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

SCHOOL REPORT.

To the Inhabitants of the School District of Haverhill:

The Board of Education of the District of Haverhill present this, their third annual report of the condition of the public schools, in said District, for the year ending March 4, 1889.

For the convenience of the Board, the District was divided the same as heretofore:—

Some one of the Board has visited each school twice during the term, and they have endeavored to conscientiously discharge the duties of their office, and beg leave to report that the schools are generally in a prosperous condition.

The progress made throughout the entire District has been such as to satisfy the Board of Education that the new law has been for the benefit of the schools in this town. We would again call the attention of the parents to the necessity of taking more interest in the schools; and in the opinion of the Board they should weekly or monthly visit the schools in their District, and show their children that they feel a deep interest in their welfare. If they will do this for the coming year we are confident they will have less cause for complaint, and their children will be more earnest to improve the opportunities afforded them.

The whole number of scholars who have received instruction in the public schools in this town is 490; of these 68 received instruction at the Academy in Haverhill Corner, and 169 at the public school in Woodsville.

The financial condition of the District is clearly shown in the report of the town auditors.

DISTRICTS NOS. 1 AND 17.

These schools comprise a part of Haverhill Academy. The primary and intermediate departments the first term were under the same teachers as last year, and with equally as good results; the progress as favorable as could be expected.

The fall and winter terms have been quite successful with Miss Fannie B. Buzzell in the primary, and Miss Mary E. Burbeck in the intermediate departments.

The parents in these Districts have reason to congratulate themselves that their children can have the advantages of a graded school without extra expense. There has been much improvement in the matter of discipline during the past two years.

DISTRICT NO. 2.

This school was taught the entire year by Miss Ida M. Buck, her usual good success attending her efforts. Good progress was made by nearly all the pupils in their studies. One serious fault in this district is the irregular attendance of some of the pupils, which is largely due to the apathy of the parents. If such parents could see the inconsistency and injury to their children by their irregular attendance, we are fully convinced that this fault would not longer exist.

DISTRICT NO. 3.

The spring term of ten weeks was taught by Miss

Louise Page, and in most of the studies very good progress was made, and in the main was quite a successful term. The fall term was taught by Miss May M. Weeks, with her usual good success, and the term was continued twelve weeks. The advancement made in the different studies was very good.

The winter term of twelve weeks under the instruction of Mr. W. O. Smith was in every way a success, if we except the discipline, which seemed to us not as good as it should have been; yet the advancement made in the studies pursued, reflected credit upon both teacher and pupils.

DISTRICT NO. 4.

This school has been taught the entire year by Miss Ona E. Lane with her usual good success. Owing to the sickness of the teacher the school did not commence as early as we intended to have it, therefore the school is now in session. Miss Lane is a very successful teacher, perfectly at home with her pupils and the results of her teaching are very satisfactory.

DISTRICT NO. 5.

This school has been taught by Miss Abbie S. Meader through the school year with very good results. She is an experienced teacher and has the faculty of getting the good will of the scholars. The parents in this district are more interested in the welfare of their children than they are in some other portions of the Town District. We think that the presence of the parents in

the school room occasionally, adds very much to the interest and progress of the school.

DISTRICT NO. 6.

The spring term of ten weeks was taught by Miss Mary F. Morrison with her usual success.

The fall term of ten weeks and winter term of twelve weeks were taught by Miss Hattie M. Sherman. The attendance has been quite large and the work in the different departments has been quite satisfactory and in several instances above the usual percentage. The citizens of this district take a lively interest in their school and many of them visit the school during the term. Of the winter scholars attending fourteen appear on the Roll of Honor. This school includes No. 20 in Haverhill and No. 3 in Benton.

DISTRICT NO. 7.

We have not deemed it advisable to have a school in this District; but the few scholars now living there were accommodated for the winter term by attending a school under the management of the Board of Education of Piermont.

DISTRICT NO. 8.

The spring term of ten weeks and fall term of eleven weeks were taught by Miss Flora A. Temple. The teacher was faithful in the discharge of her duty and the advancement in the different departments has been very satisfactory.

The winter term of twelve weeks was taught by Miss Julia Cutting, a teacher of experience, and there was noticeable improvement during the term. Penmanship received attention and the improvement was quite satisfactory.

If the parents would join with the teacher and see that their children were promptly at school, there would be greater advancement.

DISTRICTS NOS. 9 AND 15.

These two Districts have been consolidated and a new school house built for the accommodation of both Districts. The spring term was taught by Miss Lillian B. Bemis. This was her first term in teaching, but she kept a very good school. There was marked improvement in the various branches taught. She has since taken a school for life. We hope that her success may be as good as it was in her first attempt at teaching.

The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Una Gray. We think that the fall term was very successful, but the winter term did not come up to our expectations.

DISTRICT NO. 10.

The spring term in this District was taught by Miss-Marion M. Brown with very good results. The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Lottie E. Gannett with her usual good success. In Miss Gannett is combined the many qualities that make a successful teacher. We believe that the pupils in this school made the greatest improvement in the much neglected studies of reading

and writing, than any other in this section of the town District. The interest manifested by the parents throughout the town District is not very commendable. In Districts where the parents take an interest in the school, the pupils and teachers are more interested and the school is of greater benefit. We would recommend that the parents visit the school room more frequently, and by so doing, help promote the interest of the schools.

DISTRICT NO. 12.

The spring term of ten weeks was taught by Miss Emma C. Weeks.

This school is quite small, (only seven pupils this term) but the children seemed earnest in their efforts to make the most of their opportunity, and made good progress in their studies.

The fall term of twelve weeks was taught by Miss Louise Page, and numbered nine pupils, who made commendable progress in all the branches taught. No winter term in this district.

DISTRICT NO. 14.

The spring term of ten weeks was taught by Miss Kate L. Wheeler. The work in the different departments has been very satisfactory. Miss Wheeler has the faculty of acquiring the good will of her pupils, and the interest manifested is largely due to her influence.

The fall term of ten weeks and winter term of twelve weeks was taught by Miss Mabel Hackett. At the closing exercises it showed that the teacher had been faithful in the discharge of her duties, as marked improvement was noticed in all of the studies.

DISTRICT NO. 18.

This school has had but two terms. The spring term of ten weeks was taught by Miss Mabel Hackett. The teacher was faithful in the discharge of her duties. This is the smallest school in the east part of the town.

The fall term of twelve weeks was taught by Miss Blanche Quimby. The scholars in this school made satisfactory improvement in their studies. The parents take an interest in their school, as their visits to the school show. Five out of eleven were on the Roll of Honor.

DISTRICT NO. 19.

There has been no school in this District during the past year, the pupils being accommodated in District No. 3.

DISTRICT NO. 20.

There has been no school in this District, the scholars being accommodated in No. 6.
