During the year there were 22 cases of chicken-pox, two cases of mumps and one case of scarlet fever.

Other activities consisted of class room inspection, weighing pupils, home visits in case pupils were absent, health talks, throat inspection during scarlet fever scare, lessons in first aid, making of health posters for Health Day, distribution of clothing to needy children, finding

summer work for one pupil and arranging attendance of a pupil to attend a tonsil clinic at Concord.

Since the opening of school and the organizing of the work for the year, my work has been chiefly the giving of reading tests from the third grade up through the eighth grade. I did this to determine the ability of the children to get the thought from the printed page and to find the speed or number of words read per minute.

The results of these tests in most every instance show that the pupil who read below the required rate for the grade did not reach the comprehension score for the grade.

In short conferences with each teacher the pupils' papers were looked over and remedies suggested to be used in bringing the pupils up to the required level in rate and comprehension.

As an aid to increase the ability of the pupils in the lower grades to read silently, work books to accompany the readers in these grades have been given each pupil. Careful supervision of this phase of teaching reading on the part of the teacher I am sure will soon begin to show the desired results.
