## TOWN WARRANT.

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[L. s.] THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Town's Meeting House, in said Henniker, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

ARTICLE I. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

ART. 3. To see how much money the town will raise to repair highways and bridges.

ART. 4. To see how much money the town will raise for schools other than that required by law.

ART. 5. To see how much money the town will raise in addition to that required by law, for the support and maintenance of the Public Library.

ART. 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to be used in the observance of Memorial Day.

ART. 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the building and repairing of sidewalks.

ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to discount all taxes paid on or before June 1st, three per cent ; all taxes paid on or before August 1st, two per cent ; all taxes paid on or before October 1st, one per cent.

ART. 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for electric lights, or pass any vote relative thereto.



ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation all outstanding town notes held by the citizens of the town.

ART. 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to be used in the observance of Old Home week.

ART. 12. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation the Henniker Steam Laundry Company, and for what term of years.

ART. 13. To see if the town will vote to exempt the Fred D. Dow Manufacturing Plant from taxation, and for what term of years.

ART. 14. To see what action the town will take in relation to its hydrant service.

ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to sell, or raise money to complete, engine house, or pass any vote relative thereto.

ART. 16. To see what action the town will take in regard to the repair and preservation of stone bridge on Bridge street.

ART. 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to purchase school supplies.

ART. 18. To see if the town will continue with its present system for the repair of highways, or pass any vote relative thereto.

## REPORT OF SELECTMEN.

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In this our annual report we wish, in a few words, to call the attention of the tax payers to a few items of expenditures which have this year increased the town debt.

We have come to a settlement to date with the Electric Light Company, paying last year's bill of some \$600.00 in addition to this year's bill.

We also found some \$400.00 of bills held back for various reasons, which were not presented for settlement last year. We do not censure the former board of selectmen. They could not pay bills unless presented.

At the annual meeting of last March we were instructed to hire \$750.00 for engine house, which with the expense of the new bridge of \$2,585.00, to replace the one burned, more than accounts for the increase in debt.

We make no apologies, we leave the criticism to you.

That we have been ably assisted by our associates in office, we would rightfully admit. Our highway surveyors, with but little exception, have been faithful in their work. That the town made no mistake in its selection of treasurer we can positively testify. Your tax-collector, elected last March, resigned on account of failing health, and our appointment of Timothy Peasley to that position certainly proved a wise one, as there is but \$127.44 of uncollected taxes; and he wishes to express his thanks to the tax payers for their hearty co-operation and courtesy shown which have made his success so signal.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

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The health of the town the past year, so far as it appears dependent on local conditions; has been very favorable. Our citizens generally have responded readily to the suggestions of the state and local boards of health, and the sanitary conditions of the town are reasonably good.

Several sewers are imperatively needed and will probably be furnished when we shall have an abundant supply of water for flushing. Our river bank suffers sadly because a very few citizens seem to have forgotten that the town furnishes a dumping ground for offal and waste.

Several cases of measles came into town in the spring at about the same time, and most of the children in the schools and the public generally were exposed before it was known the disease was here. About two hundred cases followed, one of which was fatal. In several cases this disease developed some weakness already existing in the patient and serious results followed.

The epidemic of grippe, followed so often by pneumonia, which is now proving so fatal, seems not at all dependent on local conditions, as all New England seems equally afflicted. We may hope that scientific investigation will show us the cause of, and remedy for, this terrible visitor to our cold climate.

The prevalence of smallpox throughout the country, and especially in all parts of our own state, warns us to take those steps known to be necessary to its prevention or

restriction. This disease, once so dreaded on account of its usual fatality, is now so well understood by physicians that it is very nearly our own fault if it prevails among us. Its present existence in so many parts of our state is due to gross carelessness and willful violation of law. As somebody will always be guilty in these respects it becomes the duty of every community to take care of itself.

Chapter 93, Public Statutes, Section 2: "No child shall attend any public school unless he has been vaccinated or had the smallpox."

Chapter 110, Public Statutes, Section 1: "The selectmen of a town whenever in their opinion the health of the inhabitants of the town, by reason of the spreading of the smallpox, shall require it, may appoint an agent for vaccination, who shall be provided at all times with suitable matter for communicating the kinpox. He may vaccinate all persons at the expense of the town who have not had the smallpox or the kinpox, and shall receive a suitable compensation therefor to be paid by the town."

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

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Although the attendance in most of our schools for the past year has been interrupted by sickness to an unusual extent, we are of the opinion that the progress made and their present condition will compare favorably with past records.

An epidemic of measles shortened the spring term of the High school two weeks, but with this exception the schools have been maintained throughout the town for the usual number of weeks.

At the beginning of the year last September, as it was represented to the Board that there would be an attendance of eight or nine pupils in the Hemlock Corner Division, we decided to maintain a term of ten weeks in that district. But three pupils made use of the opportunity offered, and the few pupils now in that district are conveyed to the central school in the village.

During the last vacation we received the resignation of five of our experienced and successful teachers, but the places thus made vacant have been satisfactorily filled with perhaps no further detriment to the schools than always occurs while new teachers are becoming familiar with their condition and needs.

Scholars, teachers and parents have shown a very creditable interest in the progress and reputation of our schools,



and more has been accomplished in ornamenting and making attractive our school rooms than in any other single year of our recollection.

In the primary room the children by contribution have purchased and hung two fine steel engravings, one being a beautiful copy of the "Sistine Madonna" by Raphael. Mrs. Prendergast, of Redlands, California, a former resident of this town, has generously donated ten dollars to this school which has been expended by the teachers in a platinum print by Geoffrey of "A Primary School in Brittany," and a carbon engraving by Millet entitled, "Feeding the Birds."

In the grammar school the pupils have purchased the steel engravings entitled, "The Shepherdess," by Levolle, and "The Return of the Mayflower," by Boughton. These pictures have done much to relieve the rooms of their bare, unattractive appearance, and could the walls be tinted and bordered it would be a further improvement. In addition to the amount raised for pictures, the pupils of these rooms have contributed nineteen dollars towards the purchase of a portable organ to be used as an aid in the vocal instruction of these schools.

The class of 1900, following the worthy example of their immediate predecessors, have donated to the library beautiful copies of Dante's "Divine Comedy," in three volumes, "Studies in Shakespeare," by Richard Grant White, "Epitome of Universal History," by Ploetz, and Dickens' "Child's History of England." Miss Edna Dean Proctor has sent a copy of her complete poetical works for the use of the school.

The board has expended the small sum raised by the town for this purpose, in the purchase of much needed

works suggested by the Faculty. It is hoped that something may be raised each year to add to our collection.

Finally, we are pleased to report far less friction, so far as our Board is concerned, in the general management of our schools than is usually encountered.

## REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF HENNIKER FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

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At the annual meeting of the town, held March 13, 1900, Mrs. Jennie N. Dodge was elected a trustee of the library, for a term of five years, to succeed Mrs. Charlotte I. Rice, whose term had expired, and her removal from town.

Miss Edna L. Connor, having resigned as librarian, early in the season, to return to North Dakota, Mrs. Dodge was chosen to succeed her, and has performed the duties of the situation since, having such assistance as needed.

There are now on the shelves of the library 2,615 bound volumes, besides a large number in paper covers, and a number of magazines mostly paid for by the library for the use of its patrons.

During the year past the library has been remembered by several donors, amongst whom are Mrs. Moody Currier, of Manchester; Nathan P. Sanborn, Esq., of Marblehead, Mass.; and Willis Howe, Esq., of Chicago, Ill. The usual number of State and Government reports have been received as books of reference. Besides these, the usual number of new volumes were added during the year.

Quite a number of books have been re-bound, and the collection of books is in generally good condition, showing faithful care of the same.

Mr. Emerson has made the usual reduction in rent, and for all donations the trustees are truly grateful, and they take this opportunity to express the hope that gifts to the library may increase, as the years come and go.

The circulation of books for the year past has been 6,680, an increase of 286 over the year previous, which was exceptionally large.
