

REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINGENDING

SCHOOL COMMITTEE

O.F

MONT VERNON, N. H.

MARCH, 1868.

CITIZENS OF MONT VERNON: Being absent from you, and my time having expired, and my place filled by one engaged in teaching, I do not feel like suggesting that, which I might feel it duty, were I a citizen among you; but, rest assured, I still feel the deepest interest in all that pertains to your welfare and the purity and growth of your schools.

I think you may feel highly gratified with your schools, at least with those for which I report. I count it a great good that I re-

ceived by being permitted to associate with them.

I would that I might know there was a graded school in the Centre District, which I am sure would remove many difficulties in connection with the District School and Academy, and meet the wants of the parents, whose children are reaching the age when they need the advantages of a higher grade than should be in the school for small children. I feel that a town like yours, which possesses so many and such excellent facilities for a first class graded school, should enjoy its privileges. I intimate this as an honest conviction, growing out of my knowledge of your wants and the wants of your children.

As I said in my last year's report, your schools have been a

success, with one exception.

Centre District. The Summer and Fall terms were under the instruction of Miss Fannie McCollom, of Mont Vernon. I can freely say, she was mistress of the school room; competent to teach and to govern, and all will justify me, I think, in saying,

that her equals are few, her superiors none. Great improvement was seen in the school, especially in its out-door deportment. Marked proficiency was made in the different branches taught, to the great satisfaction of all who favored the school with their

presence.

The Winter term was also under the instruction of Miss Mc-Collom, and, in our opinion, was a complete success. The quiet demeanor of the scholars, both within the school room and outside of it, was specially noticable. The fact that her pupils remembered her with a token of their esteem, is good evidence of faithfulness on her part in school room duties. The comments of my predecessor upon the preceding terms, are equally applicable to this term.

South District. The Summer term was taught by Miss Fannie Nichols. I am certain that if the exertion had been put forth by the teacher in another district not her own, success would have crowned her efforts. Advantage is often taken by old schoolmates, but they should be encouraged by the parents to promptness, obedience and respect. I regret the course pursued, and trust that experience has been a wise teacher. I can recommend

Miss Nichols as a competent and energetic teacher.

Winter term, Miss Mary E. P. Dascomb, of Milford, teacher. Miss D. is a teacher of considerable experience, having taught thirty-nine months previous to the present term. We consider her qualified by acquirements and experience for a first class teacher; and although the school was not all that could be desired, it was not from any want of competency on her part, but from willfulness on the part of some of the pupils. Circumstances of a similar nature during the Summer term were detrimental to the interests of the school.

East District. The Summer term was taught by Miss Emma L. Spring, of Milford. The school was a happy, quiet and profitable one. The proof that she continues to teach in the same district, speaks for the feeling co-operation of the parents. This district is to be commended for its enterprise. Within a year the school house has undergone a thorough renovation, making it a cheerful school room, and an attractive prayer room.

Winter term, Miss Emma L. Spring, teacher. Miss Spring

has had charge of the school during the year.

North District. Miss Addie McConihe, of Milford, teacher. She did well and gave general satisfaction. The pupils in this district apply themselves to their studies with great diligence, and their deportment is commendable. If the parents were as much

united as the children, more good might be derived from the mon-

ev expended.

Winter term, Miss Mary A. E. Gray, teacher. The school was visited several times during the term, and appeared well.—The discipline was not quite as strict as could be desired. The class in geography is specially to be remarked for its promptness in examination.

West District. Miss Carrie Stearns. A teacher consecrated soul and body to her work, and the fruit of her labors and prayers was plainly visible. I wish some of the larger schools might have the benefit of her influence; and the teachers some of her devotion to the moral as well as intellectual training of your children.

Fall term was taught by Miss Addie E. Adams, of New-Boston. This school is small, and therefore there is an opportunity to give each scholar a thorough drill, which Miss Adams has done faithfully. She is a teacher of considerable experience and good qualifications, and has the faculty of imparting knowledge with facility to others.
