REMARKS.

The warrant contains an article asking for an appropriation for new seats in the recitation room in Division No. 1. The crowded condition of the Intermediate and High departments calls for something to be done to relieve this congested situation, consequently the Board thinks proper to seat the room above referred to.

This past year, owing to there being no concreters in town, the concreting and grading about the house in Division No. 1 was not done. This year the houses in the out districts need considerable grading up to where the dirt has been washed away year after year.

There are some repairs and alterations needed in the sanitary arrangement of one or two houses to insure the good health of our pupils.

There are needed in the Intermediate and 2d Primary rooms, in Division No. 1, new desks,—they are greatly needed, and must come within a short time; but if new seats are put into the recitation room, the matter of new desks in these other two departments might be laid over one year.

During the year the Board has received the sum of

\$59.57 from the late John Shedd estate; it was the balance of a fund left, after the death of John S. Shedd, from the net proceeds of a private high school taught by J. E. Vose, Miss Morse and Miss N. L. Allds. This was passed over to the Committee for use in the high school as in their judgment seems proper and for the school's best interest.

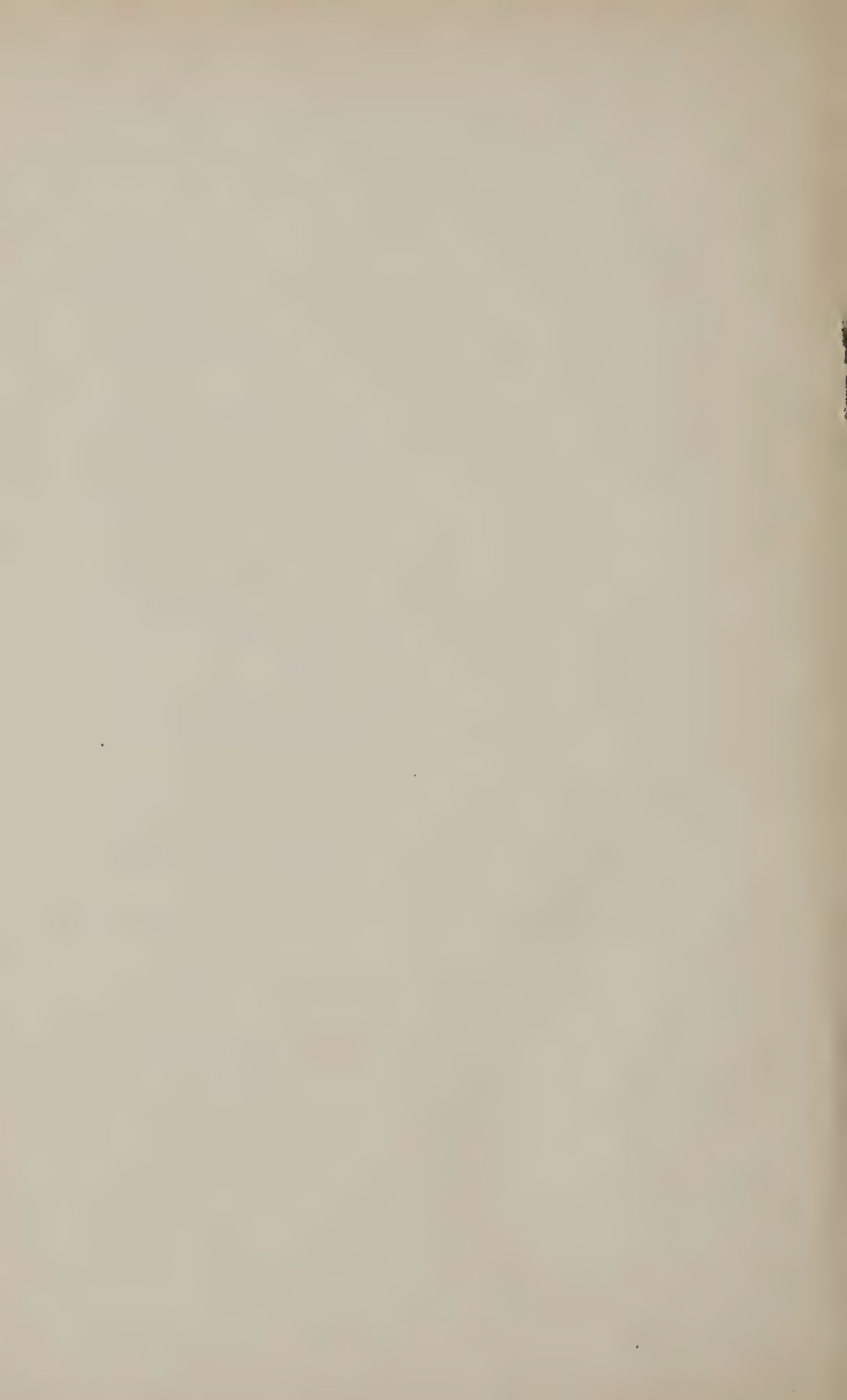
