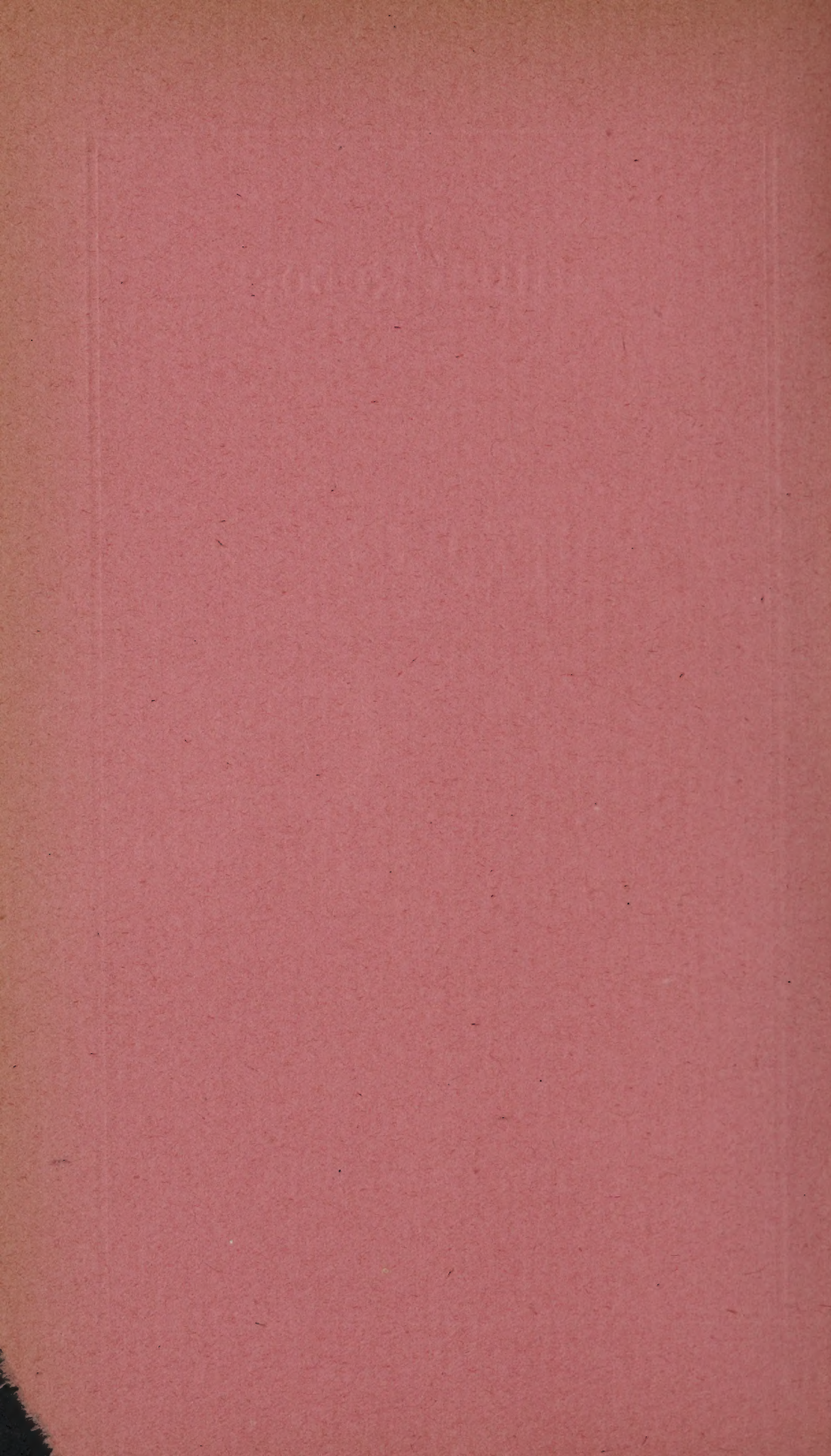

REMARKS.

First, it seems the proper thing to say that it was with much regret that your Committee was obliged to close the schools, acting under orders from the Board of Health, on account of the presence of scarlet fever in our community, but considered it the best possible move to make to prevent the further spread of the disease. The time lost should be made good to the scholar, and we hope not to have a recurrence of a similar unpleasantness.

REPAIRS. The appropriation of last year gave the Committee an opportunity of doing what for many years had needed to be done,—the laying of new hardwood floors in the Intermediate and 2d Primary Rooms in Division 1, also plastering the walls anew and putting up new blackboards. These were all needed improvements, and since being completed are appreciated by teacher and scholar. The unused balance was not sufficient to do the painting which needs to be done, consequently it was left for this year that an adequate appropriation might be made for this purpose.

Some grading and widening of concrete walk is needed to improve the general appearance of grounds

in Division 1, and a few general repairs in outside Divisions, the cost of which will not be much.

SUPERVISORY DISTRICT. By the provisions of an act of the Legislature of 1899, the School District has the opportunity of forming a Supervisory District with two or more adjacent towns for the purpose of engaging and employing a Superintendent of Schools, the State paying one-half the salary. It is the opinion of your Committee that such a man will help build up our schools to a remarkable degree, and reach a higher standard than they can by almost any other arrangement. This plan, while new with us here, has been tried with great satisfaction and benefit in many towns in Massachusetts, a State in which the public school system is acknowledged to be above the average.

Naturally, the cost of such an undertaking will startle some, but when it is thoroughly understood that the cost will be but little more than under the present system, it seems wise to get all the benefit possible from a small outlay of money, and make the trial.

Read and consider well the article in the warrant with reference to this matter, and when time comes to take action be prepared to do so intelligently, having in mind the best interests of our children, and give them the benefit of every opportunity.

CHANGES IN TEXT BOOKS. It was deemed advisable to make a change in Arithmetics, replacing the Greenleaf with a recent edition of Wentworth. The change was made this year in Division 1, and the coming year will be extended throughout the town. After this change is complete it will cost less to keep supplied with this

book, there being only two in the series, while in the one last used there were three.

CONSOLIDATION. We believe that it would be much better for the pupils of other Divisions if schools having a few pupils were closed and the pupils merged with other schools. More experienced teachers could be engaged and the pupils otherwise benefitted through associations with others.

- 17—To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to contract with some person to revise and publish

- the History of Antrim, and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or take any other action thereon.
- 18—To see how much money the Town will vote to expend in building Sidewalks, and appropriate a sum of money therefor, or take any other action thereon.
- 19—To see if the Town will vote to raise a certain per cent. on the valuation to defray town charges, pay existing debts, to cover all appropriations made by the School District, and to carry the above articles into effect.
- 20—To see if the Town will vote to appoint a trustee or designate some one to hold the funds of the Saltmarsh estate or take any action relating thereto.
- 21—To see if the Town will vote to sell or take any action relative to the Saltmarsh farm when it shall come into the possession of the Town, April 1st.
- 22—To see if the Town will vote to widen the highway between the highway leading to Holt's Hill by the Peterwaugh House and George Brown's Corner and appropriate a sum of money therefor.
