

TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Orford on Tuesday the 10th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- l. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year; Also to choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds and one Library Trustee for three years.
- 2. To hear the budget of the Town and raise and appropriate any money recommended herein or pass any vote relative thereto.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town Winter Roads for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town Property.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appopriate for the use of Electric Lights.
- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Free Library and Orford Social Library.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and administer property acquired by Tax Deed or otherwise.
- 12. To see if the Town will ${f v}$ ote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V Roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$572.39 for that purpose.
- 14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25.00 to be expended in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission for the opening and maintaining of trails and old roads for forest fire protection, the New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission to provide a matching sum not in excess of \$25.00 for this purpose.
- 16. To see if the Provisions of Chapter 171A of the Revised Laws relating to Playing Games of Beano shall be adopted in this Town.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to cover expenses of Memorial Day.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for a Community Center Memorial Fund.
- 19. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Care of Common.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Control of Pine Blister Rust.
- 21. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Improvement of a Recreation Area at Upper Baker Pond and Indian Pond.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be used for improvement of the road leading to Indian Pond.

TOWN WARRANT — (Continued)

- 23. To see if the Town will vote to open the road leading from the Upper Baker Pond Road from a point beyond the residence of Clarence Epstean to the North Easterly side of the Town Property.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds to be used to buy Road Equipment.
- 25. To see what action the Town will take, relative to Celebrating the Two Hundredth Anniversary of the Granting of the Charter of the Town, in conjunction with other towns in this area, whose Charters were granted in 1761 and raise and appropriate any money made necessary thereby.
- 26. A. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Participation in Construction of Additions, Alterations and Improvements to the Lebanon Airport (including the acquisition of land therefor) to be voted and financed jointly with the City of Lebanon and any other instrumentalities of the State of New Hampshire, the State of Vermont, and the Federal Government.
- B. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen in their discretion, to take such action as may be necessary to join with the City of Lebanon, and any other instrumentalities of the State of New Hampshire, the State of Vermont, and the Federal Government in the formation of an authority or instrumentality for the purpose of carrying out the Purposes of Paragraph A, of this Article.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for material spreader.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Trustees of the Community Center Memorial Fund to turn over \$1,000.00 of the fund to the Orford School District to help defray the cost of an attractive memorial entrance to the new school facility together with an appropriately worded Memorial Plaque, the design and wording of which shall have the approval of the Trustees, Selectmen and School Board.
- 29. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to mail postcards to property owners notifying them of the valuation figure upon which their tax is computed, such postcard to be mailed as soon as possible after such figure becomes available.

- 30. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

The following is a report of the activities conducted in the Town of Orford by the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing for the year 1958.

Immunization clinics were held for Salk vaccine, Triple Toxoid and Smallpox Vaccinations in February and May with a good attendance. In May a Child Health Conference was held at the Town Hall for physical examinations for preschool children. Eight children received a complete physical by local doctors. In August a Dental Cleaning and Sodium Fluorine Program was held for children three to six years of age. Fourteen children took advantage and received dental cleaning, four N. A. F. treatments and excellent dental instruction by a Dental Hygienist from the Bureau of Dental Public Health of the N. H. Department of Health. My sincere thanks for the use of the Town Hall, Library and Orfordville School for these clinics, also to the doctors, nurses and lay committee who assisted. My special thanks to the Orford P. T. A. and other sponsoring organizations assisting in these worthwhile programs for the children of their community.

Home calls have also been made on mothers, infants and preschool children and assistance given in problems as needed. Arrangements have also been made for children to attend diagnostic clinics at Hanover and Littleton and follow up visits made for instruction.

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning — brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc., cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you — personally and financially.

- If, however, you do burn on your premises:
- 1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

To the inhabitants of the School District of Orford qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District, on Monday, the Sixth of April, 1959, at eight o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for three years, and to fill any vacancies which may occur on the School Board.
 - Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.
- Article 9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1958-59, a sum of money to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1959, in order to meet obligations due primarily to unanticipated costs for necessary equipment and higher costs for electricity.

Article 10. To see if the District will raise and appropriate, in addition to the original appropriation for 1958-59, a sum of \$840.00 (Eight Hundred and Forty Dollars) to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1959, and, also, \$840.00 (Eight Hundred and Forty Dollars) in the 1959-60 budget, in order for the District to avail itself during 1958-59 and 1959-60 of federal funds to be distributed under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act, Public Law 85-864, and to authorize the School Board to make application for, to accept on behalf of the District, and to apply against this appropriation any or all grants or other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act.

Article 11. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire, the United States or other sources.

Article 12. To see if the District will complete and equip the new school building now under construction, and will make alterations and additions to the present high school building, including in each case the purchase of equipment and the necessary grading, filling and draining of land, and appropriate money therefor and raise the same by the issue of bonds, notes or otherwise and authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts relating thereto, including the employment of an architect, and to take such other action with respect thereto as may be necessary or advisable.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Orford:

I present herein my report for 1958, my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Orford.

New Building

The 1958 Orford School District meeting voted, by a very large majority, a bond issue of \$79,000.00 to construct a new building. This was a significant step. It symbolized Orford's confidence in itself and its schools, and, also, its determination to have an even better high school.

Twenty-year bonds were issued in June. The contract for the building was awarded to Trumbull-Nelson Company, Inc., of Hanover, the low bidder on the plans and specifications drawn by Helmer and Cole, Associate Architects of Woodstock, Vermont. The contract was signed on October 21, 1958, and construction started almost immediately.

The bids were higher than had been hoped for. There was sufficient money to make a good start on building one

classroom and the combination auditorium-gymnasium-cafeteria. Before the building can be used, however, there must be a further appropriation for some aspects of the construction and for equipment. Furthermore, if we are to put the improved program into action, and are to have the library that is required, there must be funds for alterations to the old building. I hope that the 1959 School District Meeting will raise and appropriate the funds that cannot be secured from other sources. We must have the improved program if we are to continue to attract tuition pupils or hope to increase the number of such pupils.

Change in Principalship

After eleven years of excellent service, Mr. Elmer B, Fulton resigned as Principal. The high school had grown and gone forward under his leadership. I am sure that the people of Orford, and particularly the students who were in the school during his tenure, will join with me in expressing deep regret at his leaving, but, at the same time, wishing him every happiness in his new work.

We were very fortunate to secure Dr. Paul J. Wenners as Mr. Fulton's successor. Dr. Wenners has a broad education in both professional and liberal arts fields. He has had a long and varied experience, both as a teacher and as an administrator. We are confident that the schools of Orford will continue to go forward under his leadership.

Teachers' Salaries

Improved facilities and a better program will improve the school only to the extent that we have good teachers. In previous reports I have stated that the Orford salaries put us in a poor position to retain teachers or to compete for new ones.

- Only 254 of the 2,171 elementary women teachers in the state receive less than \$3,400.00.
- Only 59 of the 822 men high school teachers receive less than \$3,600.00.
- Only 37 of the 747 women high school teachers receive less than \$3,500.00.

The Vermont minimum salary law that went into effect with the school year 1957-58 makes Orford's position even more precarious. That law calls for the following **minimum** salaries:

The Vermont communities are required to advance their teachers toward the minimum salaries at not less than \$300.00 per year.

We had a very difficult time to fill our vacancies for September, 1958. Between May 1 and August 30 —

- Forty-three toll calls were made to teachers' agencies, colleges and individuals.
- Eighty-three letters were written to agencies and colleges.
- Seventy-three letters were written to individuals.
- Orford positions were discussed with many candidates for Hanover and Enfield positions.
- Several advertisements were run in the New York Herald Tribune, the Valley News, the Manchester Union and the Claremont Eagle.

Out of a total of the twelve full-time personnel on this year's staff, six, or fifty percent are new. School opened on September 3. Contracts for the new people were signed on the following dates: April 30, May 16, June 17, August 16 (2), and August 22.

A salary study is now being made in Orford. The 1959-1960 School Budget makes provision for a step forward. I sincerely hope that the budget will be passed, and that the study will result in a very substantial increase for 1960-61.

Conclusion

Rather than merely quoting excerpts from Mr. Wenners' report to me, I would like to have the people of Orford see his entire report. I conclude, therefore, by expressing appreciation to the members of the School Board, the members of the school staff and the citizens of Orford for their continued help.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF ORFORD HIGH SCHOOL

1. A Step Forward

Since this is my first report as Principal of Orford High School, based upon only five months' acquaintance with the educational situation here, I do not feel competent to speak of the accomplishments during the past school year, except — and this is quite an exception! — to record that the new building then planned and provided for is now rising from the ground and taking form — visual proof that a great and significant step has been taken toward realizing the expressed hope of making Orford High School "one of the finest small high schools in the State" of New Hampshire.

2. Dr. Conant on School Size

As this new building rises to continue in existence a small high school, the newspapers and education and other magazines are headlining the imminent publication of a book by the former President of Harvard University, James Bryant Conant, in which he has been reported as saying that the

American high school should have no fewer than one hundred students in the graduating class, since smaller schools cannot offer the type of education he believes necessary today. It may well be that, in view of such a statement by an eminent educator, some may feel that it is unwise to continue small high schools such as Orford is now, and may be for some years at least in the future.

Not in the spirit of controversy, but to reassure those whose support of the proposed better high school in Orford is important for its success, some observations seem justified, — before we describe the plans upon which much work has been done since our assumption of the duties of the principalship.

In the first place, there is **nothing new** in Dr. Conant's statement about school size. Fifteen years ago professors at Harvard Graduate School of Education were telling their students that only in four-year high schools with at least five hundred students could a comprehensive curriculum be offered at the lowest per pupil cost; in smaller schools the per pupil cost would be greater. Even this statement is open to question, since salaries vary greatly in different areas, and school building costs for different types of construction as well as for land are certainly not the same; modern curricula are offered in old buildings as well as in multi-million dollar "palaces". No doubt, in general, costs are lower where classes are larger, but this is not necessarily true in every school.

The danger is that those not familiar with the many aspects of the educational development of the American high school, and perhaps somewhat awed by the international repute of Dr. Conant as a university president, may tend to think ill of any school he does not approve. For example, they may not know of the Edgar Starr Barney Project (research and service department of the Hebrew Technical Institute, originally the first free vocational school in New York City, now devoted to the nationwide study of technical and vocational education) which has sponsored the publication of two very important books — the 1948 "Education for an Industrial Age" and the 1955 "The Comprehensive High School". This latter book, based upon a four-year study from coast to coast, begins with a sentence well worth quoting: "Like any honest book, this book reflects the experiences and the persuasions of the writer."

3. Vocational Education Not Everything

It is, in brief, important to remember that any book represents a point of view, and while it is wise to consider the point of view of a distinguished educator, it is not necessary to feel that his is the final word on such a question. There are, for example, such practical considerations as the time and the expense involved in transporting pupils to these larger schools in sparsely settled areas, such as most of northern New England, and much of the rest of the United States. Again, there are social values to be kept in mind contact with a student's own community may become so slight that the most important needs of an adolescent, emotional in nature, are not met even if his vocational interests are satisfied in the larger area school. Moreover, educators who have spent their whole lives in the field of high school education are quite convinced that vocational education - which is what large schools are usually better able to offer at lower per pupil cost — is not so important as "learning to live", as the late Dr. John M. Brewer of Harvard phrased it in his book "Education as Guidance", published in 1932.

4. Investing in Orford's Future

The small community that wishes to do its best for its young people must face squarely the question: Shall we offer only a "college preparatory" curriculum, however few of our students ever actually go to college, solely because it costs the least per pupil, — or shall we **invest** a reasonable amount per pupil more to offer all students either a good general education and some vocational skills, or a strong college preparation if they wish to continue their education beyond high school?

The word "invest" was used intentionally, rather than "spend", because studies have shown conclusively that the community which educates its young people as well as possible becomes a better community economically, as the better-educated graduate can better support himself and his family, and thus in due time add to the value of his property holdings in his town. The United States Government has, for example, found that the money spent for Veterans' Education has been well **invested**, since the veterans — after training — earned more and paid higher income taxes.

As speakers remarked when ground was broken last fall for the new Orford High School, no matter how splendid the building, the most important thing is what education takes place within that building. In the firm belief that this new structure would give the community the best value for its investment only if it resulted in greater educational advantages for all students, plans have been carefully made during the past five months to improve the curriculum to be offered in 1959 - 60.

5. More for the Money

It has been felt that maximum use should be made of both the original building and the new building, with a view to providing now the best possible education for present students and those additional tuition students who might wish to attend Orford High School, with the frank hope that increased revenue would hasten the day when the new Orford High School could be completed. With this is mind, it is recommended that the new building be used, not only for basketball games, assemblies, and lunchroom, but also for physical education classes. Such use would mean not only better health and physical development of both boys and girls, but it would aid in the development of social poise as well, through participation in the many games, sports, etc., that such a program provides. The per hour cost of use of the building would be materially less than if it were not used for such physical education classes.

6. Modernizing the Old

Again, with many of the students in these physical education classes, rooms in the original building would be available for instruction in other subjects which cannot be offered at present because so many students are kept in so-called "study periods". This year, many students are taking subjects in only twenty periods per week, though there are thirty regular periods, in addition to five so-called "activity periods". Except for the very few athletes, who practice soccer or basketball in such "activity periods", or the few who meet in various clubs, no **activity** is possible at the present time.

7. Curricula for Today's Needs

To make possible a better curriculum, plans have been drawn to change the original building at relatively small expense. To be specific, it is proposed to convert the present Grade VII-VIII Room into a Home Economics Laboratory,

with adequate modern facilities for sixteen girls at a time (Grades VII and VIII will be in the new classroom in the new building next fall); to convert the present Science Room and Home Economics Room into a modern Science Room with facilities for twenty-four students, — by removing the partition between the present two rooms; to convert Room 3 into two smaller but more efficient classrooms; to convert Room 5 into the library (required by state law when a new building is erected); to divide Room 8 (the present cafeteria) into a classroom and a small Teachers' Room (at the present time, the teachers have no place where they may even keep their outer clothing); and to provide more toilet facilities by changing two doors so that entrances will be from the corridors rather than from the classrooms.

These changes, together with efficient use of the new gymnasium, will make possible a fuller curriculum. Complete explanation of these changes would require more space than this report should take, but some improvements at least should be noted. It is planned to divide the English classes in Grades IX and X, so that the college preparatory students and those taking other courses may have their particular needs better cared for; similarly, in mathematics, the freshmen may take General Mathematics or Algebra I or General Business, depending on what they plan to do in later life; all freshmen will be able to take General Science; sophomores may take either College Preparatory Biology or Health and General Biology, — the latter more practical in nature for the general student; juniors and seniors will be able in alternate years to take College Preparatory or General Physics and Chemistry, depending on their life aims; Latin I will be re-introduced next fall, with a four-year sequence to be available in succeeding years; Physical Science will be offered for seniors who have not had sufficient science; and Advanced Mathematics will be available to capable seniors.

While, ideally, every student's high school program should be determined individually, as a practical matter few students — even with guidance — are able to plan such a program, largely because their aims are subject to change. For this reason, and because many students will have similar goals, a number of curricula have been arranged which assure inclusion of subjects all need, as well as additional subjects necessary for success in college, in technical schools, in business, in homemaking, in agriculture, and in other fields. For the especially able students, provision is made for the study

of five or even six subjects, in addition to physical education. In all of these pre-arranged curricula, subjects are offered in proper sequence, from the lesser to the more complex, from year to year.

The establishment of such recommended curricula does not prevent selection of other subject combinations by students with special goals, to the extent that the program of studies permits. However, all students must include those subjects necessary for a well-rounded general education as well as subjects of vocational type.

8. Choosing Wisely

During the past month, the Iowa Tests of Educational Development have been given and the results will soon be available; these tests are marked electronically and afford an unbiased analysis of the strengths and weaknesses of each student. Together with other tests to be given soon, they will furnish each student and his parents with a valuable insight into his interest and abilities, so that in choosing the subjects he will study in the future, he will be able to decide wisely.

While Orford High School will not be able to offer as wide a choice of subjects as Dr. Conant might wish, with the opportunities available under the proposed plan, and with the great advantages to be found in the close teacher-pupil relationship of the small high school, we can look forward confidently to excellent results.

9. For Leisure Hours

While this report has been primarily devoted to the major work of a high school — the program of studies — we have given thought to other matters as well. For example, we hope to have an interesting series of assemblies, not only those planned and executed by the students, but others of a cultural and entertaining nature, to which we hope parents and friends will come, now that seating will not be the problem it has been. We hope too to have evening social events, such as dances, where students and their friends may spend enjoyable hours. We hope in time to see further development of the school grounds, with provision for cross-country and track teams especially.

10. The New Shop

We suggest too that thought be given as soon as possible to providing a separate shop and classroom for the Vocational Agriculture students, since the danger of fire in the present wooden annex, under classrooms, is a constant source of concern, even if the shop were as large as it should be. This should be given attention before further additions are made to the new gymnasium building.

Personally, may I express for my wife and myself, our deep appreciation of the friendliness and helpfulness of the many people we have met already in Orford and its neighboring and neighborly towns; I have enjoyed working with you, Mr. Pierce, with the members of the School Committee, Mr. Glenn Pease, Mrs. Martha Miller, and Mr. Meldrim Thomson, Jr., and with the faculty. I have never known a community where so many people have so unselfishly done so much to make a teacher's life pleasant. We hope that in return we can do something to make you as glad as we are that we came to Orford.


