#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways in addition to the amount required by law.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Library.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of cemeteries.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of the common.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,035.00 to secure \$2,070.00 from the State for State Aid Construction.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to secure from the State \$2,000.00 for permanent road from Rumney Village to Stinson Lake.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to be used to gravel and oil the lower road, Stinson Lake so-called, commencing at the junction with the State Road by the grist mill and continuing north to its junction with the state road near the house occupied by Albert Cummings.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2% discount on all taxes paid before July first.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to have the inventory blanks distributed at the time of taking appraisal of property.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to act as agents to dispose of any property bought by the town at tax sales.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.
- 16. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to buy a safe in which to keep the record books kept by the Town Clerk.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Rumney School District:

I hereby present my third annual report as Superintendent of the public schools of Rumney.

#### Instruction

The teaching staff of the district is the same with the exception that Stewart Thompson of Stewartstown was appointed teacher at the Depot grammar school. He is a graduate of the Keene Normal School with a splendid record. His prestige with the pupils is excellent and results of his work good. The achievements in Latin and Algebra started last year at the Village warranted their continuation this year and the prospects are that much more will be accomplished this year.

For sometime there has been a keen desire for more music in the schools. Although music may be considered a fad by some, nevertheless, it cannot be denied that it functions in adult life as much as many subjects loosely classified under the "3 Rs". The Board in conjunction with the supervisory union a few years ago investigated the possibility of a music supervisor, but the financial depression ended the project. At present it seems that no feasible way can be worked out with the Plymouth Normal School.

Accordingly early this fall a committee of teachers composed of Elinor Jones, Beatrice Putney and Mary Russell made a survey of this problem and brought in a plan and recommendations for the music of the district. Valuable discussion followed and a somewhat uniform course adopted. Miss Jones, chairman of the committee is assisting weekly in the music at the Depot school and Mr. Thompson gives a course in general science in the Village school at the same time. The pupils of the district are getting instruc-

tion in the theory of music and seem to thoroughly

enjoy singing.

The fundamentals in Arithmetic are tested by the Superintendent from time to time and remedial work prescribed.

## Attendance and Health

The percentage of attendance for the district was 62% below the percentage of the state at large. Three schools exceeded the state average and four fell below. It is hoped that this year all may reach the state average. Excluding the very few willful violators of school attendance in nearly every community, the attendance of schools will vary generally with the health of its pupils. The entire matter seems to be one of common sense. Children should be sent to school when physically able and kept at home when there is possibility they are coming down with contagious diseases. Even during the present depression necessary dental and medical attention should not be deferred too long and defects incurred that can never be corrected.

## **Property**

Since the last report the Village school has been painted on the outside. It should be painted on the inside at once. At Stinson Lake the porch has been enclosed and hooks installed for hanging up outer clothing. A well was driven by means of funds furnished largely by summer people. The water was started in January and was found to be good by a test of the State Board of Health. One side of the Quincy school has been shingled.

Since the last report Judge Kimball of Plymouth gave a flag pole to the Depot Parent Teachers' Association which organization painted, equipped and raised with appropriate ceremony. The same association gave \$10.00 for baseball equipment and \$10.00 toward purchase of tools for Manual Training under the supervision of the 4-H Club. It has also been voted to have a pupil fitted for glasses and to frame a picture of

Washington in the Depot primary room.

All of these projects at the Lake and Depot show a splendid interest in the young people and are gratefully acknowledged.

#### Conclusion

During the year fire drills have been organized and conducted frequently throughout the district and the building thoroughly inspected for fire hazard. I regard this as highly important from a view point of safety of lives of children and protection of property. During the year the records of the district have been carefully sorted and are kept in a fireproof safe in the office of the school board in the town house.

The graduation in June was unique in that it broke away from traditional exercises and was built up around the bicentennial of the birth of Washington. Great credit is due the teachers and pupils for the preparation and presentation of the entire gradua-

tion.
