TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Raymond in the County of Rockingham and said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Odd Fellows Hall in said Raymond on Tuesday the 11th day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To elect a delegate to the Constitutional convention.
2. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray all town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for same.
4. To fix compensation for collecting taxes for the year ensuing.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand nine hundred and twenty five dollars (\$1,925.00) for tractor.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town maintenance including snow.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such amounts for State Highways as recommended by the New Hampshire State Highway department.
8. To see if the town will vote to authorize and order the chief of Torrent Hose Company, No. 1, Raymond Fire

department to purchase a motor pump for fire prevention and control within the town and elsewhere as may be necessary, particularly for use beyond the hydrant system, at a cost of not exceeding seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) with payments arranged as follows: two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to be paid on delivery, and one thousand dollars (\$1,000) together with a crude interest at the rate of five per cent (5%) per annum to be paid on the first day of April, A. D., 1931, 1932, 1933, 1934, and 1935, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day purposes.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the fire company.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Dudley Tucker library.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting.

13. To see if the town will vote to install a street light at the intersection of State road and Onway Lake road and raise and appropriate money for same.

14. To transact other business as may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Raymond:

Since my services in Raymond began with the present school year the report for the year completed in June, 1929, is of necessity statistical. However, I wish to deal briefly with the present organization and enrollment, buildings and equipment, health activities, and a square deal for the boys.

Two pupils, Emma Cram and Carrie Ida Hilliard, were graduated from the senior high school in June, 1929.

The cost per pupil in the elementary schools of Raymond for the year 1928-1929 was \$69.59 compared with \$83.35 the median cost per pupil in the state. Of the 244 New Hampshire school districts arranged in the ascending order of cost, per thousand of equalized valuation for all school purposes, Raymond stood 167th.

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

Due to the resignation of four teachers, including the headmaster of your high school, five of our nine teachers were unfamiliar in September with your local school system.

Laurence P. Bagley, a 1926 graduate of Bates and for three years a high school principal in Maine, succeeded Headmaster Snyder who accepted a position in the Manchester school system. Josephine Fernald, a 1929 graduate of Tufts, and Mildred E. Thompson, graduated in 1929 from Boston University, succeeded respectively Miss Waldron as teacher of history and Latin and Mrs. Snyder, the teacher of commerce. You are fortunate in the retention of M. Catherine Davey in the department of English and French, and of Iber Holmes in home economics.

In the fifth and sixth grades Miss Shirley Martin was succeeded by Mrs. Helen M. Martin, a graduate of Salem Normal School and for several years a teacher in Haverhill, Mass. S. Ellen Mitchell, a recent graduate of Keene Normal school and previously a teacher in the Hopkinton and Milford Unions, was elected teacher of grades three and four. Both Mrs. Martin and Miss Mitchell are in charge of schools having a register of over forty pupils each.

With a combined enrollment of over fifty children in grades one and two it became necessary to transfer the second grade to the one-room annex, previously used for a superintendent's office. Hazel Robbins, last year teacher in grades three and four, is in charge of the second grade. Lucille E. Seaver retains the first grade in the main building. I am gratified to note the retention of these teachers in these most important grades.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

In the main building in addition to the seasonal cleaning, oiling of floors, and painting of woodwork and walls, the plumbing of toilets and of heating equipment has required frequent attention. One unit in the boys toilet is useless and should be replaced before another year. It would add much to the efficiency and convenience in handling wood and ashes and in delivering heavy cases of supplies if a rollway were built from the boiler room to the yard at the rear of the building.

By finishing the floor and walls and introducing steam heat, the supply room over the boys entrance has been converted into an office which the superintendent finds adequate and convenient.

A fir floor was laid last summer in the kitchen of the home economics building, and the windows and doors completely screened. The school room in the annex has been equipped with jacketed stove and with a ventilating system adequate for thirty pupils.

The increased enrollment in high school, including fourteen tuition pupils, necessitated the purchase of sixteen chair desks for the home room of the junior and senior classes.

In addition to the efficient performance of his routine duties the janitor, Mr. Littlefield, has greatly assisted in meeting crowded conditions by the repair and construction of seating and other equipment.

HEALTH ACTIVITIES

Raymond and the other four towns of this Union are fortunate to retain the services of Margaret E. Cronin, R. N., for the entire period of the present school year. Her report for the six months ending June 30, 1929, follows:

At a clinic for underweight children, conducted by Dr. Robert Kerr in Raymond, May 15, 1929, thirty-two school pupils were examined. At the Elliot Hospital seven pupils had tonsils removed and one received ear treatment by Dr. Togus. One applicant was admitted on trial to the Golden Rule Farm near Hill, N. H.

To the 205 school visits recorded in the Table of Statistics for 1928-1929 there should be added forty-six home visits which constitute a particularly effective feature of the nurse's work in securing corrective treatments.

Through the generous co-operation of the local Red Cross society and the activities of your school nurse dental clinic service for the school children of Raymond seems assured before the close of schools in June.

A SQUARE DEAL FOR THE BOYS

Raymond's schools now offer to the girls popular and efficient courses in practical arts for twenty-two periods a week, while the boys "serve time" until the girls return to join them in academic or commercial classes. This means that we are emphasizing a girls' high school, and are encouraging the boy who is not possessed of an academic mind to leave school as soon as he becomes of sufficient age. In view of this situation I am convinced that the welfare of your school and community calls for practical courses for boys, that shall correlate with the activities of the home, the 4-H Club, and the extension service of our State University. I have in mind the type of work for boys long established in such small high schools as Hopkinton, New Boston, Warner and Weare. I recommend that with the next school year there be established for the boys of the Raymond schools practical courses in farm and home mechanics, agriculture, and animal husbandry.

IN CONCLUSION

I wish to add my hearty approval of the suggestions made in the report of Headmaster Bagley and to commend the work of the headmaster and the teachers of all grades whose interests, I believe, are one with the best interests of their pupils.

A BRIEF REPORT OF WHAT THE HIGH SCHOOL IS DOING, WITH SOME RECOMMENDATIONS

The school year began with forty-four students in the Senior high and forty-two in the Junior high. Now at mid-year we find we have lost but one from the Senior and four from the Junior high. There have been very few cases of absence because of illness—in all a very good record of attendance.

The High school offers an excellent Home Economics department for the girls where they procure practical training in the arts of home making that will be of much value to them in life. It also furnishes good dinners to the students for the small sum of ten cents.

The boys are less fortunate. The lack of one of the so-called "practical arts" courses for the boys is at present the major need of the school. There is nothing of a practical nature to offer boys who do not wish a purely academic course, but who have talents along other lines that should be developed. For these boys a course in agriculture or wood and metal work would graduate young men who would be of much greater value to their community.

The ideal program of athletics is that program which supplies some form of athletics to meet the needs of every student. This ideal of having everyone benefited by sports is nearly met for the boys of the high school in basketball as almost every boy is out for this sport. The team is playing a clean, fast brand of basketball and is winning a majority of its games. But the school is handicapped in trying to carry out a program of athletics for all by lack of suitable facilities. A properly equipped gymnasium would solve this problem and provide for the young people the kind of place they need for their activities.

The basketball teams wish to express their thanks to the Odd Fellows for the use of their hall, without which this fine season of sport could not have been enjoyed.

A debating team was organized this winter term and joined the State University Debating league. Such an organization is of vast importance to the student participating in it as it increases his ability to think, to arrange those thoughts in a logical order and to deliver them in a forceful and convincing manner to an audience. It would be a splendid thing if a course in debating were introduced in the English course next year, in connection with the debating team, affording an opportunity for more students to be benefited by this training.

Under the direction of Mr. Heber Sink, and with the assistance of the local ministers, a Hi-Y was organized for the boys last fall. The activities of this organization are prepared with the view of developing the boys physically, mentally, and spiritually. A large number of the boys belong to the Hi-Y and are taking an interested and active part in its development.

The girls desire a similar organization with equal opportunities. Such organizations for character development in youth are of lasting value to the school and to the community at large.

The high school is in real need of a school library equipped with the necessary reference books. There are a few books in the school at present which are to be used to start a library but the supply of reference books is limited and should be increased as rapidly as possible.

In conclusion, I wish to thank all who have helped out by attending various school functions, and to express the wish that more of the parents and others in the community would show the interest I know they have in the school by visiting the regular sessions of the school as well as the socials, games, and other public gatherings.

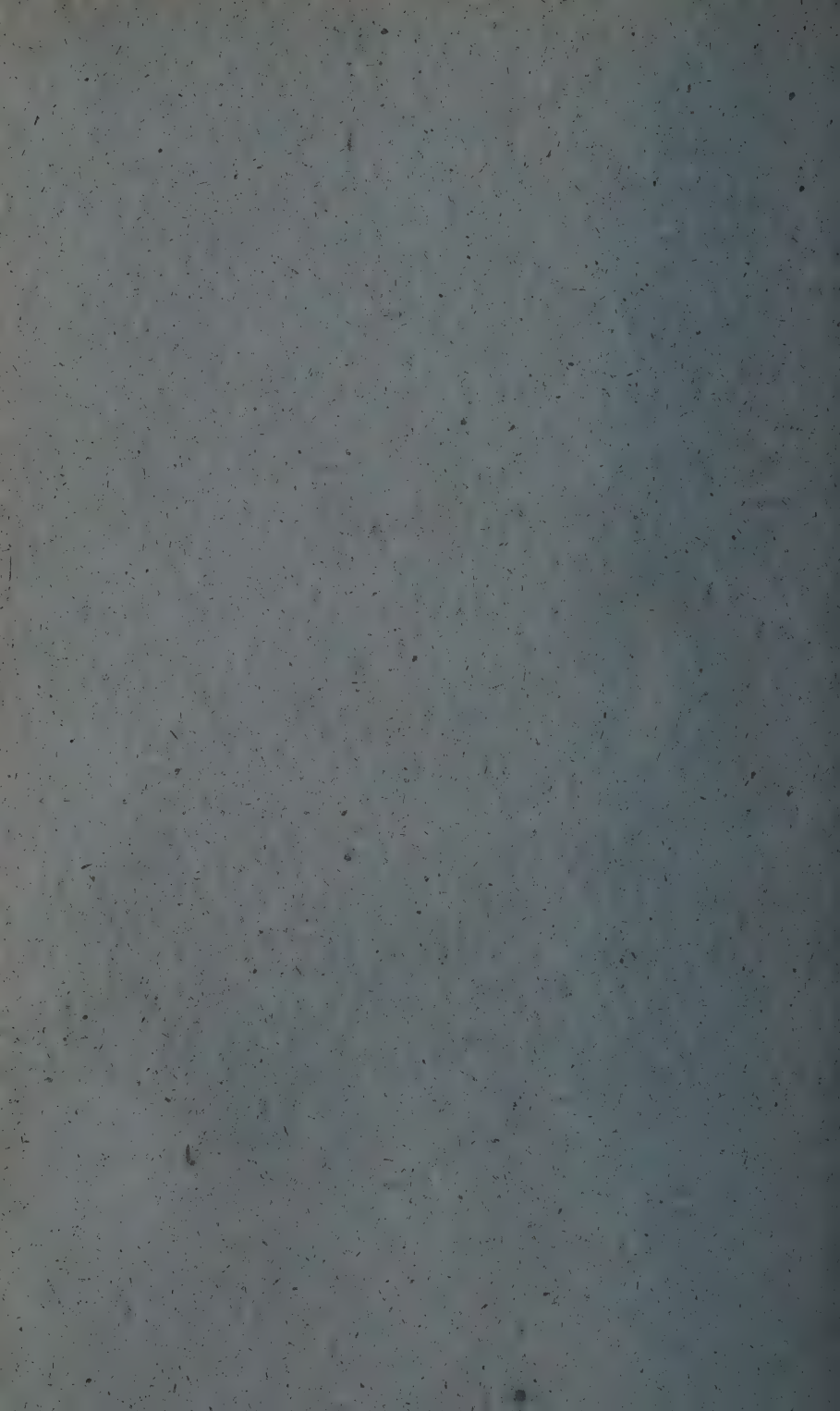
