

TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.] To the inhabitants of the town of Salem qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house, in said Salem, on the second Tuesday of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers and agents for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the year ensuing.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise any more money for the repairs of highways than the law requires.
- 4. To see what method the town will vote to adopt to facilitate the collection of taxes.
- 5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer to hire, with the approval of the selectmen, such sums of money as he may need for general purposes in anticipation of taxes.
- 7. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100, or any part thereof, for the use of Gilman E.

Sleeper Post, No. 60, G. A. R., to be expended in the observance of Memorial Day in the year 1906.

- 8. By request. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Salem free public library.
- 9. By request. To see if the town will vote to macadamize a portion of its highways.
- 10. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000 for building a hose house for Salem Village Hose Company, No. 2, and choose a committee to carry the same into effect.
- 11. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept of John F. Smith, administrator of Sarah E. Gage estate, the sum of \$50 for care of Sidney Gage lot in Pine Grove Cemetery; also the sum of \$100 for the care of the Francis S. Smith lot in said cemetery.
- 12. By request. To see if the town will vote to build a lock-up and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 13. By request. To see what action the town will take towards suppressing the gypsy or brown-tail moths and raise money for the same.
- 14. By request. To see what action the town will take in regard to adopting by-laws for the government of cemeteries in said town.
- 15. By request. To see what action the town will take in regard to buying machinery for building macadam roads.
- 16. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept of George Woodbury estate the sum of \$100, as a perpetual

fund, the income to be expended for the care and improvement of a lot in Pine Grove Cemetery, known as the George and Isaac Woodbury lot.

- 17. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend its water pipe up Highland Avenue and down School Street to the house of C. H. Allen.
- 18. By request. To see what action the town will take in regard to the purchase of more fire hose and raise money for the same and choose a committee to carry the same into effect.
- 19. By request. To see what action the town will take in regard to bonding the town debt.
- 20. By request. To see what action the town will take in regard to completing the town history.
- 21. By request. To see what action the town will take in regard to the will of Elizabeth Cundy.
- 22. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$72.85, to replace money taken from Pine Grove Cemetery fund and used for other purposes.
- 23. By request. To see if the town will vote to put the town water into L. E. Bailey's house, providing the said Bailey does the excavating to the point of supply.
- 24. By request. To see if the town will vote to repair the private road on the shore of Canobie Lake.
- 25. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$125 for repairing the building known as the Salem Free Public Library.

- 26. By request. To see if the town will vote to establish a police court at Salem Depot, agreeable to Section 1, Chapter 211 of the Public Statutes of New Hampshire, fixing the compensation of the justice at \$100 per annum and the fees of the office; and all fines collected in said court to be paid to the town treasurer, and raise money for the same.
- 27. By request. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to confer with the New Hampshire Electric Railroad Company, relative to having the railroad company place electric lights at all crossings of highways in the town, by the tracks of said railroad company.
- 28. By request. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 78, Laws of 1897, relating to the manner of conducting caucuses and elections.

REPORT OF WATER COMMISSIONERS.

In accordance with Article No. 12, passed at the annual town meeting, March 14, 1905, your commissioners negotiated with the Salem Water Company and purchased the entire plant of the company for the sum of forty-eight thousand dollars.

Your commissioners received from the town treasurer, \$1,937.50 for the purpose of making extensions and repairs. There has been added since the purchase by the town, about 2,300 feet of six-inch main pipe at an expense of nearly \$2,000.

Twenty new services have been added. The total amount of the annual rates due from water takers is now \$3,049.

A contract for five years has been made with the New England Breeders' Club at an annual rate of \$600.

The board of health respectfully submits its report for the year ending February 15, 1906.

We are pleased to say that our attention has been called to only six nuisances, showing that the citizens are alive to the importance of keeping their premises in good condition. We have visited about all of the public places and found them in very good condition and we think that they have done very well to keep them so.

One death having occurred from typhoid fever and two from consumption. A sample of water was sent to Prof. C. D. Howard and was reported very good. There were 27 cases of contagious diseases reported: Measles, 2: scarlet fever, 21; typhoid fever, 2; consumption, 2.

PROSECUTING OFFICER'S REPORT.

To services for year ending February 15, 1906, Paid B. R. Wheeler, services at raid and attendance at court, 6.23

One raid and one arrest for illegal selling, by reason of insufficient evidence, the party was discharged by Justice James Ayer.

One arrest for drunkenness; at a hearing before Justice L. W. Hall he was sentenced to serve 90 days in the county jail at Brentwood.

We have received a few complaints of illegal selling at private houses and have been solicited by some to raid them. After investigation and failure to obtain evidence of selling, we refused to raid private houses. It has been our aim to cultivate due respect for the home and carefully consider every occasion for entering them. The problem concerning the supply and use of liquors by those employed on large contracts has been a subject of consideration. Complaints have been received and investigations made. While some claim to know much about conditions, their knowledge vanishes about the time we could make use of it. We are always grateful to the citizen, who, with a desire to improve conditions, places at our disposal facts which may aid us in removing an evil.

Although, we understand, several decisions have been reached by New Hampshire and Massachusetts courts favorable to employers including liquors with the daily rations to a class of their employees, we confess we are in doubt concerning the matter. As a consequence, the contractors' methods have received the benefit of the doubt.

SALEM FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

To the Board of Trustees of the Salem Public Library:

Gentlemen: The twelfth annual report of the library, showing its work for the year ending February 15, 1906, is herewith presented.

The year's growth.—The whole number of books reported last year was 1,886; the number of accessions since then has been 100, comprising 91 volumes obtained by purchase and nine gifts, making a total now in the library of 1,986. This does not include the public documents and reports, of which there are 326 bound volumes and 792 paper covers and pamphlets.

The year's circulation.—During the year 5,188 volumes were issued for home use, an increase from last year of 351; more than one third of the books were sent to the Depot Village and a fraction over one sixth to North Salem. REPORT OF TRUSTEES.

The trustees of the Salem Free Public Library respectfully submit their annual report for the year ending February 15, 1906.

The trustees organized at the beginning of the fiscal year with the following officers: President, Loren B. McLaughlin; treasurer, Clinton L. Silver; clerk, Daniel A. Abbott.

The regular meetings of the trustees have been held on the first Saturday night of each month at 7.30 p.m. in the library.

We are glad to report at the close of the fiscal year that the library is in a flourishing condition. The past year has been one of success for the institution. A large number of new books, well selected, have been added and the interest of the patrons and the public in general has been maintained. In connection with the new books, the trustees feel that the interest of the public in a library naturally centers in the accessions of new books and periodicals, and it is, therefore, essential to add from year to year the best new publications to keep up the reputation of the library and stimulate the interest of its patrons. The trustees desire to call the attention of the public to the encyclopedias and books of reference with which the library is well supplied. They are easy of access and information of a reliable nature may be obtained on almost any subject desired.

We wish to express our appreciation of the faithfulness and ability with which the librarian, Mrs. Cluff, has discharged the varied duties of her position. We would also extend our thanks to all who, during the year, have contributed in any way to the success of the library. A few repairs have been made on the interior of the library during

the year at the minimum of cost. The need for additional shelf room will have to be met the present year and it is quite probable that some minor repairs may be necessary.

We would earnestly recommend that the sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125.00), at least, be appropriated for the support of the library, in addition to the amount required by law.

The trustees would also urge an appropriation of one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125.00) for the purpose of shingling the roof of the library building, which is in a bad condition and needs immediate attention.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Nearly one year ago the Town School District of Hudson voted to rescind the vote whereby it voted some two years previous to instruct its school board to unite with some other town or towns for the purpose of forming a supervisory district. As the school year is from August 1 of any one year to the same date in the next year, and the towns of Hudson and Salem composed a joint district till August 1, 1905, your schools had a superintendent until the date just named.

The school board made an effort to unite with some other town or towns for the purpose of uniting to form a new supervisory district, but were unable to find any town to unite with, by reason of this: your schools have not had the benefit of expert supervision since last August. We regret this very much, as we believe our schools would be brought to a higher state of excellence by having a capable person to select suitable teachers and direct them in their work; also in many other ways would such a person be of much help to both teachers and pupils.

If you are to fit your children for high school, we are of the opinion that you must have expert school supervision. We believe the teachers employed during the year have labored faithfully and your schools, with one or two exceptions, have made fair progress. The matter of the children being tardy and absent to and from school is a source of much loss to the pupils and annoyance to a teacher. Where this condition exists, the progress and results are far from being satisfactory.

The sum of eighty dollars was voted at the school meeting last March for the purpose of digging two wells. Your committee made an effort to hire some person to do this.

but did not succeed in getting the work done. The committee made an agreement with a party to dig the wells, but they failed to do the work.

The condition of your schoolhouses is very good. We think the old part of No. 10 schoolhouse ought to be reshingled. The seats and desks in No. 5 schoolhouse are in very bad shape. You ought to raise money at the annual school meeting to at least make the inside of this school building comfortable for the children. We think the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) would be sufficient to place new seats and desks in No. 5 schoolhouse.

There are now attending high school at Methuen and at the seminary at Tilton, 21 pupils. The tuition charged for each pupil is \$40. This expense is to be met by taking the money to pay this bill from the school fund.

We think the district ought to raise money enough to keep its schools at least 34 weeks, plus the amount necessary to pay the high school tuition. The interest on the fund of old school district No. 3 (\$9.31) has been expended, giving that school one week in addition to the number of weeks of school given by the town.

.The interest of the fund of old No. 2 school district (\$14.68) has been used for the conveyance of pupils in that district to and from school No. 1.

The interest on the fund of old school district, No. 10, has not been expended at the date of this report. This school is now in session and the interest just mentioned will be used as in the past.

Our attention was called last spring to the condition of the fence at No. 5 schoolhouse. We found the fence in very poor shape. A new fence has been made on the west side of the schoolhouse lot and the south and east sides repaired. The whole cost of this work, including lumber, labor and nails, was \$47.87.

SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC.

To the Honorable School Board of the Town of Salem, N. H.:

Your special teacher of music is pleased to report improvement in the work of the children during the past year, despite the fact that some unfavorable conditions have existed in some schools. Of course, frequent changes in instructors is a severe handicap to the study of singing, as well as other branches of school work, but the teachers generally have shown a willingness to accept the suggestions of the supervisor and the results have been, in the main, quite satisfactory. Lack of time in many schools is another drawback to the best results. Again, if the pupils could all be made to realize in some way that it is just as much a duty to accept and take active part in the musical period as in any other branch, then we might look for still greater improvement. Much enthusiasm is shown among the younger children and a strong desire to learn to sing, which speaks well for the future music in the schools of Salem.

In conclusion, I will say that it is my opinion that the schools, as a whole, compare very favorably in music with those of neighboring towns and cities.
