While our town debt has been increased the past year by \$201.30, yet we believe the foregoing recapitulation is self-explanatory, inasmuch as the snow paths necessitated an extra outlay over the previous year by \$654.38, which on any average year it must exceed by 50 per cent. It must therefore be borne in mind that on this one item alone the responsibility rests for this increase. Therefore the situation is this—snow paths increased in cost by 50 per cent., yet by prudent and conservative business principles the town debt only increases 14 per cent.

Whole number of cases under quarantine, 1, that being scarlet fever, which remained in strict quarantine 42 days.

One case of the previous year was settled by the payment of doctor's bill and incidental charges amounting to \$29.64, and a bill of \$10.70 for supplies from Weeks & Seward during the quarantine of Uri Lane and John H. Davis; thus the town this year escapes with a total of \$40.34 for contagious diseases. We wish at this time to express our gratification for the manner in which cess-pools and all other places of filth throughout our town have been kept and at the same time recommend that close watch be kept on the household water supply, owing to its unusual lowness, that during this period wells should be cleaned and prepared for the heavy spring rains.

Report of Library Trustees.

DIVISION 1.

The spring term was taught by the teacher of last year, Miss Katherine N. Brown, of Kingston. Miss Brown, born a teacher, and with heart and soul in her work, made brilliant progress in this school. Seldom equalled and never excelled, she retained the re-

spect of her pupils to a degree far beyond the average teacher, and scholars leaving this school for a higher grade readily showed her superiority of teaching. At the close of this term the board with reluctance accepted her resignation. The scholarly attainments of Miss Brown will remain with us for a long time and the scholars fortunate to have her for an instructor show proof of her intellectual training. At the commencement of the fall term at the recommendation of a former teacher the board again were fortunate in securing the services of Miss Mary E. Folsom, a teacher of experience who at once became interested in her work, and the fall and winter terms have been ones of profit. Miss Folsom has rare tact and her ability as a teacher, especially with the smaller pupils, attests her worth in our district schools. Parents should visit this school and witness the interesting recitations of the lower grade when those bright boys and girls attend the "auction sale."

DIVISION 2.

This school, the largest in our town, was for the spring and fall terms under the charge of Miss Alice G. Smart, the teacher of last year. Words are inadequate to express the esteem in which Miss Smart was held both by pupil and parent. She resigned her position at the end of the fall term to accept one in a graded school of Saugus, Mass. Success awaits her. Good teachers are born, not made, and again the kind hand of Providence guided us to safety in securing Miss Smart's successor when we secured the services of Miss Bertha M. Rand, of Deerfield, who came highly recommended and thus far has showed that she was worthy of it. The school board have great confidence in Miss Rand, and her experience of 11 years as a teacher we think is worth much to us, and she will be retained for the spring term. Retain good teachers.

DIVISION 3.

Of Miss Susie O. French, the teacher of previous years, there can be said nothing that would add to what we said last year. At the visitation of the board the school room was neatly kept, order of a high degree maintained, and pupils interested in their work, which

must necessarily reflect on the teacher, and your committee agree that a teacher of experience is the best to employ.

DIVISION 4.

The spring and fall terms were under the charge of Miss Bessie M. French, the same teacher of last year, giving general satisfaction. A young lady of scholarly attainments, hers was perhaps the neatest register and deserves praise for its correctness. The winter term has been under the supervision of Miss J. Maud French, a teacher of little experience, yet her work has been of high order and merits the approval of the school board. Parents with a few exceptions generally satisfied. This school is the smallest in town, but composed of good scholars that stand perhaps as high as any of the other schools.

GENERAL REMARKS.

“Education, in the most extensive sense of the word, may comprehend every preparation that is made in our youth for the sequel of our lives.” So wrote an early author and how plainly it reflects on our after lives! If our young friends, who to-day attend our schools, could realize that their after lives are being mapped out to them in their early preparation at school and could look forward as we older ones look back we think that no wasted time would be indulged in, but every moment made to count as they climb the educational hill of life. No truer words were ever uttered than those of our parents, when we as school children were often told that we were seeing the best of our days, how as boys we were apt to look too lightly on our opportunities and rather question our parents’ words. But, my young friends of our schools of to-day, embrace every chance to obtain an education and while in school lose not one moment of the precious time, for once lost it never returns; profit by the advice of your elders, and if followed, in after years the wisdom of their remarks will manifest itself. The school board wish to thank the parents for their co-operation with teacher and themselves, and our schools of to-day are an improvement over a few years ago when a few inferior

teachers and also few excellent ones were under the instruction of a supervisory system and the geography thrown aside for the box of sand and colors substituted for the arithmetic. Common sense is perhaps the greatest factor in obtaining an education, both in pupil and instructor ; let us not depart wholly from those lines that our ancestors so closely adhered to and educated our leading men of to-day, for a system, not intended for the school room, but rather for the moulder with his box of sand. We have certainly been in the past year fortunate in regard to teachers and in the future with continued co-operation of parents, pupils and teachers, our schools will again be classed with those who guided them a few years ago, for no better results were ever attained than those of teachers under the direct guidance of those lamented educators, John J. Scammon and George Alfred Wiggin.
