REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

During 1980 the Board of Selectmen completed a busy year in the normal responsibilities of their positions.

Reflecting the high cost of construction Building permits decreased over 1979, with eleven (11) permits for new homes and ninety-one (91) permits for alterations and/or additions to existing homes. A new ordinance forbidding the plowing of snow across Town roads resulted in twenty-two (22) permits granting an exception; seventeen (17) sign permits and thirty-one (31) yard sale permits were also granted during the year.

The New Hampshire Supreme Court decision on the Sutton/Kezar Lake suit was settled against the Town in December of 1979. In May of 1980 the Town paid out \$164,494.00 in settlement costs. This amount was not added into the tax rate, but was taken from surplus funds.

In 1980 104 parcels of property were approved under the guide line of Current Use. This constitutes a total of 3,586.50 acres in New London under Current Use, representing an original assessed value of \$3,014,085.00 Because of changes in our percentage of valuation to 100% equalized valuation, which is at 63% for the year 1980, this assessment valuation drops to \$165,795.00. This means a revenue loss to the Town in the amount of \$60,316.97.

As a result of a vote of the 1980 Town Meeting the Selectmen obtained a parcel of land from the Kearsarge Regional School District located immediately adjacent to and behind the New London Fire Station. Possible plans for the future use of this land include an expansion of the Fire House and new living quarters for the Police Department.

In August of 1980 four (4) monitoring wells were installed at the landfill, under the supervision of the State Water Supply and Pollution Control and Bureau of Solid Waste Management, to determine the

possibility of groundwater contamination by leachate from the New London landfill. With the future of the Towns' rubbish disposal facilities uncertain a Solid Waste Disposal Committee was formed and Charles Mortensen, Robert Evans, Dana Stanley, Cathy Robjant and Robert Lull agreed to serve and make a study of possible alternatives to the present method of disposing of rubbish.

With an eye to modernization and efficiency, the Town employees payroll, and the real estate tax bills are now on computer billing.

Included in the many decision made by the Board was the awarding of a Cable T.V. franchise to Kearsarge Cable Communications, Inc. a subsidiary of Telephone and Data Systems, Inc. A request by the cable company for authorization to operate the system in New London and a petition for a waiver to operate within the exchange area of the Kearsarge Telephone Company are under consideration by the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D.C.

The gift of 70.9 acres of land, located on Otterville Road, from Mrs. Bessie Phillips of Salem, Mass., to be called the Stephen Phillips Memorial Preserve, was gratefully and appreciatively received by the Selectmen, in behalf of the Town. Mrs. Phillips has stipulated that this land be retained in its natural state to assure future generations the opportunity to enjoy the rural charm that has helped make New London the fine community that it is.

In December the Selectmen regretfully accepted the resignation and retirement of Ged Prescott as Highway Superintendent. Mr. Prescott is an example of the many elected and appointed officials whom the Board thanks for their continued willingness to serve and their devotion to the Town of new London. Mr. William Green was appointed the new Highway Superintendent.

Early in 1981 the New London sewer system went on line to Sunapee. There is no further effluence being discharged into Lyon Brook.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING JANUARY 29, 1980

Amend Zoning Ordinance:

Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the existing town zoning ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?

(A topical description of substance of proposed amendment is as follows: Hospitals, sanatoriums, nursing homes, convalescent homes, churches, religious institutions, private schools and other private educational institutions would be permitted in the Residential, Agricultural and Rural Residential, and Commercial Districts only as a special exception when the Board of Adjustment finds, after a hearing, that the same meets the requirements for a special exception. The requirements for any special exception, briefly summarized, would be as follows: (a) Project to have no adverse effect on environment nor impair neighboring property values nor be detrimental or injurious to neighborhood nor discourage its orderly development. (c) Reasonable need for project in location proposed, is shown. (d) There are adequate and legal facilities or arrangements for sewage and solid waste disposal, water supply, utilities, drainage and other necessary services. (e) Project would not cause traffic congestion or be detrimental to traffic movement. (f) Project will be consistent with spirit of ordinance, including density requirements. Board of Adjustment may impose reasonable conditions to prevent nuisance and promote harmony with neighborhood, including proof of financial responsibility if a large construction project is involved.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of New London in the county of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kearsarge Middle School Auditorium in said New London on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at 12:00 o'clock noon to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1.A. choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
B. To vote by ballot on an amendment to the New London Zoning map.

“To extend the **Commercial District** Northerly along the **East Side of Pleasant Street** a distance of approximately **three hundred and forty-five feet (345')**, and at a depth of approximately **six hundred and fifty-five feet (655')**, as shown on the Zoning map.”

NOT RECOMMENDED BY PLANNING BOARD

NOTE — By law, the meeting must open before the voting starts. Therefore, the Meeting and Polls will open at 12:00 noon for the consideration of Article #1, Parts A and B.

At 12:30 p.m. the Meeting will recess but the Polls will remain open until 8:00 p.m. The Meeting will reconvene at 7:00 p.m. to act upon Articles 2 through 43.

Art. 2.

A. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$800,000.00, for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications and constructing replacement sewers and appurtenances as required by the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et. seq.) and which will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$300,000.00 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH R.S.A. 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of New London, and to allow the Sewer Commission to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government

under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

Further: To see if the Town will also vote to authorize the Sewer Commission to incur indebtedness for the project in (a) above in anticipation of the receipt of monies from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) by issuing note or notes payable not more than two years from their dates or as required by NH R.S.A. 33:7-b and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums for the ensuing year to defray Town charges:

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 for maintenance and up-dating of the Tax Maps.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 for revaluation pickup work on assessments.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$7,600.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser for the Police Department. The Selectmen are authorized to receive such funds from Federal, State or private sources which may be made available to offset the cost of the Police Cruiser.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$29,500.00 for the purchase of a three (3) Ton Diesel Dump Truck for the Highway Department. The Selectmen are authorized to receive such funds from Federal, State or private sources which may be made available to offset the cost of the Dump Truck.

Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act for use as a setoff against the following capital items.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to spend Highway Subsidy Funds in the amount of \$17,537.35 for the improvement of Class IV and V highways. (RSA 241.14)

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to spend Highway Subsidy Funds in the amount of \$13,264.38 for the construction or reconstruction of Class IV and V highways. (RSA 241:15).

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,600.00 for the purchase of two (2) "Gasboy-keytrol" gasoline pump devices to provide an accurate record of motor fuel use.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$12,500.00 for a Sewer Infiltration Study.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,110.00 for payment of the Town of New London's share in the Sunapee Sewage Treatment Plant Facility.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a capital reserve fund pursuant to RSA 35 for the purchase of an ambulance from such funds derived from the lease of the Town Ambulance to the New London Hospital Association.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen, and the Town Treasurer, to incur debts from time to time during the 1981 fiscal year to an aggregate amount not exceeding the 1980 Tax levy, for temporary loans in anticipation of 1981 taxes, and to issue notes of the Town therefor, which shall be payable in one year from their dates, and to refund same, all as provided in the Municipal Finance Act: The Selectmen and Town Treasurer to be authorized to sell such notes.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Planning Board to review and approve or disapprove site plans for the development of tracts for multi-family dwelling units (other than one and two family dwellings) as provided in the 1979 amendment to RSA 36:19-a.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to adopt as a Town Ordinance the following:

1. A fee of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) will be assessed by the Board of Selectmen for each building permit for new construction.
2. A fee of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) will be assessed by the Board of Selectmen for each building permit for renovations or alterations of existing structures.

This Ordinance shall take affect upon its passage.

Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to adopt as a Town Ordinance the following:

"It shall be unlawful for any person to dispose of, or at-

tempt to dispose of, solid waste at the New London landfill sites which has not been generated within the limits of the Town of New London.”

Violation of this Ordinance shall be punishable by penalties as provided by RSA 31:39.

This Ordinance shall take affect upon its passage.

Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to adopt as Town Ordinance the following:

“It shall be unlawful for anyone to construct a driveway onto a public right of way, except under supervision of the Town Highway Superintendent.”

This Ordinance shall take affect upon its passage.

Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 76:15-a providing for semi-annual collection of taxes, commencing in 1982.

Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint an Archivist for the Town of New London.

Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept the new Information Booth, as a gift from the Chamber of Commerce, located on the Town Common.

Art. 40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept, as a gift, the new District Court Clerk’s office located in the Town Hall.

Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Town Committee to be know as “Elkins Sesquicentennial Committee” with the appointing power given to the Ladies Aid Society of Elkins.

Art. 42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell, by sealed bids, the property located on Map 84, Lot 44, known as the Addie Gay property, with the right of rejection on any bid and that the proceeds be invested with the income thereof used for Town purposes.

Art. 43. To see if the Town will vote to ask the Board of Selectmen to take no action to erect, re-erect, or continue any signs which have the effect of changing two way traffic to one way traffic on all, or any part of Lakeside Road or any other Town road or street until and unless they first shall have held a public hearing on the change, with due notice to the residents and voters of the road or street involved and of the Town.

(By Petition)

Art. 44. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes if deemed necessary by the Selectmen.

NEW LONDON CEMETERY COMMISSION

There were thirty-one (31) interments during the year 1980. Since fifteen (15) of these took place in Old Main St. Cemetery, the necessity of completing the development of the new addition is imminent, as very little space is now available in the existing cemetery. Access roads to the new area will be completed this year (1981) along with the proposed plot layouts. Major tree removals and trimming have been completed along the stone wall at the boundary of the new section.

The expense of expanding West Part Cemetery may be deferred another year, as the available space will apparently satisfy the 1981 requirements, since only 5 interments occurred here in 1980. Elkins Cemetery received the balance, or 11 interments.

Mr. Willis Prescott was elected a Cemetery Commissioner, and his advice and experience have proved to be very valuable assets to the Commission.

This year, because of power failures, we had occasions to use the generator at the dispatch. This enabled the Town to have communications with all departments, which otherwise would have been impossible.

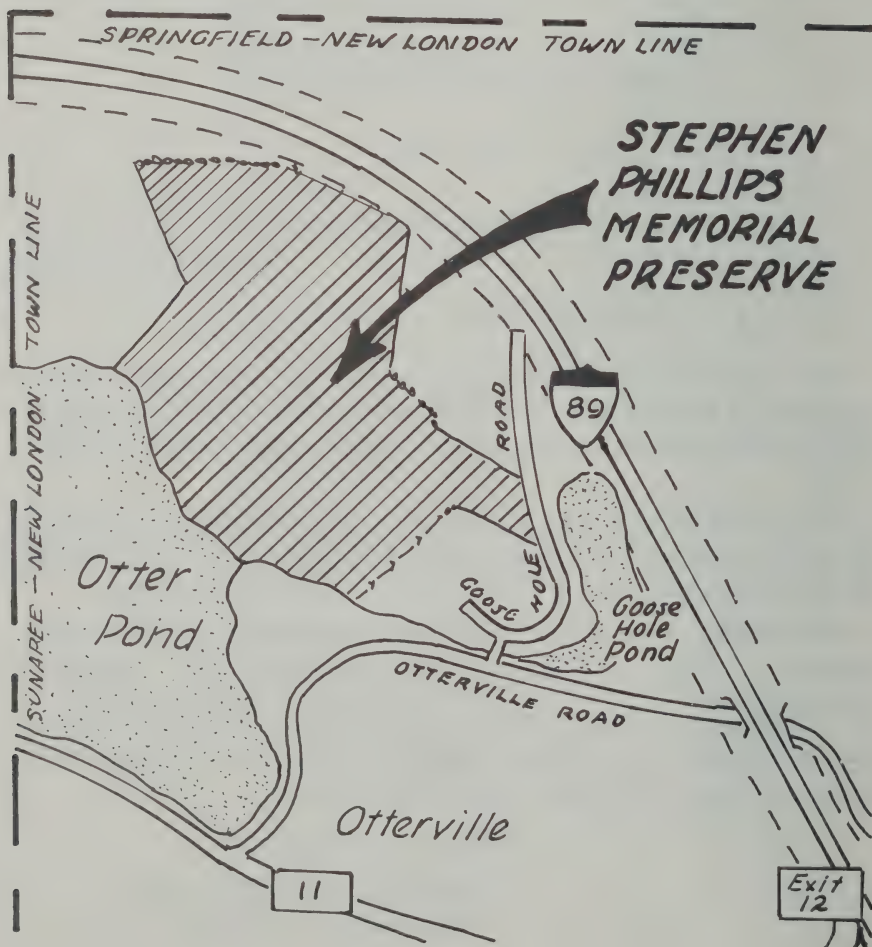

ANNUAL REPORT NEW LONDON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The New London Conservation Commission is pleased to report a significant donation of 70.9 acres of wooded hillside between Goose Hole Pond Road and Otter Pond. Deeded to the Town by Bessie W. Phillips the area will be known as the Stephen Phillips Memorial Preserve. This Commission plans a scenic, all-season trail through the tract which will show its ledges, former granite quarry, and lakeshore. With some removal of trees at the summit there promises a view of Lake Sunapee to the east.



A loop trail to Shepard Spring off Mountain Road was completed this summer. The trail features the year-round spring and a lovely, gentle wood ridge. Off-road parking is provided at the trail entrance.

Extensive work on the Lyon Brook Trail continues including foot-path maintenance, signs and a new bridge in 1980. The trail follows the course of Lyon Brook through the courtesy of adjacent landowners who have given easements for the trail to cross their property. The Commission gratefully acknowledges the most recent such easement given by Arthur and Linda Gurr. Further easements to secure this mid-town green strip, hopefully, will be obtained in 1981.

The Philbrick-Cricenti Bog Path continues to be the most popular of the trails maintained by the Commission. During the past year 1,720 visitors signed the register at the entrance. Activity on all trails grew in 1980. An updated trails map is available at the Town Clerk's Office in Kidder Garage. Virtually all these trails are suitable for year-round enjoyment.

**COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM
BELKNAP-MERRIMACK COUNTIES, INC.**

The Kearsarge Valley Community Action Program located in the Old Graded School, Main Street, Warner, serves eight towns in Merrimack County: Bradford, Henniker, New London, Newbury, Sutton, Warner, Webster, and Wilmot. This year we were able to double the dollar amount of services to the Elderly and low-income families of this area. That translates to \$354,463.63 in services.

Services to the Elderly include Meals-on-Wheels and the Senior Companion Program for shut-ins; Congregate Meal Sites in Henniker, New London-Wilmot, and Warner; and a Rural Transportation Bus that gets Senior Citizens into Concord. Our fuel assistance program last year reached 220 families in the eight towns. We expect that this year even more people can be helped. We are again offering an Adult Basic Education Course teaching basic skills in the areas of parenting, family health, money management and nutrition. In addition, this year we are going on 24-hour call for emergency situations. There will be a phone number published when the program gets into full operation.

The money your town appropriates for Community Action goes to run the Area Center in Warner. The Center's budget goes for salaries, travel expenses, office supplies, and the cost of heat and maintenance for the Community Action Neighborhood Center. The federal government provides the bulk of monies for the 1981 budget. What we ask from each town is a percentage of program participants from each town.

REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON DISTRICT COURT

From October 1, 1979 to September 30, 1980, 4,563 cases were entered in the New London District Court representing an increase of 23.8% over the number of cases entered in 1979. The breakdown of the cases was as follows:

1980 was a year of change for the Court, in that in January Justice George O. Shovan retired as Justice of the Court, having reached the mandatory retirement age on January 17, 1980, after ably serving as Justice of the Court for over 10 years.

In May, Margaret Abbott, who has served as Clerk of the Court long and faithfully, determined to resign and was replaced by her deputy, Ann Hammond. At the same time, the Clerk's office was moved from Miss Abbott's home to a newly constructed office in the basement of the New London Town Hall, which is the building in which the Court sits, providing easier access to the Court by the public. With the addition of the new Clerk's office, it now appears that the Court's physical facilities meet the standards espoused by a recent study of our court system, and should do so for some time to come.

In July the Court was one of several around the state that converted from its existing bookkeeping system to a system designed by the Administrative Committee of the Municipal and District Courts for the State of New Hampshire, which system was required to be adopted by all municipal and district courts in the State no later than January 1, 1981.

In closing, I would like to note the relatively small number of criminal cases entered in our Court. Assuming that the number of cases reflects the amount of crime in our District, I think all of us who live here should be thankful that we seem so far to have missed the skyrocketing rate of increase in crimes committed which plagues our nation as a whole. Lets hope we can continue on this same trend in the future.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FOREST FIRE CHIEF AND YOUR TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

The Town Health Officer spent much of his time onsite, checking test pits for proposed sub-divisions and subsurface sewage disposal systems. All sewage disposal system plans were reviewed and approved before being sent to the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission Office.

Many wells were tested during the spring. Lake Sunapee, Little Lake Sunapee, Pleasant Lake and Messer Pond were monitored during July, August, and September. These lakes were also inspected visually for sources of pollution.

The cooperation of all residents, summer as well as year-round, in helping to maintain the good water quality enjoyed in our lakes is greatly appreciated.

REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY SUPERINTENDENT

In the Spring of 1980 we were again plagued with a heavy rain that washed out several roads. The most heavily damaged was the section of Bog Road that passes under Interstate 89.

Our plans for 1980 were to upgrade our roads. This was carried out by cutting brush on approximately eight (8) miles of roads and by surfacing or resurfacing over ten (10) miles of roads with a cold patch mix. The Contractor for the Sewer Project resurfaced Otterville Road and did an excellent job. Also, over ten (10) miles of gravel roads were resurfaced.

Besides these improvements larger culverts were installed on Stoney Brook Road to stop the washouts that occur there regularly. The bridges on North Pleasant Street and Wilmot Center Road were widened eight (8) feet for safety reasons. Also, the road by the Elkins Chapel was widened and the wall relaid to make this a safer area.

At the Town Garage we finished the landscaping and seeding of the grounds and built a new road to the recycling plant that provides a safer approach for those bringing paper and bottles to the plant.

We are proud of our landfill that is one of the best in the State. This year we were required to install four (4) new wells for monitoring the ground water pollution, but as of now there is no problem. With proper planning this facility will last for several more years.

NEW LONDON HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION, INC.
ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY
1980

The year 1980 has been very eventful for the hospital in serving the needs of New London and surrounding towns.

Installation of new X-ray equipment, expansion of the intensive care unit, rearrangement of operating and recovery room facilities, new air conditioning for the area, and a new direct corridor from the Outpatient entrance to the front lobby were completed in time for exhibition to the public in an open house on May 13th, 14th and 15th, during National Hospital Week. These changes, at a cost of \$456,000, were accomplished without outside borrowing.

The Long Range Planning Committee studied the level of care needed by the community, and they have recommended initially that Swan-Ganz invasive monitoring be provided in the intensive care unit to improve means of measuring heart function of seriously ill patients. The \$17,000 necessary to provide this equipment has been included in the 1981 budget, and a year-end appeal for these funds exceeded its goal. This year-end appeal has been a part of an effort during the year to create an effective and ongoing development program for the hospital.

A Quality Assurance Plan was formally adopted and assigned to the Joint Conference Committee. This committee has representatives from the Medical, Surgical, Nursing and Administrative staffs, as well as from the Board of Trustees.

During the year, the 'Philosophy and Objectives' of the hospital were carefully considered, reworded, and proposed as a change to the Constitution. Other changes proposed will place a uniform three year limit on the term for all officers of the Board of Trustees, will establish minimum attendance requirements for all officers and trustees, and will designate the title of all Board members as 'trustee'.

The Administrative Staff has maintained close liaison with nearby hospitals. Students from Dartmouth Medical School obtain part of their training at the New London Hospital, and George Washington University, Washington, D.C., provides an administrative resident for one year, as part of their requirement toward a master's degree in hospital administration. During the past year, Mr. John E. Sunde has filled this post with distinction.

Harry Lowd was elected to the Executive Committee of the Northeast Canadian American Health Council, Vice President of the New Hampshire Hospital Association, and to the National Commission on Nursing; and Frances Bonardi was named a Director of the New Hampshire Chapter of the American Nurses Association.

Primary nursing care, instituted in January 1980, has worked very satisfactorily. This concept makes one nurse responsible throughout her shift for all nursing care of her patients.

The administration of a memorial fund in the name of Barbara Jane Baker, a former student at Colby-Sawyer College, amounting to \$16,850, was transferred from the college to the hospital, earmarked for use by the laboratory for equipment and/or training.

A gift of \$12,000 from the New London Service Organization was received and greatly appreciated. This gift was made possible under the terms of the will of the late Herbert D. Swift, a former President of the hospital. \$10,000 of this is to help offset indebtedness of indigent patients from New London, and \$2,000 is toward the purchase of the Swan-Ganz invasive monitoring equipment.

The year saw changes in personnel. Eleanor Spaulding, following over nine years of dedicated service to the hospital and the Clough Extended Care Center, retired as of October 1st; a tea was held in her honor on September 30th. Arnold Nichols, the trustee representing Springfield, submitted his resignation which was accepted with regret and with sincere thanks for his years of service. Mrs. Malcolm Patten was appointed to complete his unexpired term. A great loss was experienced in the death of Bishop Charles Gilson, who had served the hospital with distinction; he will be sorely missed on the Advisory Council.

Two resolutions were passed: one in appreciation of the dedicated service of F. Graham McSwiney for three years as President of the Board of Trustees; the other requiring disclosure of possible conflict of interest by members of the Board of Trustees.

The Medical Staff has been expanded and now includes 22 on the Active Staff, 3 on the Associate Staff, 20 on the Consulting Staff, 4 on the Honorary Staff, 2 on the Courtesy Staff and 10 on the Outpatient Department/Emergency Room Staff.

AUXILIARY OF THE NEW LONDON HOSPITAL

The Auxiliary of the New London Hospital, which is celebrating its 55th year, held eight regular monthly meetings from October 1979 through May 1980 followed by their annual meeting in June. The Auxiliary Board met monthly, augmented by various auxiliary committees who met as needed during the year. Our membership is over 405 with an average attendance of 80 at our monthly meetings.

The primary concerns of our auxiliary are threefold: the Volunteer Service program within the hospital, the health care education programs which are aired at our monthly meetings, and our fund raising projects.

This past year, over 105 dedicated men and women provided 5200 hours of Volunteer service in both the acute and extended care units of the hospital. *Worth of note* - we are most fortunate to have the experience and "know how" of Frances Baynes, director of Volunteer Services who directs the major endeavors. She is entering her 50th year of continuous volunteer service here and throughout the United States. This summer, she also supervised the "Volunteens", 5 energetic young people who donated 400 hours of service in the hospital.

In the health education field, we held a variety of programs which were open to the general public, on the New England Eye Bank, Nutrition for Health and Wealth, "State of the Hospital", the Hospice and Hostel programs, Generic Drugs and Preventive Medicine. We are members of the New Hampshire Association of Hospital Auxiliaries, and attended several state workshops and hosted a state workshop here at the hospital with representation of ten other hospitals.

Our fund-raising efforts were concentrated in four projects - two rummage sales which netted a total of \$5,600.00, the auxiliary booths on Hospital Day which raised \$6,324.70 and the Barn Players Pillow Rental service which made an amazing \$860.00 (each rented at 5¢ apiece). With this money, we awarded two scholarships, one to Carol Kozikowski from New London, who is a student at Georgetown University, and Sandra Krajcik, from Sunapee who is attending Lenoir-Rhyne College in Hickory, North Carolina. In addition to these scholarships, we were able to purchase approximately \$8,600.00 of equipment, etc. for the hospital.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The New London Planning Board has had a busy year. In view of the many 'cases' coming before it, the Board decided to meet regularly twice each month instead of once. During 1980 the Board held twenty-two (22) regular meetings and three (3) special meetings, including one (1) special meeting for a public hearing on a zoning amendment.

Action was taken in the following categories:

- 14 Subdivisions
- 12 Site Plan Reviews
- 6 Annexations

In addition numerous discussions were held and opinions given on zoning and subdivision matters not requiring action.

An amendment to the Zoning Ordinance approved by the Planning Board was voted by the Town at a Special Town Meeting in January, and confirmed at the Annual Town Meeting in March. This amendment granted increased powers to the Zoning Board of Adjustment in ruling on Special Exceptions and also added hospitals, sanatoriums, nursing homes, convalescent homes, churches, religious institutions and educational institutions to the Special Exception list.

The traffic and parking study, authorized the previous year, was completed, and for the most part recommended to the Board of Selectmen for implementation.

Two new members were added to the Board: Bruce MacFarlane and Charles Mortensen, replacing the retiring chairman, Marshall Hoke, and Marilyn Andrews. Marshall Hoke was appointed an alternate member. This report gratefully acknowledges the service given to the Board and its chairman by all its members. Special mention should be made of Laura Mathewson's contribution as Acting Secretary, who fulfilled a necessary function in the absence of a regularly appointed Secretary.

SEWER COMMISION REPORT

During 1980 construction of the pump station and pipeline for the connection to the Sunapee system continued on or ahead of schedule. The system was practically completed at year end and was put in operation on January 13, 1981. Progress on the pump station at High Pine Lane has been slow, however we expect it will be completed this spring.

The Infiltration/inflow analysis and Sewer System Evaluation has been completed. This report recommends that certain sewers be replaced and that a great many manholes be repaired in order to alleviate the continuing problem of infiltration of ground water. It is expected that State and Federal Grants will be available to assist in the funding of this work. An Article to appropriate the funds for this project appears in the Warrant for the 1981 Town Meeting.

TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

In 1980, the library's circulation was the highest in its history. The adult and juvenile book circulation was 27,928, while periodicals and other non-book items brought the total circulation to 29,342.

In spite of a significant increase in the cost of books, 1,009 new titles were added to the collection through appropriations, memorial funds, and a generous gift of \$1,500 from the Friends of the Library. For the first time a considerable number of paperback editions were purchased especially for the youth collection. In addition to books purchased, the library received 305 gift books from patrons.

In 1980, the library hours were increased to include the noon hours on Wednesday and Friday.

The children's program, a vital part of the library's service to the community, included the Summer Reading Program, an after-school movie series, and the weekly story hours for preschool children. Volunteers gave many hours of assistance to make these services available.

In 1980, we had some changes in the staff. Assisting Mrs. Susanne Filkins, Head Librarian, are two part-time assistants, Mrs. Martha

Denz and Mrs. Kathleen Timbrell, and Mrs. Cheryl Newton at the circulation desk. Mrs. Lucy Woodward and Mrs. Marjorie Stevenson are substitutes. We are fortunate to have this excellent staff.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

The year 1980 had it's usual problems in the operation of the Precinct, all of which were dealt with as they arose.

First it was gratifying to see a greater interest in precinct affairs by the voters as indicated by the number of people present to take part in matters of concern to us all. An informational meeting was held in August on the engineering report mandated by the E.P.A. A special meeting was held on December 10, 1980 in which it was voted to have the engineering report rescinded by the W.S.P.C.C. which has since been done. It was also voted to introduce, for the first time, the bi-partisan ballot system.

Last February the reservoirs almost went dry. Due to the lack of snow and extremely cold weather, thick ice prevented a free flow of water from the settling basin. As the reservoirs were refilled the problem of high turbidity surfaced, that was found to emanate from #2 reservoir. The reservoir was drained, cleaned out and re-lined with a plastic mesh by our own crew and refilled. As a result, turbidity has tested lower than ever. The Commissioners felt that the situation was serious enough to be declared an emergency and was paid for by fund temporarily borrowed from the Capital Reserve Fund.

The Capital improvement project of 1980 was the relaying of the Farwell Lane pipe line which has been completed. Attention can now be focused on the start of updating the 3'' line over Burpee Hill. Hopefully a start can be made on this project this fall.

Five new house services were completed and one commercial development main was installed.

Eight weekly classes were attended by Water Department personnel prior to certification as operators in treatment and distribution systems throughout the state, per R.S.A. 332 as enacted by the 1979 Legislature, effective date June 25, 1980.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

December 31, 1980

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the New London Water System Precinct conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governmental units.

Basis of Accounting - The accrual basis of accounting is followed to determine income and expense for the year.

Inventory - The inventory of supplies is priced at cost. Based on physical inventory taken once a year, the increase or decrease in the inventory value is charged or credited to supply expense.

Water Precinct Facilities and Equipment - The utility plant in service and equipment are stated at undepreciated cost. Gifts or contributions of water facilities are recorded at fair market value at the time received. Assets disposed of or abandoned are written off at cost against the appropriate asset account and charged to the General Fund balance or Contributions in Aid, depending on the original source of the assets.

Note 2 - Cash

At December 31, 1980, the Operating Cash account included \$5,379.00 which had been borrowed in October from the Capital Reserve Account to help finance operations until precinct tax payments were received in December; these funds were transferred back to the Capital Reserve Account on January 8, 1981.

At December 31, 1980, the Capital Reserve Account owed the Operating Cash Account \$1,232.00 for the purchase of capital equipment appropriated at the 1980 Water Precinct meeting. These funds will be transferred in 1981.

Note 3 - Precinct Tax

The Precinct tax according to State regulations has no restrictions. The income from this tax is used primarily to pay principal and interest on outstanding debt, and to pay for plant and equipment. The tax is reported as Other Income to avoid distortion of the gain or loss from water operations.

Note 4 - Contribution in Aid

Additions to the water facilities made during the year at the expense of private owners and donated to the New London Water Precinct amounted to \$1,326 in 1980 and \$1,928 in 1979. Abandonment of water facilities in 1980 that were originally Contributions in Aid amounted to \$2,000. There were no abandonments in 1979.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Commissioners of the
New London Water System Precinct:

I have examined the balance sheet of the New London Water System Precinct as of December 31, 1980 and 1979, and the related statements of revenues and expenditures and changes in financial position for the years then ended. My examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

In my opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the New London Water System Precinct as of December 31, 1980 and 1979, and the results of its operations and the changes in its financial position for the years then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.
