

The Public Schools

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Acworth School Board:

I herewith submit by fifth annual report as superintendent of your school.

Schools are established that children may acquire knowledge of the fundamental operations by which they must earn their livelihood, and take their places as members and leaders of society. Believing that scholarship is the foundation of a good school, and that it should be given the main place in all school activities, there was instituted, last year, a scholarship contest in which all grammar schools of this supervisory union were represented. Each school sent one or two teams of three pupils each to Charlestown, on the appointed day, not to engage in play or to have a good time, but to take examinations in arithmetic, history, reading and geography. No prizes were offered, the only reward being the announcement of the results of the tests by teams and schools. I am sure the interest shown by the contestants and the competing schools answered the criticism sometimes heard that pupils do not now-a-days care for work or scholarship.

Financially, the district is in fine condition, starting the year with a good surplus. This made possible the remodelling and painting of South Acworth school. The burning of the "Town" school brought a loss upon the town which it could ill afford. However, it seems certain that help will be available to supplement a suitable appropriation by the town, so that the burden may not be as heavy as at first seemed. The opportunity is now offered Acworth to build a modern building, artistic in design, correct in physical features, such as lighting, heating and ventilation, and suitably equipped with modern school appliances. With little added expense, provision can be made for warm lunches, for the presentation of school plays or social activities, for instruction in wood work or sewing and allied subjects.

A recent movement in education is the broadcasting of school courses of study under the direction of the United States Commissioner of Education. The first series of courses started February 4 and consisted of broadcasts, twice weekly, of history and English lessons for the upper grammar grades. The time will soon be here when a school will be "out of date" that is not equipped with a good radio. The music appreciation courses of the New York city schools are broadcast directly from the New York class rooms. A radio in school would bring to the pupils of Acworth exactly the same work as the children of that rich city enjoy. These courses are just the beginning of more valuable work to come. In towns where school budgets must be closely watched, school boards will be hesitant about installing radios. It is here that the opportunity is offered to the large numbers of citizens who are interested in the schools, to show this interest in a way that will add much to the efficiency of those schools and bring a refining and a broadening influence into the lives of our pupils.

In America the people are constantly demanding a more complete education for a larger percentage of the people. Thus we find colleges and high schools growing in number and size. By looking over past Acworth Reports this movement is evident. During the year 1922-1923, two children

of Acworth were attending a high school in New Hampshire. The next year the number had increased to four. There has been a continuous yearly increase since that time until, in the current year, there are twenty young people of Acworth in New Hampshire high schools, eighteen of these

in your own school.

Your high school, under the efficient leadership of its Principal, is continuing the good work of previous years. The value of this school to the town is great. Your children are securing their education in their own town, as those of the cities do. They are having the advantages of the most efficient methods of teaching. It is interesting to note that the cost of this school will be noticeably less than has heretofore been paid for high school costs and high school tuition. Financially, as well as economically, it is a success.

I wish again to express my appreciation of the helpful

co-operation of the Acworth School Board.
