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

and is admirably fitted for the position. She is prompt, energetic, and thorough. She believes in the efficacy of work, by teacher and scholar. Strict discipline was maintained. I visited the school frequently and always found it quiet, orderly and systematic. Mrs. S. so classified her scholars as to keep them profitably employed in the branches fitting their attainments. Marked improvement was manifest, attesting the skill and fidelity of the teacher and the activity and earnestness of her pupils, at the concluding examination. The declamations, even of the smaller scholars were remarkably excellent. Maps were drawn with great readiness and accuracy upon the blackboards by members of the Geography classes, and also some exhibited on paper, executed in a very tasteful style. The past services of Mrs. S. have been so valuable to this District that their continuance would be desirable.

DISTRICT No. 2. — SOUTH. — Miss Sarah E. Richardson had charge of this school both summer and winter terms. The number of scholars was exceedingly small, only six during the summer term, with little to inspire enthusiasm in teacher or scholar, yet those attending made good progress and the labors of the teacher were very acceptable to the district. In the winter, the whole number in attendance was thirteen. They were interested in their studies and made good improvement. I may remark that the same qualities which rendered the services of Miss R. so valuable in the East District last year were exerted with equal success here. She has aptitude for instruction, good administrative ability, is pleasant yet decidedly firm, requiring and securing implicit obedience.

DISTRICT No. 3.—EAST.—Miss Lenora A. Smith taught summer and winter. This was a well regulated, pleasant and profitable school. The teacher was quiet but efficient, maintaining good government with little apparent effort. The creditable deportment of the larger boys who attended during the winter term, was a pleasant feature, reminding the committee that the special commendation bestowed last year should be repeated here. The recitations evinced correct teaching and good proficiency. Several of the declamations were unusually good, and well executed maps illustrated the progress of the classes in Guyot's Geography.

DISTRICT No. 4.—NORTH.—Miss Lydia W. Dodge taught both summer and winter. Miss D. has excellent scholarship, and during the summer term her management was satisfactory to the District and committee. In the winter there was a failure in discipline. In behalf of the teacher it may be said, that she struggled for a time to control the disorderly elements which have recently appeared in this heretofore orderly school, but finally yielded, as was only too manifest at the closing examination. Miss D. was conscientiously earnest, and assiduous, and her modes of instruction were correct, and a fair measure of progress was made despite the absence of "Heaven's first law."

DISTRICT No. 5.—WEST.—Summer and Fall terms taught by Miss Ellen O. Lamson. This was her first attempt at teaching. She was apt and energetic, and evinced a tact at government and facility in imparting instruction, which with more culture and experience, will render her very successful in this vocation. Her pleasant manner in the schoolroom won the affection of her scholars and a decided improvement was made throughout the year.
