THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in the Town Building in said town, on the second Tuesday of March, next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article I. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Article II. To choose three Selectmen for the ensuing year.

Article III. To choose three Trustees for the Littleton Public Library to serve three years each, in place of Frederick G. Chutter, Delia B. Mitchell and Charles F. Eastman, terms expired.

Article IV. To choose an Auditor for the ensuing year.

Article V. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for laying out and constructing and repairing highways and bridges, for the payment of town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, and for all other necessary town charges.

Article VI. To see what sums of money the town will raise and appropriate for observance of Memorial Day.

Article VII. To see what action the town will take in reference to electing a Road Agent or Agents.

Article VIII. To see what action the town will take in reference to authorizing the Selectmen to dispose of the pest house.

Article IX. To choose an Agent to enforce the liquor laws under provisions of Section 9 of Chapter 122 of Laws of 1903.

Article X. To see what action the town will take with regard to limiting the expenditure of the Littleton Water & Light Commissioners.

Article XI. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article XII. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article XIII. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

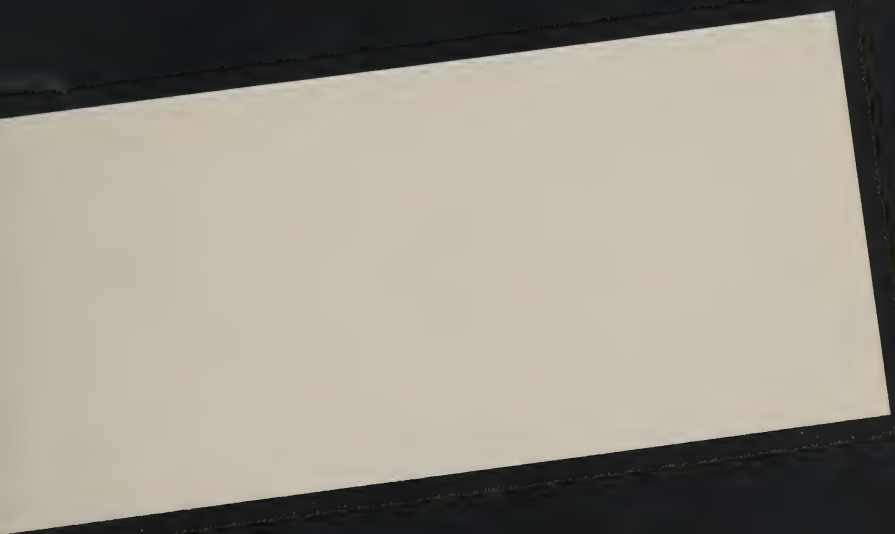

COMMENTS.

The policy of the state with reference to the regulation of the traffic of the sale of intoxicating liquors was changed by the act of the legislature at the last session, and the new License Law went into operation on the nineteenth day of May, last.

An unusual class of cases was brought before this court by the prosecution of offenders who accompanied a circus and who had perpetrated frauds upon patrons of the show.

The frequency of this sort of offences occurring in connection with the circus business of recent years would seem to justify the enactment of more stringent legislation on the subject.

All fines for criminal offences imposed in this court belong to the town and are annually paid over to the town, as shown by the town books. The fees of the justice are also collected and paid over to the town in the same way as are fines. The justice of the police court has no part of the fines or justice fees paid by those who have been found guilty of offences of which this court has jurisdiction.

COMMENTS.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners of Littleton, Fire District:

GENTLEMEN:—For the year ending February 1, 1904, this department has responded to forty-seven alarms, fifteen bell and thirty-two still, only one of which has been outside the precinct.

In the performance of their duties the members of this department have laid 5,150 feet of hose, of which 4,650 feet have been used at nine fires, and have used twelve chemicals.

The cost to the precinct has been \$277.07, an average of only \$5.39 24-47 for each alarm.

The fire loss has been \$7,060, an average of \$150.21 12-47. The loss in all fires but one has been fully covered by insurance.

CAUSE OF ALARMS.

Chimneys burning out were the cause of thirty-two alarms, stovepipe, one; grass fires, three; smoker's pipe, two; lightning, one; firecracker, one; matches, one; lamp, one; rubbish, one; sun shining through roof, one, and two the causes of which were unknown.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

We recommend the purchase of a one-horse, 35-gallon, double-tank chemical engine.

DIRECTIONS.

The glass covered box on side of alarm boxes contains the key; get the key by breaking the glass, and open alarm box; pull down the hook, letting go at once. **DO NOT PULL A SECOND ALARM UNLESS ORDERED BY THE CHIEF ENGINEER OR ONE OF HIS ASSISTANTS.**

The alarm will indicate the station from which the signal was given. Thus, a signal from Station 42 will be sounded by four strokes of the bell, followed by two strokes. This will be repeated, so that notice will be clearly given that fire has broken out in the vicinity of Station 42, if that be the case, because the alarm sounds a four, by four strokes of the bell, and a two, by two strokes of the bell. In this way Station 42 is indicated. The other stations will be indicated in a similar manner, the second number struck by the alarm bell corresponding to the number in unit's place either 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, or 7, as the case may be.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES.

An interesting feature of our town is the public library from the fact it has become a part of every home and every person. Again and again we hear it asked what could we do now without this treasury of intellectual things to draw from? What did we ever do without it? The increase of our schools, the increase of the clubs and the increased attention given to reading have made the library a positive necessity, and no one can determine which of our various intellectual functions has the largest influence upon the people. The fifteenth annual report gives great pleasure to those of us who have watched the change in the character of reading, the great demand of the young as well as the old for the high type of our literature has created the demand. We have loaned 16,709 books, 85 per cent has been fiction, but it is largely of the historic, biographical, and socialistic kind, which is educating. We have loaned in pure history, travel, and biography $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent; 2 per cent of the books taken has been along the lines of philosophic and scientific literature. This does not include the books used in the reading room nor those used for reference by the members of the various clubs, nor those used by the pupils of the public schools. We have purchased 202 volumes, 27 volumes of bound magazines to fill in sets. Four volumes have been presented by Mrs. Lang, two volumes by Hon. A. S. Batcheller, two by Margaret Merrill, one by E. A. Pillsbury, one by MacMillan Publishing Co., one by Physicians Publishing Co., one by Mrs. Mary E. Law, twenty-five volumes unbound magazines by Father Riley, two volumes unbound magazines by Frank Leach.

The year books of the following: Daughters of New Hampshire, Daughters of American Revolution, Kosmos club, Wakefield, Mass.; addresses before Old Planters' society, Salem, given by Mrs. Ida Farr Miller. The year books of the various clubs in town: Friday, Colonial, 19th Century, and Historical clubs.

Magazines have been given to the reading room by the Christian Science society, Mrs. W. H. Mitchell, Mrs. D. C. Remick.

We wish others would remember us with books and magazines.

It is the intention of the trustees to put large emphasis on standard works. While we are obliged to purchase the transient literature, we intend that nothing shall be eventually wanting in the permanent. The library is really an annex to the school, and its books are as necessary as the text books from which the children recite. The increasing of the curriculum increases the demand; we must supply the children, their education and expansion demand it.

We make bold to assert that there is no town of its size which has more literary clubs and more women doing good solid work than ours. There is no better expenditure of the town's money than that spent for the library.
