REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Alstead:

I herewith submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

SCHOOL ORGANIZATION

As in the preceding year five schools are maintained in the district.

The beginning of the year found three new teachers in the system. At the East Alstead school Miss Miller was succeeded by Miss Mildred Angier, and at the Center school, Mrs. Metcalf by Miss Alma Farinoli. Both of these teachers graduated from Keene Normal School in 1929. Miss Nellie Webster, Keene Normal School, 1928, succeeds Miss Prentiss at the Village Primary school.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Many needed improvements in the various schools have greatly bettered the physical conditions under which the children work. A part of these improvements were made possible by funds raised by the district. A considerable balance at the end of the year made other improvements possible.

The East Alstead and Mica Mine schools were painted on the outside. One side of the roof of the East Alstead school was newly shingled. Electric lights have been installed in both rooms of the village school. Both rooms of this school were equipped with new desks. The desks which were removed have been refinished and the tops resurfaced. The Mica Mine and East Alstead schools are now equipped with these reconditioned desks. Thus all the schools are suitably furnished with desks. The school grounds at the Village and East Alstead schools have been enclosed with strong serviceable fences. New shades were supplied at the Mica Mine and Alstead Center schools. These improvements, together with painting portions of the interiors of several buildings where needed, and repairs upon the foundations of the village and center schools, add much to a wholesome appearance of the buildings and greater comfort for the children.

I believe that conditions would be further bettered by the installation of chemical toilets in the schools. At present the East Alstead school is the only school thus equipped. I hope that another building may be wired for electric lights during the coming year.

HEALTH

The services of the school nurse are furnished the district for the full time provided by the amount approved for state aid, at the rate of \$1.50 per pupil. This gives the district her services for approximately four weeks. The nurse's itemized report of work done thus far appears in another part of the report.

HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

Of the seventeen pupils graduating from the eighth grade in June, 1929, eleven in September entered high school. In a town which has no high school, where attendance at high school is, at best, a considerable inconvenience for the pupil, I believe that this proportion is a most gratifying proof of the value placed by the parents and children on a higher education.

4. Decrease in expected payment for transportation of pupils.

Dear Sir:

I respectfully submit the following report as school nurse:

- 101 pupils were examined.
 - 4 pupils were underweight.
 - 87 pupils were in need of dental care.
 - 13 pupils were unvaccinated.
 - 10 pupils showed defective vision, uncorrected.
 - 1 pupil showed defective hearing.
 - 4 pupils showed some orthopedic defect.
- 21 pupils had enlarged or diseased tonsils.

6 visits were made and health conditions were talked over with the parents.

A dental clinic was held May 28, 1929, with work done as follows:

Total number treated,	12
Total number receiving complete care,	7
Total number having teeth cleaned,	. 6 ,
Total number of extractions,	9
Total number silver fillings,	17
Total number of operations,	32

The clinic rates as follows: Cleansing, \$.75; extractions, \$.50; silver fillings, \$1.00. The bill for this work was twentysix dollars (\$26.00) paid for by the parents of the children having work done.

A tonsil clinic was held at the Elliot Community Hospital, Keene, N. H., one child was treated.

3 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

7 pupils had special eye examinations and defects corrected.

7 pupils were vaccinated.

5 tonsil cases were treated privately.

I wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation of the parents in the work accomplished in the last year.
