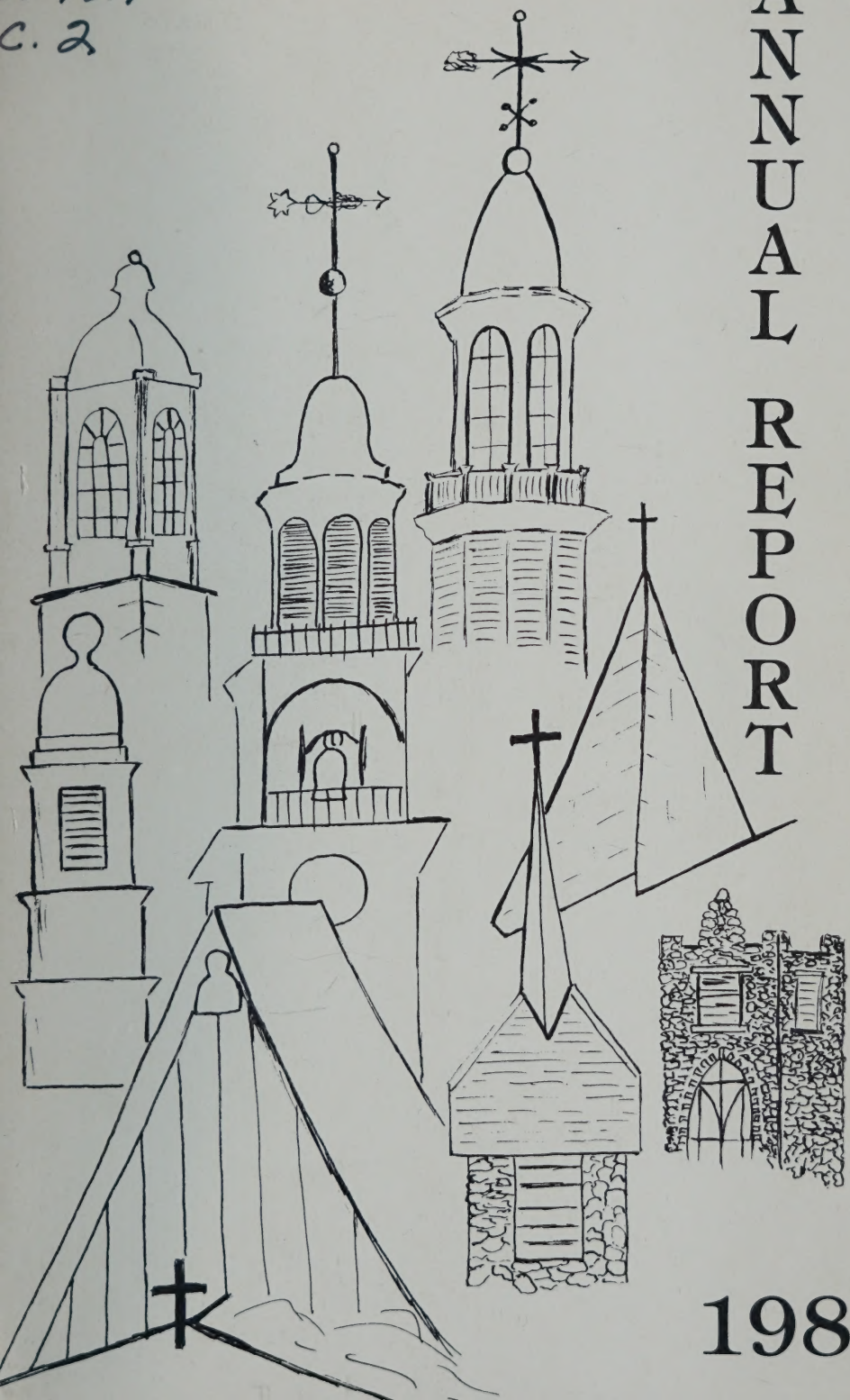

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

New regulations imposed on municipal government by the State and Federal governments have added to the responsibilities of the Board of Selectmen and further burdened our citizens with rules to follow. As examples, all new construction must now have an energy certificate from the State before the Selectmen may issue a building permit, the State is in the process of organizing regional solid waste groups; next year new construction will be required to install fire alarm safety equipment.

The downturn in building construction resulted in fewer permits again this year with eighty-five (85) permits for alterations and/or additions to existing homes, and eight (8) permits for new homes, including a permit for the construction of thirty-two (32) units of housing for the elderly, in two story wood frame structures, located on Pleasant Street. Eleven (11) sign permits and forty-seven (47) yard sale permits were granted during the year.

The Town is faced with a possible major tax lawsuit with the Public Service Company filing a five year protest with the State Board of Taxation. This suit involves more than thirty towns. The Board, however, is hopeful that this can be settled favorable to the Town.

In 1981 108 parcels of property were approved under the guide lines of Current Use. This constitutes a total of 3,554.5 acres in New London under Current Use, representing an original assessed value of \$3,163,055.00. Because of changes in our percentage of valuation to 100% equalized valuation, which is at 57% for the year 1981, the Current Use assessment valuation drops from \$285,006.00 to \$162,700.00. This means a revenue loss to the Town in the amount of \$27,304.00.

Problems of waste disposal continue to concern the Board of Selectmen. The present site for septage disposal has been unsatisfactory and

will be moved next Spring. Again, review of stump dump hours will be on the agenda in the Spring. Most important for the future is the limited life that remains for both the stump dump and the landfill area.

The computer system for assessment and taxation of real estate has worked well this year with tax bills coming out within three days of the time established by the State for payment December 1st.

This year the tax rate increased a modest \$1.10 from \$21.20 to \$22.30 with the Town rate going down .30¢ per thousand. However, big changes are in the offing as financial problems on the State and Federal level will reduce income to local governments and cause significant increases in the Towns contribution to the County and the Schools. Welfare and old age assistance at the local level is increasing markedly; already the expenditures in these categories have gone from a combined total of \$4,315.48 in 1980 to \$7,836.55 in 1981.

Ironically, while the State reduces its contributions to local governments, it continues to enact regulations which cost local government more money. An example is an increase of 7% which the Town must contribute to the Police Retirement Fund bringing it to a total of 14% of each police officer's salary, at a current cost of \$3,306.00.

In order that the Town Meeting may have better control over the budgetary process, the Board of Selectmen will propose to the 1982 Town Meeting that the Annual Town Meeting be changed to May in 1983 and that the budget year be from July 1 to June 30 beginning in 1983. Under the present system, the Town actually spends for 2½ months before it appropriates the money. Under the new system, no expenditures will take place until a budget is adopted.

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS

All property owners must file by April 15, 1982 an Inventory of Taxable Property and Exemption form with the Board of Selectmen completely filled out. Failure to do so, will result in a penalty of \$10.00 to \$50.00.



NOTICE TO CURRENT USE APPLICANTS

Owners of land classified as Current Use must indicate on the Inventory form whether any changes in the use of the land have been made.

New applicants must fully complete a Current Use application form with a map showing clearly the land to be considered for Current Use. All applications and maps must be on file with the Board of Selectmen by April 15, 1982.

**COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM
BELKNAP-MERRIMACK COUNTIES, INC.**

The Kearsarge Valley Community Action Program, Main Street, Warner, serves an area encompassing some 300 square miles comprised of eight towns: Bradford, Henniker, Newbury, New London, Sutton, Warner, Webster, and Wilmot.

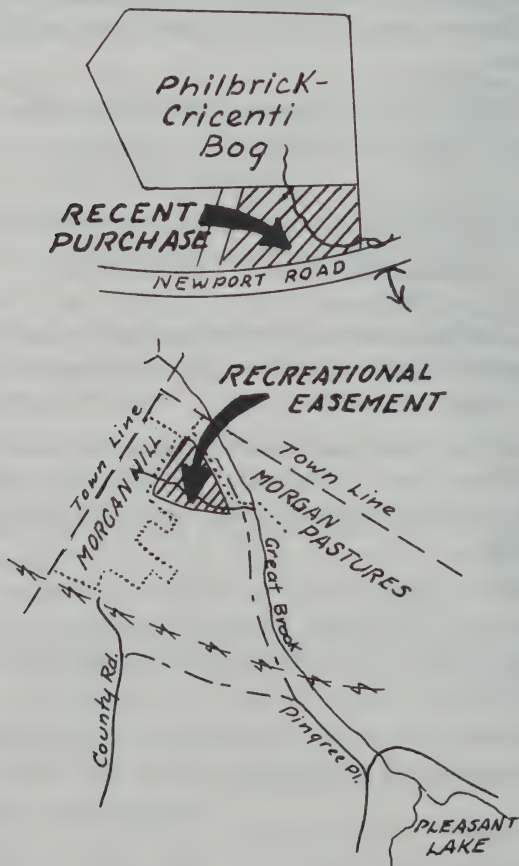
ANNUAL REPORT

NEW LONDON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

During 1981 the New London Conservation Commission acquired new land for preservation, accepted a permanent easement, constructed and maintained hiking trails, protected wetlands, and revised its trail map.

The Commission purchased 4.31 acres which includes the outlet of the Philbrick-Cricenti Bog. This will assure for the future a constant water level for the floating mat. The Bog continues to attract visitors. In 1981 more than 2400 people signed the register, an increase of 700 over the previous year.

Richard H. Webb granted to the Town a permanent easement giving permission for foot travel on 70 acres of wooded hillside. The Commission plans a footpath beside a cascading brook through this land, which lies between Mr. Webb's Morgan Hill and Morgan Pastures properties.



Trail maintenance and construction during the summer focused heavily in the new Phillips Preserve Area adjacent to Goose Hole Pond Road and Otter Pond. Attractions in this 70 acre natural area include a recently opened view of Sunapee Lake, an old quarry site, and many shore birds along the pond.

An updated edition of the *New London Footpaths* is now available at the Town Clerk's office. Most of these trails, incidentally, are suitable for cross-country skiing and snowshoeing.

As development continues in New London, the Commission is considering its responsibilities in the preservation of views and the status of agricultural land.

The winter snowshoe walks were limited by the absence of snow in 1981; however, these popular excursions seem assured this year. The spring walks in May and June were well attended.

The Commission wishes to thank all volunteers who, on Tuesday workdays, helped with trail maintenance and other projects.

During the past year I have continued to be concerned with the number of cases of driving while intoxicated. An informal count places the number of convictions for this offense during 1981 at 47, 4 of which dealt with operators driving the wrong way on Interstate 89, an incredibly dangerous situation.

As a result of the increasing number of alcohol related traffic fatalities in the State, the 1981 session of the Legislature stiffened the penalties for driving while intoxicated. Accordingly, a person who is convicted of driving while intoxicated a second time within a period of 7 years must now serve a mandatory minimum sentence of 7 consecutive 24 hour periods in the House of Correction. An unpleasant prospect, but hopefully enough to cause people to realize they simply cannot afford to drink and drive.

In a more pleasant vein, I am happy to report that in April the Governor and Council appointed Gerald J. Carney, Esq. to be the New Special Justice of the Court.

REPORT OF THE TOWN HISTORY AND ARCHIVES COMMITTEE

We shall miss Dr. J. Duane Squires in many aspects of town affairs. The significance of his service over the years through this Committee merits a brief revue. His name appeared for the first time in the Town Report of 1949 as a member of the Town History Committee, organized for the publishing of a new Town History. Other members of this first committee were Nancy Lord Daniels, Stanley A. Spiller, William M. Kidder, Charles E. Shepard and Percy M. Thurston. As we know, Dr. Squires became the author of this new publication which was printed in 1952 as *Mirror to America, A History of the Town of New London, New Hampshire, 1900-1950*.

In 1962 the Committee authorized a competition for a design for the official seal of the Town. This seal, designed by the late Vincent S. Wickham, was adopted by the Town Meeting that year. During the same year, a program of historical markers was initiated with one marker erected each year until the Bicentennial Year of 1979 when a total of sixteen had been placed. Under Dr. Squires' leadership and with the cooperation of dedicated committee members and many interested citizens, the year long celebration of the Bicentennial was carried out.

The title of the Committee had been changed in 1975 to History and Archives Committee in recognition of the added responsibility for the collection of non-current official town records, transferred from the Selectmen's offices in the Town Hall to the vault in the basement of Tracy Memorial Library. This location offered more adequate space and fire protection. To the nucleus of invaluable and irreplaceable town records and manuscripts have been added those of on-going official commissions such as the Cemetery Commission. Old deeds, minutes and papers of churches and other town organizations, family papers, and oral history tapes have been deposited in this archives collection for protection and accessibility.

These materials have been classified, organized and filed in acid-free manuscript boxes. A portion of the annual appropriation by the Town for this Committee has been used for the purchase of supplies and for photocopying of fragile and vulnerable manuscripts, and these photocopies may now be handled by the public. Each year there are inquiries from out of town and by local citizens for genealogical documentation and for other historical data. The Archivist cooperates with the Office of the Town Clerk in providing such information. An example of the growing outreach of these collections is the use which will be made for the second year by a group of Colby-Sawyer College students, who will be studying as their interim program, the history of New London.

The Town Meeting of 1981 voted to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Town Archivist, and Mildred Tunis was duly appointed.

Interested citizens and friends are invited to contact the Archivist and arrange to visit the Archives. Additional materials pertaining to the history of the Town would be appreciated, including family records, minutes of town organizations, diaries, and photographs, either as gifts or on loan for duplication. Continued concern and support for this project are deeply appreciated.

NEW LONDON HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION, INC.
ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY
1981

In 1981, the New London Hospital moved steadily forward in service to the communities of the area.

The Board of Trustees and its many standing and ad hoc committees met at duly scheduled times to consider and act on all necessary business.

Early in the year, President Sally Fifield proposed changes in committee structure to improve overall functioning. Also, a policy statement was adopted for developing capability consistent with the philosophy and objectives of the hospital.

During the year, the hospital raised its level-of-care in a number of ways. The Swan-Ganz invasive monitoring, which was made possible by the successful 1980 year-end fund drive, became operational in the Intensive Care Unit. Weekly visits to the hospital by mobile ultrasound examination equipment are now a reality. The long planned Quality Assurance Program was initiated and is off to a good start.

Thanks to the efforts of many volunteers, Hospital Day events netted a record amount of over \$54,000, to be used for capital improvements.

A 1981 year-end fund drive toward providing mammography equipment for detection of breast cancer is progressing well. The importance of this problem justifies having equipment available locally, not only as a matter of convenience but to encourage greater use of it.

As new procedures, medicines and equipment become available, the nation-wide trend will be a shift of many services now performed in acute hospitals to outpatient facilities. In line with this, an architect has been retained to study our outpatient quarters. He has already submitted preliminary concept plans for further study. It is highly likely that these quarters will have to be expanded within the next few years.

The importance of staff development has been recognized in the adoption of a tuition reimbursement policy that encourages employees to attend job related seminars, within budgetary limits.

Three estate planning sessions, for benefit of the general public, were held at the hospital during May and were so popular that they were repeated and updated in October. A briefing session with Senator Gordon Humphrey was held at the hospital on the problem of U.S. Government regulation of hospitals in general.

Through the New Hampshire Hospital Association, close liaison has been maintained with nearby hospitals, at the administrative level. We are grateful to The George Washington University for assigning Miss Sarah Chamberlain to us this past year, as a resident in hospital administration, a post she has filled with distinction.

Our auditors, Ernst & Whinney, submitted a very favorable report for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1981, showing that the hospital increased its working capital. This is a direct result of commendable teamwork between the Administration and employees, in closely controlling the budget.

Two Resolutions of Appreciation for services rendered were passed. One was for John W. (Babe) Sargent, who retired from the Board of Trustees and whose unexpired term was filled by the appointment of Randall H. Merriman (representing the town of Sunapee). The other was presented to the Reverend Robert W. Thurston for his years of service to the hospital in many capacities, on the occasion of his change in pastorate from New London to Melvin Village, N.H.

The Medical Staff, that competently served the hospital over the year, included 22 Active, 3 Associate, 20 Consulting, 4 Honorary, and 10 Outpatient/Emergency Room members.

The hospital is grateful to the Auxiliary and the Summer Residents' Association for the thousands of volunteer hours contributed. More volunteers are always welcome.

AUXILIARY OF THE NEW LONDON HOSPITAL

The Auxiliary of the New London Hospital, which has been serving the hospital family for 56 years, held eight regular monthly meetings and one annual meeting during our calendar year from October 1980 to June 1981. In addition, monthly meetings were also held by the Board of the Auxiliary augmented by various committee meetings as needed. Our paid membership stands at 371 with an average attendance of 76 at our monthly meetings.

The New London Hospital Auxiliary continues to serve as an "arm of the hospital" trying to reach the members of New London and its surrounding communities both *in* and *out* of the hospital. Our three areas of concern are Volunteer Service, community health education and fund raising as a means of supporting our projects.

In both the acute and extended care units of the hospital our Volunteer Service Program (most ably chaired by Frances Baynes) covered many areas of service including the Beverage Program, Dietary, Occupational Therapy, Mail Delivery, T.V. Rental, Library, Office Assistance, Laboratory, Physical Therapy, etc., etc. This required the dedicated help of about 100 volunteers who served a total of over 5,000 hours. Included in this total unit of service were 18 enthusiastic "volunteens" who "shared" their summer vacation with patients in the New London Hospital, and now several have continued on through the winter.

In the field of community health education, our monthly meetings (which are open to the public) have included programs on Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation, Alcoholism, the Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association, the Kearsarge Counseling Service and Hyperalimentation (interavenous patient nutritional therapy). We have also provided almost 800 Vial of Life units to members of the communities around us which will enable and encourage households to collect vital personal health information in one place ready for emergency use if needed. We shall continue this project for several more years until we feel that we have reached the total "interested" community.

Through our fund raising efforts this year (\$8,900 grossed in our spring and fall rummage sales, \$1,050 in our pillow rental project at the Barn Players, and \$6,500+ raised on Hospital Day this summer) we have made possible several worthwhile projects.

Early last winter (this report is January 1981-82) the Auxiliary physically and financially decorated the front lobby of the hospital and set up a children's corner in the Outpatient Department. We also have purchased a color T.V. for the Intensive Care Unit and Infant Car Seats and awarded \$2,000 for scholarship awards. This year's reci-

ipients were Leslie Collins from Sunapee High School who is studying Medical Records at the Claremont Vocational College and Sandy Krajcik, Sunapee, who is studying to become a physician's assistant at Lenore-Rhyne College, Hickory, North Carolina. Our third recipient was Pat Marsh, New London, who is continuing her nursing education by obtaining a Bachelor of Science at New England College, Henniker, New Hampshire.

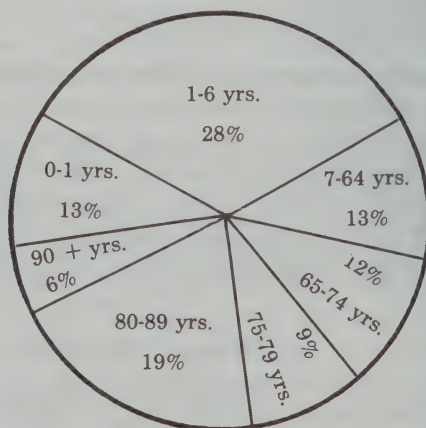

KEARSARGE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION ANNUAL REPORT OF SERVICES

The Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association has touched the lives of many people in your town this year. The enrollment in the Child Health Program has increased serving 17 children in your town with a total of 80 immunizations given. We have screened 164 people at your Blood Pressure Clinics/Health Fairs with 55 new people in attendance. The growth of KVNA is also reflected in the 437 nursing care visits, 146 Physical and Occupational Therapy visits, and 955 hours for Homemaker and Home Health Aide in your town.

In 1982 we are requesting for the third straight year, the per capita assessment of \$1.95. Total town appropriations equal 15% of our operating budget. RN's, Homemaker/Home Health Aides, a Physical Therapist and Occupational Therapist are offering more sophisticated health care including blood drawing and plans for IV Therapy. For the patient, this may mean reduced time spent in the hospital and lowered health care costs. For the elderly, our supportive services may enable people to remain in their own homes, forestalling or preventing institutional placement. These visits are reflected in the following age distribution of our total caseload.

SEWER COMMISSION REPORT

The year 1981 saw a significant event in the history of the New London Sewer System with the completion and start-up, on January 13, 1981, of the new transmission system to Sunapee. On that date discharge of treated waste water to Lyon Brook, thence Kezar Lake, was terminated finally and permanently. Since then all raw New London sewage has been transmitted to the Sunapee plant for treatment and discharge to the Sugar River.

It may be noted in passing that, although New London had one of the earliest three stage treatment plants in New Hampshire with processing to the highest than known purity level, experience appeared to show harmful effects downstream. The only cure was to abandon it and this has been done.

The new system was built within original cost estimates and the first year of operation was reasonably close to projected operating costs but, it was not without some problems and seeming crises, most of which arose in the middle of the night or on stormy weekends, or so it seemed. Our consulting engineers tell us, however, that our shakedown year was not abnormal for a system so large and complex and, with the exception of a short "punch list" of things to be done, most problem areas have had attention.

A remaining major project faced by the Commission involves reconstruction and repair on the original collection system to alleviate the continuing problem of infiltration of ground water. Design work is underway and funds were appropriated for this project at the Town Meeting last year.

TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

Report of Special Fund

Money Market Certificate \$40,000.00

The above sum of money was bequeathed to the Tracy Memorial Library by the late E. Adelaide Sargent Mason of Brookline, Massachusetts.

TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

In 1981, the library's circulation was the highest in its history. The adult and juvenile book circulation was 29,624, while periodicals and other non-book items brought the total circulation to 31,710—more than double that of 1971.

The Friends of Tracy Memorial Library under the leadership of Frank Conklin and Howard Moody raised \$3500 in 1981. This generous amount of money made it possible for us to purchase additional books for circulation and to initiate a children's record and tape collection which has proven to be very popular.

The library purchased 1,131 new titles in 1981. Seven hundred were for the adult collection and four hundred, thirty one for the juvenile collection. Ten new periodicals were added to meet an increase in patron use. Also the popular paperback book collection was enlarged.

In December the library received a legacy of \$40,000 from the estate of Mrs. E. Adelaide Sargent Mason of Brookline, Massachusetts. The trustees anticipate using the income from this gift to enlarge the book collection. This extra income comes at a crucial time when budget increases must be kept to a minimum but periodical and book costs are up approximately 14 percent.

The trustees feel that the library has an excellent staff: Mrs. Susanne Filkins, Head Librarian; Mrs. Martha Denz, Administrative Assistant; Mrs. Emma Crane, Circulation Assistant; and Mr. Vincent Lee, Custodian. Student Aides, Jennifer Hodges and Cheryl Battersby, are each employed for one afternoon a week. Assisting the staff are volunteers whose many hours of work have enhanced the children's program and made possible other services to our patrons.

We appreciate the support of the citizens of New London who through taxes, volunteer services, and contributions have made for another successful year at Tracy Memorial Library.

The Commissioners have voted to accept the water mains, and hydrants in all 6 Clusters of Hilltop after proper provisions and documents are presented to us. This has been completed.

Due to very little construction, there has been less than 6 services installed in 1981. We had no serious problem during the year.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

December 31, 1981

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the New London Water System Precinct conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governmental units.

Basis of Accounting - The accrual basis of accounting is followed to determine income and expense for the year.

Inventory - The inventory of supplies is priced at cost. Based on physical inventory taken once a year, the increase or decrease in the inventory value is charged or credited to supply expense.

Water Precinct Facilities and Equipment - The utility plant in service and equipment are stated at undepreciated cost. Gifts or contributions of water facilities are recorded at fair market

value at the time received. Assets disposed of or abandoned are written off at cost against the appropriate asset account and charged to the General Fund balance or Contributions in Aid, depending on the original source of the assets.

Note 2 - Cash

At December 31, 1981, the Operating Cash account included \$544 which had been borrowed from the Capital Reserve Account to help finance operations; these funds will be transferred back to the Capital Reserve Account in 1982.

At December 31, 1980, the Capital Reserve Account owed the Operating Cash Account \$1,232.00 for the purchase of capital equipment appropriated at the 1980 Water Precinct meeting. These funds were paid out in 1981 as shown in Schedule No. 2.

Note 3 - Precinct Tax

The Precinct tax according to State regulations has no restrictions. The income from this tax is used primarily to pay principal and interest on outstanding debt, and to pay for plant and equipment. The tax is reported as Other Income to avoid distortion of the gain or loss from water operations.

Note 4 - Contribution in Aid

Additions to the water facilities made during the year at the expense of private owners and donated to the New London Water Precinct amounted to \$777 in 1981 and \$1,326 in 1980. Abandonment of water facilities in 1980 that were originally Contributions in Aid were zero in 1981 and were \$2,000 in 1980.
