To the inhabitants of the Town of Epsom, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, in said Epsom, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$160.00 for the Epsom Public Library.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Old Home Day.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be used for a series of Band Concerts.
7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make such change as may be necessary in extending the time of payment on notes held against the town.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,093.50 for State Aid Construction, the State

to give \$2,186.00. If State Aid Construction is applied for as above, such joint fund must be expended on the Black Hall Road, to build from the covered bridge to Route 28.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of Webster Park.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of fire equipment.

11. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

12. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under the Laws of 1933, Chapter 99, Section 22.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used to reduce the town debt.

14. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 2 per cent on all property taxes paid previous to July 1, 1934.

15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

16. To see if the town will accept an electric water system installed in McClary Cemetery with an adequate fund for care and upkeep of same. The aforesaid to be the gift of John W. Cox as a memorial to the late Joseph Lawrence and Eva L. Cox.

17. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before said meeting.

While circulation statistics show but a small part of the work of the library, special mention is made of it each year. The circulation has been 8,011 volumes of which 1,563 were from the branch at New Rye. Reserve cards have been kept and all possible efforts have been made to get the book wanted into the hands of the person wanting it. Postal card notices of new books have been sent out to persons interested in special subjects.

Overdue cards were purchased this year and while they diminish the library income from fines they have been of great convenience to the library patrons. According to the library rules and regulations, "books must not be kept out more than 3 weeks, under penalty of 2 cents per day

for the additional time". Eighteen persons were notified with overdue cards and all were grateful for this prompt notice.

A suggested purchasing list has been kept and the librarian expresses appreciation for the interest and help given in book selection. Leading events in current news have been noticed by appropriate exhibits of books and pictures displayed in the library. Especially prominent this year have been pictures and clippings pertaining to a Century of Progress at Chicago.

Book Week activities were numerous consisting of 3 special book exhibits in the reading room, also a display of posters. The librarian visited the five schools in town, showing a few of the new books for children and giving a short talk on the care and handling of books. Book marks with a graded list of books were given to each child.

With the approval of the school superintendent 25 children in the 7th and 8th grades, accompanied by their teachers came to the library for a visit and instruction in the use of the card catalogue. A number of these children had never had an opportunity to visit the library before.

The librarian attended the Neighborhood meeting for librarians and trustees held at Pembroke, also, the meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association held at Peterborough.

Work of repairing the books has continued and much credit is due the Epsom Center Neighborhood Club and the Short Falls Community Club for their earnest co-operation and assistance. This work has been outstanding and the librarian has been asked to speak of it at several library meetings.

Fifty years consecutive numbers of the Epsom Town Reports, from 1883-1933 have been collected and bound in attractive volumes, making a valuable reference collection for the library. The librarian expresses appreciation to all who contributed town reports for this file, making possible a complete record. The set consists of 3 volumes attractively bound in dark red buckram at a cost of only \$1.10 per volume.

In September, Mrs. Bessie Stevens resigned as assistant and Mrs. Madeline Knowles came as her successor, taking charge of all the desk circulation.

Books as gifts have been received from Mrs. L. R. Rand of Epsom and from Mrs. Emma Nelson of Brooklyn, N. Y. Mrs. Nelson was a summer guest at Pine Grove Inn and has shown great interest in the library. Her gifts of recent fiction books are greatly appreciated.

The work has gone on in excellent order and it has been the desire of the librarian and her assistant to be of service to the community to make the library attractive, to advertise it, and to encourage its use.

To the New Hampshire Public Library Commission and to the members of the Board of Trustees the librarian returns grateful acknowledgment for counsel and interest in the various forms of library activity.

**REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

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*To the School Board and Citizens:*

I herewith submit my fourteenth annual report of the schools of Epsom, for the year ending June 30, 1933.

There were maintained during the year, five schools, for a school year of 37 weeks, with one change in the teaching force.

The total school enrollment was 108, with a daily average attendance of 96.21 per cent.

The schools were in session on an average of 353.2 half-days.

Of the five teachers employed, three are graduates of a normal school, one of Dewey Training School and one has a state license.

Our teachers were faithful to their duty and diligent in their work; they were well trained professionally and competent in organization and school management. They were mindful of the needs of the pupils while in the school rooms and on the school grounds and wisely cautioned them of the need of care while traveling on the public highway, and were also interested that all the children might have warm clothing and proper food. These efforts of the teachers are worthy and should receive the commendation of all good citizens, yet more praiseworthy was the earnest desire of the teachers to give to each boy and girl higher ideals of life and a worthy ambition to become good and useful citizens.

It is commendable to be a leader in industry or finance. It is commendable to administer a system of schools or other social organizations. It is my belief that it is

greater still to deal directly with children, inspiring them with ideals and putting into their lives the lofty desire to become honest and useful men and women. One noted educator writes, "Next to that of creating a democracy is that of maintaining it, as teachers are doing in the schools at the present time. Teaching may not pay so well but it is the highest type of service in the world."

The School Nurse, Miss Adonia Douillette, has continued her excellent work in our schools. Added to the regular school calls she has made many home visits in the interest of the children's health and welfare. She has exercised every care that the children might have proper food and comfortable clothing. She has been successful in soliciting aid from local organizations and charitable citizens and has generously furnished free transportation to children at clinics and for other remedial work.

The original purpose of the American school, — to completely prepare the child for the life he is to live, remains unchanged, but the procedure and policies for securing this aim must of necessity be ever changing.

In the early history of our country, education, consisting mainly of the three R's, was fairly adequate for a sparsely settled country engaged mainly in agriculture and discovery. Machine production, increased wealth, congestion of life in the city, the multiplication of occupations for men and new economic opportunities for women, have compelled a radical change from the original procedure of education. It has made necessary the introduction of the study of music, fine arts, science, domestic and industrial arts and also health education including courses in hygiene, health examination, dental clinics, balanced diet and visits to homes by nurse and teachers for the well-being of the pupils and of the neighboring community.

Again, our educational policies have been greatly modified by the change in the number of children employed in the industries. From 1880 to 1910 large numbers of children were employed in factories. Since 1910 when 18.4 per cent of our children were employed, the trend of

the employment of the children has been downward, for in 1930 only 4.7 per cent were employed. In 1930 the total enrollment in all our schools and colleges was about 29,500,000 and 1,000,000 teachers gave instruction in these institutions. This means that about one-fourth of our population was directly engaged in educational activities.

The enlarged material equipment necessary for carrying out the present-day school program; the construction of the modern school buildings containing laboratories, gymnasiums, swimming pools, auditoriums, cafeterias; their modern systems of heating, lighting and ventilation; the expansion of the school yard equipped with apparatus for play and physical exercise, has greatly increased the cost of education.

In 1900 the total national expenditures for public primary and secondary schools was \$214,965,000. In 1930 it was \$2,316,790,000. During this period the total value of all school property increased from \$550,069,000 to \$6,211,327,000.

The cost of maintaining the schools and the cost of maintaining the state and national governments has caused an excessive tax burden and has made it difficult to obtain sufficient funds to adequately finance the school system, especially in sparsely settled communities where the real estate valuation is low. Many of these localities have been obliged to seek financial assistance from either the county, state or federal governments.

To equalize educational opportunities in these districts and lower the cost of schools, two devices have been utilized. The first is that of enlarging school administration units by consolidating school districts. This resulted in the consolidation of 16,232 school districts by 1930.

The second device is that of using state funds to supplement local resources. Despite such efforts and the

earnest endeavor of educators to secure equalization of educational opportunities, there still exist marked failures in some localities.

After being engaged in educational activities for more than fifty years and desiring more time for reading, travel and leisure, early in June I sent to the State Board of Education my resignation to take effect on August 31, 1933.

For the twenty years last past I have enjoyed my work as superintendent of this union and have received the loyal support of the State Board of Education and of the school board members, teachers, pupils and citizens. The cordial assistance given to me by all of the State Commissioners of Education has been encouraging and helpful.

I wish to thank all for the assistance given to me in making better schools.
