REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Taking a general view of our schools the past year, I feel authorized to express a favorable opinion. The teachers, with but one or two exceptions, have proved themselves worthy of the important trust committed to their charge. Some have exhibited unusual talent, energy, and aptness to impart instruction clearly and practically.

We can but feel ourselves highly favored as a town since there are

but few that will resolve to have the necessary qualifications, but think if they can barely "get a certificate" it is sufficient.

And while parents feel an interest in their children's welfare, they should look well to their education, as it is one of the prime elements of society and the foundation of future prosperity. They certainly do not wish to have them educated theoretically, but physically, intellectually and morally. Think not that the best committee the town can produce or the best teachers can do this without the hearty coöperation of the parents. Parents should be careful never to speak disparagingly of the teacher in the presence of their children, as such remarks are very injurious. If they are dissatisfied with the teacher let them go to him with their complaints, and not murmur before their children. The hearts of the parents ought to be in the work as well as the teacher, encouraging their children to learn, aiding them and asking them questions about their lessons, thus continually increasing their interest in school. The habit of thoroughness should be formed in early life, thus assisting them to become practical scholars — qualifying them both for public and private life.

Much more might be said in regard to faults existing at present in our schools, and the most efficient remedies, but I will leave this for abler pens than mine. With these remarks I respectfully present the following items relative to each school:

DISTRICT No. 1. The Summer school was under the care of Miss MARY DOE. Length of school, 16 weeks; wages of teacher per month, including board, \$17; whole number of scholars, 32; average attendance, 21; instances of tardiness, 359; instances of dismissal, 60; visitors, 27.

Miss Doe entered upon her labors with some previous experience in teaching, but failed to maintain the discipline requisite for a good school. Some classes made fair improvement. It seems as if the teacher was not alone at fault where there are so many instances of tardiness.

Winter term taught by Mr. W. F. HARVEY. Length of school, 12 weeks; wages per month, including board, \$25; whole number of scholars, 36; average attendance, 29; instances of tardiness, 177; dismissals, 112; visitors, 43. "Order is Heaven's first law," and this may safely be said to be Mr. Harvey's in school. He appears to have inspired his pupils with a love to obey. If nothing else had been done but the attainment of such perfect order, I should think he had labored hard and deserves much praise. But this does not seem to be the case, as good improvement has been made in the branches taught.

DISTRICT No. 2. The Summer term was taught by Miss H. M. RAND. Length, 12 weeks; wages, \$18; scholars, 28; average, 25; tardy, 18; dismissed, 6; visits, 24.

Miss Rand sustained her former good reputation as a teacher. Her manner is mild, yet dignified, gentle, though firm. Marked improvement was made by all. The final examination was quite satisfactory. Rhetorical exercises very good.

The Winter term by Miss S. L. BEEDE. Length, 10 weeks; wages, \$21; scholars, 32; average, 30; not attending, 6; tardy, 32; dismissed, 7; visits, 72.

Miss Beede possesses all the necessary qualifications for an accomplished teacher. She secured the respect of both parents and scholars, and labored faithfully for the advancement of her school. The closing examinations and rhetorical exercises were of a superior character.

DISTRICT No. 3. The Summer and Winter terms were both taught by Miss M. A. KIMBALL. Length of summer term, 10 weeks; wages, \$14; scholars, 7; average, $5\frac{1}{2}$; dismissed, 2; visits, 19. Length of winter term, 11 weeks; wages, \$14; scholars, 9; visits, 24.

Miss Kimball has well sustained her former reputation as a profitable teacher. Good improvement was made by all the scholars attending school during both terms, who did honor to themselves by their diligence in study and promptness in recitation.

DISTRICT No. 4. Both terms by Miss L. A. C. HOLT. Length of Summer term, 12 weeks; wages, \$13; scholars, 22; average, 17; not attending, 2; tardy, 35; visits, 39. Winter: Length, 12 weeks; wages, \$16; scholars, 22; average, 19; not attending, 1; tardy, 70; visits, 30.

Miss Holt is a teacher of some experience, and taught this school with a good degree of success. She secured the respect of her scholars and gave general satisfaction. The final examination of both terms was highly satisfactory.

DISTRICT No. 5. Both terms were taught by Miss N. R. MORRILL. Summer: Length, 7 weeks; wages, \$13; scholars, 19; average, 17; tardy, 27; dismissed, 6; visits, 18. Winter: Length, 9 weeks; wages, \$13; scholars, 19; average, 18; not attending, 2; tardy, 32; dismissed, 18; visits, 18.

Miss Morrill is an experienced and successful teacher. She gave good satisfaction in this school. The examination and deportment of the scholars at the close of both terms were commendable. A good degree of improvement was made in the several studies pursued.

DISTRICT No. 6. Both terms by Miss A. E. DOW. Summer: Length, 9 weeks; wages, \$17; scholars, 26; average, 22; tardy, 8; dismissed, 4; visits, 43. Length of Winter term, 7 weeks; wages, \$26; scholars, 30; average, 25; tardy, 19; dismissed, 29; visits, 14.

Miss Dow has had much experience as a teacher. She possesses a good share of energy and a fine talent for illustration. The closing exercises of the Summer term were interesting; also a part of those in the Winter. The scholars learned thoroughly what they learned.

DISTRICT No. 7. Both terms by Miss E. A. FRENCH. Length of Summer term, 10 weeks; wages, \$10; scholars, 13; average, 10; tardy, 62; dismissed, 6; visits, 19. Length of Winter term, 7 weeks; wages, \$14; scholars, 15; average, 8; not attending, 3; tardy, 41; dismissed, 7; visits, 16.

Miss French is an inexperienced teacher. She is diligent and energetic, laboring cheerfully and earnestly for the improvement of her pupils. The closing examinations were very satisfactory.



DISTRICT No. 8. *Primary Department.* Both terms were taught by Miss S. E. GILBERT. Length of Summer term, 16 weeks; wages, \$18; scholars, 74; average, 45; tardy, 134; dismissed, 20; visits, 20. Length of Winter term, 13 weeks; wages, \$20; scholars, 54; average, 43; not attending, 50.

Miss Gilbert commenced this school without previous experience in teaching, and labored faithfully and with good success. Good order was maintained throughout both terms.

DISTRICT No. 8. *Advanced Department.* Summer term by Miss S. C. WILLEY. Length, 16 weeks; wages, \$18; scholars, 43; average, 19; tardy, 65; dismissed, 116; visits, 50.

Miss Willey is an experienced teacher. She devoted herself faithfully to the interests of the school, and was successful both in discipline and instruction. The closing exercises were pleasant and interesting.

Winter term by Mr. R. L. TILTON. Length of school, 13 weeks; wages, \$34; scholars, 49.

Mr. Tilton is an experienced, energetic, and successful teacher. He possesses a clear discrimination of character and an ardent devotion to his work. The school had not reviewed their studies when last visited, but gave evidence of good discipline and excellent progress in the branches pursued.

DISTRICT No. 9. Both terms taught by Miss A. DOE. Length of Summer term, 12½ weeks; wages, \$14; scholars, 7; average, 5; not attending, 4; tardy, 25; dismissed, 4; visits, 4. Length of Winter term, 10 weeks; wages, \$14; scholars, 10; average, 7; tardy, 41; dismissed, 11; visits, 5.

It is a wonder that the teacher had as much interest as she appeared to have, since it is the smallest school in town and but little interest manifested by the parents. Her order was good. The closing examination of both terms was satisfactory.

UNION DISTRICT. No return has been made.

There has been raised by assessment the present year for the support of schools, and appropriated to the several districts, including \$77.22 of literary fund, \$1099.12, as follows:
