In accordance with our statutory obligations, we estimate that \$900.00 will be necessary for the purchase of books and supplies. As there is a balance of \$44.17 on account of Flags and Flag Poles, we estimate there will be no additional amount required.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

MEMBERS OF THE SCHOOL BOARD:

I respectfully submit the following report concerning the schools of Peterborough for the year ending February fifteenth, nineteen hundred fifteen.

At the present time, there is not a single person teaching in the schools of Peterborough who was on the force five years ago. Furthermore, in some schools there has been not one but many changes in that time. Several have occurred since the printing of the report one year ago. The list of those who have secured positions elsewhere with increased salaries includes the names of Mr. L. S. Morrison, principal of the high school, now superintendent of schools in a neighboring district, Misses Edith A. Ryan and Ethel M. Bascom, assistants in the high school, Miss Bernice E. Coburn of the Wilson Corner school, Miss Beulah M. Irwin of the Valley school, and Miss Anna A. Hurley of the Center school whose resignation went into effect in January. Mrs. Maude L. Grant was not a candidate for re-election at the East school.

The task of securing a new principal for the high school was both easy and difficult because of the unusually long list of applicants—there being approximately forty. The outcome of the efforts to choose from this list the right man for the place was the selection of Mr. William G. Park, a teacher with considerable experience acquired in Massachusetts, Rhode Island,

and Connecticut. Candidates for the other high school positions were not nearly so numerous. Finally, Miss Hortense F. Atwood of Natick, Mass., a graduate of Simmons College, and Miss Anna E. Gorham of Easthampton, Mass., a graduate of Bay Path Institute, accepted the offers that we could make.

The changes in the other schools include the transfer of Miss E. Estella Shedd from the West to the Center school and the following appointments:—Miss Anna G. Byrne of Portsmouth, N. H., the West school; and later, because of the unexpectedly large enrollment, Miss Florence C. Carr of Stoneham, Mass., the West Grammar school; Mrs. Maude W. Frederick, a former teacher in town, the Wilson Corner school; Miss Viola Hemphill of Hillsborough, the East school; Miss Adaline M. Holmes of Falmouth, Mass., the North school; and Miss Lucia D. Ruggles of Boston, Mass., grades five and six, Center school. This list is the result of not a little travel, and much correspondence, some of which ended abruptly when figures were mentioned. Had we been able to offer larger salaries, the labor would have been materially lightened.

The experiences of the past year, referred to above, have made me feel more strongly than ever that we shall have to pay our teachers more if we wish to secure and retain such talent as the town should have. Board is more expensive than a few years ago, and the salaries offered by other towns for trained and successful teachers have increased steadily during the same period. Only a few weeks ago, one of the normal principals told the writer that he could place all of his graduates in positions paying as much as Peterborough teachers of experience are receiving. This condition naturally suggests that we should increase the appropriation for teachers' salaries.

Some other changes that have taken place within five years are the increase in the length of the school year from thirty-three weeks to thirty-six weeks for all schools excepting the high and grammar schools which already had that number of weeks; the fitting up of a manual training room in the Center building; and the introduction of commercial and domestic arts courses in the high school. These increased advantages necessarily mean additional expense. As I feel certain that the town does not wish to take any backward steps in educational matters, I again venture to suggest financial liberality.

A few statements regarding the new courses referred to above may be of interest to the reader. At the present time, there are six members of the first year class in domestic arts. They have prepared and served five lunches in addition to the cooking of many separate dishes, and have drafted and made garments from

measurements taken by themselves. The members of the second year class, numbering seven, are studying household physics and chemistry, and sanitation. Among other things, they have made diagrams illustrating steam, hot air, and hot water systems of heating, and have discussed their comparative merits. They have also become familiar with the ventilating system of the schoolhouse. In the laboratory, they have made soap, silver polish, and furniture polish. The other new department, the commercial, attracts about the same number of pupils as the department already mentioned, there being sixteen pupils in the bookkeeping classes. Ten of these are doing second year work. Seven juniors and seniors are studying shorthand and typewriting. Three of these should complete the work this year and be able by that time to take and transcribe any ordinary office dictation. For the sake of comparison, I will add that there are thirteen freshmen and sophomores studying Latin. Thus it would appear that each one of the curricula offered is about equally attractive.

For several years, the question of how to divide up the work in the Center building has been met in makeshift ways. This year, there are more than seventy pupils in the primary room. These are taught by two teachers, one of whom takes her classes into the chemical laboratory for recitations. As there is no class in chemistry this year, the room can be used in this way with some inconvenience. Next year, however, it is altogether likely that the room will be used for laboratory purposes. Then some other provision will need to be made for the primary pupils. The best solution would be another room for the use of the grades. This can be obtained by taking the present commercial room for that purpose, and fitting up a commercial room in the third story of the building. Some other solution may be better; but, as I view it now, that seems to be the most feasible and economical way to solve the problem.

Although the primary teacher has been obliged to work at a disadvantage because of crowded conditions, she has been able to obtain good results. According to her report at the end of the year, the pupils in the "A" division of the first grade read ten primers and first readers in class, and in addition each member read anywhere from five to twenty-one books outside of class. With regard to this outside of class reading, I might say that it was undertaken as an experiment. The outcome was so unexpectedly gratifying that it would seem wise to make it a permanent feature of the work.

Passing to the other end of our educational system, we are able to record the graduation of twelve persons from the high

school last June. Five of these are continuing their studies at other institutions. Misses Charlotte M. Spaulding and C. Mira Wallace are attending the Sargent school; Mr. Almerin M. Gowing is pursuing art studies at a private school in Boston; Mr. Paul S. Liscord is a Dartmouth freshman; and Mr. Donald J. Mackenzie is at Harvard, having passed the entrance examinations with such credit as to secure honors. As far as I know, Mr. Mackenzie is the first person that has ever entered that college directly from the Peterborough High School,

TO THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS:

I hereby present my report covering that part of the year during which I have been connected with the High School.

When school opened in September the registration showed a slight increase over that of last year, and has remained about the same up to this time.

Considering that the majority of the teachers were strangers to the town and school at the beginning of the year I feel that the progress made has been all, and perhaps more, than we might expect. A certain period of adjustment is bound to occur at such a time but a good degree of interest and enthusiasm has been shown in all the work on the part of both teachers and pupils and the desire to excel seems to be the prevailing spirit.

The excusing of honor students from taking examinations, excepting the mid-year and finals, appears to have a very good effect and is a stimulus to do good work each day. So far this plan is giving very satisfactory results.

In the courses of study as now arranged, the omission of Physics and English History makes a break in the continuity of the work which it is somewhat difficult to bridge over successfully. I do not know as it will be possible to remedy this omission with our present teaching force, but if it can be done, I am sure it would greatly strengthen our work. The addition of a modern language to the Commercial Course is to be recommended.

The courses in Domestic Arts and Commerce are attracting a large number of the entering classes and it is quite certain as time goes on that the wisdom of adopting these courses will be apparent. The question of the day in school work seems to be how we may best fit the pupils we are sending out from year to

year for right living. The problem may not be solved, but I believe that some advance toward its solution is now being made. If the high school can help its pupils to decide as to their life work, it has accomplished at least one important object.

TO THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS:

The following report of the Department of the Manual Arts is herewith respectfully submitted.

The work in the Manual Arts in the grades consists of courses in the following subjects: Nature drawing, paper and cardboard construction, object drawing, color, design, construction drawing, manual training and sewing. The course aims to develop in children general aptness in correlation of hand and eye, in the expression of ideas of form, of constructive thinking and the appreciation of beauty. The principles underlying the representation of objects in perspective are discovered by the children through carefully planned experiments.

Sewing has lately been added to the list of subjects taught in the manual arts and instruction in this subject is given to the girls of the seventh and eighth grades of the Center school. There will be an attempt to correlate this work with work in drawing and design.

The work in manual training in the grades is similar to that of previous years. Principles are taught by means of carefully graded problems. When these have been satisfactorily completed the pupil chooses an individual problem, something he desires for his own use, and this usually takes him several years to complete. The number of required problems is to be increased. It is to be hoped that a longer period than forty minutes once per week will be allowed next year. An allowance of only twenty-four hours per year for work in this subject is not nearly enough for really satisfactory results.

The work in the manual arts in the high school consists of two subjects: Manual training for freshman and sophomore boys and Art Appreciation for all members of the domestic science class.

High school manual training classes have worked on two kinds of projects. One project has been the improvement of the school building, as expressed in the work done in the domestic science rooms. The rest of the boys have worked on their individual

problems. These problems have usually been something that the boy really wanted, and is generally some article of furniture of simple construction. To secure better results, I ask for more time to be given to this subject. The addition of a machine to to lighten the drudgery of the exhaustive sawing and planing that is necessary now would add to the interest in the work.

Work in the Appreciation of Art class centers about the notebook, which each member of the class is required to keep. The notebook contains outlines, essays and prints of the examples studied. Textbooks are used and reference books are consulted. The subject is important for a broad education, and its only weakness lies in the fact that we have only pictures to study. In connection with this work, members of the two classes have made one trip to the Boston and Cambridge museums on an observation tour.

The present need in the manual arts course in our high school is for the introduction of a course in **drawing**. It is an absolute necessity for later work in the Domestic Science class. There should be a special course for the domestic science pupils and courses in freehand and mechanical drawing or a progressive general course for all other pupils of the high school.

The courses already established would put forth tangible results if the time devoted to these subjects could be increased.

The hearty and interested co-operation of teachers and pupils has made my work in Peterborough very pleasant.

TO THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS:

The following report of the music department of the Peterborough schools is respectfully submitted.

In several ways the music work is progressing more smoothly than last year, especially in the lower grades. I feel that it is getting nearer to the standard we would desire. Since the opening of the school year, the first four grades have been in charge of Miss Shedd in music and have shown marked improvement.

Beginning with this fall term we have had the work planned ahead as carefully as possible. The Supervisor leaves the plans for four weeks work with the grade teachers the first of every month, thereby keeping a record of work done and giving the teacher a chance to study the outline a month ahead.

The third and fourth grades have gained rapidly in the ability to read music. The tone quality also receives special attention throughout the school, which is one of the most important things to be considered.

The sixth grade is doing two part work, has studied all the chromatic tones and had drill in all the fundamental principles of rhythm. The seventh and eighth grades are singing three part songs, have studied the bass clef and made a more detailed study of the chromatic tones.

The High School chorus is doing very good work, considering the fact that the only time allowed for chorus work is about forty minutes once a week. There are very few tenor voices so the parts are not quite as well balanced as would be desired. The bass part is very good and there are quite a number of good girls' voices. The girls' glee club has begun rehearsals.

The class in music appreciation meets for only one period a week. We are studying the subject of "Music Form" and are using for a text book "What is Good Music" by W. J. Henderson. The students in this class are also keeping note books of current musical events which contain press notes and photographs of famous musicians now in the public eye, thus becoming acquainted, in a way, with the best that is going on in the musical world to-day.

The effort is made to keep the district schools up to the same grade in music as the graded schools, which is in some cases, a hard task. Each school is divided into two or three classes, each of which has (allowing one half hour to each school) from ten to fifteen minutes of the Supervisor's time once in two weeks. Consequently, the progress depends largely upon the regular teacher's ability to go on with the work. Several of the classes are doing very good work.

I appreciate what thought and effort the teachers have put into this subject, without which we could not accomplish our purpose.

Your committee chosen at the town meeting of March, 1914, wish to submit the following report on the purchase of a Combination Chemical and Hose Motor Truck. After visiting a number of towns and cities, including Athol, Gardner, Fitchburg, Leominster, Boston, Everett, Chelsea, Medford, Arlington, Worcester, Manchester and Nashua, and making a number of inquiries in relation to the different types and makes of Fire Trucks, your committee signed a contract with The American-La France Fire Eng. Company, Inc., of Elmira, N. Y., for one of their Type 10 Double Tank Combination Chemical and Hose Cars for the sum of fifty eight hundred dollars, delivered in Peterborough, N. H.

The truck arrived in Peterborough on Jan. 29, 1915, and after a number of severe tests or trials through ice and snow, it was accepted by your committee in behalf of the town on Feb. 6, 1915, and immediately placed in commission.

The above truck has a gasoline motor of 48-70 horse power rating; two 35 gal. chemical tanks, 200 ft. of chemical hose, a false body for fire hose of 2000 ft. capacity, and room to carry seven to fifteen men with other equipment.

To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to appoint a police officer whose duty it shall be to preserve order in and about the public places in town, and perform such other duties as are required by the selectmen both day and night, and raise and appropriate money to defray the expense of the same.

7th. To see if the town will vote to accept legacies and gifts given to the town in trust by different individuals, the income to be used in the care of cemetery lots.

8th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of Old Home Week.

9th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the concrete side-walk where needed most.

10th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to spray the shade trees along the street and public places to protect them from the ravages of insect pests.

11th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Board of Trade.

12th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate towards building the new state highway known as the South Side Road.

13th. To see if the town will vote to replace one or more of the wooden bridges in town with stone, cement or iron bridges, and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any other action relating thereto.

14th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to erect guide boards on the highways of the town.

15th. To see if the town will accept the gift of a deed from Mrs. George E. Adams of a certain tract of land containing nine acres, more or less, situated on the south side of Union street on the road to West Peterborough, for a public play ground, or take any action relating thereto.

16th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to appoint a highway agent.

17th. To see if the town will vote to put steam heat into the town hall block and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any other action in relation thereto.

18th. To see if the town will vote to put steam heat and a water closet into the Fire Station and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action in relation to the same.

19th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to carry out the recommendations of the committee chosen at the last annual town meeting to investigate the protection and conservation of the town water supply or take any other action relating to the report of said committee.

20th. To see what action the town will take to lay the dust on the streets of the village and raise and appropriate money for the same.

21st. To see what action the town will take in relation to carting away rubbish in the village and for the conservation of public health and raise and appropriate money for the same.

22nd. To see if the town will vote to make a concrete sidewalk on Summer street, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to lay out a side-walk on Vale street, commencing at a point opposite the land of John Condon at the corner of Vale and

Grove street running on the north side of said street to a point opposite the Emmes place and raise and appropriate money for the same.

24th. To see if the town will vote to put an electric light on the pole in front of the Quimby estate and raise and appropriate money for the same.

25th. To see if the town will vote to sell the land near J. F. Dunklee's and the Puffer corner, or take any other action relating thereto.

26th. To see if the town will vote to put an electric light on Concord street opposite the Episcopal Church.

27th. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation for a period of ten years any improvements or expenditures to be made in buildings and machinery of whatsoever nature on the property in West Peterborough and vicinity standing in the name of "The White Mills of New Hampshire." Also, on the personal property of the above firm consisting in part of machinery, cotton manufactured or unmanufactured, supplies, money and securities and working capital, standing in the name of the above firm.

28th. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate to pay the cost of changing the old Jaffrey Road in the southern part of the town, from the foot of the hill east of the house of John E. Ellsworth to a point about opposite the house of W. L. Nickerson, whenever the selectmen shall lay it out, or to choose a committee to investigate the advisability of changing the road.

29th. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the old highway from the foot of the hill east of the house of J. E. Ellsworth to a point about opposite the house of W. L. Nickerson, whenever a new road is laid out between said points by the selectmen.

30th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate two hundred fifty dollars and expend the same to reimburse Mr. Charles F. Batchelder for expenses of railing beside the road near Powers Bridge, so called, and to complete the filling in the road at foot of hill near said bridge, or take any action relating thereto.
