## From the Special Committee of the Selectmen

April 15, 1991

Dear Fellow Citizens of Walpole:

At the Town Meeting on March 23, 1991, the people of Walpole concurred with the majority of the Selectmen that Article 4 and other related articles of the Annual Town Report should be adjourned until May 4, 1991. The purpose of the adjournment was to allow the Selectmen the time to revise the financial statements for accuracy. In this regard, many of the townspeople offered to sit on a special committee to assist the selectmen with this important task.

Several days after the March Town Meeting, Roger Santaw and Arly Stiger appointed the special committee. Collectively, the people appointed to the committee represented a tremendous pool of talent as well as a broad cross section of the people of the town. Immediately upon being appointed, the group began to meet almost daily to review, reconstruct and revise the Town Budget for 1991.

The first task of the committee was to set the guidelines for its activities. First and foremost it was agreed that the group would limit its task to "fact finding, not fault finding". It was also agreed that only with a "renewed spirit of cooperation will the common good of the community be realized on May 4th and for many years to come". In other words, working together in harmony and good faith will yield the quality of life and type of community in which we wish to live and prosper.

Specifically, the committee decided its role would be limited to providing the Selectmen with assistance and expertise to achieve the following specific tasks:

- 1. Review and revise the financial statement (and related data) for year 1990
- 2. Revise and recommend appropriations for 1991 expenditures
- 3. Review the financial status of 1991 to date and make recommendations
- 4. Provide other related services as requested by the Selectmen

In total the committee met about ten times formally, and in addition, some members also agreed to accept assignments as necessary. In total it required over 600 man-hours to complete the task and meet the request of the voters. Many of the meetings did go into the wee hours of the morning.

The committee met with many of the various departments, the public auditor and the Senior Auditor of the State of New Hampshire. To all of these people we offer our sincerest thanks for their assistance and patience.

Originally, in order to explain the revisions, we intended to draw comparisons between the original Town Budget presented in March with this revised Town Budget. However, after several early attempts, it became evident that numerous corrections and revisions made such a comparison confusing, if not impossible. With this thought in mind, we are offering this revised Town Budget and the 1990 Comparative Statement to stand on its own merits.

Regarding the bottom line, the amount to be raised through taxes, that number was reduced somewhat over the original budget, and is now only slightly higher than requested in the Town Report in 1989. This is significant because in the weeks following the March meeting, new increases or pending increases in spending were discovered for 1991 and daily we faced mandates from the State that could still cause our taxes to change long after the meeting postponed until May 4. With these pending revenue losses and increases in expenditures, it was decided to keep all recommended appropriations at a minimum for 1991. In many cases departments did not receive what was requested. Each of these cuts were difficult choices and not taken lightly.

We are hopeful that this budget meets the approval of the Town and each of us thank the many people who assisted the committee in this important opportunity to serve the people of the Town of Walpole. A special thanks to Cindy Heath, the Selectmen's secretary. Cindy attended every meeting to offer help and to take the minutes. She offered her help at her own expense. Each of us on the Committee offer our earnest hope that the spirit of mutual cooperation will prevail in this town for many years to come.

The funds for 1990 Article #8 (line item #24) for the purchase of a truck were not properly removed from the Capital Reserve funds in 1990, therefore the amount of \$46,914.52 will be left in Capital Reserve. As a result of the truck being purchased with General Funds, the taxes are greater. To reduce the impact on this tax increase, the normal Heavy Highway Equipment Capital Reserve of \$25,000 has been reduced to zero for 1991.
- B. Appropriation for Solid Waste Disposal (line item #26) is increased to include \$5,000 for repair of the crawler.
- C. Line items 28 and 29 are combined in 1991 and represent an increase over 1990 to include a full year's employment of the one full-time employee at the Recycling Center



## TOWN OF WALPOLE, NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT 1991

To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on Articles 1,2. Polls will remain open until 7:00 p.m. Following the counting of ballots, the meeting will be recessed until the 23RD day of March next at 9:30 a.m. in the forenoon, at which time the balance of the Articles will be acted on.

Article 1: To choose the necessary Town officers for their respective terms.

Article 2: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Walpole Zoning Ordinance and Map by extending the Boundaries of the Commercial District (Article VI, Section F) to include:

"That portion of the property designated on the Walpole Tax Maps as Map 12, Lot 11, which lies within 750 feet of the western edge of the New Hampshire Route 12 right-of-way, and located more or less directly across said highway from the North Meadow Plaza, so-called." To be voted on by ballot. (By Petition).

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$190,000. for the purpose of purchasing and renovating the Old Fire Station for use as town offices and to raise the same by the issuance of bonds or notes under and in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act (Chapter 33 of the N.H. R.S.A.) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and determine the details of such bonds or notes and the rate of interest thereon and to take such other actions as necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or nots as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Walpole. (By request) By Ballot

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,114,271.67 for the support of Town poor, for Town Libraries, to build and repair bridges and highways and for such other expenses as may accrue.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to raise money on notes of the Town for current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to accept such funds and bequests as have been left to it during the year.

Article 7: To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector Deed, by public auction (or Advertised Bid), or in such other manner as determined by the Board of Selectmen as justice may require.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend monies from the State, Federal or other Governmental units, or a private source, which become available during the year in accordance with the provisions set forth in New Hampshire R.S.A.'S.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,325.00 to purchase the Acer Computer System with software package.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to have a complete revaluation by a private appraisal firm that has been approved by the Department of Revenue Administration. Revaluation to be completed for the tax year 1992 or thereafter.

Article 11: To see if the voters will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) for the purpose of purchasing the Old Fire Station on Westminster Street as recommended by the Building Needs Study Committee. It is the purpose of this Article to provide the voters with an alternative to incurring long term debt as a means of purchasing of the property. (By Petition)

Article 12: To see if the Town is in favor of mandatory recycling in order to recover useful resources and prohibit recycable materials from being deposited in the Town Sanitary Landfill. Mandatory recycling to take effect after the siting and construction of a permanent recycling facility and at a date to be selected by the Board of Selectmen. Our temporary recycling facility is now operating at total capacity in serving a volunteer recycling program and could not possibly process the increase in recyclable materials resulting from the enactment of mandatory recycling. (BY REQUEST)

Article 13: To authorize a maximum expenditure of \$112,000 to construct and equipt a recycling center. To include a building as recommended by the Recycling Committee, together with machinery and equipment for processing of recoverable waste materials. (BY REQUEST)

Article 24: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$53,000 to trade a 1981 truck for a new truck, plow, two way dump body, lights, cab shield, pintle hitch, vibrator, plow hitch assembly, front mounted pump, valves to operate plow, body and sander installed and to authorize the withdrawal of the funds required from the Heavy Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for this purpose.

Article 25: To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### THE WALPOLE SEWER PROJECT

#### FIRST PHASE - NORTH WALPOLE

Phase I of our sewer project has, as reported in the 1989 Town Report, been in operation since July of 1988. During 1990 the final audit of this completed phase was made by the State as agent for the EPA as well as for the State. The audit resulted in the EPA releasing the retained funds in the amount of \$33,610 and further determining that their grant should be increased by \$71,335 to cover their portion of the eligible expenses. A check in the amount of \$104,945 has been received to cover these two amounts. Based on these findings, the State increased their grant by \$37,610 thereby reducing the Town's portion of the capital debt due on the first bond issue.

Using the present figures, the final cost of Phase I of the project is \$3,252,746.00. Of this total the:

The Federal Government may, at anytime within three years, conduct a further audit of the projects records.

An average of approximately 70,000 gallons a day are now being pumped from North Walpole to the WasteWater Treatment Facility in Bellows Falls, Vt.

# SECOND PHASE WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY IN BELLOWS FALLS

As previously reported, Walpole has no responsibility for the engineering or construction involved in this project. Our sole obligation is to pay the State and Town share of the costs. This has been estimated to be \$461,792. payable in four installments of \$115,448. each. We have made three payments. The fourth will be made after the final audit of the project, probably in late spring or early summer. At that time any necessary adjustments will be made and the final amount determined. The estimated funds necessary to make the final payment are in a CD payable on June 19, 1991. Of the total estimated payment, the State will reimburse the Town in the amount of \$338,237 leaving an estimated total cost to the Town of \$123,555. We have also paid an initial tie in charge of \$24,354.

#### THIRD PHASE - WALPOLE VILLAGE

Now we come to the final phase of the project - Walpole Village.

You may recall that the Town of Walpole was under an Administrative Order dated October 17, 1988 to complete Phase III on or before October 1, 1990. If the schedule was not met the Town would be in contempt of court and subject to a substantial fine. We are pleased to record that the terms of the order were met and the order has been released. All those on the sewer in No Walpole as well as Walpole are to be congratulated for their successful effort to meet the specified dates.

On June 11, 1990 the old sewer in Walpole Village was connected to the new system therby eliminating the disposal of all wastewater into the Connecticut River. At the same time all new users of the system were given ninety (90) days to install their building service lines and activate their sewer disposal system.

After the completion of the installation of the new sewer lines, there was a good deal of clean up to be done. Many roads were

torn apart and had to be rebuilt. Prospect Hill in particular, presented many problems. The repaired roads are now in excellent condition and should remain so for some years.

The entire project is practically completed. There are a few relatively minor things that will have to be done in the spring. When they are taken car of we will be in a position to request the State to make the final audit. On the basis of their findings, the final adjustments will be made.

#### A FEW GENERAL COMMENTS

On January 1, 1990 Bellows Falls, as a Secondary Treatment Facility started figuring their quarterly invoices using the formula recorded in the Intermunicipal Agreement. The billing is based on three factors: 34% on Flow----33% on the B.O.D.---and 33% on the TSS. Flow is the quantity of wastewater passing thru the system into the treatment facility in Bellows Falls. Readings are taken daily at the No Walpole pump station and the pump station located on Route 12 in Walpole. These readings are added together to get the total town figure which is the flow used in the calculation. The B.O.D. (Biochemical Oxygen Demand) is a measure to determine the oxygen necessary to maintain the purification process and it's also an indicator of the strength of the waste. This is measured weekly at the same two stations and again added to get the figure for the Town as a whole. The TSS(Total Suspended Solids) is also measured weekly at the same locations and the results handled in the same manner.

All feasible, practical measures will be taken to keep the figures resulting from these three measurements to a minimum. You can help your own cause by thoughtful use of water and by using your sewer connection for the disposal of only normal household wastewater.

All the necessary bonds have been issued, \$6,257,554.00. All the interim loans plus interest have been paid. Barring an unforseen demand for cash, we have sufficient funds abailable to take care of the final payments that will come due under the contract.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Town of Walpole, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1989, we considered its internal control structure in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

However, during our examination we became aware of several matters that are opportunities for strengthening internal controls and operating efficiency. The memorandum that accompanies this letter summarizes our comments and recommendations regarding those matters. A separate report dated June 12, 1990 contains our report on reportable conditions and material weaknesses in internal accounting control. This report does not effect our report dated June 12, 1990 on the financial statements of the Town of Walpole, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1989.

We have already discussed these comments and recommendations with various Town personnel, and we will be pleased to discuss them in further detail at your convenience, to perform additional study of these matters, or to assist you in implementing the recommendations.

#### OVERDRAFT OF APPROPRIATIONS

During 1989, expenditures exceeded budget appropriations by \$23,826. Several line items and departments contributed to this budget overdraft. We recommend that the Town carefully analyze and adjust future budgets to insure that they are sufficient for the desired levels of service. Once a budget is adopted, we urge that Town officials closely monitor expenditures to eliminate budget overdrafts.

#### LIBRARY PAYROLL

Library employees are paid by the Library fund which then remits related payroll taxes to the General fund for the required tax deposits. This system makes preparation of federal tax deposits and related tax returns difficult and increases the potential for error. We believe that the Town should centralize all payroll activities through the General fund in order to simplify tax reporting and to reduce the possibility of errors.

#### SEWER BILLING

We observed that Sewer fees have not been billed on a regular cycle and that the bills have not been sent for up to six months after the end of the service period. The Sewer fund is a self-supporting fund and requires revenues to pay operating expenditures. If resources are not available, the Sewer fund must borrow from other funds to continue operations. We recommend that the Town implement a standard billing cycle. We also recommend that the Town regularly review its sewer rates to insure that charges are sufficient to cover operating expenditures.

#### REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

1990

This year we finally finished the Walpole Valley Road. We do have a little cleaning left to do.

Maple Grove Road is almost completed. We have 500 feet left to rebuild and pave.

One half of the Airport Road was rebuilt and spray tarred to hold the road for the Winter. This road will be finished during 1991. Most of the needed gravel has been hauled and is stored at the Town Shop. (The Old Drewsville Road)

Work is started on Cold River Road. One Section was graveled and ready for the tar, but Whitcomb's starting hauling mud during a rainy spell and the road became so rutted we could not tar.

Our crew (all or part) worked 29 days in North Walpole fixing drains, water problems caused by the new sewer project. We have been repairing leaks or broken pipes. We have two more spots, that we know of, that need to be fixed. We have completed twelve spots.

We worked 5 weeks on the bridge on North Main St. rebuilding it, damaged by the sewer project. (completely rebuilt)

The Watkins Hill Bridge will be finished in 1991. We have the cement work completed. This project includes rebuilding approximately 1/2 mile of road.

We hired someone from outside the Town to mow 37 miles of roadside for \$2000.00. We hope to have them back in 1991.

#### WALPOLE TOWN LIBRARY TRUSTEES - 1990

1990 was a year of many changes and exciting activities at the Walpole Town Library. In February, to comply with state confidentiality laws, the librarians began issuing numbered borrowers cards. It was with regret that the trustees instituted this change, since patrons would be identified by numbers instead of names. I want to thank the library patrons for their cooperation and patience while this policy was put into effect.

The Bridge Memorial Library received a Title I LSCA grant of \$289 to purchase and install a modem for our Apple IIE computer for use in interlibrary loans. The modem allows the librarian to determine which libraries in the State have the book requested, whether the book is available for loan, and what restrictions apply to the book.

I want to thank the Selectmen and townspeople for their support in returning \$2,000.00 to the Walpole Town Library budget at the Town Meeting. This money made possible the needed repairs and painting of the Bridge Memorial Library. The exterior of the library was painted, the plaster was repaired in the Reading Room, and both the foyer and the Reading Room were painted. I want to thank Mike Hawkins for the fine work he did and for his cooperation in doing this work when it would not interfere with the operation of the library.

In the spring, a memorial gift of \$500 was given to the Bridge Memorial Library for the purchase of large print books. Patrons will find this collection of books in the Reference Room.

Susan Sudsbury organized a collection of easy-to-read books for children just learning to read. These books can be identified by the bright orange dots on the books and on the catalog cards. These books are located in the Children's Room, on a shelf to the left of the windows.

Volunteers continued to be an invaluable help to our librarians. Volunteers work at the circulation desk, inventory the book collection, shelf read, and mend books. If anyone would like to help with these or other tasks, please see the librarians. Volunteer help is always very much needed and appreciated.

Each year the North Walpole Commissioners have provided improvements to the North Walpole Library to make it a pleasant and safe library for its patrons. This year the Commissioners had the new parking space in front of the library paved.

Vickie Barrett and Heidi Cushman presented a summer reading program for children at the North Walpole Library. The program was held once a week for eight weeks, in July and August. Books were read to the children and a project related to each book was completed by the children. Each child was asked to read twenty books during the summer. A party was held at the end of the program and each child received a certificate.

A set of "The Civil War" videos is now available at the North Walpole Library. The set is a gift from Time/Life Books.

The Friends of the Bridge Memorial Library provided many programs for the library. The Friends sponsored the following adult programs: a Great Books discussion group, a needlework group, "Classical Caravan" a video about the Princeton Chamber Orchestra, and a lecture by Stuart Wallace title "Pilgrims and Pleasure Seekers", about travels in 19thcentury, New Hampshire.

Children's programs sponsored by the Friends included a monthly preschool story hour, a concert by Debra Stuart and David Colburn, a puppet show by folksinger Carolyn Parrott, and a movie "A Child's Christmas in Wales", in December.

In June, a program by magician Bob Higgins called "Around the World with Magic" began the summer reading program. This exciting program, with the theme "Around the World with Books", was organized and conducted by Jean Kobeski. Weekly activities relating to different countries were enjoyed, and children signed contracts to read books during the summer. Children attending the party at the end of the program made pictures of their favorite books. These pictures were transfered to fabric and made into a beautiful quilted wall hanging by Jean. The quilt is now on display in the Children's Room.

On behalf of the trustees, I want to thank Jean Kobeski for her contributions to the library during the past two years. Jean not only provided wonderful children's programs for the library, but she organized the highly successful money raising activity "A Taste of Walpole", a sale of local foods held in October.

Another money raising project sponsored by the Friends was the Book Sale, organized by Bill Bopp and held on Old Home Days.

With money from these projects, the Friends purchased the American Heritage Illustrated History of the United States (19 Vols.) and display materials for the Dewey Decimal system for the Children's Room. The Friends also bought a typewriter, book cart, and magazine files for the library.

At the Friend's annual meeting in April, Jere Daniell, spoke on "The Constitution: as Walpole Went so Went the Nations". At the Friend's fall meeting, Carolyn Parrott and Brad Dorsey presented an adult program of American folk songs.

Gene Conklin organized several interesting exhibits for the display case in the Reference Room. My thanks to Gene and to the many local residents who shared their collections with library patrons.

The trustees are interested in any concerns or recommendations regarding library services or materials. We welcome any ideas which would provide better library services. If you would like to request a book, magazine, or other materials, please contact a librarian. Every effort will be made to satisfy requests.

# WALPOLE CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 1990

1990 was an eventful year for the Conservation Commission. Thanks to you voters we were successful with three important warrant articles at the 1990 Town Meeting.

Article thirteen established as Town Forest Five tracts of Town owned land totalling almost 250 acres, and specified their method of management and disbursement of proceeds from such management. The Town Forest, managed for multiple use, promises to become increasingly valuable to the community for recreation, wildlife habitat, education, timber production and aesthetics.

Article fourteen dealt with change of use penalty in that a portion of the penalties collected would be paid into a conservation fund which by law is specific in its uses. This fund will be used primarily to pay costs of acquiring or protecting desirable conservation lands that may become available in future years. You may be assured that any acquisitions or protective measured employed will be directed toward minimizing impact on the tax base of the Town.

Article fifteen an increase from six to seven commission members. We had several names of interested persons for this position but before we made a recommendation to the Selectmen, Leslie Hubbard, a long time commission member, chose to retire. We then needed two new members. The choice was made to recommend Lewis Shelley of Carpenter Hill along with Mabel "Fritze" Till of Drewsville. Both Lew and "Fritze" were appointed and duly sworn in. In a very short time they have added significantly to the capabilities of your Conservation Commission. We trust you will be as pleased with their work in future years as we have been to date.

In April, we hosted an Arbor Day program. This was an interesting Saturday morning program with Governor Judd Gregg in attendance. Trees were planted, awards given and overall a very fine program with good recognition for all Walpole residents.

We were asked to have a display on the common at Old Home Day. We felt that our exhibit that day went well, given the visitors to our booth. We wish to thank Bill Beer for the fine map he made depicting an early period in the Geology of the Valley area; Ted Walski, of the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department, is always popular and we will not overlook Van Garrison of the commission for his fine map work of Town Lands, State Lands, and easements.

We had very little forestry work in 1990. The clear cut required along Reservoir Rd, due to disease, has been re-planted to White Pine and Norway Spruce.

A November windstorm caused considerable damage to the forest on the east side of Reservoir Road. Mark Welch was engaged to clean up the down timber. Unfortunately, it was not economically feasible to handle or salvage all of this wood as there were widely scattered single trees. Those of you who use this road will see some of the remaining "blow down".

#### Conservation Commission (Contd)

We cannot function without support from businesses and people of our community. During 1990 Long River Gardens donated a tree which was planted beside the walkway at the Historical Society. The Governors Task force, for Arbor Day, provided a tree that was planted in front of the Town Hall. Late in the summer we were finally able to replace our vandalized picnic table shelters at the Route 12 rest areas. Through the combined efforts and generosity of Frank Whitcomb Construction Company; Hodgkins and Sons; and Roger Santaw, this work was completed. We thank you for all your contributions and support.

Again "Fritze" and her trailbuilders worked where ever there was brush to cut or move. These kids do a great job and are to be thanked.

Lew Shelley works with a group from Alstead known as "Youth Opportunity Corporation". These are older young people who are capable of difficult work projects. Re-construction of a trail on an old beaver dam and causeway across the Mill Pond has begun and will be completed in 1991. This will provide an easier and safer crossing at that point.

We were approached by a young man active with the Boy Scouts who wished to earn his Eagle Scout badge. He had chosen a community service project, specifically restoring the Academy Ravine Trail. The program was worked out and approval given by his Boy Scout Council that this was a certified project. With that, Dan Bashaw, of Old Keene Rd, led his team of scouts in the laborious task of clearing up this area.

They carried out tons of brush and trash, built steps and hand rails, stabilized eroded areas, built a picnic table, stained those that were still intact and otherwise restored this area to a condition it hasn't been for sometime. Dan also conducted a food sale to raise funds for materials he needed. Our hats are off to Dan and we await the day when he is awarded his Eagle Scout Badge.

In closing we extend appreciation to the help we have received from the Selectmen and the office staff, Joe Smith and the Highway Dept, and all other Town people we have called upon for assistance. We have received wonderful cooperation from all and we really appreciate it.

#### WALPOLE WATER AND SEWER DEPARTMENTS

As we enter 1991, we can all be proud of our new sewer collection system and the fact that we are no longer polluters of our public water ways. I would like to thank everyone in both villages for being so understanding these last three years while we were under construction. The three worst areas we had to work on were: River Road; Prospect Hill; and Turnpike Street. Although they were far seperated, the underground water was a serious problem which slowed progress considerably. With the spring of 1991 upon us, I'm sure we'll find places that have washed or settled, however, by summer, everything should be repaired, green, and back to normal.

We have had no new problems with either of the Town water pumps, and I'm pleased the North Walpole Village Commissioners have applied for Federal monies to develop another well and pump system to meet state and federal regulations.

This past fall while a report was being made by S.E.A. in Boston, the water line on Old Keene Road failed and we had to dig and install a new system with 6" ductile water main and all new house services. The old system of 3/4" - 2" galvanized pipe which was installed in the past from 1903-1939 is now in compliance with state regulations since we had to run a minimum 6" main; and we installed a hydrant for added fire protection and flushing of the lines. Although the total cost was \$42,000.00, this is about half of the cost of estimated state and federal jobs of this size when they are put out for bid.

This past fall and winter, we have changed; repaired; and added over 100 water meters. They have been installed in all homes and all businesses except permanent mobile homes with out cellars. This became a necessity due to the need of having an accurate method of billing sewer customers.

I thank all of you for your patience and understanding, and I apologize for your inconveniences.

#### REPORT OF THE BUILDING NEEDS STUDY COMMITTEE

The Building Needs Study Committee was authorized by the voters at the March 1990 Annual Town Meeting to study the Town's current and future building, office and facility needs and to recommend appropriate measures to meet those needs. The formation of this committee grew largely out of the question of whether the Town should consider purchasing the Old Fire Station in the Village and renovating the space to fill future office needs of the Town government. However, that charge was expanded to include consideration of all of the Town's space needs. The committee, consisting of five members, was appointed by the Board of Selectmen.

The committee began its work by visiting and inspecting all town buildings including the Town Hall, the old and new town garages, the small water company garage, the new fire station and of course the old fire station. The committee then met with all department heads and town board chairpersons to get their views as to the needs or individual town government functions, The committee also investigated several privately owned buildings to determine their potential for meeting the town's space needs.

In general the committee found that the greatest single unmet need is for adequate office space. The Police Department, Board of Selectmen and Town Clerk/Tax Collector all lack adequate space to effectively and efficiently carry out their duties. The Police Dept is currently housed in the rear of the old fire station, however, this arrangement is temporary, pending the ultimate disposition of the property. The Selectmen's office in the Town Hall is extremely cramped, housing up to six persons along with the necessary desks, work space and files. The Selectmen have frequently found it necessary to use the kitchen in the Town Hall for meetings and appointments requiring quiet and privacy. Likewise, the current Town Clerk/Tax Collector's office lacks sufficient office and storage space. This situation would be much worse were it not for the fact that, currently, the two positions are held by the same person. The Town cannot rely on such an arrangement in the future.

The committee considered a number of alternative approaches to address this need for additional office space. These included new construction, addition to and renovation of the Town Hall, leasing space in privately owned buildings and, of course, the purchase and renovation of the old fire station. While each of these alternatives was attractive in some ways; the majority of the committee believes that the old Fire Station offers the best potential for meeting the Town's needs at the most reasonable overall cost.

On the other hand, space for the housing of the Town's vehicles and heavy equipment is generally adequate, with the Highway Department and Fire District both having recently built new facilities designed to meet both short and long term needs. The construction of a small, unheated shed attached to the new Town Garage for cold storage should be considered at some point in the future, however, in order to maximize the use of the heated space in the main building.

The committee has also been informed that the recycling program at the landfill has requested a new building to meet the needs of an expanded recycling effort. The building committee did not become deeply involved in this issue, however, as it was told that the W.R.A.P. committee was responsible for this effort.

Based on its investigations, therefore, the Building Needs Study Committee has developed the following recommendations for consideration by the voters to meet the current and future space needs of the town:

OLD FIRE STATION: The majority of the committee believes that the purchase and renovation of this building is the best option for meeting the present and future office space needs of the town. The committee, therefore, recommends that the voters give strong consideration to approving the purchase of the property in 1991. It should be carefully taken into account in making this decision, that this is the only chance that the Town will have to acquire the property, as the Fire District has clearly stated its intent to sell the property to private interests if the Town declines to purchase it.

The building has been offered to the Town by the Walpole Fire District at a cost of \$100,000. The Committee estimates that the cost of renovating the structure for use as Town Offices will be between \$80,000 and \$85,000. If the Town were to issue bonds through the N.H. Municipal Bond Bank in the amount of \$190,000. at 6.75% interest for five years to purchase and renovate the building there would be no increase in the 1991 tax rate and a five year pay ment schedule beginning in the 1992 tax year as follows:

The use of the \$100,000 purchase price by the Walpole Fire District to reduce the debt on the new Fire Station will also serve to reduce the effect of the purchase on the overall tax rate in most of the Town.

OLD HIGHWAY GARAGE: Although this structure is in relatively poor condition, the committee believes that it can be useful as cold storage space for the Water & Sewer Departments, Conservation Committion, the Highway Department (on a short-term, as needed basis) and for other municipal storage needs. The committee is concerned, however, that maintenance costs for the structure could excalate significantly in the future. The building should also be carefully managed, as the committee has noted that it had become cluttered with a wide variety of equipment and aupplies. Some concern was also raised that the building was being used to store non-municipal items.

The condition of the structure must be carefully monitored in the coming years to detect and prevent further deterioration. Should further deterioration occur, consideration should be given to reducing the size of the building through demolition of deteriorated sections.

The overall management of the building must be made the specific responsibility of one group or individual and the space should be specifically assigned to those departments using it. Maintenance costs should also be allocated among the users. If non-municapl use of the space is to occur, the Town should require reasonable rent to help cover maintenance costs.

WATER DEPARTMENT GARAGE: This small structure is in relatively good condition but lacks sufficient parking area to be used for anything other than storage of small equipment. While it is possible that the building could be sold to an abutting property owner, the committee recommends that it be retained by the town and used for winter storage of the Town's forest fire truck (the truck is kept at the new fire station during the non-winter forest fire season). During the non-winter months the building can be used to store small equipment such as lawnmowers and cemetery maintenance tools.

In conclusion the committee believes that the purchase and renovation of the old fire station coupled with prudent management and maintenance of the Town's existing facilities will serve to meet the Town's space needs for many years into the future.

#### REPORT OF THE HOOPER INSTITUTE - 1990

The Hooper Institute had a busy and productive 1990 sponsoring environmental education programs in the school and community. Each classroom at the Walpole School was visited on a weekly basis throughout the school year.

Adaptations of plants and animals to the winter landscape was studied, as well as winter weather and astronomy. Older children explored the outdoors on snowshoes and learned of native ways. Primary age children studied bird feathers, owls, endangered species and trees.

As winter melted to spring, younger children forced tree buds to blossom, started seeds in classroom containers and learned about amphibian migration. Older children studied birds and frog songs and trekked around the Mill Pond.

Fourth graders visited a sheep farm, sawmill, turning shop, produce farm, commercial greenhouse and beekeeper as part of the Farm and Forest Project sponsored by the Hooper Institute. At school, children learned to spin and weave with wool and watched a sheep shearing demonstration.

Sixth graders spent winter and spring studying the Connecticut River and its valley. Classroom studies included discussions of watersheds, topographic maps, geology and natural history, plus a look at human history. Students took a field trip to the power plant, grist mill and sewage treatment plant in Bellows Falls. A two day canoe trip on the River culminated our studies.

An Earth Day Open House at the Hooper Institute on April 22nd drew a crowd of more than 200 people. Earth Day inspired an on-going recycling program at the Walpole School. Old Home Day festivities offered the opportunity to talk with many people about our program.

The Hooper Institute sponsored a six week Summer Program for 45 children. They explored a variety of sites in Walpole and beyond on a weekly basis. Weekend nature walks were offered to the community in the spring and autumn.

Small groups of Junior High students became Trailbuilders for two months in the spring and three months in the fall. They cleared and constructed trails on Town property. Other groups of Jr. High students began water quality testing at several sites in Town.

Autumn brough many seasonal nature lessons to the schools. They included studies of insects, spiders, hawks, wetlands, pondlife, mushrooms, nuts, seed travellers, apple picking and cider making, migration, soils, trees and forestry, hibernation, evergreens and conifers. Children also learned to use a compass. We once again collaborated with the Boy Scouts for our annual Christmas Tree sale.

The Farm and Forest Museum at the Hooper Institute had an excellent year. We served 741 children from Walpole and surrounding communities. Profits from these programs will be used to sponsor a college scholarship for a Walpole resident.

Thanks to everyone who contributed to a successful 1990!

# WALPOLE POLICE DEPARTMENT WALPOLE, N. H. 03608

During 1990 the Walpole Police Department, responded to nine hundred and thirty seven (937) calls for assistance. These calls ranging from burglar alarms, domestic disputes, suspicious vehicles, suspicious persons, OHRV complaints, criminal complaints, fire and ambulance assist, motorist aid calls. Motor vehicle accidents totaled thirty eight (38), which was down from forty three (43) last year. Our biggest complaint was for vandalism of mailboxes and vandalism against private property.

I have asked for an increase in the Police Budget for 1991, with plans of increasing patrol time to curtail the increase of vandalism and burglaries. I have also asked for a second cruiser to be leased.

I have placed two articles in the Town Warrant, one is a Town Ordinance for an Open Container Law and the other Article is for the adoption of RSA 466:30-a Dog Control Law. As our Town grows, we find it increasingly necessary to have these two articles in effect.

Each year I ask that residents <u>please</u>, if you are going away on vacation or just for the weekend, to contact the Selectmens Office or any Police Officer for a request for a home security check. Burglaries during 1990 and the beginning of 1991 are up, so <u>please</u>, take advantage of your Police Departments Home Security Check.

Our appreciation for the donation to the Police Benevolent Fund, it will be put to good use. We thank you.

My appreciation to the people of Walpole for appropriating the funds for the purchase of Body Armor. Myself and my officers are now wearing them and hopefully they will never be needed to save our lives.

Again, my appreciation to the people of Walpole, especially the Fire and Ambulance Departments for their continued assistance and cooperation.

#### WALPOLE RECYCLING ACTION PROJECT

For the Year Ending December 31, 1990

1990 brought another increase in the number of people using Walpole's recycling facility. From an average of 83 vehicles each week in the first quarter that the facility was in operation, participation has grown to a level of 178 vehicles per week. The week saw 206 vehicles. It is fortunate that since July we have had our recycling coordinator, Rick Cooper, on hand every day to help volunteers with the work load.

Part of that work load was caused by changing markets and new additions to the materials that are recycled. For example, our market for cardboard shut off suddenly when fire closed the plant that took it. Rick quickly examined a number of possibilities. The Committee decided baling cardboard would be the best solution. A used manual baler was obtained and rebuilt by Rick to meet our needs. We have also had to alter plastics granulating to separate products by color, thus increasing storage space needs. Joe Smith made more space available in the landfill shed, which is appreciated. In the last quarter, after several months of investigation, tin cans (on a trail basis), glossy paper, magazines and catalogues have been added to the materials being recycled.

Members of the WRAP Committee have regularly, through the Walpole Gazette, tried to keep townspeople informed of marketing and product changes and necessary home preparation of materials for recycling. We had a June meeting of Volunteers to bring them up to date on developments. We talked with new residents about recycling at a meeting for them sponsored by the Women of Walpole. In October we had an open house at the recycling facility to show it off and to answer questions. Recycling in the Walpole school was started with two Committee members picking up materials collected by students and transporting them to the recycling facility.

To help move bales and boxes, lift forks were obtained which can be attached to the landfill bulldozer. A pallet jack and a strapper completed major equipment purchases. Hubbard Farms gave another used truck body which enables us to handle the catalogue—magazine business. We thank them as well as the Town road crews who set the truck body on cement blocks after moving and resetting the cardboard trailer and who moved in blocks to support necessary additions to the loading dock. Volunteers built the dock addition, put covers on the plastic bins and helped on other maintenance jobs. Expenditures were within budget. Cash income was \$2,685 mostly from aluminum cans and redeemable bottles.

The existion recycling facility is inefficient and labor intensive. The committee has examined facilities elsewhere, has firmed up estimates of volume to be expected under mandatory recycling, both by doing car counts at the landfill and by discussion with Walpole's commercial haulers, and is preparing a facility design.

We were pleased this year to receive the Community Citizen Award from Walpole Grange No. 12. We want to thank the many volunteers who have contibuted their time and ideas without which this important extension of the life of Walpole's landfill as well as recovery of valuable materials would not have been possible.
