THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Littleton qualified to vote in town affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in the Town building on the second Tuesday of March, next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects.

Article I. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Article II. To choose three selectmen for the ensuing year.

Article III. To choose three trustees for the Littleton Public Library, to serve three years each, in place of George H. Tilton, Julia A. Eaton and Harry M. Morse, terms expired.

Article IV. To choose an auditor for the ensuing year.

Article V. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for laying out and constructing and repairing highways and bridges, and for the payment of the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, and for all other necessary town charges,

Article VI. To see what sums of money the town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article VII. To see what action the town will take in reference to electing a road agent or agents.

Article VIII. To choose an agent to enforce the liquor laws under provision of Section 9, of Chapter 122, of Laws of 1903.

Article IX. To see what action the town will take in reference to providing money for the furnishings and fittings of the Public Library.

Article X. To see what action the town will take in re-

gard to the completion and sale of the Town History and paying bills for the same.

Article XI. To see what action the town will take with reference to authorizing the water commissioners or selectmen to borrow money for the purpose of extending the waterpipes and electric light wires and for other necessary purposes connected with the Water & Light plant, provided it should become necessary, during the ensuing year.

Article XII. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing state aid for highways in this town, under the provision of an "Act to provide for state aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the permanent improvement of main highways throughout the state," approved February 24, 1905; and to raise such sums of money as may be deemed advisable and to make such appropriations under said act.

Article XIII. To see what action the town will take in reference to discontinuing the road leading from the main highway near the J. H. Smalley place to the Palmer place, so-called, in North Littleton.

Article XIV. To see what action the town will take in regard to undertaking a proposition for the Donovan-Apthorp Shoe Company in regard to making additions to the shoe shop property.

Article XV. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article XVI. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing and to choose or elect any which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be cast under this warrant.

Article XVII. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

COMMENTS.

The administration of the affairs in this court during the past year indicates only two features that require special explanation.

The number of prosecutions has been unusually large and that fact is due to a vigorous prosecution of offenses against the police of towns in the first half of the year.

In the last half there is a marked falling off of such prosecutions, and this is due largely to the indisposition of town authorities to burden the town with the expenses of the detention of persons sentenced to jail or the house of correction by reason of their inability to pay fines and costs.

This state of affairs prevails in all the large towns in the county to a greater or less extent.

CHIEF ENGINEER'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners of the Littleton Village District:

GENTLEMEN: For the year ending January 31st, 1905, this department has answered eight bell and thirteen still alarms, a total of twenty-one; twenty-six less than last year.

The total fire loss has been \$956, an average of \$45.52 for each alarm, and the cost to the district \$130.15, an average of \$6.19 for each call.

In the performance of their duties the members of this department have used nine hand chemicals and 35 gallon tank; have laid 1,250 feet of hose, of which 850 feet were used.

CAUSES.

The burning out of chimneys was the cause of 13 alarms, dropping of lamp one; match, one; rats and matches, one; brush fire, one; defective stove pipe, one; spark from chimney, two; inflammable stuff spilled on stove, one.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES.

Herewith is appended a report of the condition of the public library. The influence of a well-selected library cannot be overestimated. It is wholesome, non-partisan, unprejudiced; no personal grievances are fostered by it; no grudges are settled by it. The mission of the public library is to disseminate knowledge, to advance education in the broadest sense, to stimulate the ambition for a wider culture.

The public library has purchased the past year 141 volumes; it has loaned 16,863 volumes. Of this number, 85 per cent. were fiction and seven per cent. history and travels. Twenty-six volumes of magazines have been bound and placed on the shelves.
