THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in the Town Building in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article I. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article II. To choose three Selectmen for the ensuing year.

Article III. To choose three Trustees for the Littleton Public Library to serve for three years each, in place of Mandane A. Parker, Elizabeth K. Remich, Harry W. Randlett, terms expired.

Article IV. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for laying out and constructing and repairing highways and bridges, for the payment of town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, and for all other necessary town charges.

Article V. To see what sums of money the town will raise and appropriate for observance of Memorial Day.

Article VI. To choose an Auditor for the ensuing year.

Article VII. To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the alteration and amendments of the Constitution proposed by the Constitutional Convention shall be approved.

Article VIII. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended by the Selectmen for band concerts the coming summer.

Article IX. To see if the town will vote to accept a transfer of the property of the Wheeler Hill Cemetery Association of Littleton.

Article X. To see what action the town will take with reference to purchasing or acquiring in some other way the franchises and property of the Littleton Water & Light Company, or acquiring, establishing, and maintaining an entirely new and independent plant, and to provide for operating the same, and to provide for the necessary money by taxation or for borrowing the same upon the notes or bonds of the town, if it is decided to acquire or construct either a water or electric light plant, or both, and to choose such committees or agents as may be necessary or convenient to carry out any vote that may be passed.

Article XI. To see what action the town will take in reference to electing a road agent or agents.

Article XII. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, and committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article XIII. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

Article XIV. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

There is nothing of special importance to be brought to the attention of the people through the medium of this report for the year now closing.

The statistics of offences brought to the attention of the court indicate an increase as compared with those of last year.

This incident, however, was based upon what appeared to be a spasmodic condition, the principal part of the increase being by reason of a congestion of drunks in the space of a very few weeks.

Normal conditions were speedily restored by vigorous police effort, and for a long time not a single prosecution has been necessitated on account of local offences of police grade in this community.

In view of the possible changes in the laws relating to the sale of alcoholic, vinous, and malt liquors as beverages the statistics of this court for the ensuing year may have added interest and importance as respects the various uses of comparison and ascertainment of facts in the working of new laws.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners of Littleton Fire District:

Gentlemen:

For the year ending February 1, 1903, this department has laid 1,000 feet of hose, of which 400 feet have been used. It has used 14 chemicals and answered 36 alarms, 8 bell and 28 still, at a cost to the precinct of \$137.10, an average of \$3.80 $\frac{5}{6}$ for each call. The loss, as near as could be ascertained, has been \$238, an average of \$6.61 1-9 for each alarm. Chimneys burning out have caused 28 alarms; ashes, 1; gasoline stove, 1; rats and matches, 1; cigarette stub, 1; smoke stack, 1; stovepipe, 1; hot-box, 1; spark from engine, 1.

Five fire-alarm boxes have been placed in position; runners have been purchased for the apparatus, and a long-distance telephone has been placed in the fire station.

DIRECTIONS.

The glass covered box on side of alarm boxes contains the key; get the key by breaking the glass, and open alarm box; pull down the hook, letting go at once. DO NOT PULL A SECOND ALARM UNLESS ORDERED BY THE CHIEF ENGINEER OR ONE OF HIS ASSISTANTS.

The alarm will indicate the station from which the signal was given. Thus, a signal from Station 42 will be sounded by four strokes of the bell, followed by two strokes. This will be repeated, so that notice will be clearly given that fire has broken out in the vicinity of Station 42, if that be the case, because the alarm sounds a four, by four strokes of the bell, and a two, by two strokes of the bell. In this way Station 42 is indicated. The other stations will be indicated in a similar manner, the second number struck by the alarm bell corresponding to the number in unit's place, either 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, or 7, as the case may be.

Report of Library Trustees.

The year just closing has demonstrated more and more the large educational feature the library is in the lives of our people. There is hardly a home into which the books have not gone as a weekly visitor. The library, while it has created a desire for reading, by the selection of its books, has also in a large measure determined the character of the reading. It has also made a demand upon itself, for those reading one work of an author return for others, and are perfectly surprised if they are not found upon our shelves. No taste is more quickly developed and is more insatiable than that of reading, and thus it is easily seen how great is the demand, encouraged and fostered as it has been during these fourteen years in which our public library has existed. One can hardly realize the variety and the extent of the reading who has not stood by the librarian and heard the calls. Few towns as large as ours can show as many literary clubs, which do real hard work, and which appeal to the library for every aid needed in their studies. It has been the policy of the book committee to study each need, and as far as it is possible to supply it. We are deeply conscious, as are the applicants for books, how far short we have come, but how can we, with our present appropriation, do better? It is for the tax-payers to make their reply, allowing one dollar per book, which is the average cost.

We are glad to note the increase in circulation. Over two thousand more books have been taken out this year than in any previous year, 18,951 in all. Eighty-three per cent have been fiction, by far the larger portion, for fiction is the pastime

literature for weary men and women, the spare hour reading for young people, the entertainment for the little folks. We have issued two hundred new cards this year. The library has been frequented more and more by our scholars, seeking those books which aid them directly in their work. We have added during the year 360 volumes, besides those which have been presented by the state and the government at Washington. Two hundred and sixty-four have been purchased. Thirty-eight books have been bought to replace standard works worn out. Eighty-four have been presented by Mrs. J. M. Rand, from her own private library, one by Thomas W. Lawson, C. F. Eastman, B. W. Kilburn, Guy Rix, J. H. Hyde, G. H. Smith, and the State Board of Health. We have now in all 8,300 volumes. According to the vote of the town we have purchased duplicates where the committee thought best, and by the special appropriation made we have obtained all the local literature, pamphlets, and addresses prepared by our townspeople.

We think that we ought to remind the public that they have not made the use that they might of the state library, any book of which, on application made to our librarian and the express charges paid, might be obtained. Such an opportunity is of special value to those working out extensively on specific lines.

The reading-room still retains its popularity, and is frequented constantly by eager throngs. The shortage of fuel, in which everybody has suffered, has compelled us to close the rooms part of the time this winter.

The generosity of Mr. Carnegie has made possible a more commodious building for our books. The purchase of the Dr. McGregor lot by the committee finds universal approval. The efforts put forth by the committee and the care taken to procure the right kind of a building, with the best arrangement and most modern appliances, is appreciated by the trustees, who are sure that the committee will build what is most practical,

durable, and ornate, even if the town should be called upon to increase a little the Carnegie gift.
