Article.

Article 15. Voted to pass over the Article.

Article 16. Voted to pass over the Article.

Article 17. Voted to raise the sum of \$1,200.00 to be expended in improving the so-called West Swanzey and Spofford highway beginning at the property of Mr. J. T. B. Fisher and continuing to the Swanzey line thereby opening an important artery to Lake Spofford.

Article 19. Voted to raise the sum of \$9,000.00 for the repairing of highways and bridges to be expended \$3,000.00 in each part of the Town, \$200.00 to be reserved for snow removal.

Article 20. Voted to pass over the Article.

Article 21. Voted to pass over the Article.

Article 22. Voted to pass over the Article.

Article 23. Voted to raise the sum of \$400.00 for Trunk Line Snow Removal.

Article 24. Voted to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for the support of the poor.

Article 25. Voted to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the Town library.

Article 26. Voted that the Moderator be empowered to select six men, the Town granting to them the privilege of spending \$5,000.00 on road equipment such as is referred to in Article 26 and to lay out to the Town the method under which this material is to be handled and how; also granting to them the privilege of purchasing the machinery. This committee of six men as selected by the Moderator is as follows: Walter J. Post, Fred E. Atherton, Clifford E. Chickering, Chester M. Burnham, Roger C. Spaulding and Charles A. Post, all of whom took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 27. Voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Harry E. Winn to serve as Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year and Harry E. Winn having a majority of votes cast was declared elected and took the oath of office before the Moderator.

Article 28. Voted to observe Old Home Day the same as we have done in other years, and to raise and appropriate the same sum of money as in other years, two hundred dollars. Voted that the same committee serve this year as last year. This committee consists of Paul M. Penning, Harold E. Foster and R. Bligh Telfer.

Article 29. Voted to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for street lighting.

Article 30. Voted to raise and spend, under the direction of the Selectmen, the sum of \$300.00 in order to improve the walls and the general condition of the public cemeteries.

Article 31. Voted that the Article be stricken out.

Article 32. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 to be held in trust and known as the Elizabeth Bonney Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for the care and improvement of the Abel and Joseph Holt burial lots in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 33. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 to be held forever in trust, the income thereof to be used toward the expenses of evangelical preaching in Spofford.

Article 34. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the John Stanford Cemetery Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for the care and improvement of the John Stanford burial lot in the Chesterfield Center Cemetery.

Article 35. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 to be known as the Louise E. Davis Cemetery Trust Fund, the income thereof to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the care and improvement of the Louise E. Davis burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 36. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the George Wheeler Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the Foster Wheeler burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 37. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust to be known as the George W. Webb Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for the perpetual care and improvement of the George W. Webb burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery.

Article 38. Voted to give a rising vote of thanks to the Moderator for his orderly meeting, which was given unanimously.

Voted that the Town go on record as against daylight saving.

Voted to pay for what equipment we buy this year.

No other business appearing it was voted to adjourn, at 4.19 o'clock.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I submit my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

The opening of school in September found three changes of teachers in the schools. At West Chesterfield Miss Ruth Isherwood of Berlin teaches the primary grades and Miss Margaret Hidden of Tamworth the advanced grades. Miss Marie Elder, of Brimfield, Massachusetts, is in charge of the Advanced grades at Spofford. These teachers are all graduates of the Keene Normal School, class of 1931.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Two major changes were made the past summer in the sanitary conditions, at Chesterfield Village and West Chesterfield schools. The toilets in these two schools were replaced

by Kaustine chemical toilets, and the toilet rooms refinished. All three buildings are now well equipped in this respect.

The old type double desks in the primary room at Chesterfield Village have been replaced by the new type single unit chair desks.

New clocks have been furnished the primary rooms in each of the three buildings. The upper grade rooms were similarly equipped several years ago.

The walls and ceilings at the Spofford School have been refinished.

TEXTBOOKS AND SUPPLIES

As new books are purchased to replace those worn out in service, an attempt has been made to follow a definite adoption in the various subjects. Each year finds more of the same books used in similar grades of the different schools. This makes for greater economy in the purchase and use of books. Unused books on hand in one school may be transferred to another school where there is a shortage, thus obviating the necessity of buying new books. Children transferring from one school to another find the same books in use in the schools. Such adoptions have been made in the text books in the following subjects: Basal readers, spellers, arithmetics, geographies, histories, and language books.

The teachers have cooperated well in the economical distribution and use of school supplies.

FINANCES

The second highest item in our budget is that of transportation. Several families, with children of school age have occupied places at a distance of more than two miles from the nearest school. This will make our transportation costs considerably higher than last year. Our bills for high school tuition are also greater than in past years. These expenditures are compelled by law, and cannot always be estimated correctly in advance.

The Community Needlecraft Club, as in years past, at graduation awarded books to each member of the graduating class, to the pupil of each room attaining the highest scholarship, and to the pupil of each room who showed the greatest improvement in school work.

Recognition should also be given the Ladies' Aid societies and the Community Needlecraft Club for their cooperation at the Christmas parties of the schools.

I gratefully acknowledge the cooperation of citizens, members of the School Board, and the teachers.

113 pupils were examined.

11 pupils were underweight.

2 pupils showed defective hearing.

2 pupils showed a slight degree of anaemia.

4 pupils showed some orthopedic defect.

66 pupils were in need of dental care.

83 visits were made in the homes.

47 school visits were made.

79 pupils were given hearing tests with the Audiometer.

A dental clinic was held in West Chesterfield, October, 21st, 1931:

No. of extractions,	51
No. having teeth cleaned,	9
No. silver and porcelain fillings,	25
Total number of operations,	78

The clinic rates as follows: cleaning, 50c, extractions, 50c, silver fillings, 75c, porcelain fillings, \$1.25. The total bill for this work was forty-four dollars (\$44.00), paid for by the parents of the children having work done.

12 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

Three tonsil clinics were held. One June 16th, 1931, at the Mousley Hospital, Walpole, N. H., at which two cases were treated. Two at the Keene Community Hospital, July 10th, and 17th, 1931, at which six cases were treated.

One tonsil case was treated privately.

One pupil had special eye examination.

I wish to express the appreciation of the district to the Local Red Cross Chapter of West Chesterfield and Spofford. Mr. and Mrs. George Carruth, Mrs. Ada Allen, Chesterfield Community Club for assistance given in the past year.

I also wish to express my appreciation of the cooperation of the parents in the work accomplished in the past year.
